First Bonus Drawing Scheduled Saturday

Three More Slated Before Christmas

Hico merchants will kick off their Christmas Bonus Day program this Saturday when the first of four cash drawings will be held. Drawing time is 4 p. m. on Main Street.

Five cash awards will be presented to lucky persons who are present for the drawing. First prize is for \$40 in cash; second for \$20; third and fourth for \$10 each; and fifth is for \$5.00.

The Saturday give-away will be followed by three more, to be held on the next two Saturdays and Christmas Eve Day. The two Saturday drawings will offer awards the same as this Saturday, but cash will be stepped up Christmas Eve when a total of \$120.00 will be distributed among five winners. First prize for the final day will be \$50 cash; second and third for \$25.00 each; and fourth and fifth for \$10 each.

Deadline For Destroying Cotton Stalks Changed To December 15th

The deadline to destroy cotton stalks in Hamilton County has been extended from December 1 to December 15, according to De Gordon, County Agent.

John C. White, State Commissioner of Agriculture, extended the plow-up date because of the unfavorable weather for cotton harvest.

The compulsory destruction is a part of the pink bollworm control program. The cultural practice is still the best and most economical program available to control the pink bollworm.

If the clear weather continues in Hamilton County cotton producers should be able to have their cotton harvested and stalks destroyed by December 15.

Iredell Defends Regional Championship at Buckholts

Iredell Defends Regional Championship at Buckholts

Iredell Dragons, seeking their consecutive Regional Six-Football Championship will play to Buckholts Saturday for an encounter with Buckholts beginning at 7:30 p. m. The boys gained the right to battle Buckholts last Friday night by beating the Normangee Panthers at Iredell.

Officials from the two schools immediately following the game at Iredell, and Buckholts of the coin-toss correct-get the play-off site.

Iredell Coach C. H. Mims said early this week that Buckholts is probably the strongest team that the Dragons have met thus far, and cited some comparative scores as basis for his prediction.

Iredell and Buckholts have met four common opponents this season, with results as follows: Iredell downed Jonesboro 18-12, while Buckholts defeated the same team 60-12; the Dragons won over Abbott 42-18 while Buckholts defeated the same team 52-14; Buckholts dumped Turnersville 56-18, and Iredell eked out a 26-24 win; and the Dragons lost to Oglesby 20-32 while Buckholts downed the Tigers 62-32.

Buckholts is 10-0 for the year, drawing a bye into the regional game. Iredell's record now stands at 9-2.

Coach Mims said that he wasn't conceding anything to the host team, however, and that fans who make the trip would see a good ball game. Buckholts is located about 20 miles southeast of Temple on the Cameron Highway.

In last week's bi-district game, the Dragons jumped on the visiting Normangee team for 22 quick points and breezed on to the one-sided win.

Normangee managed its first touchdown early in the second quarter, but Iredell scored 21

themselves in the second period to move out front 43-8 at half-time.

Starting the third quarter, Bud Strong passed eight yards to Dan Bakke for a touchdown to add icing to the cake, and from that point on Coach Mims inserted the reserves for the remainder of the game. Even then Normangee had to use a recovered Dragon fumble at the one yard line to make their final tally.

Performing well for the Dragons were George Copeland, Eud Strong, Butch Bateman, Jud Roach, Dan Bakke, Johnny Sartor and David Mims.

A large following of Dragon fans is expected to make the trip for the Saturday night game.

Parcel Post Hints

Package parcels solidly," and addresses which are either incorrect or not legible are responsible for the non-delivery of about half a million parcels each year.

If the return address is incorrect or illegible and the package cannot be returned, it will be saved for about 90 days. If unclaimed, the parcel is usually lost to the sender or intended recipient. Such parcels wind up in public auctions held at 15 major post offices across the nation.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should also have the address written on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off.

Mr. Jackson emphasized that Zip Coding the addresses on parcels and letters helps insure against loss due to improper addressing. Since each area of the country has an individual Zip Code, there is little chance of a piece of mail destined for one city being directed to a city which may have a similar name. For example, there are at least 26 possible areas around the country which would have Springfield in the address. Use of the proper Zip Code would send the mail to the right post office.

When packing a gift, remember that the package you send should be shipped on the bottom of the sack and there may be other packages on top. Among relatively few packages that are damaged in transit, improper packing is the greatest factor," postmaster cautioned.

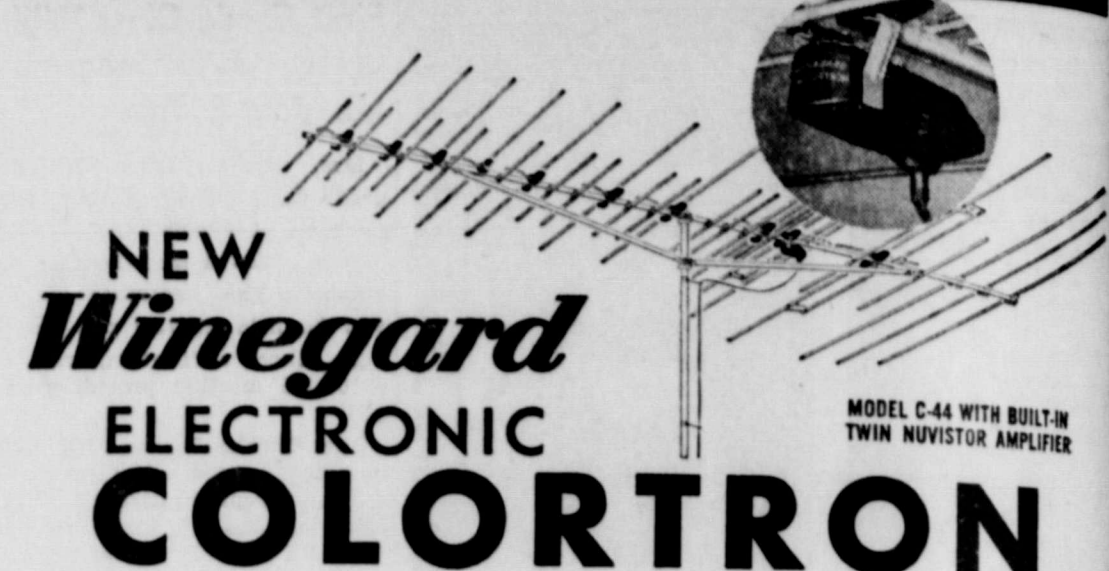

Game Warden Reports

By BOB RHUDD

Deer season opened up slow throughout this area with the kill about 50 percent of what it was this time last year. There could be many reasons for this, one of the main ones being the warm weather we had opening weekend.

Upon checking the cold storage plants I estimate there was about 150 deer killed in Bosque County the first weekend. All the deer I checked were in very good condition and weighed out real good.

However the antlers were small as compared to some of them last year. A reason for this could be that last spring when these antlers began to grow, it was dry in this area and this is a very critical time for antler growth. I believe if we had had some of the fine rains we have had the past few weeks then it would have made a difference in the size of the antlers.

With the colder weather that has come in the past few days I believe the hunting will get better. So you sportsmen that did not get your buck the first week try again, because you still have about four weeks left.

Quail season opened December 1 and will run through Jan. 31. From my observation of the quail through the summer I do not believe we have as many as we did this time last year. With the frost we had last week the weeds and grass should be killed out real good to see some good bird dog work.

Quail limit this year is 12 a day and 36 in possession, and your gun must be plugged to a three-shot capacity. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset.

Again I want to remind you to be extra careful while you are hunting. Most accidents are caused by some fellow not practicing gun safety. Gun safety should always be practiced when handling firearms.

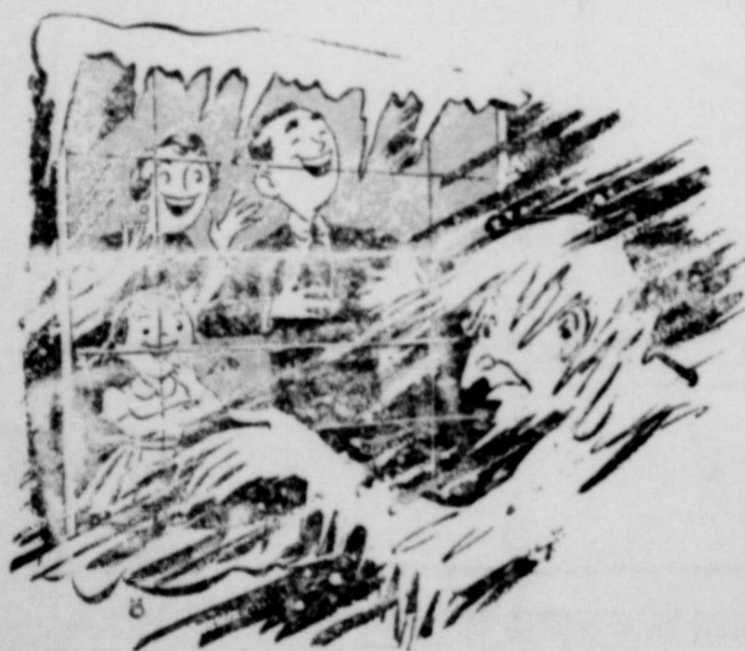

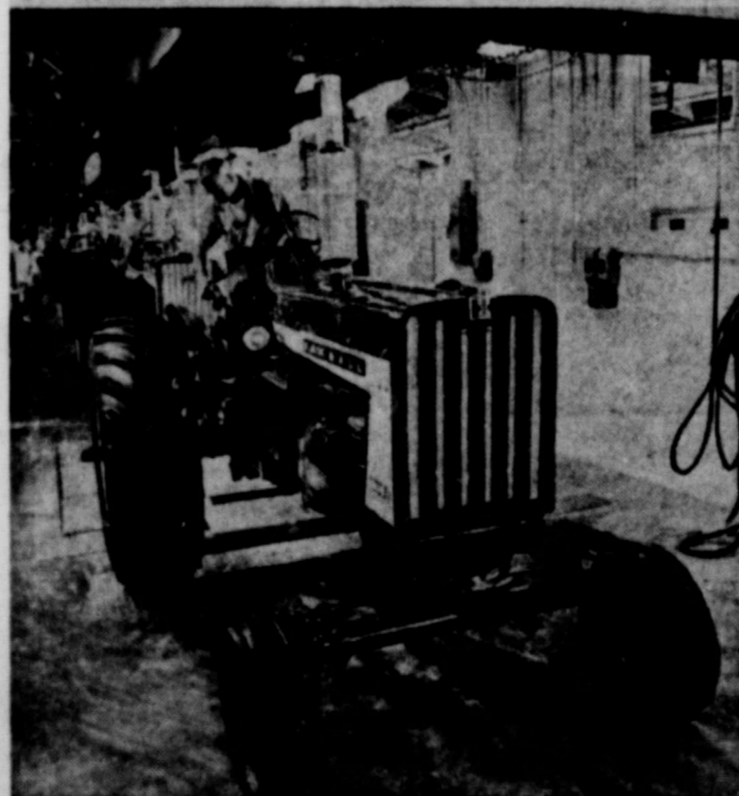
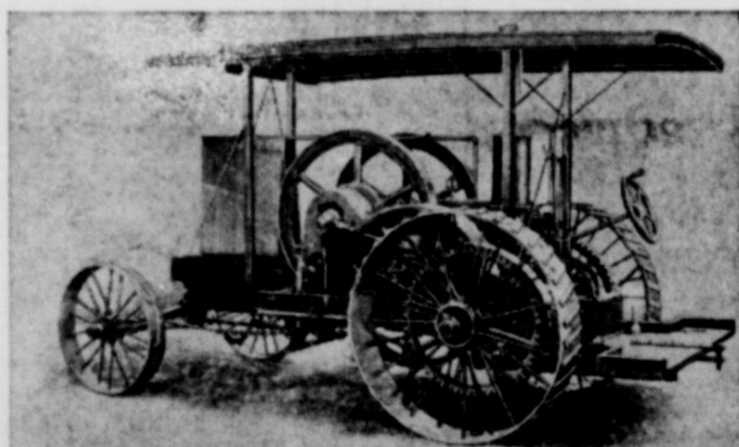
