MKT Asks to Abandon Freight Through Hico

Washington (Sp.)—The Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad asked the Interstate Commerce Commission Monday for authority to abandon 220 miles of branch line trackage between Bellmead (Waco) and Sanford.

The railroad said the branch has been operating at a deficit and is in such condition that heavy expenditures would be required for its rehabilitation. It said an alternative route

would be more economical.

Charles L. Howard, general agent for the MKT in Waco, said he had received no word of the proposed abandonment. Howard said the track which operates only as a freight line serves Aquilla, Whitney, DeLeon, Hico, Dublin, Cisco, Albany and Stamford. He said one train leaves Waco every other day and one leaves from the other end of the line on

the alternate days.

The MKT had leased the line from Texas Central Railroad Co. since April 20, 1914. Texas Central filed a companion application to abandon the Bellmead - Stamford branch line.

MKT officials said they would prefer to lease a line over an alternative route of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Co.

Two new county officials will take office Friday at Hico, one for a full four-year term and the other for a two-year term of the late H. Gene Tate.

Herman W. Standifer will be sworn in as County Judge, filling the unexpired term. John F. O'Neal will take the oath as new County Attorney.

Standifer won the judges' post by out-balling three other candidates. He eliminated Jess Reeves of Carlton and J. H. Soules of Hamilton in the first primary, and won over G. W. Hurley in the runoff. Hurley had served one year having been appointed to the post by the Commissioner's Court. He resigned a commissioner's position to accept the judges' seat.

O'Neal won a clear-cut victory over incumbent H. B. Gordon in

the primary, and will take the office for his first term.

Other county officials to be sworn in for four-year terms are W. W. Woody Young, sheriff, who won a hotly-contested race over newcomer Ed Bulman; Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, who was unopposed as county tax assessor-collector; and Fred Rainwater, who won out over R. W. Bob Hancock for the commissioner's post of Precinct 3.

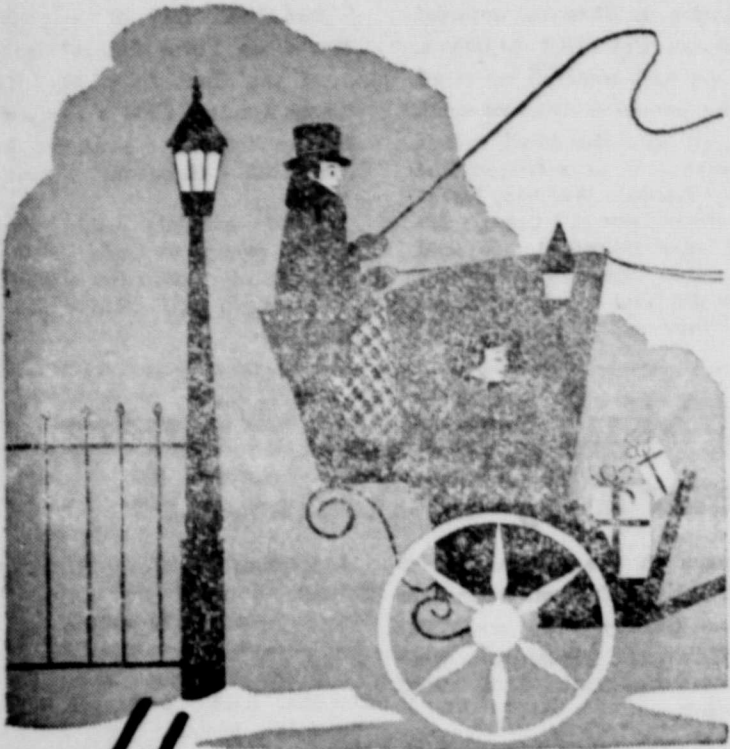

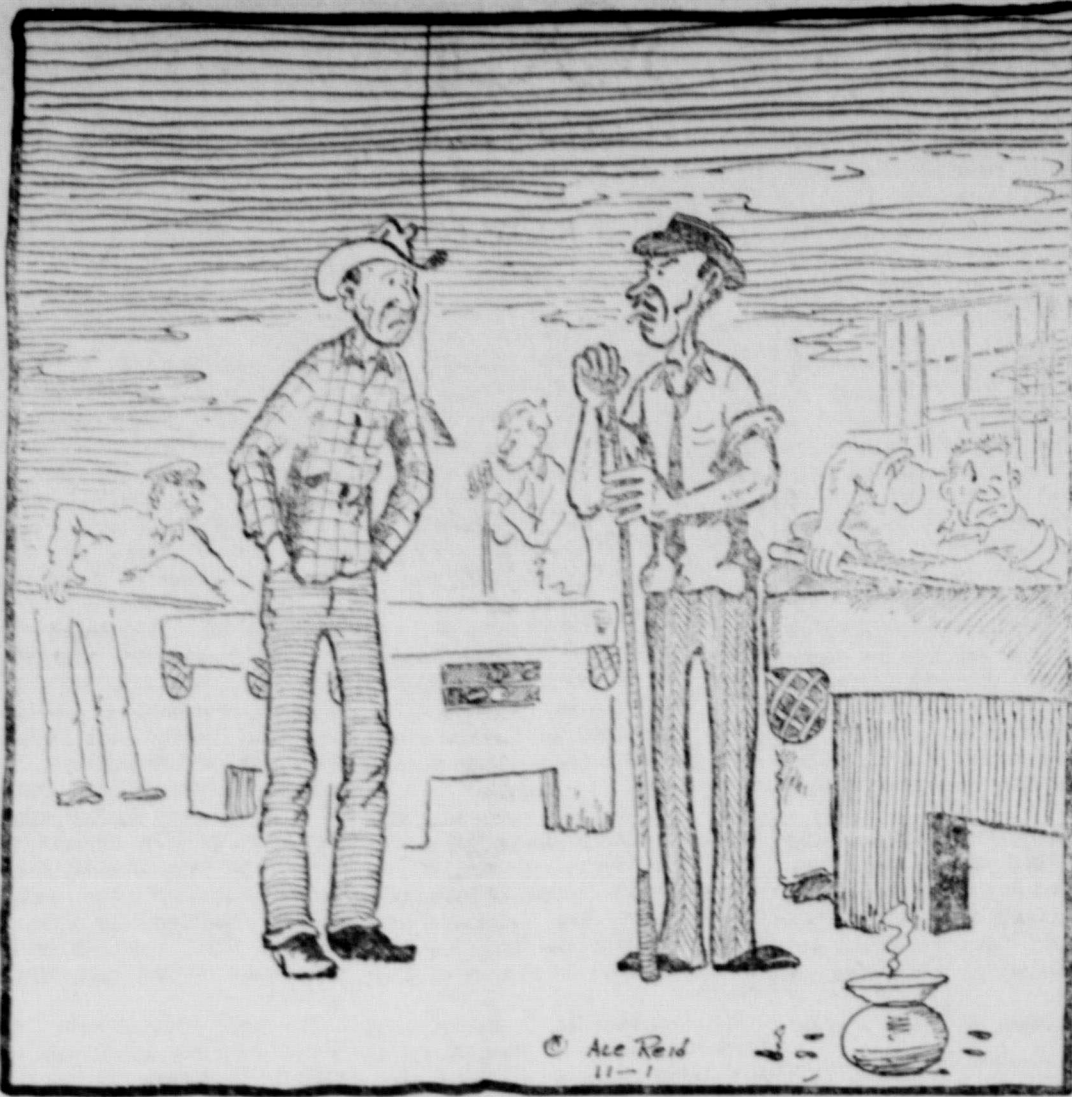

On the Home Range

By JEAN HENRY

Women are always searching for easier ways to do things, and thinking up "odd" uses for equipment and gadgets which were originally intended for other purposes. Take small appliances for instance. Many of them, designed for other purposes—from Temperature control to cooking—can also be useful in the laundry department. Did you know?

An electric fan can be used for the same purpose as the air conditioner? Train the fan's flow of air parallel to the line of hanging clothes. Fabrics dried in still air tend to grow stiff, while an artificial breeze helps keeps them soft. A pleated skirt or crinoline petticoat can be hung over an ordinary fan or a hassock fan; it will revolve like a carousel, and dry in a matter of minutes.

Both a hair dryer and portable heater are also naturals for drying a small wash indoors. They expel warm air to help dry the atmosphere, and thus speed moisture evaporation. Place either appliance several feet away from the moist articles to prevent their actually being heated.

A miniature clothes dryer can be improvised from an electric lamp. The method is to spread small items over a cake rack, then set this over the shade of a lighted lamp to take advantage of the rising heat which produces some drying action.

A hot electric light bulb can be used to iron tiny puffed sleeves, pockets, gathered yokes, and other

hard to get at areas. Work lighted bulb under and small sections of damp fabric until it is smooth and dry.

A vacuum cleaner, with its set to blow instead of suck, is good for drying furniture upholstery and rugs after suds-scrubbing and drying freshly washed hair clothes, and for fluffing wash pile fabrics such as corduroy velveteen.

A refrigerator is a good place to store damp laundry before it is ironed. The moist cold air spread dampness more evenly keep it that way, and the temperature prevents mildew so chilled fabrics actually better.

An electric mixer is a whippersnapper for whipping up dry suds? This form of soap or detergent is possible for sponging or shampooing soil from surfaces and fabrics which should not be saturated with water—such as rugs, stery, jewelry and leather or accessories. The method is to a big handful of soap or detergent with a little warm water, then this mixture until it becomes as meringue.

An electric timer comes in handy for lots of jobs besides cooking. Use it, for instance, to time brief soak periods required some clothes or set it ahead time as a novel way to teach children to wash their hands after dinner.
