Annual Livestock Show has judges for the 18th annual production set next Friday, and plans are under way to make care of increased enrollment divisions, according to Walker, FFA Chapter Advertiser of the open show. Oliver of the Anima Department, Texas University, will place the trophy and Mr. J. Warren Norment of Ohio Breeders Assn., Texas Representative, will place dairy entries. Both men are highly qualified and well respected in judging circles.

A new feature of the show this year will be Showmanship trophies to be given in each division to junior exhibitors doing the best job of fitting and showing their individual projects. The trophies will be presented after each division is judged and the official judge will select the winner and the donor will immediately make the presentation.

Congressman Omar Burleson notified the News Review by wire late Wednesday of intentions of the Post Office Department to post bids on March 19 for new construction or remodeling facilities in Hico.

Complete text of the telegram follows: "Post Office Department advises bids will be posted March 19, for new construction or remodeling post office. Specifications 2,330 square feet interior (2,128 if existing construction) 80 square feet platform, 5,000 square feet parking and maneuvering area. To be leased for 10 years plus four 5-year renewal options. Bids to be opened April 20th at Lubbock."

A number of Hico Future Farmers were in Houston last week showing their projects, participating in the livestock and dairy contests.

Dwain Gray, local Chapter president, caught a calf in the scramble Feb. 28, and will receive \$150.00 with which to purchase a breeding beef heifer to return to the 1066 Houston Show. Mr. O. J. McCullough of McCullough Tool Co. is his sponsor, and Dwain visited with him some at Houston during the course of the show.

The Dairy Cattle were shown on Wednesday, with Ronnie Henderson and Edmund Horton exhibiting their animals Ronnie showed his snior heifer calf to 6th place and a blue classification in a very strong Brown Swiss class with over 20 entries.

Edmund showed his senior heifer calf in the Holstein division to third place in a class of 35 entries and a blue classification. His senior yearling heifer placed 4th with a red classification. This heifer was close to calving and showed at a disadvantage in the mammary system. She brought a bull calf Friday morning and thus an extra calf came home from the show. Edmund placed second in showmanship in the Holstein division being among the top ten the past two years.

In the beef show, Mike Christian showed his junior heifer calf on Tuesday, placing second in a class of 24 heifers. His Santa Gertrudis was bred by Surprise Valley Ranch. The heifer showed for reserve champion after the champion was picked from the same class. However the reserve was picked from the junior yearling class. Mike received an "Excellent" classification on the heifer.

Jim Grimes showed his Rambouillet ram to 5th place in the two-tooth ram class but failed to place his ewes.

Dwain Gray, Barry Polk and Jim Lackey judged dairy cattle Saturday, and Danny Jenkins, Aodis Land and Ronnie Hefner judged livestock. Friends and acquaintances here of Elmer Jones of the Lanham community were very sorry to learn Sunday of his passing about 10 a.m. at the Hamilton Hospital following a short illness.

Elmer Newton Jones was born to the late Mr. and Mrs. West Jones at Lanham March 28, 1889, being the second eldest son. In early manhood he was married to Miss Glensie Sails of Hamilton. To their marriage two children, a son and daughter, Elverne and Barbara were born. The mother passed away in July 1953. On May 9, 1959 the daughter, Mrs. Barbara Blum passed away.

Mr. Jones had spent his entire life in the Lanham community, being a member of the Lanham Methodist Church which his father helped to establish more than 75 years ago. During the lifetime of his wife she served as pianist for the church, and since her death, the son, Elverne, has served as pianist.

Elmer was a hard working man and spent most of his time on his place west of Lanham near Pecan Creek, looking after his own affairs. He will be greatly missed, especially by the son, who has experienced the passing of

the entire family and has been so faithful to all in their last illness. Mr. Jones and a brother, Alsa T. Jones were attending Fairy school in January of 1904 when this scribe moved here. They rode two large black horses the distance of eight miles. We can still picture them as they arrived with their faces so red from facing the cold north wind so far, and we understand they also rode 11 miles to Hamilton where they finished high school.

Funeral services for Mr. Jones were held at the Lanham Methodist Church at 2 p.m. with Rev. Wesley Van Norden, pastor of the Carlton Methodist Church and Rev. Russell Vierse, pastor of the Lanham and Cranfills Gap Methodist churches officiating. Paul Schwalbe of near Jonesboro rendered two vocal numbers "Pearly White City" and "Beyond the Sunset" accompanied by Clint Crosby Jr. who also furnished other music for the service. COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Farmers who would like to know more about weed and insect control in field crops will be interested in attending a meeting

in the courthouse Tuesday night, March 16. Bill Lawson is planning the meeting. Matt Dees Jr., representative for a chemical company will bring the program. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. All farmers are invited to attend.

We had good attendance at the County Poultry Clinic back in January. Many of these men and women who attended will also be interested in knowing that the State Commercial Egg Clinic will be held at Tefas A&M on March 31. The clinic starts at 8 a.m. in Memorial Student Center and will adjourn at 4:23 p.m.

There will be eight different speakers to talk on eight different topics. The topics and speakers were selected based upon the current interest and concern to the people engaged in the commercial egg industry of Texas.

I have had a number of questions concerning the use of ammonium nitrate to kill burr clover and henbit in the lawn. If ammonium nitrate is used properly it will control these weeds and will also fertilize the grass.

Mow the plants closely three or

four days before treatment. Dissolve one pound of ammonium nitrate per gallon of water. Apply the solution broadcast with a sprinkler can at the rate of 4 gallons per 1,000 square feet. Spot treatment should be avoided as the nitrogen will cause green spots in the lawn when the grass comes out.

Another chemical that will effectively control burr clover and all other broad-leaved weeds is 2, 4-D. Unless 2, 4-D is used with extreme caution it can cause severe damage to desirable shrubs, flowers and trees. Use two tablespoons of the amine form of 2, 4-D per gallon of water. It is best to use a sprinkler can to apply this chemical. A sprayer may be used, but the same sprayer should not be used again for any purpose. It is almost impossible to thoroughly clean the sprayer after 2, 4-D has been used.

Many people prefer to use a wax arb containing 2, 4-D to kill broad-leaved weeds in the lawn. You simply drag the bar over the weeds and it is effective. There is no danger of killing desirable plants with the bar since there is no drift.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Austin, Texas—If you want to sit in on the committee hearing for the bill which would legalize the sale of miniature bottles of liquor in restaurants, you better come early.

That's what Sen Jim Bates of Edinburg, sponsor of the bill in the upper house is saying. He expects as many as 3,000 persons will be at the Capitol to testify or to listen when the bill comes up before the Senate Committee on Jurisprudence at 2 p.m. Tuesday, March 16.

Bill would allow establishments where at least half of the monthly business is for meals to get a state license for the sale of 2-oz. bottles of liquor, enough for a single cocktail.

There's organized support on both sides. The line-up:

In favor, the Texas Restaurant Association, which hopes the bill will permit its members to meet the competition of private clubs, which increasingly are getting the restaurant business from people who like a drink before dinner.

Opposed, church groups which generally are against any liberalization of liquor regulations and a strange bedfellow, the Texas Package Stores Association, which contends the bill as written would prevent liquor stores from continuing to sell beer.

The Texas Package Stores Association also believes the same section it opposes would prohibit

restaurants from selling beer and wine if they sold miniatures.

A hearing is yet to be scheduled on the House version of the bill by Rep. Willis Whatley of Houston.

Congressional Redistricting

Texas Republicans, whose lawsuit resulted in present congressional districts being invalidated, have offered their version of how the lines should be drawn. Plan is embodied in a bill sponsored by Rep. Frank Cahoon of Midland, only Republican in the 59th Legislature.

The GOP product satisfies many objections raised to others introduced so far, since it disturbs fewer incumbents than any plan to date.

Only U.S. Reps Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls and Omar Burleson of Anson would be facing each other as opponents in a newly-created Congressional District 13, and U.S. Reps John Dowdy of Athens and Lindley Beckworth of Gladewater, in a newly-defined District 3.

Three new districts would be developed: A District 23, giving Harris County a third congressman; District 17, giving Bexar County and a group of South Texas counties another representative and District 7, giving Dallas County a second congressman. U.S. Rep. Joe Pool, who lives in District 7, but now is elected statewide, could thus retain a seat.

Land Program Renewal Proposed

Voters will get another chance to say whether they want to continue the veterans land program under which thousands of Texas veterans have purchased farm property at low interest.

A proposed constitution amendment to extend the program—first amendment cleared this session—was approved by the Senate and sent to the governor. Amendment will be voted on in November. Rep. Gus Mutschler of Brenham and Sen. Criss Cole of Houston are the sponsors.

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—How often we have heard the expression "he is a smart man," or "he ain't so smart." Intelligence being what it is suggests the question, what is it? Evidently there are many kinds. Almost 60 years ago Alfred Binet created the first intelligence test, but psychologists still can not agree on what it is.

From all indications the Congress will soon pass another Federal Aid to Education Bill. Particular emphasis is already being placed on the "drop-outs." Nowadays it is pretty difficult to fit into our society without a pretty good education, even in those jobs for which it was once considered an education was unnecessary. Then there is electrostatic printing and labeling machine which can stamp 2,200 apples per minute. They say it works on any produce or material from living animals to potato chips, from concrete to feathers. If we ever get around to selling snow, it may be possible to put a label on it.

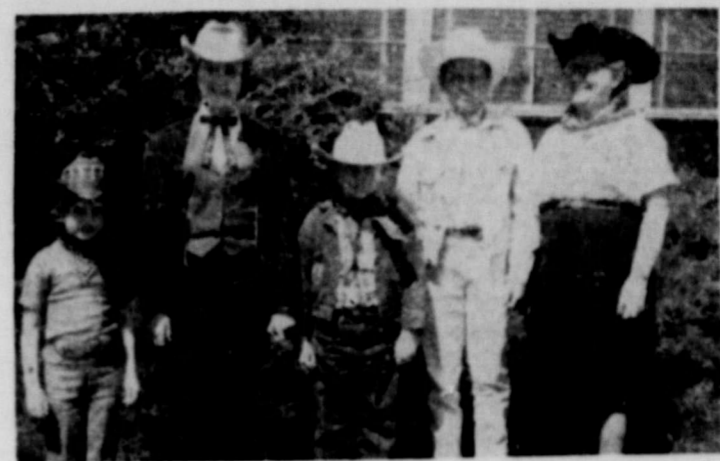
