\$86,531 Monthly in Social Security Benefits to Countains

Monthly Social Security benefits in Hico and Hamilton Counties amounted to \$86,531.00 on Jan. 1, 1965, Jack Calvert, district manager of the Temple social security office said this week. These monthly benefits are received by 1,647 persons, representing 19.4 percent of the population of the entire county.

"This money stimulates the city and county businesses since most of it is spent for food, clothing, and shelter locally," Calvert said. "There is no doubt that these monthly social security benefits help to stabilize the income and spending power of the residents."

In the seven counties of the Temple district, Bell, Coryell, Milam, Mills, San Saba and Hamilton, 18,190 persons are receiving \$971,800 each month. This comes to a yearly total of \$11,661,600.

Monthly social security benefits first became payable in January 1940 and have continued without interruption with a steady growth in the number of people getting benefits. There are many people in this area who could now be getting monthly benefits if they would just contact the Temple office or file a claim.

Every person 65 years of age or over who has not filed a claim with the social security office should do so. This will prevent any possible loss of benefits. Any person 62 years of age or over who has not contacted the social security office should do so. They may be entitled to receive some

May 15th Deadline For County Notaries To Re-Qualify

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin has announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring to be re-appointed for the new term ending June 1, 1967, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence between May 1 and May 15.

Martin emphasized that Notaries should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law requires the county clerks to approve all notary bonds.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed.
