FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH— Postmaster Pushes Planning

A little planning during the Thanksgiving holidays can help avoid the "Christmas Rush" Postmaster Robert Jackson said this week.

The Hico postmaster has some tips which will not only put ZIP into Christmas mailing, but help local postal employees move the record-breaking mountain of mail that is expected this season.

1. Find last year's Christmas mailing list. If you don't find it, make one up.
2. Check to see that all addresses are correct.
3. Wherever possible, add the ZIP code to the addresses on the

list.

4. Determine your list of gift purchases which must be mailed. The postmaster emphasized that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He also suggested that the address be written on only one side of the exterior wrapping and that a duplicate address be included inside the carton, in case the outer covering is not secure and comes off.

Mr. Jackson said that the Post Office Department is predicting a record seven billion pieces of mail will move through the postal system during the peak rush just before Christmas.

"Cooperation of all mailers is vital for us to deliver each holiday card, letter, and package before Christmas Day. A little planning will make the Christmas rush less hectic for everyone," he said.

U.S. Engineers Will Survey County Buildings For Civil Defense

Fort Worth, Nov. 23.—A team from the Fort Worth District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, will conduct an updating survey of newly-constructed buildings in Hamilton County beginning the week of November 23.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Plans for the observance of Farm-City Week in Hamilton Co. have been completed. Purpose of the national observance is to promote better understanding between farm and city residents, and to increase the knowledge and appreciation of each other for the American way of life.

President Johnson has proclaimed the period from November 20-26 as National Farm-City Week and has urged urban and rural residents to participate in the locally planned activities. Appropriately the observance ends on Thanksgiving Day and we all have a lot to be thankful for.

Many people do not think agriculture is important today because we have only 11 percent of our people living on farms and ranches. Actually, about 40 percent of all the people in our state are either engaged in farming or ranching, in supplying production needs to farmers or in processing and distributing agricultural products.

About 96 percent of all of the agricultural production in Texas must pass through business firms in our state before reaching the final consumer. This is one reason why agriculture is very important to our economy.

The farmers and ranchers are largely responsible for the high standard of living that Americans enjoy today. When the consumer went down to the retail store dur-

ing the 1920s and purchased a pound of beef steak, a pound of pork, a quart of milk, one dozen eggs, a pound loaf of bread, a dozen oranges and a 10 pound sack of potatoes, and based upon the average wages at that time, he would have had to work about 4 hours and 29 minutes to buy that bill of groceries. This would leave him only 3 hours and 31 minutes out of an 8-hour work day to earn money to pay for his shelter, his clothing and other needs of the family.

Today it's a different picture because it takes only about one hour and 42 minutes of labor to buy this same bill of goods. As a result he has about 6 hours and 18 minutes left out of an 8-hour work day in which to earn money to

buy such items as clothing, shel- ter, TV sets, automobiles, air conditioning units and many other things.

Of course, one of the reasons why it takes fewer hours of labor to buy food today is that wages have gone up much faster than the price of food and fiber.

Since consumers have more money left to buy these other items it creates a good demand of these other items and as a result this helps to create a demand for labor which to some extent may be one of the reasons why wages have been able to increase thru the years.

Make a special effort to get a better understanding of business and agriculture. They depend on each other.
