

# Proposed Country Club Membership Drive Underway

Memberships were being sold at a special rate Tuesday and Wednesday. Hico's future recreational planning for which has been underway for two months. Forty-one members had signed at mid-morning Tuesday.

An effort to keep dues at a minimum for operational expenses and retirement of indebtedness will be acquired to build the club. The steering committee has a plan to membership drive that, thus far, has proved to be successful.

Members are being asked to pay a small \$10 fee, plus \$10 monthly dues beginning June 1. A monthly or yearly basis of minimum period of one year.

Members behind the payment of dues above was to get some cash coming in before the loan money is appropriated. Money paid in between actual start of construction will be put in escrow at First National Bank, and in event that project is not carried out, the money will be refunded.

Members were quick to respond that the program will be successful, contingent upon securing a minimum of 50 members in the amount mentioned above.

For the facilities are built in operation, current committee anticipates a membership initiation fee to become a member.

For the country club call building and modernizing present club house, constructing swimming pool, building a grass green golf course watering system, constructing caretaker's quarters, other recreational facilities.

Country Club, Inc. has applied for and received tentative approval of a loan in the amount of \$50,000 to carry out the plan. The money will be borrowed under Farmer's Home Administration's rural community development loan, which only requires under 2,500 population.

Primary Work Underway. Architect-engineering firm is making cost estimates of the proposals, which will be actual planning of facilities. The club has the required membership pledges, which will be submitted for final approval.

Next, the engineering firm will only preliminary work be carried out until the club has the minimum requirements for membership, thus the impetus on the member drive.

She was in nursing training at Starlight Clinic in Center Point. Miss Baker's body was taken to Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home and was sent to a San Angelo Funeral Home Monday. 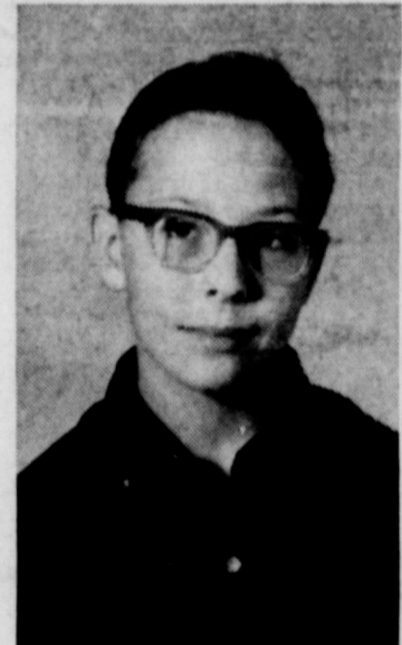
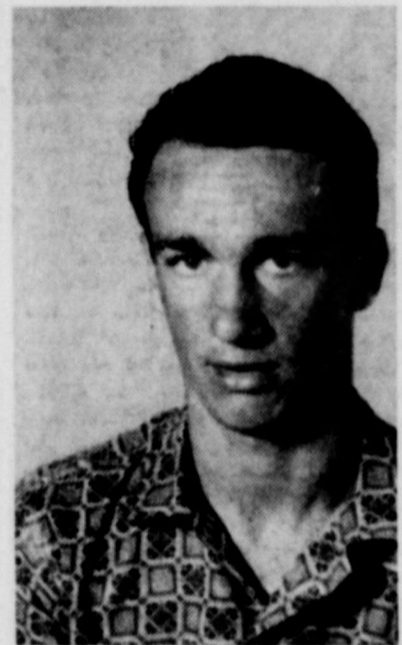

## 'River Stay 'Way From My Door' Theme Here Saturday

Rainfall up to 12 inches during a six-day period on the Bosque Watershed created some uneasy moments for residents in low-lying areas of the river last Saturday night when the stream began rising rapidly, bringing back memories of the May 1952 flood when so much damage was inflicted. However, the weatherman pulled the stop string on the downpour in time to avert most serious damage. But there was some damage,

mostly to washed out fences in low lands, and to prime farming land. Some reports of livestock losses have also been received. Mixed with the heavy rainfall Saturday night was some hail, but no damage reports have been received on this. Official rainfall for Hico during the week-long period was 8.82 inches, according to weather observer W. R. Hampton. Starting Thursday, May 6, Hico received the following official amounts of rain thru Tuesday, May

Several farmers contacted are optimistic about prospects of the grain harvest due to all of the moisture. Few think that the crop is undamaged and several have expressed opinions that in some instances the crop could be a near-total loss.

Most severe damage caused from the overflowing Bosque River is said to be to freshly prepared bottomlands where top soil was washed away. Second most of the damage was to many, many miles of fences which will have to be repaired, and in some instances replaced.

Despite the seriousness of the situation, there was a humorous touch during the height of the emergency, when a real old-fashioned "pig drive" was staged up main street. Sixteen hogs were evacuated quickly from the Gene Hicks place along the river, and herded some two miles afoot to his parents place on Highway 220. However, Hicks did lose three registered sheep in the flood.

All in all, most people, especially in Hico proper, were relieved that the river rise began to subside when it did, and not force complete evacuation in the low-lying areas.

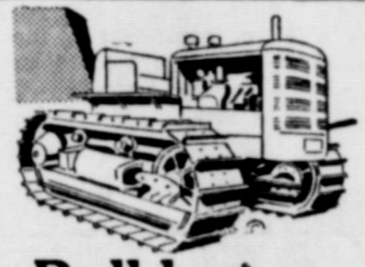

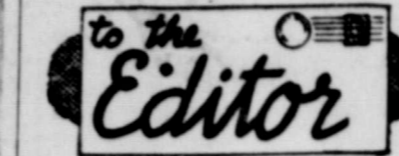

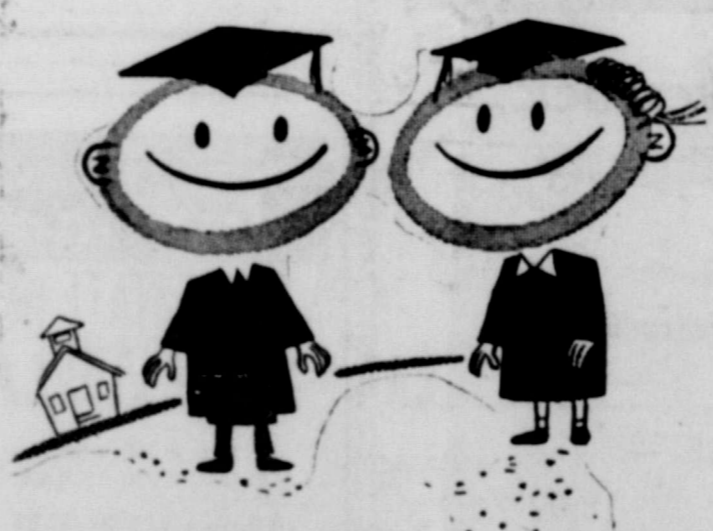
