New Facilities Assures Hico Adequate Electric Supply

Community Public Service Company has recently completed a new 66,000 volt feeder line into Hico, which is connected to an existing 66 KV line three miles south of Iredell. A new sub-station has also been constructed in Hico, just east of the power plant, and has an output of 3750 KVA or more. The existing sub-station located at the plant has a total output of 1500 KVA.

The new sub-station will also have an alternate feeder line of 22,000 volts which is now the existing line from Walnut Springs through Iredell to Hico. In case of power failure from either of the above sources, or both sources facilities will be constructed to serve Hico from a 22,000 volt existing line from Hamilton, as well as possible use of the power plant as a standby in an extreme emergency. The new station will be equipped with primary voltage regulators and automatic oil circuit breakers.

O. L. Davis, District Manager, said that his company plans to build two new circuits out of the new station to tie in with existing circuits in the town of Hico. At that time, Mr. Davis pointed out, the city will be cut over from the existing 2400 volt primary system to a 4160 volt system, and feeders which will enable the distribution to be much better balanced and will offer improved service to all customers.

Mr. Jake Perry, line foreman from Clifton, was in charge of constructing the highline, and Mr. W. E. Ellis, Division Engineer, Mr. W. L. Spieler, Division Maintenance Foreman, and Mr. Owen Ringness, Electrical Engineer from Fort Worth, were in charge of constructing the new sub-station.

Community Public Service Company has hopes that Hico will continue to grow as in the past, and the ultimate goal, Mr. Davis said, "is continuity of electrical

service." The accompanying photos gives a general picture of the new facilities.

Hico, Meridian Hook Up in District Football Opener

Hico and Meridian will hook up Friday night at Tiger Stadium in the first district football game of the year for both teams. And the Jackets will be top-heavy favorites to make the Tigers their first victim in their drive to repeat as district champs.

The Jackets come to town with an experienced group of boys, most of them hold-overs from the regional champion team of last season. They are co-favorites with Valley Mills to dominate district play, with the championship probably being decided in the last game of the season when the two teams meet.

son and Mike Gravette join the other regulars on the injury list; however, both are expected to play, but won't be at full strength.

Meridian will enter the game with a record of two wins and four losses, while Hico's slate reads two wins, one tie and three losses.

Game time will be 7:30 p.m. instead of the usual 8 o'clock starting time.

Bishop Lynch Downs Tigers

The Bishop Lynch Friars of Dallas, paced by the running of halfback Dale Lawrence and the passing of quarterback Jim Rager, blanked the Hico Tigers 33-0 in a game played at Seagoville last Friday.

Halfback Joe Hener drove off tackle for five yards and the Friars' first score in the second quarter. Later in the second period, the Friars scored on a 12-yard TD pass.

Bishop Lynch scored twice more in the third quarter, once on a 5-yard trap play, and later on a 3-yard slant off left tackle. Final tally came on an eight-yard run in the fourth period.

The Tigers posed two serious scoring threats. After the opening kickoff they drove down to the Bishop Lynch 12 yard line, where a pass interception killed the opportunity.

On the last play of the game, James Crews tossed a screen pass to Leslie Roal, who ran 43 yards to the Friars' 7-yard line.

All those in favor of or in opposition to the designation of Hamilton County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area are invited to attend. If no opposition is presented, Hamilton County will be designated as a Control Area effective February 3, 1965.

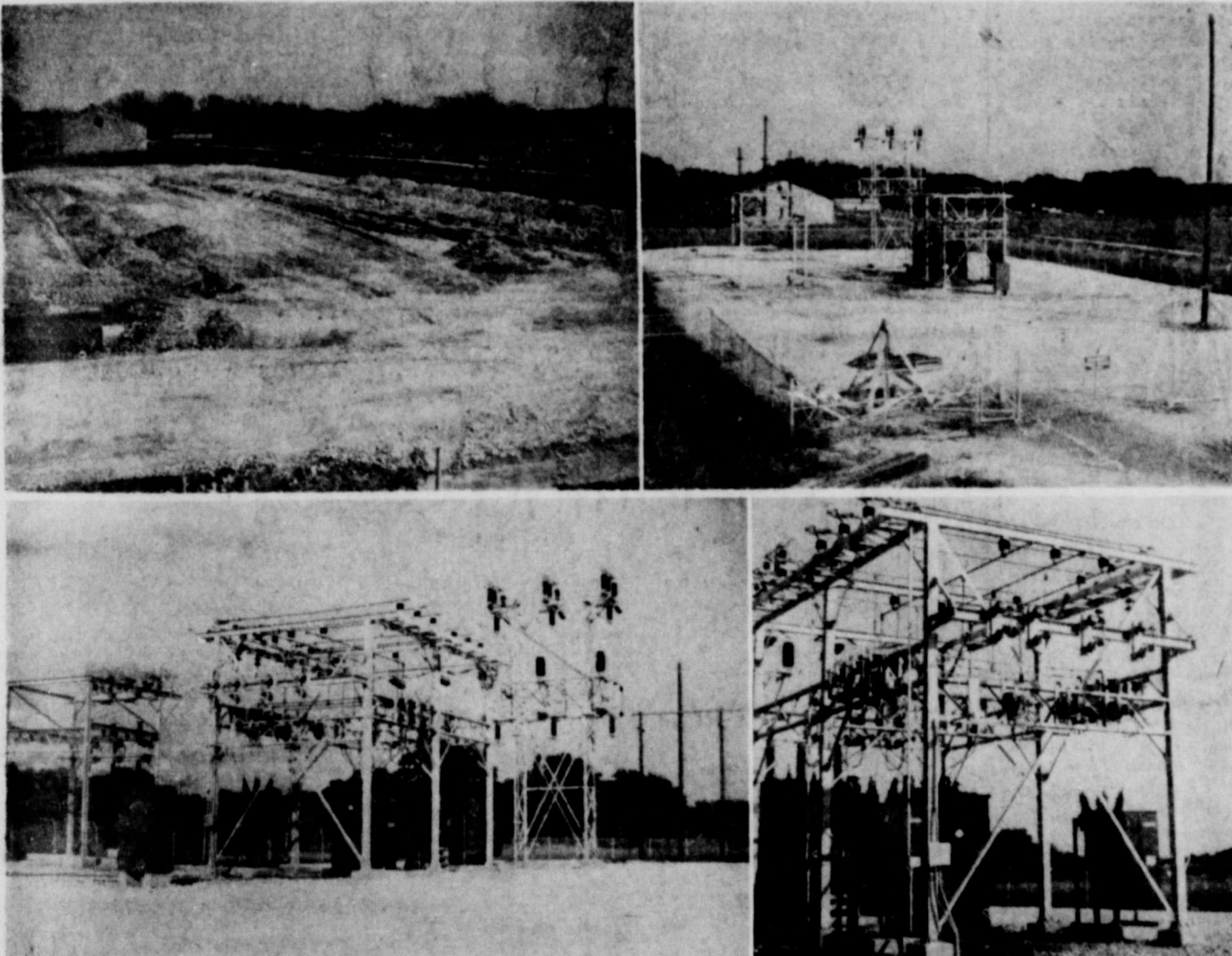
Everyone had a good time getting together whether they won or lost.

Good Range Management Proven Profit-Maker

During the past several weeks rainfall in the District has been above the average. Most farm fields are full. The rains came early enough to insure good growth of range grasses where there have not been over-grazed. There are two reasons why over-grazed range grasses will not be much of a recovery. The first is a weakened root system and the second is that most of the water falling on over-grazed ranges appeared as run-off and did not penetrate the ground.

Run-off results in a loss two ways. The first is loss of needed moisture and the second is loss of top soil through erosion. The loss of soil moisture is permanent. Both can be corrected through proper use of rangeland.

This year the Journal of Range Management published the results of twenty years of study and research on water penetration of soil on ranges heavily grazed, moderately grazed, lightly grazed, and non-grazed. The study was

made by soil scientists, research agricultural engineers, and research agronomists. It was found that water intake was inversely proportional to the grazing intensity. In other words, the shorter the grass was grazed the less the water penetrated the soil. It was also noted that on heavily grazed ranges the tall high producing grasses disappeared and all that survived was the short low producing grasses. The tall high producing bunch grasses made up most of the vegetation on moderately grazed and lightly grazed areas.

All over the district one can see the results of range management. On ranges over-grazed there will be little or no forage for winter grazing. This means the operator will have to buy both hay and concentrates if livestock are kept through the winter. In all probability, at present prices, it will take most of the calf crop or other productions to pay the feed bill. Little or nothing will be left for the rancher. For those who have not over-grazed there will likely be all

the winter grazing needed to carry livestock on the range with the addition of a small amount of concentrates. This means a feed bill of about one-third of the cost of 'o'h hay and concentrates.

It has been found through research that a simple "rule-of-thumb" is to graze off half the total production of forage and leave half on the land. By this procedure, prospects are good that there will always be plenty of grass on the range throughout the growing season and an ample supply left for winter grazing.

Forage production depends on the grass or quality of land, rainfall, and grazing practices. Little or nothing can be done about the land potential or rainfall. A lot can be done about proper range use. This is a matter of management. If in doubt about management problems consult Soil Conservation Service technicians at Hamilton or Gatesville. They have authentic information developed through research that will enable ranchers to obtain highest per acre beef production possible and at the same time keep ranges in good to excellent condition.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Claude Hoffman and I took a group of 4-H boys out to the city lake near Hamilton Saturday to study grasses. The warm season grasses are now mature and can easily be identified. The boys learned to identify nine different plants. In addition to identifying the plants they learned some of the more important characteristics of each plant. The boys who went on the grass field study trip were Danny Berry, Eldon Black, Randy Dyer, C. B. Cathey, Ray Reinert, Lance Rutherford, Chris Hoffman, Cal Van Hoffman, and John Hoffman. From this group a grass judging team will be organized, to compete in contests next year.

Another group of 4-H boys met last Tuesday night to study electricity. J. L. Harris is adult leader working with the boys interested in learning more about electricity.

The county agent's office will be closed next week. We will be in College Station all week attending the State Extension Service Conference. Theme of the conference will be "New Horizons in Adult Education."

Hamilton County farmers and ranchers will need this year's business records to help answer questions on a form scheduled for mailing in early November to

start the nationwide Census of Agriculture. The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years. It provides information of vital importance about the nation's agricultural resources and production. The data gathered will include the number and size of farms, number of persons living on farms, acreage and harvest of crops, a livestock and poultry inventory, and information on farm equipment and facilities, and on income and some production expenditures.

Shortly after November 1, the Census Bureau will mail out census questionnaires to all rural boxholders in the county. Farm operators will then have a period of time to consult their records and answer the questions on the forms. In some cases where records are not available the best estimates will be used.

Local citizens, working as enumerators, will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions the farmers may not have been able to answer. Enumerator visits, which will take about three weeks, to complete, will start on November 23.
