## SECOND VERSE—FIRST IT IS; THEN IT ISN'T; BUT SNOW BLANKETS AREA ANY WAY

About the time local residents had settled back hopefully, thinking that this was one winter when they would get by without the inconvenience of sleet and snow, it happened.

It was a confusing weather picture all day Tuesday, with first the experts telling the world that people could expect freezing rain, sleet and snow, and then changing that observation at 10 p.m. to a "no snow in sight" prediction.

And just as you might have suspected — residents awoke Wednesday morning to find a

light cover of blowing snow, and cold, cold temperatures. W. R. Hampton, local weather observer, gave the official low as 16 degrees.

The front moved into the area around noon Tuesday, and by 4 p.m. the temperature had dropped to an unofficial 28 degrees, with more than half an inch of moisture falling in the meantime. Late in the day, frozen streets were a rule rather than the exception, until a 20-30 mile per hour wind cleaned the area.

Wednesday, March 3 is deadline for filing for places on the official ballot. The election will be held Saturday, April 3.

## Investigation Continues in Mail Damage

Hamilton County Deputy Sheriff Buck Shepherd said Wednesday that nothing new had developed in the investigation into the mutilation of 31 rural mail boxes here recently, but that the investigation was continuing.

A postal inspector was in the area earlier in the week making preliminary investigation, and is expected to return later.

Finger prints are in process of being checked, and Shepherd said some suspects had been questioned.

Flags from the mail boxes, and one of the damaged boxes have been carried to Waco for fingerprinting.

## Formal Protest on Railroad Abandonment Filed by Group

Formal protest by a committee representing Hico was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington this week in protest to application by Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad and The Texas Central Railroad to abandon the route between Waco and Stamford.

Protests from other towns who are served by the Katy are also expected to be filed.

Text of the protest is reproduced here for information to the readers:

"Gentlemen: The Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad and the Texas Central Railroad have posted notice that on the 21st day of December, 1964, they filed with your Commission at Washington, D.C. applications for a certificate of public convenience and necessity permitting abandonment of the Texas Central Railroad of its railroad extending from mile post 6 at Belmead, Texas, to mile post 226.28 at Stamford, Texas in various counties which includes our County of Hamilton and covered by Finance Docket No. 23427 and abandonment of operation by the Missouri, Kansas, Texas Railroad. Finance Docket No. 23426.

"We the undersigned patrons of the afore mentioned railroad in Hico, Hamilton County, wish to enter a formal protest to the proposed abandonment. If authority to abandon this trackage is permitted it will not only cripple the economy of our City but will practically make ghost towns of all the stations located on this line.

"This railroad is the only rail-

road in Hamilton County and the station at Hico serves not only us, but the County Seat of Hamilton County and eight other smaller towns.

"We respectfully request that a hearing by the Interstate Commission be authorized and that we and others affected by the abandonment will be given the opportunity to present our case before the Commission. Your consideration and acknowledgement will be appreciated."

The letter to the Commission was signed by M. I. Knudson, J. B. Woodard and A. H. Lackey, all representatives of firms that are liberal users of the railway.

Judge Frank G. McDonald of Waco, scheduled speaker at Hico Parent-Teacher Association meeting Monday night, was born in Bosque County, son of the late Dr. and Mrs. J. Frank McDonald. He is married to the former Miss Louise Vanderford of Aquilla, and the couple is parents of a daughter, Luann.

Judge McDonald is a graduate of Hill County schools, Baylor University, and University of Texas Law School. He is a combat veteran of World War II with 67 months service, 30 months overseas in North Africa and Italy. He received the Legion of Merit, and 11 other decorations during his period of service.

He is a former District Judge from Hill County, and presently is Chief Justice of Central Texas' 16-county Tenth Court of Civil Appeals.

The speaker is Past Master of Hillsboro Lodge No. 196; Past District Deputy Grand Master of 62nd Masonic District; and Past Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in Texas.

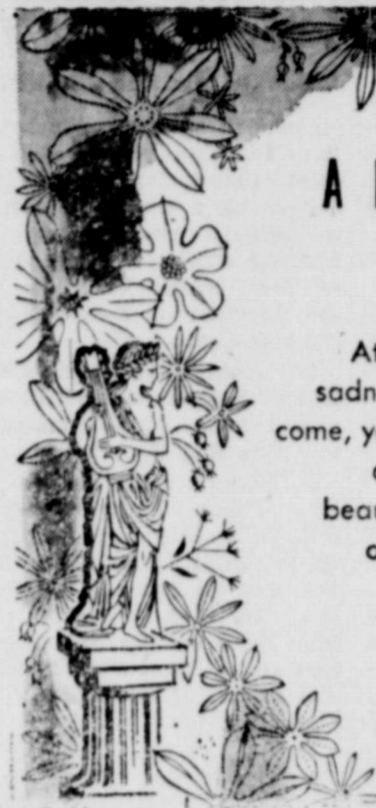

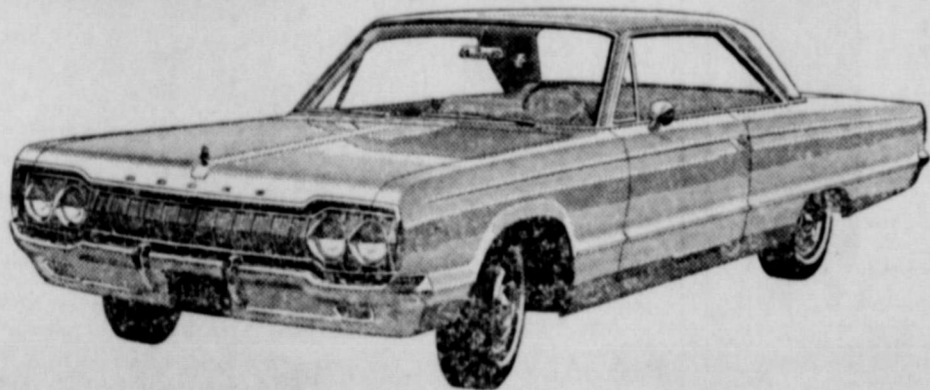

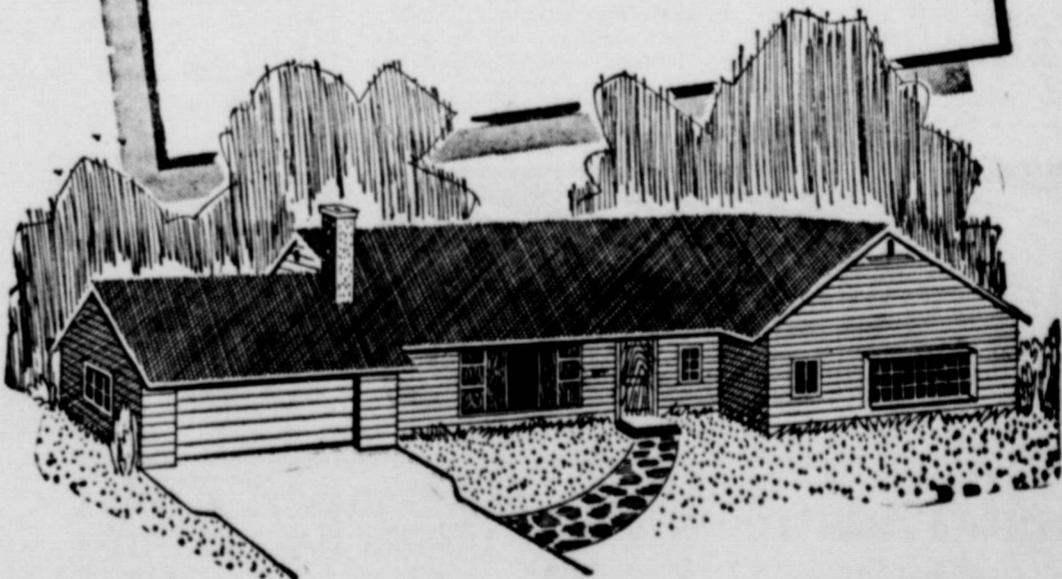

One Contestant, Two Alternates Set to 'Scramble' at Houston

Dwain Gray will be a contestant, and Joe Tooley and Mike Robinson will be alternate contestants in the Calf Scramble at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo on February 28th at the 6:30 performance.

The Houston calf scramble will again qualify as the "world's greatest" when the first of a series of 19 contests takes place in the Sam Houston Coliseum on February 24.

When the Houston show held its first scramble in 1942, twenty-four calves were awarded. It was not dreamed that the project would result in putting some 4000 boys into the cattle business in the next 23 years.

In 1944, 112 boys scrambled for 56 calves in five contests. Each year the calf scramble activities increased, and more and more sponsors stepped forward.

The Calf Scramble Contests became so popular with the rodeo audiences that for the past 15 years there has been a contest included as an event in each of the 19 rodeo performances.

During the course of one season 400 boys now scramble for 200 calves. Half of the calf certificates are given to boys interested in dairy cattle and the other half to those who prefer beef cattle.

When the calf scramble contestant wins, his work has just begun. With his cash certificate he purchases the best animal he can find. He must then care for the calf, furnish monthly records to the Houston show and his sponsor, and return his animal to the show the next year.

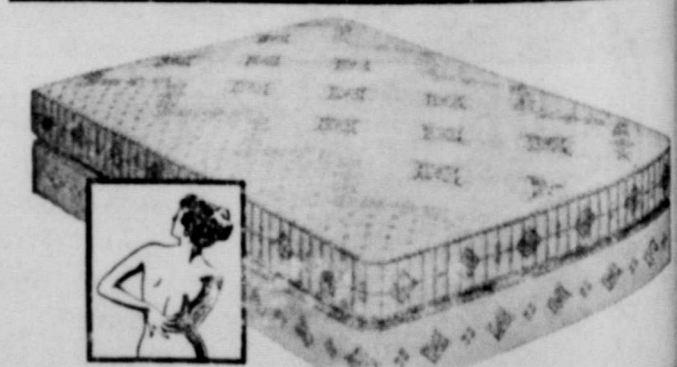

## Over-Utilization of Hospital Beds is Danger Under Medicare Bill

Current Medicare legislation carries "an unnecessary threat of over-utilization of costly hospital beds," Mrs. W. R. Payne, operator of Hico Nursing Home, warned today.

"Our state organization, the Texas Nursing Home Association, has joined the American Nursing Home Association in sponsoring a series of amendments to the Medicare Bill that will lessen the threat of over-utilization of, not only hospitals, but nursing homes as well," Mrs. Payne said.

"We have urged Congress to require a utilization review plan of hospital stays 14 days after admission instead of 21 days, as proposed in the bill, and we have also urged a review within 30 days after admission to a nursing home," Mrs. Payne explained.

"It is our finding, through nation-wide research, that the length of stay in hospitals and nursing homes can be greatly reduced without doing harm to the patient," Mrs. Payne said.

"There is a proposal in the legislation that provides for a pre-hospital admission and stay before a patient could be admitted to a nursing home, and this is unnecessary, Mrs. Payne continued.

"Such a proposal not only would increase the programs' costs but would aggravate the scarcity of hospital beds already overtaxed in many sections of the country," Mrs. Payne concluded.

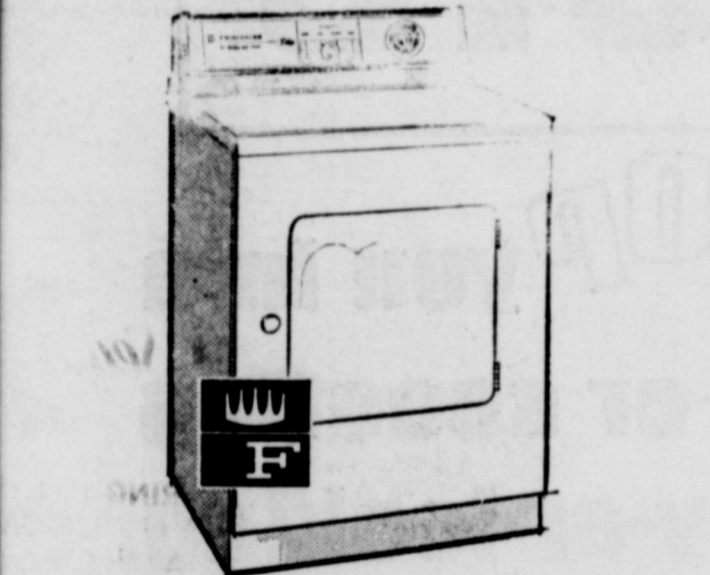

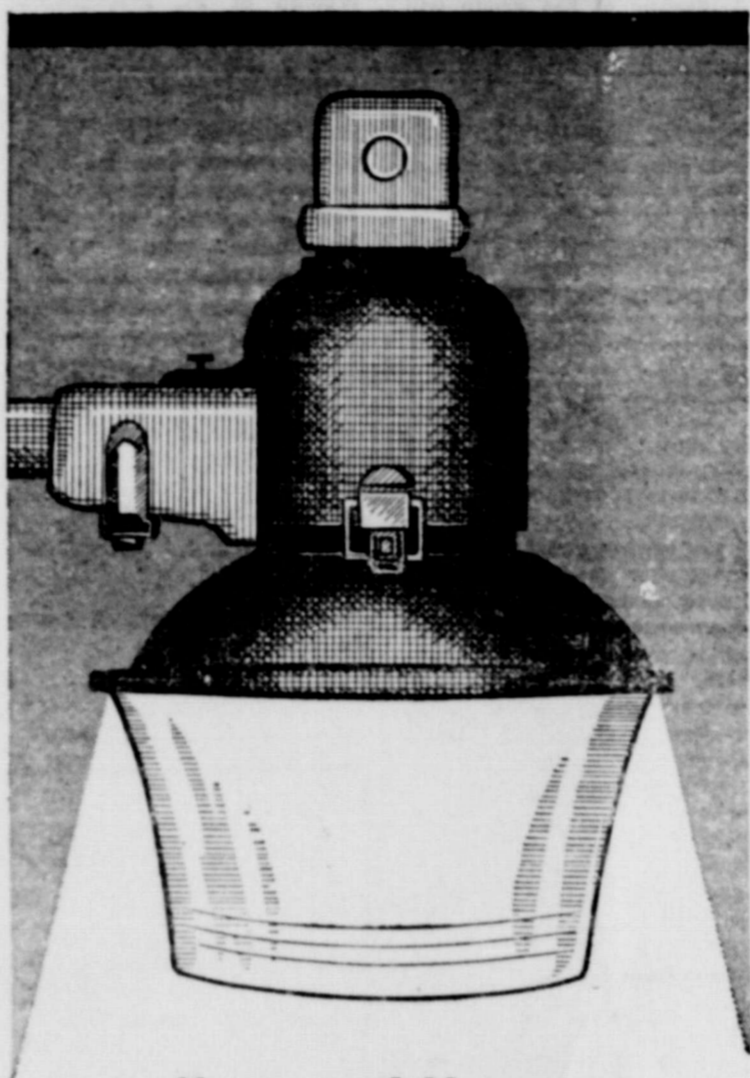

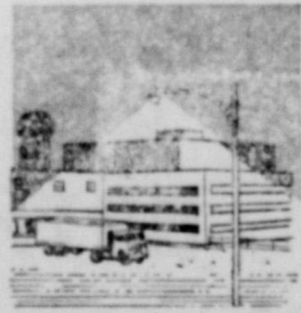

Many people in this county know Mr. R. G. Burwell of Stephenville. If you have met him one time you know him. Few people ever forget him after the first meeting.

Mr. Burwell has been District Agricultural Agent, supervising county agents in 20 Central Texas counties for the last 18 years. He has made thousands of visits to this county and made many friends here.

Mr. Burwell retired on January 31, after 35 years of service with the Extension Service. Few supervisors ever had the respect and loyalty from those who worked under him as Mr. Burwell had. He is blessed with a wonderful sense of humor and a deep interest in people. The millions of 4-H youth who came in contact with him during his 35 years of service loved him.

Some hay such as Coastal Bermuda may vary from 6 percent to 20 percent protein, yet look nearly the same to the eye. Only through scientific analysis can these differences be detected.

Farm Bureau members may get a hay mailer envelope from A. M. Abernethy, county president. A small representative sample of hay is taken and placed in the envelope along with a check or money order for \$1.50. The envelope is already addressed so all it

### Beef Cattle Field Day Slated March 4 at McGregor Station

Area stockmen will have an opportunity to see a new method of livestock judging demonstrated March 4 at the Beef Cattle Field Day at the Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor.

Other highlights of the annual field day will include reports on current research with suggestions for application to commercial operations and a tour of research projects and facilities.

The field day will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. A barbecue lunch will be served at noon.

Presenting the judging demonstration will be Dr. J. C. Bomma, noted animal scientist who developed the system after many years of research in South Africa.

His system is based on what he calls "judging for functional efficiency." Using the system, Bomma predicts fertility, longevity of production and other important economic characteristics of cows and bulls.

Texas A&M animal scientists believe Bomma is about 90 percent accurate in his predictions. They say he has had some success in telling exactly how many calves an aged cow has produced.

Bomma claims anyone with talent for conventional livestock judging can learn to judge cattle for functional efficiency.

"Cattlemen can quickly tell the difference between a steer and a bull," he said, "but they seldom recognize the gradations in differences between fertile and less fertile bulls."

Bomma was brought to this country for a year's work with Texas A&M University animal scientists by a grant from the Wortham Foundation of Houston.

## Economy of Hico, Hamilton County Reflected in Report

(Special to the News Review)

New York, Feb. 24—For Hamilton County's retail stores, 1964 was a banner year as local residents, armed with fatter pocketbooks, spent generously for goods and services.

Most lines of business were able to post new, all-time records, according to the latest market data report.

It shows that the average consumer was willing to spend more to live better. He ate finer cuts of meat, bought more expensive clothes, went more frequently to entertainment and sporting events and got more gadgets for his car.

The details are from the comprehensive study of consumer buying made by the Standard Rate and Data Service on the basis of Federal, state and local reports.

It reveals, for every section of the country, just how the average family distributed the money remaining to it after taxes in the past fiscal year.

In Hamilton County, a major portion of the retail dollar went for food and for automotive equipment and supplies. They accounted for 58 percent of all disposable income.

The total amount that was spent in these directions came to \$6,927,000, as compared with the previous year's \$6,604,000.

Of this, \$2,330,000 represented purchases in meat markets, bakeries and other local food stores. The figure does not include money spent in restaurants.

Sales of cars, boats and other automotive equipment came to \$2,952,000. Outlays for gas, oil and services at filling stations added another \$1,645,000.

The rest of the retail spending

picture in Hamilton County appears in the totals chalked up by the other types of stores. Most of them showed increases over the previous fiscal year.

Among them were general merchandise establishments, with

sales of \$443,000, shops specializing in wearing apparel, \$320,000, home furnishings stores \$230,000 and drug stores \$428,000.

The total volume locally for retail businesses of all kinds amounted to \$11,912,000, which topped the previous year's figure at \$11,616,000.

It was at the rate of \$4,708 per local family. It compares with \$4,121 per family in the South Central States.

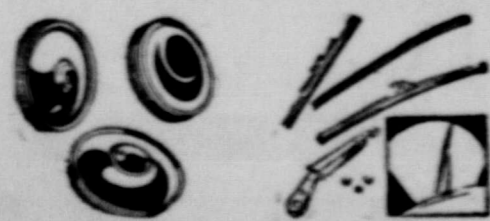
