## School Program This Year to Include Modern Arithmetic

Note: The following was compiled by Supt. O. C. Cook and Principal J. B. Barnett to familiarize both students and parents with the new math program being used in the local school system this year.

Two years ago students in the seventh and eighth grades and high school mathematics classes began a program in Modern Mathematics. At that time new state adopted texts were chosen and teachers received their first introduction to modern techniques of teaching math.

This September the new mathematics program will be taught in elementary school beginning in the first grade.

Some have asked why the need for modern arithmetics. From a recent study made, mathematicians found a special need for a new approach to arithmetic for a variety of reasons. Some have to do with national interests and our need for competing with other nations of the world. Others center on our need for mathematics on a personal level—both as wage earners and as citizens. Still others lie in the simple fact that a modern program affords easier and more effective ways of teaching arithmetic than were formerly at our disposal.

Today there are uses for mathematics that were unheard of or not thought about a few years ago. Chemists and physicists have used new uses and interpretations for mathematics; biologists

are applying mathematics to the study of genetics; businessmen are using mathematics in scheduling production and distribution; and sociologists are using complicated statistical ideas.

It is at the grade school level that children must acquire a liking for, an interest in, and an inclination for mathematics. Here is where solid foundation in modern arithmetic must be established. A modern arithmetic program does not mean a complicated or difficult program. It merely means that the approach, and to some extent, the content are new.

### What Is Modern Arithmetic?

Modern arithmetic might be defined as a modern program in arithmetic—a program that differs from the traditional programs in both content, inquiry and discovery. It is a program that reflects new points of view and new emphases. The new arithmetic is carefully planned to provide for the needs of all pupils in the classroom. It does enable superior pupils to "stretch" their powers. At the same time, slower pupils are stimulated by the new material approaches.

One aspect of a modern program that is readily apparent is the precise use of vocabulary. The modern arithmetic program puts even greater emphasis than formerly on understanding our decimal numeral system, including place value. As children progress through the elementary mathematics program, he will have opportunities to consider systems of numeration with bases other than ten as a means of reinforcing his understanding of place value.

In a modern arithmetic program children learn to express what they learn in number sentences. This plays an important role in problem solving. More emphasis is placed on principles than formerly in order to give the child tools for building new facts and concepts from what he already knows, and to give him some appreciation, however elementary, of the basic structure of mathematics.

Some new terms found in the new arithmetic program are: associative principle, distributive principle, number line, sets, subsets, and some geometric concepts. These are only a few of the modern aspects of today's arithmetic program. The modern program reflects a new and deeper concern for how children learn.

**Faculty Prepared.**  
Much interest has been shown by the local school faculty in preparing for the new program in arithmetic. Last summer several teachers took courses in preparation to teach the new math in junior high and high school. Others have attended courses and workshops this summer to gain knowledge and a better understanding of how to present the new program.

New textbooks were selected last spring and each teacher has had access to the new books this summer to prepare lesson plans for the coming year.

## School Bells Will Ring Here Monday

Hico schools will officially begin a new year Friday morning when high school students will begin registering for the 1965-66 term.

Registration will start at 8 a.m., and all students are urged to be present sometime during the morning.

First faculty meeting is planned for Saturday morning.

First day of school is Monday, August 30, when full classroom routine will be carried out. A general assembly in the auditorium will be held at 9 a.m. and friends and patrons are invited to attend. Buses will run the same routes at the same time as last year, and lunch will be served. Dismissal will be at 2:45 p.m. the first day.

Students will attend classes for one week and then enjoy the first holiday of the year the following Monday, Labor Day. After that, the next holiday will be in November when two days will be taken for Thanksgiving. Other school holidays have been set and will be given later.

### Required School Attendance

House Bill 51 raised the required school attendance of students from 16 to 17 years of age.

House Bill 51 says, in part: "Every child in this state who is 7 years of age and not more than 17 years of age, other than a high school graduate, shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of his residence, or in some other district to which he may be transferred as provided by law, a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term of the district in which said child attends school."

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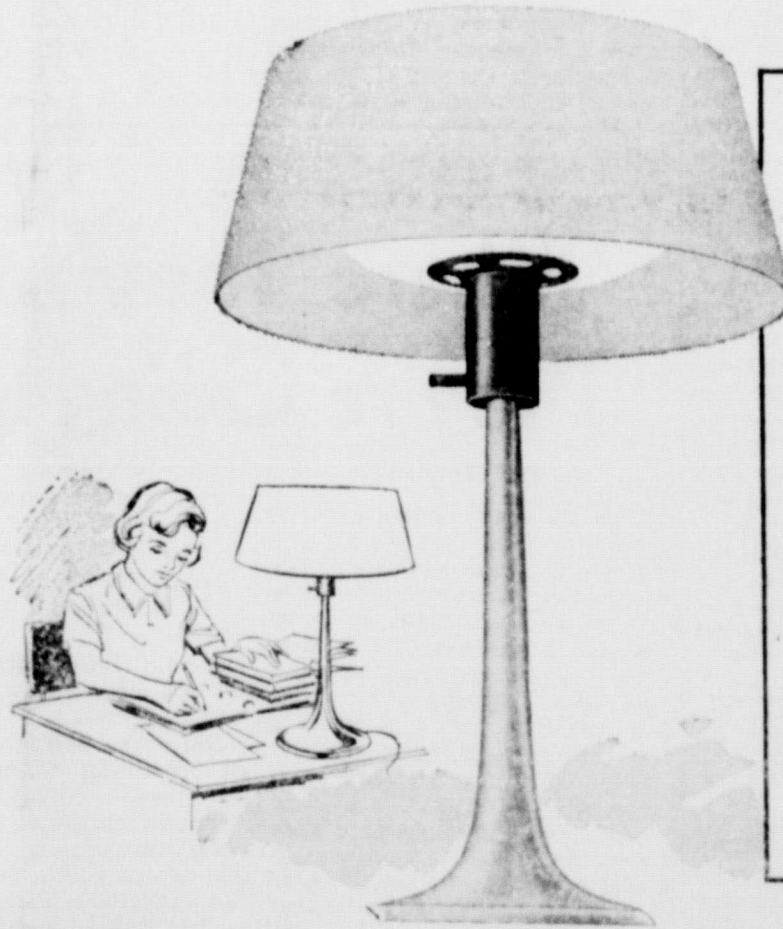

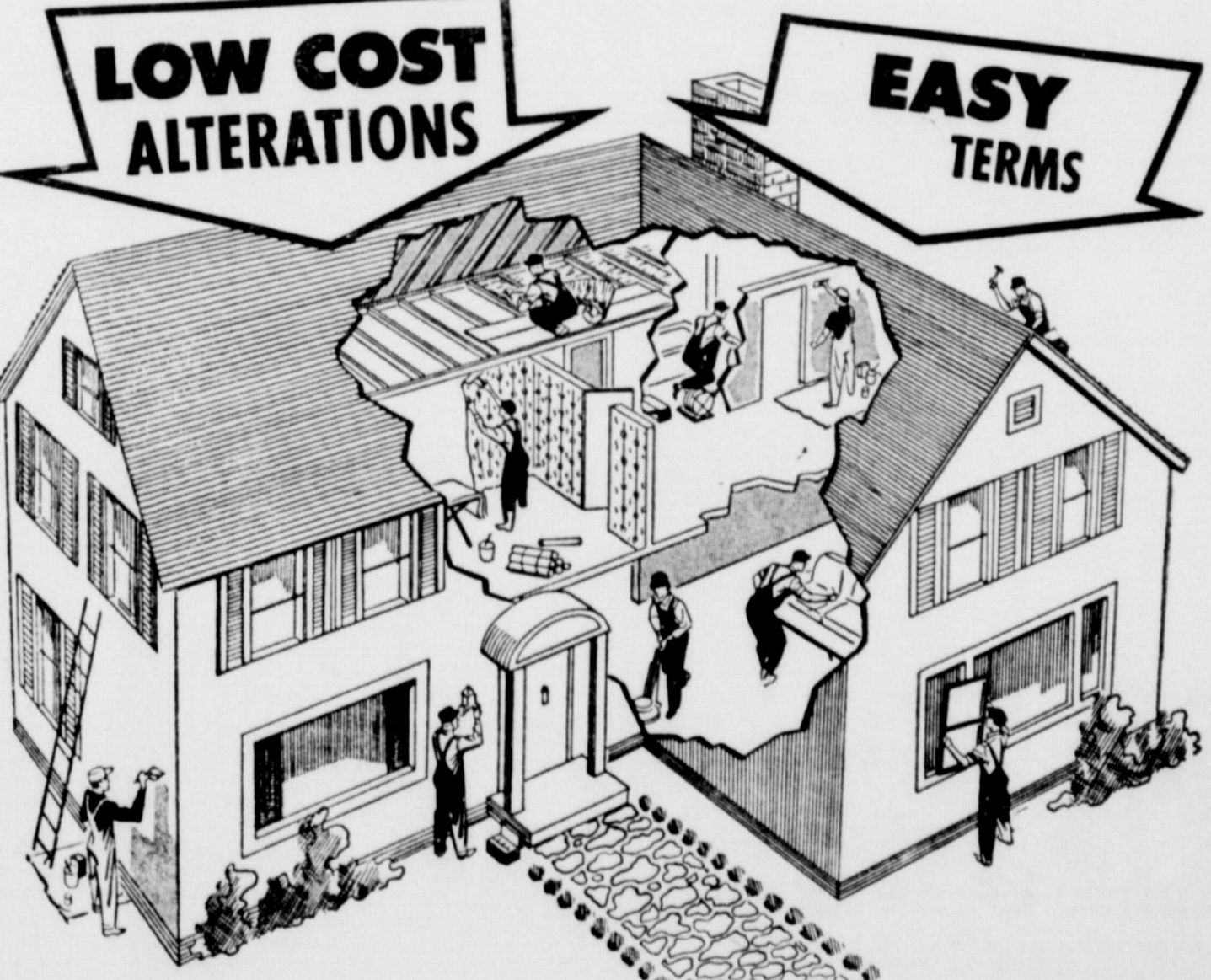

## ASCS Office Releases Info On County Farm Programs

Feed grain, domestic cotton and wheat stabilization payments will be completed soon, according to the county ASCS office who has been notified that as soon as 90 percent of measurement of farms is complete, program payments can be made through August 31. The past week this county office has made the following payments:

Feed grain, \$59,717.52 to 250 producers.

Wheat stabilization, \$5,633.68 to 51 producers.

Domestic cotton, \$4,008.00 to 53 producers.

Producers should sign applications for payment on all programs as soon as they are notified.

All payments are planned for payment by August 31.

Hamilton ASCS County and Community Committees met August 24 in a regular meeting at which time all programs were reviewed.

A representative from the social security office explained changes in social security laws pertaining to the farmer.

Community committees were to make up a list of 10 farmers and ranchers to go on ballots which will be mailed to all producers in the county, that they may vote for community committeemen to represent them in 1966. These ballots will be mailed August 30 and must be returned in person or post marked no later than midnight September 8.

ACP Funds for this program have

been exhausted. Producers who wish to carry on conservation work should let their desires be known at the county office. Personnel are taking names of producers who want to carry out conservation practices and as soon as money is available, these producers will be notified in accordance with dates they make their request.

### Domestic Cotton

In their regular session Tuesday, August 17, the county committee reviewed several requests for late signing of intention to participate in the domestic cotton program. Requests were based on the assumption that they had not received notice of final date to sign intention for this program. The county committee reviewed notices and letters mailed to cotton producers giving final sign-up date. The committee has exerted every effort to help these producers, but no payments can be made when requests are made after the closing date, which was April 16.

### 1966 Programs

The county office is receiving inquiries each day about the 1966 farm programs. To date Congress has not passed any farm legislation. As soon as Congress acts, producers will be advised. Legislation is required this year on cotton, feed grain, wheat, and incentive programs on wool, unshorn lambs and mohair.

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## THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

### Highlights and Sidelights

Austin, Texas—As absentee voting gets under way for the September 7 election on the proposed constitutional amendment to increase size of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 members, battle lines are drawn.

State AFL-CIO is leading the opposition. It charges that the proposal is a pig in a poke offering no guides as to where the new districts will go.

"Committee for Fair Representation," made up primarily of trade and industrial association representatives, contends that Texans would get "proper representation without jeopardizing interests of sparsely settled areas by adding eight new members to the Senate.

Lobby groups acknowledge they favor the plan because increased membership would cut down a senator's work load somewhat and make it easier to communicate with him.

The enlargement amendment, which triggered one of the 59th Legislature's most bruising battles, was intended to take some of the sting out of legislative redistricting by making it possible for most incumbent senators to keep their jobs.

Big city forces are divided, while most rural interests trend to favor a 39-member Senate.

Whether either campaign affects the expected light voter turnout remains to be seen. Most predictions are that the amendment will fail.

#### Screwworm Battle

Federal-state air invasion against the screwworm fly was stepped up during July with the release of 632,000,000 sterile screwworm flies over Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California, and 12 Mexican states.

Dr. S. B. Walker, Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, and Dr. John Wilbur, Veterinarian for the Animal Health Division of U. S. Department of Agriculture report that 115,800,000 sterile flies were released over Texas where 63 confirmed cases of screwworms were reported. Special "hot spotting" was directed in Texas and northern Mexico river beds.

Largest number of confirmed cases in Texas—25—was in Zavala County. New Mexico confirmed 29 cases; Arizona 94; California three; and Mexico 800, where 438,600,000 sterile flies were released.

#### Brucellosis Program Moving

At the end of July, 182 of Texas 254 counties were engaged in some phase of Brucellosis Eradication program, with 128 qualified for certification. So reports federal and state animal health authorities.

In several counties, including Bosque and Erath, area testing was

in progress. But some of the heaviest livestock population areas in the east of the state were among the 72 counties not yet in stride, they said.

#### Labor Day Traffic Toll

Department of Public Safety estimates 25 will die in traffic accidents in Texas during the three-day Labor Day Holiday.

Violations of Texas traffic laws will be apparent in nine out of 10 of these accidents, says Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director.

As part of stepped-up efforts to curb the toll, DPS will add 150 men from other uniformed services to supplement its regular Highway Patrol force.

#### Crime Study News

First three members of the Legislature's 11 member "Interim Committee to Study News Media on Proceedings in Criminal and/or Civil Courts" have been named by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

They are Sens. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Culo Krueger of El Campo and Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi. Yet to be named are three members from the House of Representatives.

Panel resulted from controversy over deletion of a provision from the new Code of Criminal Procedure which would have severely restricted pre-trial news coverage. New code takes effect January 1.

Study committee was authorized to take a sharp look at existing coverage.

#### AG Rules

In requested opinions, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that:

\* Texas Western College cannot use money appropriated by Legislature for tuition scholarships to aid students living in Juarez, Mexico.

\* Sections of new act instituting jury wheel system in Young, Titus and Kerr counties are unconstitutional "local and special laws."

\* A city, after annexing an area including a county road, does not need permission of county to abandon and close such road or street.

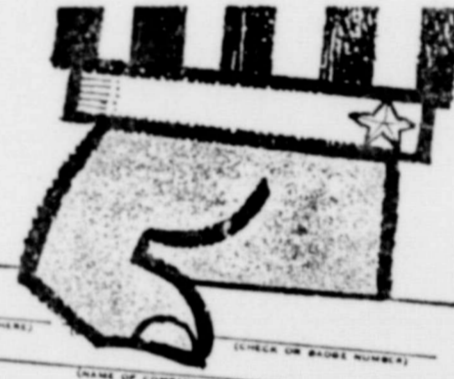
#### Oil Allowable Held

Texas Railroad Commission set September oil allowable at 28 per cent of potential, same as the previous month.

Allowable amounts to more than 2,800,000 barrels a day, 41,000 less than for August. Commission emphasized this level would prepare industry for demands of peak winter months.

On September 1, Commission will set up District 8-A, composed of 21 West Texas counties.

Commissioners say the new district will promote efficiency in administering oil and gas conservation laws.

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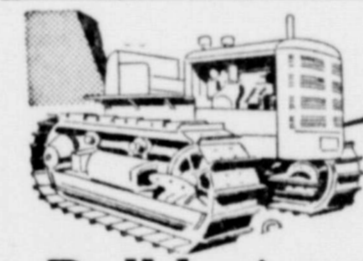
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## Traffic Violations Will Be Responsible For Most Wrecks

"Violations of the Texas traffic law will be apparent in nine out of every 10 accidents which claim a human life over the Labor Day Weekend," said Col. Homer Garrison this week in a statement concerning the upcoming holiday.

Col. Garrison, director of Texas Department of Public Safety, said that DPS statisticians estimate that 35 persons will die in traffic during the three day holiday.

"To combat carelessness and attempt to hold down these needless deaths," Garrison said, "the DPS will conduct the regular special emphasis program 'Operation Motorcade' from 12:01 September 4 through 11:59 p.m. September 6, the Department will use every means at its disposal to reduce traffic accidents."

As a part of Operation Motorcade, a tabulation of fatal accidents will be released from DPS headquarters in Austin three times daily to focus attention on the dangers of holiday travel. Garrison also noted that an additional 150 men from other DPS uniformed services will be on duty to supplement the activities of the Highway Patrol.

Garrison pointed out that almost all the accidents during the 1964 Labor Day Weekend, which killed 39 persons and injured hundreds more, had violations of the law as contributing factors.

The most common violation, he reported, was the failure to yield right of way, followed closely by violations where the driver exceeded a safe speed for existing weather or road conditions.

Other common violations contributing to accidents were:

1. Exceeding posted speed limits.
2. Failure to stop or turn in time.
3. Driving while intoxicated.
4. Driving on the wrong side of the road.

"Labor Day 1965 can tell a different story from last year," Garrison said. "But we must have the help of every motorist in observing traffic laws and in driving sanely to avoid this tragic loss."

Several other state agencies and public service organizations will participate in efforts to cut down on death and injury during the holiday period. Among these are the Texas Highway Department, the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Motor Transportation Association, and the Texas Junior Chambers of Commerce.

## Game Warden Reports

By BOB RHUDY

Now that hunting season is about here I am sure some of you would like to know some of the bag and possession limits as well as the opening and closing days of the season. Listed below you will find this information on the game in our area.

First I would like to remind you if you have to have a hunting license please get one before you take to the field. If you don't know the law on hunting license check with any place that sells them or a game warden before you go.

Mourning dove season opens at 12 noon September 1 and will run through sunset October 30, 1965. Daily bag limit is 12 and possession limit is 24. Shooting hours are from 12 noon until official sunset daily.

Deer season opens the second Saturday in November (Nov. 13) and will run through December 31. Season limit is two bucks except you may kill a doe or antlerless deer if you can obtain a special permit from the landowner before you go hunting. And this will only apply to areas where landowners are able to obtain these permits from the Parks and Wildlife Department. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset daily.

Quail season will open December 1 and run through January 31, 1966. Daily bag limit is 12 and possession limit is 56. Shooting hours are from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset daily.

Turkey season will open November 13 and run through December 31. Season bag limit is one turkey gobbler or one bearded hen. This bird must protrude through the breast feathers. Shooting hours are the same as quail.

Squirrel season is open year around but there is a bag limit of 10 daily and possession limit of 20. Shooting hours are the same as for deer.

Duck season has not been set yet and can be found in the migratory bird proclamation when it is released.

Please remember that on migratory birds (dove, ducks, geese, etc.) you must leave one fully feathered wing for identification.

For landowners who would like to know about doe or antlerless permits, I'm sorry to say at this time I do not know if there will be any permits issued this year or not. We should know by the last part of October after we have run the deer census lines in both Hamilton and Bosque counties. I would like to remind you if you are eligible for these and get them, be sure you turn them back to us, Joe Stevens or myself, no later than January 10, 1966. There is a new regulation this year that says you will be subject to violation if these are not back to us by that date. Not only that but these are very important to our records of deer killed in the county. And please do not mail them to Austin as you do the Shooting Preserve Books.

As in the past I do want to remind you to be very careful with that gun when you are hunting. Don't point at anything that you don't intend to shoot. And know at all times what you are shooting at.

There were large crowds attending revival services at the Baptist Church each night this past week. Visitors from Carlton, Fairy, Duffau, Hico and Hamilton came nightly.

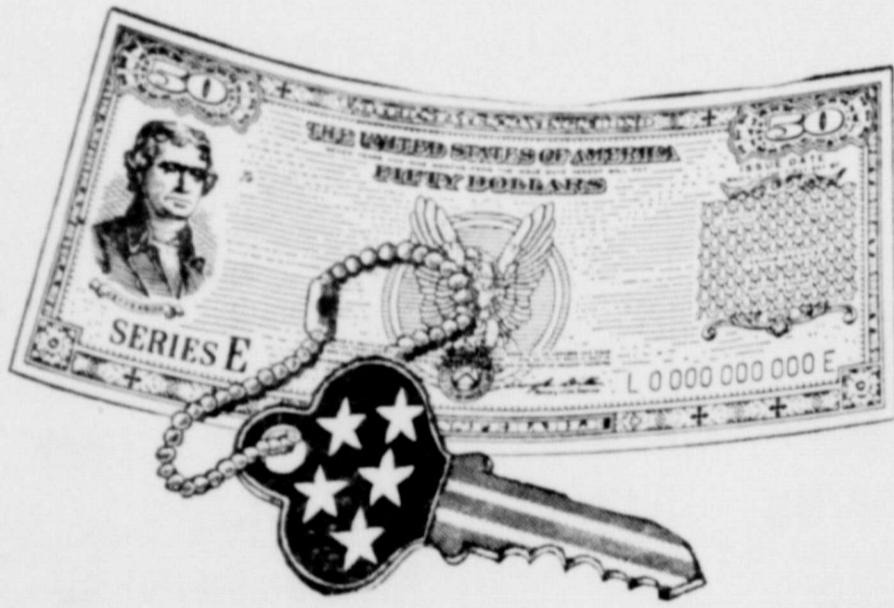
