Tigers Contest Stephenville 'B'

Hico's Tigers will change scenery this Thursday night, going to Stephenville to take on the Yellow Jacket B team in an 8 p.m. encounter at Tarleton State College Stadium. And the locals won't be in the best of shape for the second game of the season. Coach Jack Barnett reported Wednesday that two members of his starting eleven were doubtful for the game, one definitely out, and the other available for limited duty only, Edmund Horton, starting guard, will miss the contest with a skin infection, and Mike Gravette, starting halfback, is a doubtful starter. He suffered a leg injury in drills Tuesday. Other than minor bruises and soreness, the remainder of the

team is in sound physical condition. Coach Barnett scouted the Stephenville team last Saturday night in their game with Fort Worth Tech, a game that the Jackets won 26-6. "The Stephenville team is big, mobile and well-coached, and is by far the best Jacket team that Hico has faced in recent years," the coach observed in reporting at Hico Civic Club this week. Following the game with Stephenville this Thursday, the Tigers will go to Blanket next Friday night, before the next home game with Gorman on October 2. A large following is expected to go to Stephenville for the Thursday game.

Hico, Godley Battle to 14-14 Draw In Opener

Hico and Godley played a full 48-minute last Friday night, and after all was over, neither team could claim a win in the season opener for both. The score, in case you haven't heard, was 14-14.

Played in intermittent rain and drizzle, the game was a real rock 'em, sock 'em affair, and the outcome was in doubt right down to the final gun as both teams had possession in the other's territory twice in the final three minutes. Hico's markers came in the second and fourth quarters, and Godley tallied both of its TDs in the first half.

Out-weighted 24 pounds per man, the smaller Tigers took the fight to the visitors for the full 48 minutes, and when the final gun sounded, Hico appeared to have worn the larger team down. Many fans remarked after the game that this was one of the best conditioned teams seen here in recent years.

The game brought out two positive conclusions—first, small as the Hico team may seem, they are hitters, and second, this is perhaps the best all-around set of backs Hico has had in many years. The four starters, quarterback Charles Erick, halfbacks Mike Gravette and Alan Solsbery, and fullback Dwain Gray offer as much speed and quickness as any in the district, and the starting line, small as they might seem, are hitters. They carried the fight

to the larger Godley team all evening.

Godley started out as if they intended to run the Tigers completely out of the stadium, taking the opening kickoff and marching to the Hico six yard line before losing possession via the fumble route. Hico recovered on the two yard line, only to hand the ball back to the Wildcats on the first play with a fumble of their own. It looked like a game of swap-out as the visitors quickly gave up possession for the second time with a fumble at the four.

The Tigers chose to get the 'Cats away from their door by taking advantage of a north wind to kick out of danger. Erick lofted a boomer 47 yards to the midfield stripe.

Following the kick, and a fumble by Godley, Hico showed a little offense of their own, working to the visitors' 25-yard line before having the boom lowered on them. James McGehee, a 190-pound fullback, strode under an Erick pass at the 30 yard line, and was long-gone 70 yards down the west sideline for the first counter of the night. The interception came on the final play of the first quarter.

Following an exchange of downs in the second period, Hico got on the scoreboard with one of the most impressive runs ever seen here. Dwain Gray, an ineligible last year, literally ran away from

and over people fighting his way 45 yards for the marker. Enroute to the end zone, the speedy sophomore shook off four solid tackles to cross into the pay area standing up. He also got the call on the conversion attempt, and delivered with the go-ahead two-pointer.

Godley bounced right back with the kickoff, using six plays and the bruising running of McGehee to take the lead 14-8. The Tigers made one threatening gesture before the half, working to the 28. Big gainer in the series was a well-executed screen pass to Alan Solsbery for 22 yards.

The third period was all Hico's, even though the Tigers failed to score. Their deepest penetration was to the visitor's 12 yard line where a drive was killed by a matter of inches. Godley only had possession for five plays during the entire period.

A blocked punt which was picked up by Larry Shipman and run to the four yard line, paved the way for the final score of the night. The marker came on a pass play from Erick to Mike Gravette, another red-shirt from last year. The play covered four yards and tied the game at 14-14. A similar pass play failed to get the go-ahead points.

Considering the caliber of opposition and the fact that this was the season-opener, the team appeared to be capable of winning its share of ball games this season.

Results of Community ASCS Election Released This Week

Results of the recent ASCS community committee election were released this week by S. E. Cloninger, office manager.

There were a total of 683 ballots cast in the election, which compares with 647 last year. Committees were elected for a term of one year, and will take office October 1, 1964.

1965 Wheat Sign Up

The 1965 wheat sign-up began August 24 and will close Oct. 2. To date 39 wheat producers have signed an intention to participate in the program.

To be eligible for marketing certificates, a producer must sign an intention, divert a minimum of 11.11 percent of the allotment and be in compliance on all other wheat farms. Producers who do not under-

stand all provisions of the wheat program should contact the County Office, County or Community Committeemen.

The Hamilton County USDA Disaster Committee, which is composed of Alvin Perry, chairman of ASCS Committee, George Krupala, FHA, DeMarquis Gordon, county agent, Lawrence Kavanaugh, farmer, W. G. Barkley, banker, and Robert S. Jones, Federal Land Bank, made a request and recommendation that Hamilton County be approved for grazing of CR and Diverted acres and for emergency grain.

About the time the request was made, the area received some rain. On September 9 the State Disaster Committee deferred action on the application.

If sufficient rainfall is not received for seeding of small grains and more rain on the range, the request will be made again, according to Cloninger.

Producers interested in this program should let it be known to the Disaster Committee.

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Moisquitos are always a nuisance when they are present, but this year people are more concerned about mosquito control than usual. Effective control in Hamilton County will require cooperative efforts of all individuals.

As you probably know, mosquitoes pass through four stages of development—egg, larva (wiggler), pupa, and adult. Eggs are laid in clusters of about 50 to 200, and several clusters may be laid by one female. In warm weather, the eggs of most species hatch in two or three days.

Larvae that hatch from the eggs feed mainly on bits of organic matter in the water. Most species must come to the water surface for air. Larvae usually change to pupae within a week. Pupae, sometimes called tumblers, become adults in about two days. In another day or two, the female adults are ready to feed. Male mosquitoes do not bite.

The first step in mosquito control is to remove all water available for larval development. In addition to large bodies of water other common problem areas include dripping outdoor faucets and leak pipes, puddles resulting from evaporative cooler drainage, tin cans, and other articles which can trap and hold even small quantities of water.

The second step is to check ponds, water troughs, and other bodies of water for wigglers. If wigglers are present, treat water with Kerosene, non-leaded gasoline or oil. Stock tanks may be treated with kerosene without harming livestock that drink from them. Use 8-10 oz. of kerosene or oil per 100 square feet on tanks with vegetation, or 2-4 oz. per 100 square feet on tanks without vegetation.

The third step is adult mosquito control. They may be controlled in the home of other buildings with a prepared household spray or aerosol bomb containing pyrethrin, or allethrin. Another method is to apply a residual household oil spray of 5 percent DDT, two percent chlordane, 0.5 percent dieldrin, or 2 percent malathion to dark secluded spots, under chairs, tables, beds, bookcases, in closets and behind pictures. The newer materials used for fly control are also effective for mosquito control.

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HAMILTON-CORYELL SCS News

Maxie Brown, a district cooperater in the Cranfills Gap area, sprigged a waterway to Coastal Bermuda grass recently. He used about 200 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer to encourage maximum growth before frost. Before sprigging, this waterway was shaped and a good seed bed was prepared. This September has been a good month to sprig Coastal in waterways and on pastureland because of favorable moisture conditions.

If the bermuda grass grows off well this fall, it should come out early next spring and cover the ground quickly.

Two practices that help establish a waterway quickly are to control weeds by shredding or mowing and keep livestock off the grass until it is well established.

Gene Pruitt, a district supervisor in the Blue Ridge community, has established a waterway during the past two years under extremely dry conditions. His waterway was fertilized, shredded and was grazed very little the first growing season.

Some farmers like to sprig Coastal bermuda grass in waterways and overseed with Common Bermuda. This is a good way to insure a good grass cover and reduce erosion in the bottom of the waterway.

Delvin Marwitz, in the Evant area, has a soil and water conservation plan that was prepared this summer with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. He has about 60 percent of his program complete. He has controlled about 150 acres of brush, established two diversions and a number of terraces. Next spring he plans to establish about 9 acres of native grasses and one grassed waterway.

M. I. Knudon, near Hico, constructed a farm pond during the early part of this year. He plans to rough up the entire dam area, fertilize and plant it to Common Bermuda grass. This will reduce water erosion especially on the front and back slopes.

A large number of land owners

COW POKES

"Jake, how many times do I hafta tell you to stay outta my flower beds?"

In this area will soon receive channel catfish to stock their livestock ponds. These fish will be delivered from the federal hatchery at Inks Lake without cost to the landowner. For this reason some people will not treat the fish with all the respect due them.

If you are to receive stocker catfish, be sure you have made all necessary arrangements for the stocking to be successful. This will include having a pond with sufficient depth so that it will not go

dry or get so low that the fish die from lack of oxygen.

Another common error is to overstock ponds. The average sized pond will only require 35-50 channel cat to be adequately stocked. This number falls far short of what many pond owners think their pond should support that they often obtain additional fish from other sources and add to the pond. This usually causes an overpopulation of the pond and a very slow growth rate on most of the

fish.

A common complaint of pond owners is that they can't catch catfish in their ponds even though they have been stocked. They often believe the fish all died or were caught by coons and cranes. These things could happen but in most instances do not. The best explanation for their poor catfish fishing is that they are probably fishing in the daytime for a fish that is classified as a night feeder.

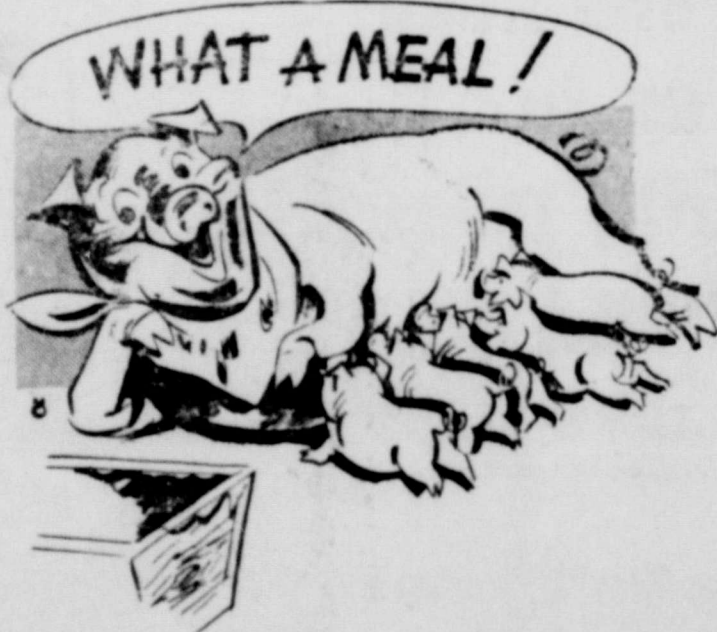
