# a name? Well read City, School, **County Tax** Deadline Near

Last day to pay city, school and county taxes is Sunday, January 31, unless you want to pay penalty and interest after that date. Since the deadline falls on Sunday residents will be given a day of grace-to Monday, February 1without suffering the penalty.

Penalty on city and school taxes is 8 percent, plus one-half of one percent per month for each month thereafter that the taxes are not paid. In oher words, taxes which are delinquent for one year are subject to a total of 14 percent in penalty and interest.

If at all possible, it would be to the property owner's advantage to pay taxes before the deadline.
