Annual Clean-Up Program Scheduled April 30th, May 14

April 30 through Friday, May 14, has been proclaimed as Clean-Up time in Hico by D. E. Bulloch.

Trash placed in containers at the curb will be picked up free of charge by the city, on two separate days during the clean-up. Free pick-up days will be Wednesday, May 12, and Thursday, May 13.

The mayor has called upon everyone to render all the aid possible, pledging cooperation of city officials in setting Hico's record for a clean and healthful condition.

This special period of cleaning, officials are especially stressing the importance of gathering up all old tin cans and any type container which might be holding stagnant water. Weeds and other vegetation around premises are growing rapidly and should be cleaned away.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to haulers.

Carl Richard (Dick) Allison, a former resident of Hico and Fairy died last Friday in Hereford. He was 54.

OUTSTANDING RECORD

Brattleboro, Vermont.—Prairie Sage Joe Doris, a six year old registered Holstein cow owned by G. E. Holladay of Hico, has produced a noteworthy record of 17,530 lbs. of milk and 607 pounds of butterfat in 305 days.

Texas A&M University supervised the production, weighing and testing operations, in cooperation with the official breed improvement programs of the Holstein-Friesian Association.

This level of production may be compared to the average U.S. dairy cow's estimated annual output of 7,800 pounds of milk containing 285 pounds of butterfat.

The students won the honors at the Region II meet held at Tarleton State College last weekend.

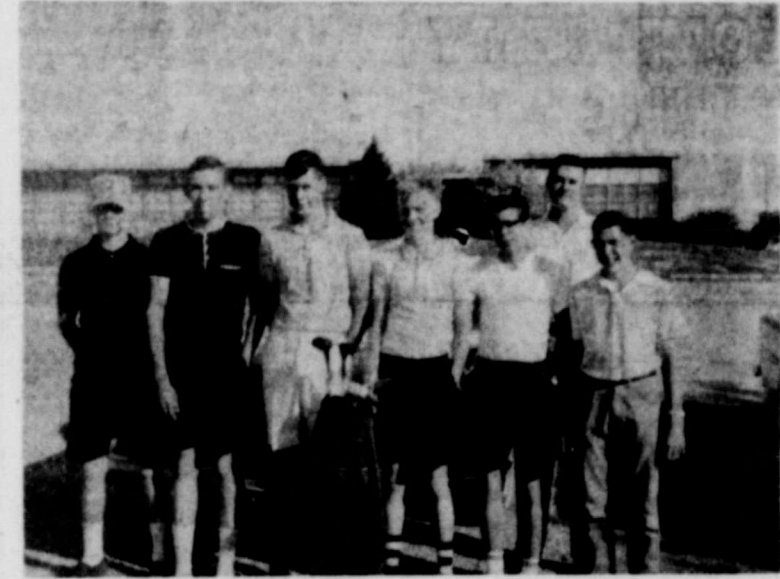

Annually, a financial statement of the Ladies Auxiliary Association and the Hico Cemetery Association has been printed in this paper. Many copies of the financial statement have been mailed to interested individuals. Should you have a copy of this statement at hand please re-read this portion: "Only the ladies Auxiliary Funds may be used for maintenance of our cemetery. Its only source of revenue consists of interest on investments of Hico Cemetery Association, Inc., and contributions from lot owners and others interested in the upkeep. The caretakers salary must be paid from this fund. The Association has been created through legacies, bequests and sale of lots. NO part of this fund may be used for upkeep excepting the interest therefrom.

Please note that from January 1, 1964 through December 31, 1964 we had a total operating capital of \$1,243.77. For maintenance in the future depends upon your aid annually on a regular paying basis. We sincerely believe that an annual income of approximately \$2,500.00 per

year would be necessary to maintain and keep our cemetery clean and beautiful.

We humbly extend our gratitude and thanks to the Hico Garden Club in their acceptance of the project of maintaining the cemetery entrance. Our heart was also saddened last week when we received a letter from Ed Burkett Jr. of Harbour City, Calif. informing us of the death of his aunt, Mrs. Bertie Crow Proctor of Hamlin. Mrs. Proctor is a former resident of Fairy. Our parents' home place, the W. T. Newman farm, was purchased by our father from the heirs of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.

H. Crow, and after her marriage she and Mrs. Blakley lived for a time in Fairy at the old Dr. Yoang residence, which later burned.

Below is a copy of the obituary from the Hamlin paper: Funeral services for Mrs. Bertie Proctor, 82, were held Friday, March 26 at 2:30 with Rev. Royce Womack officiating. Mrs. Proctor, a resident of Hamlin since 1923, died Wednesday at 8:30 p.m. after an illness of two and one half years. Born May 30, 1882 in Alabama, she was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James H. Crow. She married J. A. Blakley in 1904. He died in 1923. She was married to C. W. Proctor Jan. 24, 1924. He died in 1936. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church. Burial was in the Hamlin Cemetery. Pallbearers were Henry Jackson, Don Elmore, W. A. Hawkins and Bill Harbert. Mr. and Mrs. Blakley were great sports with the young folks and having no children they enjoyed attending parties back in the early years of this century and enjoyed playing the old familiar game of Snap as much so as the younger set. We had corresponded with Mrs. Proctor for a year or more after receiving a letter from her giving us her address. She was taking the Hico paper and had learned our identity through our news letter. We had been intending to write again as she had failed to answer our last letter, but feel sure now she wasn't able to answer. Mr. Blakley is buried in the Fairy Cemetery and it was her greatest desire to be brought back to Fairy for burial, but having no children to see after her, she had given her property to friends there to look after her and so was buried there. She was an aunt by marriage of Mrs. V. R. Leeth of Hico and Mrs. Bradford Corrigan of Hamilton.

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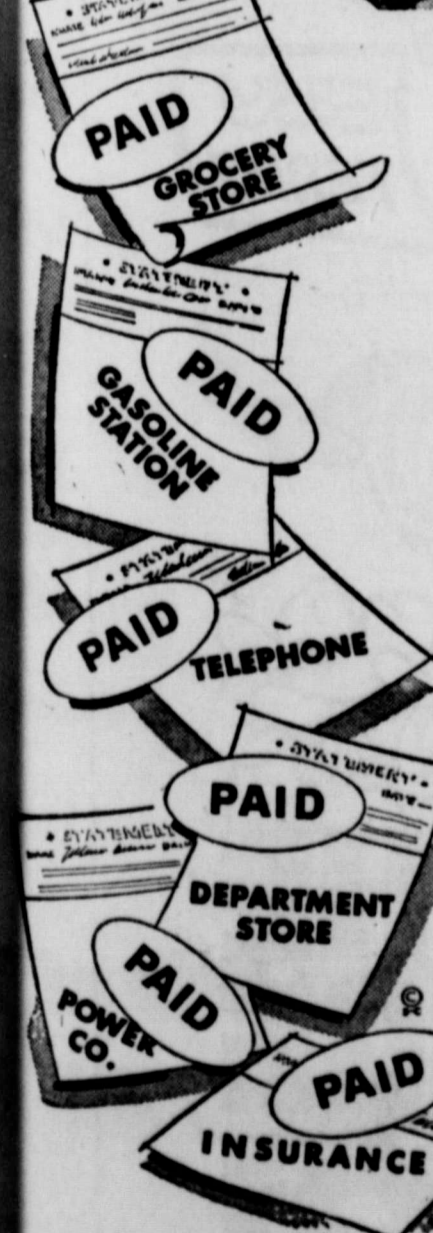

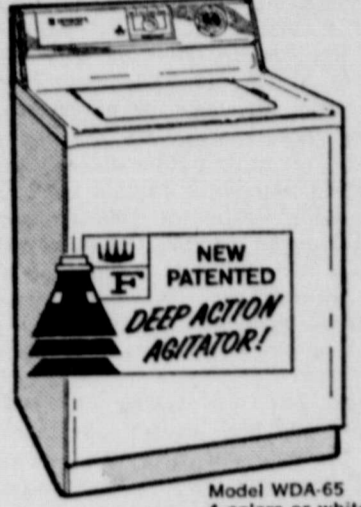

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By De-MARQUIS GORDON

The Wolf Club is an organization of livestock producers in the county who are doing something about controlling predators of sheep, goats and calves. Forty-seven men give one dollar per month to help pay for the trapper. The county pays a portion and the state pays one half the cost of the professional trapper.

The Wolf Club brought the trapper to Hamilton County four years ago. During these four years he has killed 44 wolves, about 50 bobcats and an estimated 400 red fox. One wolf will destroy between \$1,000 and \$1,500 worth of animals each year. It is hard to imagine how much destruction the wolves and their offspring could have caused if they had not been killed.

If Hamilton County keeps the trapper the Wolf Club must increase their membership to about 175 members. In a meeting April 19 the club decided to start a membership campaign. One rancher said that a man can join the club for less than the price of one lamb per year. On the other hand, if a wolf gets in a man's place he can kill 30 or 40 lambs before the rancher knows what hit. Another rancher said a trapper is the best insurance a sheep or goat raiser can have.

The predator trapper and the screwworm program are two examples of livestockmen cooperating together voluntarily to take care of two major problems.

Monday morning the Hamilton County Screwworm control fund had reached \$2230.70. This is \$869.30 short of the county quota. County chairman Dr. B. C. Cathey and Treasurer Jeff Perry announced that they will continue to receive contributions from those who have not contributed. All persons who have not contributed are urged to contribute so that Hamilton County will be able to reach the goal of \$3,100.

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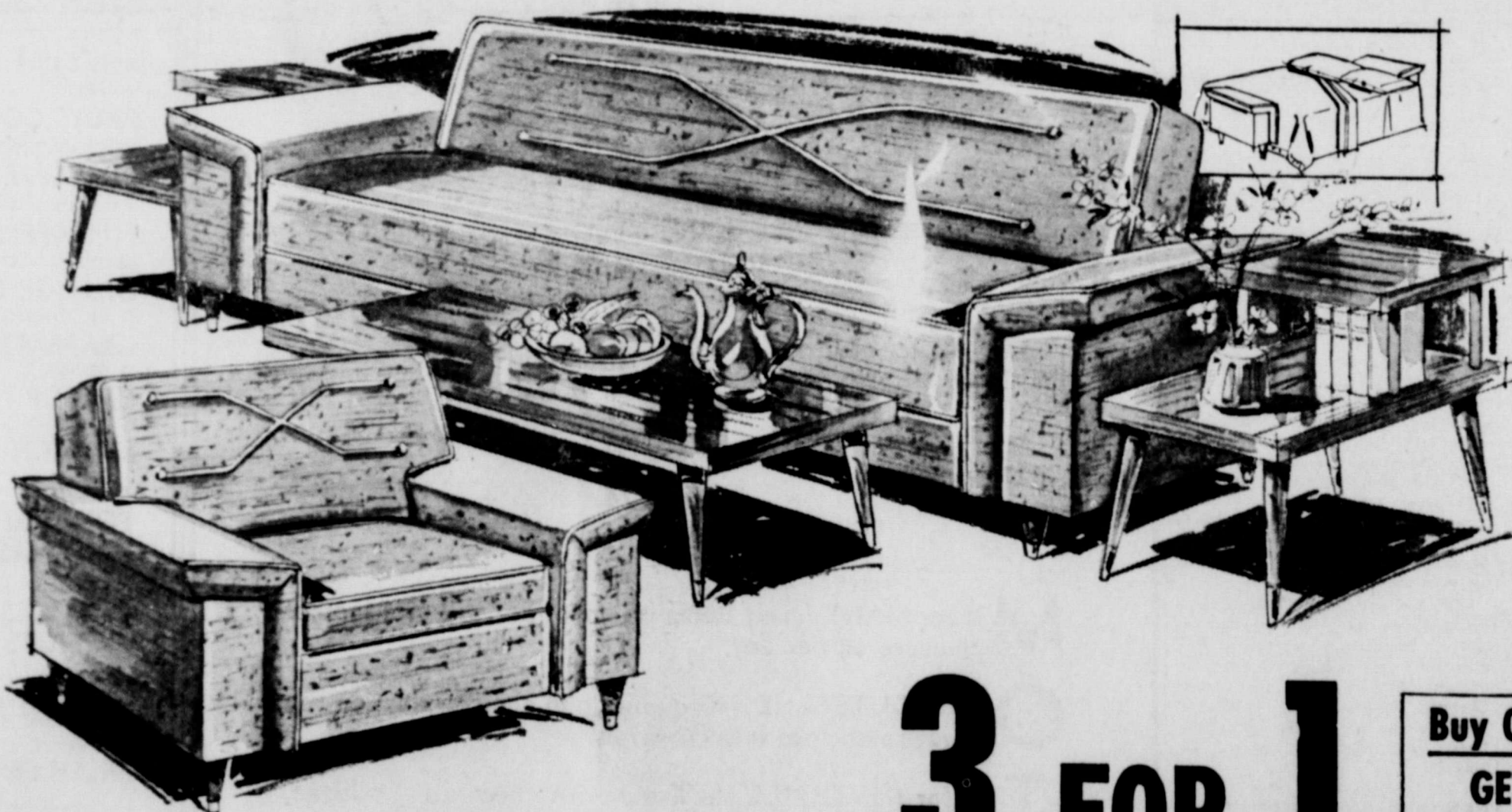

Medical School Vetoed
Governor Connally vetoed the bill authorizing Texas Tech to establish a medical school in Lubbock.

Connally said that not enough study had been given to the idea and that he preferred that his recently created college coordinating board be the supreme authority in new college programs.

Veto drew critical attacks from West Texas proponents of the school including Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Sen. H. J. Blanchard, both of Lubbock.

Districting Guidelines Set
Rep. Gus Mutscher of Breneham says the House Districts Committee aims to get a congressional reapportionment measure to the floor by May 1. Mutscher is chairman of the committee.

Three optional plans for state

House of Representatives redistricting also are due from subcommittees by May 1.

Committee has adopted these tentative legislature redistricting guidelines:

Population variance between districts should be held to a maximum of 15 percent over and below the mean average;

"At least one attempt" will be made to eliminate "floterial" districts;

Small counties without population sufficient to justify a representative of their own will not be divided;

Two or more representatives will not be allowed to run at large in two or more counties.

Committee also approved Senate-passed bill to permit up to 15 percent population variance in forming legislative districts.

House Speaker Ben Barnes is optimistic that the Legislature can solve the thorny redistricting problem without need for a special session.

Amendments Get Priority

State representatives returned from their brief Easter vacations to find two proposed constitutional amendments high on their work assignments list.

Governor Connally finally got the balky House Amendments Committee to clear for debate measure to increase terms of governor and other officials elected statewide from two to four years. Committee also approved redistricting pain-easer calling for increase of State Senate membership from 31 to 39, but stripped from it provision to lengthen upper house terms to six years.

Pressure for submission of both measures to Texas voters (in November and Aug. 7 elections, respectively) were intense.

New Laws Adopted

Dozens of bills have been given final passage in one house and sent to the other for further action.

Two bills by Rep. Dick Cory would authorize commissioners courts in all but the largest counties of the state to give county officers raises of up to twenty percent.

Sen. Don Kennard's bill to create a North Central Texas Airport Authority in Tarrant County, which he opposed by Dallas, was passed in the Senate, but the House version ran into a filibuster by Dallas delegation members in the committee hearing.

Bill by Sen. W. T. Moore would authorize Texas A&M to accept James Connally Air Force Base for the state and establish a technical institute.

Poll Tax Repeal Fails

Proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax fell four votes short of getting the necessary two-thirds in the House of Representatives. But measure was kept alive by a parliamentary maneuver.

Colleges Get Federal Funds

With eleven million dollars presently allotted for distribution in federal grants for college construction in Texas, the Texas Commission on Higher Education already has requests from twenty-four more colleges and eligibility established for twelve junior colleges.
