For Christmas Mailing—

Record Volume Predicted By Postal Department

Postmaster Robert Jackson reports that the Post Office Department is confidently predicting that the volume of mail during this year's Christmas rush will hit a record high. "Actually, it's an easy prediction because mail volume has been rising at a rate of nearly three percent a year for the past several years and this is most strongly reflected around the holiday season."

The postmaster reports that public cooperation is one important reason that post offices around the country are able to handle the huge mountain of mail in such a short period.

"Without the assistance of the public, we'd be in a jam. People who shop early and get their cards and parcels into the mails early make it possible for the holiday mail to be delivered on time. Imagine what it would be like if we were to get all the holiday mails the last week before Christmas."

In addition to early mailing the postmaster has several other suggestions which will help employees move this avalanche of mail. First he recommends using Zip Codes which help handle the mails faster because of a new transportation and distribution set-up. He also recommended that all parcels be wrapped securely, packed tightly and that the address be included inside the package as well as on the outside. This helps assure delivery even if the outer wrapping comes loose. The Zip Code on parcels usually means a more direct routing and less handling, and the change of damage is drastically reduced.

SANTA LETTERS WILL BE PUBLISHED IN HICO NEWS REVIEW

December 15th Designated as Social Security Day in County

December 15th has been designated Social Security Day for Hamilton County. Mr. Jack Calvert, manager, Mr. Henry Madeley, assistant manager, and at least one other representative from the Temple Social Security office will be in Hamilton at the Court House from 9:30 a.m. to 12, and from 1:00 p.m. until everyone has been interviewed.

Mr. Calvert stated that due to the many changes in the Social Security law in recent years, many people are losing benefits. He is hoping everyone in the county past age 65 who has social security credit will come in and file a claim.

"It is true," he stated, "that some of these people will not be paid immediately because they have not retired, but there are many advantages to filing now. It is possible that a person may receive some checks in a year that are not being lost, because a claim has never been filed."

It was pointed out also that a large number of men and women

over 62 years of age, but not yet 65, should be receiving the reduced benefit. The reason these persons have not filed is due mainly to the fact that they do not understand the law. It is hoped these people will come in and get the facts concerning their rights under the law. "Some people are under the impression that if they earn over \$1200 in a year, no benefits can be paid. This is not correct," Mr. Calvert advises. "We have cases where a person is earning \$3000 a year and is still getting one or two checks. Every case is different, and for this reason each person should get the facts concerning their own particular situation."

This is the purpose of designating December 15th as Social Security Day. It is hoped that everyone with social security questions will take advantage of three representatives being available to serve their needs. Everyone 65 years of age or older should take advantage of this opportunity to learn where they stand with respect to future benefits.

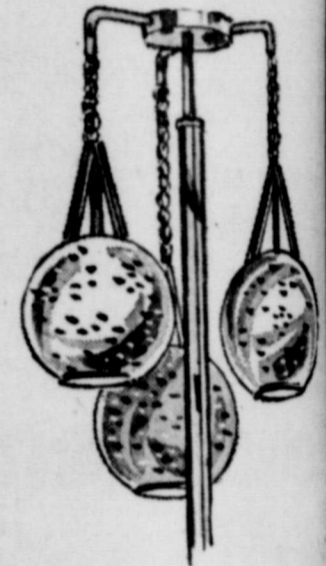

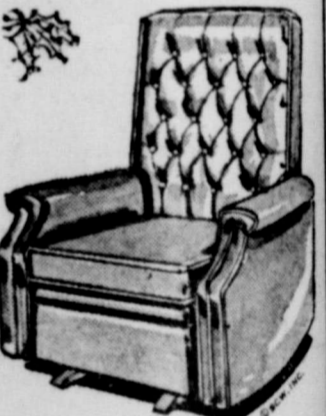

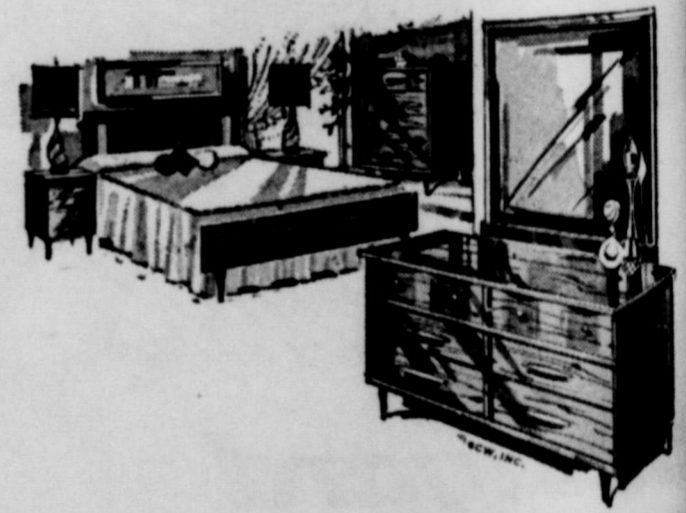

Christmas Shopping? The season will be a whopper, the biggest ever. Merchants are optimistic as early shoppers move to beat the rush. Supplies are heavy. There will be an unusual emphasis on luxury goods, and the signs are that people will grab them up. Any possibility of shortages? If you wait too long, yes. Some items just can't be stocked in adequate quantities.

Prices? Prices are high on many gift items. Expect to pay more for furniture, more for silver items, more for men's and women's clothing than a year ago. Other things will seem higher, but it's mainly because the quality has been upgraded. This will be true of toys, among other things.

Christmas Mail Timetable? To assure delivery before Christmas, meet these deadlines: packages for distant points Dec. 5 (did you make it?); out of town cards, Dec. 10; local packages, Dec. 14; local cards, Dec. 15.

Death is something we don't like to think about, nor, for that matter, make plans for—but why not? It is an experience and an expense that will, sooner or later, be borne by all. The Hamilton County Home Demonstration Clubs felt they needed to know more about the subject and make some

plans toward it. Leaders from each club come in for training and they in turn took the program on the cost of dying to their respective clubs.

Certainly the cost of death should be a part of any family's money management program. Some planning as to how this expense will be taken care of must be made. Several means used to cover the expense are: saving, accounts, social security, insurance, burial policies and veteran's benefits.

What a family spends on a funeral is an individual family preference. However, if discussed and planned ahead of time, when the family is not in an emotionally upset state, wiser decisions can be made.

You will find this varies greatly with different locations. What price casket would you desire? They range as low as \$150 on up to several thousand dollars. Do you prefer a vault? Again, cost varies from \$275 on up. Where shall services be held—at the church or the funeral chapel? Who shall hold the services? And what about the special arrangements that need to be made such as obituary notices, special music, what songs, what type family sprays, and what about public flowers? You might want to request gifts to charitable organizations instead of flowers. And finally, but not least important, have proper arrangements for the settlement of the estate been made?

After discussing these things with your family, as did many members of the County Clubs, visit the local funeral homes. They are more than happy to have you talk with them.

The director showed Home Demonstration members through each room including the preparation room, explaining all the embalming chemicals. A study of the clothing, caskets, vaults, and other services were made, prices compared and many questions asked.

The women felt it was one of the most needed and educational programs they have had during 1964. They have started thinking about what it would cost them to die and making plans toward this inevitable expense.

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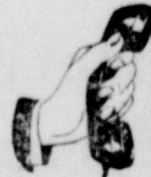

pints of parathion per acre is recommended. The extent of damage will determine whether the control is economical. Fields sprayed with parathion cannot be grazed by livestock for 15 days following the spray application.

The use of commercial fertilizer continues to increase in Hamilton County. Records show that in 1959 109 tons of commercial fertilizer was sold in the County. During the year between Sept. 1, 1962 and August 31, 1963 548.86 tons of fertilizer was sold in the county. In the 12 months ending on August 31, 1964, 940.06 tons of commercial fertilizer was sold by dealers in the county. This does not account for fertilizer purchased from other places and used in the county.

A large number of soil samples are being sent in now to the State Soil Testing Lab. I have soil testing cartons that you may use to send in samples. This is a good time to test soil where crops will be planted in the spring.
