Bond Assumption, Tax Election Wins Approval

HAMILTON COUNTY APPROVED FOR EMERGENCY LOANS

Hamilton County has been approved by the Farmer Home Administration for emergency loans to farmers and livestock raisers hit hardest by the summer drouth.

According to George Krupala, local FHA County Supervisor, farmers will be considered for FHA loans at three per cent interest to enable them to continue normal operations, but not for any expansion.

These loans are conditioned on the exhaustion of present credit and the potential borrower must be referred to FHA by the present creditor. The qualifying borrower would then be carried on an emergency basis until he was able to return to his normal source of credit.

This is expected to be of value to some farmers and livestock raisers hit by the summer drouth condition.

There was an underground river running strong and controlled by concrete embankments and ponds where the fish were fed and raised. Many people were out early fishing. At Mena, Ark, they visited the Wilhelmina State Park and had coffee at Queen Wilhelmina's Castle amidst the majestic Ouachita Mountain Range. One of the feature attractions was Queen Wilhelmina Inn, which was restored in 1960. The original sandstone edifice was erected in 1896 by Dutch promoters of Kansas City Southern Railroald to increase the passengar traffic and the somewhat far-fetched hope that the Dutch Queen would make her summer residence there. It was turned into a hotel for a few years. It was one of the country's leading exclusive summer retreats. The old train engine is parked nearby. A miniature railroad takes visitors on a twomile circuit of the mountain top providing a magnificent panorama of the surrounding valleys, ridges, lovers leap, a rocky cliff projecting high over an almost perpendicular drop to the bottom of the canyon below is a feature attrac-

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
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


