Hamilton County Baptist Association Worker's Conference will be held at Carlton Baptist Church Monday, January 11, beginning at 8:30 p.m.

Speaker for the meeting will be Dr. Ralph Smith, pastor of Hyde Park Baptist Church in Austin. Dr. Smith holds a BA degree from Ouachita Baptist College, BD and ThD degrees from Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth. Previously he served as pastor of First Baptist Church in Rosenberg.

## 1964 WEATHER FACTS

The weather picture for the Hico area during the year just past was released this week by W. R. Hampton, local observer for the United States Weather Bureau.

Rainfall for the year totaled 33.37 inches as compared to a normal of 30.89 for an excess of 2.48 inches.

Most rainfall in any one day was 3.09 inches, which fell Oct. 26.

Low temperature reading was recorded on January 14 when the thermometer dipped to 7 degrees. High temperature was July 25 with the thermometer topping out at 109 degrees.

During the year, local residents saw the temperature drop below the freezing point 52 days. There were 32 days when the temperature hit above the 100-degree mark.


The second session of the egg production clinic will be Tuesday night, January 12 in the court house. Two poultry husbandmen will be here from Texas A&M to discuss two important subjects to poultrymen. Dr. J. H. Quisenberry, Head of the Poultry Science Department at A&M will discuss his latest research on feeding pullets and layers. We are very fortunate to have him come and discuss his research with the county poultrymen.

Bill Cawley, Associate Extension Poultry Specialist, will present a review of the latest research findings in the area of lighting pullets and layers.

Would you like to stock your farm pond, with fish this year? Now is the time to get your application in. George Johnson, manager of the Inks Dam National Fish Hatchery at Burnet informs us that applications received prior to May 1 will be filled during the calendar year in which they are received. Applications received after May 1 may not be filled during the year received, but in most cases will be carried over into the following year. Bass and sunfish will be delivered about the first week of May

and channel catfish will be delivered in the fall. Fish applications may be made at either the county agent's office or the Soil Conservation office.

At the beginning of each new year the agricultural economists look into the crystal ball and tell us what to expect in the new year. Here is what they say about beef cattle and sheep.

Beef production in 1965 is expected to increase only two to three percent over the 1964 output. The number of cattle and calves on January 1 were up slightly from last January's mark of 106.3 million head. Fed cattle prices should hold near current levels into early 1965. However, large increase in fed cattle marketing later in the winter may push these prices down. Since feeder cattle are plentiful, their prices will continue under pressure in early 1965.

The 1964 lamb prices have been higher than in several years and will continue above this level in 1965. The 1965 lamb crop is expected to decrease four to six percent. The January 1, 1964 farm and ranch inventory of sheep and lambs listed the smallest number ever on record. The number is expected to be even lower in 1965.

The economist who gave us this information is Joan McHane, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

You know the story of the eradication of the screwworm. Texas and Southwest livestock producers and sportsmen gave \$3,000,000 to initiate the war on the destructive insect. Hamilton County farmers and ranchers gave a whopping \$15,000! The organization responsible for the fund raising drive was the Hamilton County Screwworm Eradication committee. E. R. Lawrence, county agent at that time, organized the committee. Its president is Dr. Cy Catey, and Jeff Perry is the secretary and treasurer.

As a result of this program Hamilton County had only two cases of screwworms in 1963. Not one case of screwworms were identified from the county in 1964.

Game Warden Reports

Deer season ended in both Hamilton and Bosque counties Dec. 31 with what was only a fair kill. However while the kill was only about 50 percent of last year in Bosque County, it was about one-third higher in Hamilton County.

We had 75 bucks killed in Hamilton County this year compared to about 50 last year. While in Bosque we had about 1050 deer killed this season compared to about 2100 in 1963, with about one-third of these being does. This could be called a fair season because in 1962 we had about 1200 killed in Bosque County.

One reason the kill was up in

Hamilton County was because more landowners leased out in that county than in previous years and with the help of the landowners it should increase even more next season.

All you folks that picked up doe or antlerless permits for the season, please remember we must have the used stubs or unused permits returned to us before Jan. 10. Your cooperation in this will surely be appreciated because this is the only sure way we can tell just how many does we have killed in the county. You may either return them to me or Joe Stevens at Clifton by mail or just drop them off at my office.

For you folks who have shooting preserve books you may just put them in your mail box and let the postman pack them up. You will not have to put postage

on them since it will be paid by the Parks & Wildlife Dept. upon receipt in Austin. These do not have to be in before May 1st but if you do not lease out for anything but deer, you may be finished with your now, and it would be a good time to turn it in while you are thinking of it.

Duck season closes January 3, but goose season will run through Jan. 13. Quail season will run through January 31 in both counties, with the daily bag limit 12 and a possession limit 36.

If any of you folks lease your land for quail hunting please remember you too must have a shooting preserve license. Thanks again to all of you sportsmen and landowners for another accident free deer season. This makes the fourth season we have had without an accident.

—New Deal, Fair Deal, The Team for Peace and Prosperity, The New Frontier, and now the Great Society. George Washington said that unless there was vision a Nation perishes. So there must be the forward look to meet the rapidly changing condition.

However, not all the past is like water over the dam. All problems created by where we have been do not dissolve and flow away, never to be recognized again. For unless we also have a backward look—to profit from mistakes and failures—chances are the same mistakes and failures will repeat themselves with greater thrust. To paraphrase something Emerson once wrote, "We should have reached a maturity to prove that we are capable of listening, not only to what the hours tell us, but what the centuries whisper."

The Dodo Bird is supposed to fly backwards, interested only in where he has been and not caring where he is going—dumb bird they say.

On the other hand, he may be about half right. How can we really tell which way we are headed and what lies ahead if we ignore conditions created by where we have been?

The Administration headed by President Johnson emphasizes the forward look. In fact, since the days of President Roosevelt's "New Deal," all Administrations have sloganized their programs for the future in inspiring terms

deserving the backward look is the National Debt, the interest on which approximates \$11 billion. It should remind us that we cannot forever continue to spend money we do not have and that one day there must be a reckoning.

Government at best is expensive. New programs invite new demands and new demands invite new programs—one begets the other and seemingly there is no end. There is a limit to everything except that which Washington thinks it can provide. The limit in our personal affairs is when we spend all we have and exhaust our credit. Not so with Government.


