Record 350 Entries Recorded In 18th Annual Stock Show

Despite weather conditions that saw the thermometer hover near the freezing mark all day, Hico's annual livestock show set an all-time record for entries last Friday at City Park.

When judging officially ended around 6 p.m., a total of 350 animals had passed through the ring, approximately 30 more than in any one year before.

At show time—9 a.m.—the temperature was hovering around twenty degrees, with a gradual warmup throughout the day to around thirty-two. However, the cold didn't dampen spirits of either the exhibitors or spectators, as attested by the entry list. Spectators in large groups were in evidence most of the afternoon.

A strong sheep division pushed the entries to the record number. A total of 122 animals were entered in that division, also a record. Next high on the entry list was 64 beef animals, which was also a near-record turnout.

Dairy division listed 61 entries; goat division had 58; swine 34; and the popular dog division drew

11 entries. Bill Oliver, Texas A&M Animal Husbandry Department, was in charge of livestock judging, and Lewis Nordyke, COBA Representative from Tyler, placed the dairy entries. Dudley Everett, Stephenville, judged the dogs.

Hico FFA Chapter Advisor Harold Walker expressed his sincere appreciation to exhibitors and spectators alike for their cooperation, and also to merchants who

supported the show in any way.

Fund Goal For Rural Marking Set

At a committee meeting Monday night of this week, the group working on the rural road marking project set a goal of \$300 as needed funds to carry out the program.

Also at the meeting, sub-committees were named to work with the group on getting information and data on various roads leading out of Hico, and in this area.

Named were: Fairy Road, Watt Petty; Iredell Road, Roy Adkison and Hamp Rucker; Glen Rose Highway, C. R. Jackson; Old Stephenville Highway, T. H. King; New Stephenville Highway, Skeet Roberson; New Clairette Highway, Mrs. Henry Mayfield; Old Clairette Road, Mrs. John Golightly; Altman Road, Les Patterson; Carlton Road, Leland Johnson; Hamilton Highway, Mrs. Sam Burney.

Plans call for every road and lane in this area to be marked with name of road and approximate distance from Hico. First of the signs are expected to be placed later this week, and completion date for the overall program is the first week in August.

Funds for the project may be left with any of the committee members, who are Anne Coleman, Woody Wilson, Horace Ross, C. R. Jackson, Ralph Turner, and Mrs. D. C. Hyles.

Committee members urged that people residing in rural areas who are familiar with roadways in their section are asked to contact any of the members.

Funeral Services Held Sunday, March 21, For J. H. Whitlock, 95

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:50 p.m. in Hico Church of Christ for James Hiram Whitlock, 95. Minister Charles Wilson officiated, with burial in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Whitlock was born Feb. 6, 1870 in Tennessee, and died March 20 in Hico City Hospital. He had been a resident of Hico the past three years, and was a longtime resident of this area.

Mr. Whitlock was a retired school teacher and pharmacist. He had operated drug stores at Waco, McGregor and other Central Texas towns.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. W. E. Coop of Merkel, Mrs. F. L. Havenhill of Arlington, Mrs. C. L. Woodward of Hico, and Mrs. R. W. Brumley of Aledo; one sister, Mrs. Jennie Bishop of Beaumont; one brother, I. F. Whitlock of Fletcher, Okla.; six grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grandchildren.

\$3,100 Goal Set For County In Screwworm Program

The Hamilton County Screwworm Eradication Committee is laying plans for this county's participation in a concentrated drive to raise \$300,000 from the Texas livestock industry to continue the program.

"The goal for our county is \$3,100," said Dr. Cyrus Cathey of Hamilton, chairman of the local committee.

A meeting of livestock producers will be held in the court room at Hamilton Thursday night, Mar. 25 at 7:30. Purpose will be to explain the screwworm control situation and make plans for the concentrated drive to raise the \$3,100.

The fund drive will begin Monday, March 29, and will be concluded Monday, April 12.

Livestock producers can leave their contributions at any bank in county. Jeff Perry is treasurer for the committee. Donations can also be made to members of the committee who will be working in each community.

Necessity for additional funds was announced earlier this month by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, which, along with the State of Texas and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, is conducting the eradication program. The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May and June, Dr. Cathey explained.

The screwworm fly has been eradicated from the Southwest, but a barrier of live, sterile flies must be maintained along the U.S.-Mexico border to prevent fertile flies from re-infesting the U.S. Approximately 100 million sterile flies will be needed each week during the three-month period. If funds are not made available the Southwest stands to lose the gains that have already been made.

De Gordon, county agent, said in the three years the program has been in existence, savings of more than \$168 million have been realized by producer. He said no screwworm infestations were detected in this county last year.

Hamilton Watershed Wins Approval



Mr. Pittman was born near Fairy on April 15, 1882. He was married to Miss Lillie Pearl Lackey in 1903. To their union one son and three daughters were born. They are Wallace Pittman of near Temple, Mrs. Nadine Chambers of Lubbock, Mrs. Buna Robbins of Ranger and Mrs. Vivian Hall of California, who was unable to attend the funeral. He is also survived by seven grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren, and three brothers, Joe of Hico Pitt of Fort Worth and Tom of somewhere in South Texas, whom relatives were unable to locate.

His wife preceded him in death December 27, 1947. The Pittman family resided in the Fairy community for many years and friends and acquaintances here extend deepest sympathy to the family and other relatives who mourn his passing.

Mrs. John Rusk of Hico furnished music for the service, and accompanied the choir who sang "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "Amazing Grace," a favorite of Mr. Pittman.

Mr. Pittman resided at a Hico nursing home until his health became so impaired his son moved him to a Belton nursing. He died Sunday about 3 p.m. Pallbearers were Carl King and Carl Ray Sellers of Fairy, Tyrus King, Dock Lackey, T. L. Betts and George Loden of Hico. Burial was in Fairy Cemetery.



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


