Twenty-One Students Enrolled in Driver's Education Class

The picture below is a group of 21 students enrolled in a driving class here, being taught by Mr. Charles Kitchens of Stephenville. In order to be eligible for enrollment, a student must be at least 14 years old. After completing 30 hours of classroom study and six hours of observation, they are eligible to take a written test given by the Department of Public Safety. Upon satisfactory passing of the test, students will be issued beginners license permits, which enables them to drive if they are accompanied by a licensed driver in the front seat. After completion of a six-hour driving phase, they will be entitled to take a driving test. Upon passing the test, the restriction will be removed from their beginners license. He had recently undergone surgery at Temple and we visited in their home about two weeks after his return and he seemed to be recovering nicely.
