## Amendment Passage Urged -

(Ed Note: Following is reproduction of an editorial from the Abilene Reporter-News which expresses this paper's views exactly on the constitutional amendment to be voted on Tuesday. It is being presented as an endorsement for the amendment, and to encourage local voters to mark their ballot Tuesday.)

September 7, Texans will vote on a state constitutional amendment to increase the membership of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39.

A thorough analysis of the proposition leads the Reporter-News to recommend its passage.

At the same time, this newspaper urges that citizens interest themselves in the amendment and take the trouble to vote. This lone amendment will be the only one drawing people to the polls on Tuesday, and a fully light turnout is in prospect.

Present size of the state Senate was set when the constitution of 1876 was drawn. As Texas' population has grown in the 20th century, the Texas House of Representatives has grown in number from 90 to 150. Congressional representation has also grown accordingly, as the state's population increased.

So the Senate.

It is this newspaper's opinion that the size of the Senate should be increased for these reasons:

1. A 39-member Senate would lighten the work load on the Senate and should thereby increase its efficiency. The Senate works through committees. Each member now serves on from 10 to 14 committees. As a result, he can't attend all meetings, can't inform himself fully on all legislation he must act on.

2. A small membership in any legislative body is more susceptible to lobby control. Influencing a 20-senator majority would be much more difficult than influencing a 16 now required to control the Senate. The 39-member would not be so susceptible to bloc voting control as the present smaller body.

3. Likewise, under the Senate's two-thirds rule, any 11 members can now block consideration (and ultimate passage) of any bill at any time they choose. Under the 39-member plan, 14 votes would be necessary to block a bill making it harder for a minority to hinder the wishes of the majority.

4. The legislature in the last session redistricted the Senate according to the one-man, one-vote formula. The districts of incredible geographic area resulted, and to be in effect, if the 39-man Senate amendment is not approved. Under these jumbo districts, it was not possible to preserve community of interests. District 12, for instance, stretches 300 miles from Ellis County to Real County, some 30 miles from the Mexican border. (This is the district of Senator J. P. Word of Meridian, of which he is a part).

5. Finally, and the factor of most direct concern to West Texas, the larger Senate would best preserve a voice in the Senate for rural Texas. Our present districts in this area could be preserved largely as they are, while cities are given the representation the courts say they must have.

6. This amendment is a constructive proposal for better government that is in the best interests of the state as a whole, and rural districts in particular.

## New P.O. Building Approved; Contract To Be Awarded Soon

According to information received Monday of this week from Congressman Omar Burleson, a new Post Office building for Hico has been approved.

In making the announcement through a letter to local Postmaster Robert Jackson, Mr. Burleson said:

"Further reference is made to our past correspondence concerning our efforts to secure approval of new construction for the Post Office building here in Hico. As you will recall, the Regional Office at Dallas previously recommended approval of a new building and five bids for new construction have been submitted.

"I am now pleased to advise that the Post Office Department here in Washington has approved a new construction project

for Hico, and it is anticipated that an announcement of an award of contract will be forthcoming within the next few weeks. Certainly I am gratified that this matter has now been resolved, and I will let you hear just as soon as the announcement of the award has been made."

Local people will recall that the post office department made an attempt last year to secure available housing for remodeling into new postal quarters, but a satisfactory building was not available. The department later changed its request and specifications for new construction, and the five bids were received.

No information as to possible location of the new building was given.

## Little Interest In Tuesday Amendment Election

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday, September 7, to vote on a constitutional amendment of great importance to the people in rural areas and small and medium size towns of the State.

The amendment up for approval is Senate Joint Resolution 44 that will permit the State Legislature to increase the membership in the State Senate from 31 to 39, and therefore avert the possibility of decreasing the voice of rural Texans in State Government affairs.

Unless the amendment is approved at the election, the remaining alternate will be the adoption of another re-districting plan which would take away voting strength in most of the small and medium populated counties of Texas and add to the voting strength of urban areas. Under this plan, Houston would get three additional State senators, Dallas two and San Antonio one. This would be accomplished by expanding the senatorial districts in sparsely-populated areas.

By adding eight new senate positions (increasing the Senate membership to 39), such as proposed in the amendment to be voted on Sept. 7, equitable reapportionment, as ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court,

can be met. Under this plan the big cities would have equitable representation, yet not at the expense of rural Texas.

In District 12, for example, where J. P. Word of Meridian is now serving, 16 counties would be added embracing an area from Waxahachie in Ellis County to Real County, near the Mexican border.

These facts are being brought to the attention of voters by a group called the Committee for Fair Representation headed by Jim Taylor of Austin and J. Tom Suggs and Perston Weathered of Dallas.

The committee also pointed out that unless the amendment passes, many rural areas of the State will be left without adequate representation because of the increased size of many districts and the varied economic and geographic factors.

As an example of the wide expanse of the districts, the committee cited what will happen in one West Texas District (No. 25) if the amendment fails to pass. The district will be expanded into an area of 44,321 square miles, an area larger than 17 states. The district will be 400 miles across at its widest point, and to visit all of the 21 counties in the district a person will have to travel 1,100 miles.

The same situation will exist in other districts in a lesser degree. The committee reminded voters that election day comes immediately after Labor Day, and urged voters to turn out.

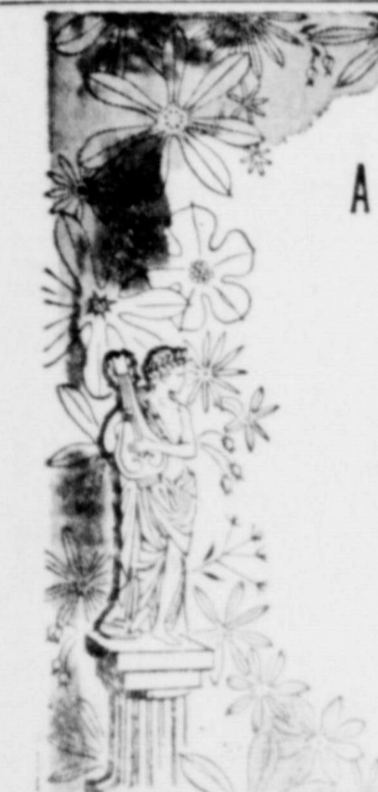

# Accident Prevention Urged For Labor Day Weekend

The Texas Safety Association today issued an "Accidental Death Alert" for the Labor Day holiday weekend and urged Texans to set an example for the nation by keeping the state accident-free.

"The accident situation in Texas is favorable now for curbing holiday accidents," S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President, said.

"But, it will take the cooperation of all citizens to get through the weekend without the usual holiday fatalities."

Traffic accidents present the greatest challenge. It is estimated that 35 persons in Texas will die in the Labor Day weekend traffic.

"But it doesn't have to be this way," Carr added. He pointed out the traffic picture is the brightest it has been in several years in Texas. Since the first of this year fatalities have shown a four percent decrease over the same period last year.

"And, it is doubtful that such a significant decrease would have been possible this year, with the increase of motor vehicles and travel on our streets and highways, if individual drivers had not put

forth an extra effort to drive carefully," he said.

"This same kind of caution in traffic can keep the weekend toll down."

The TSA "Accidental Death Alert" is for the weekend period beginning at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, September 4 and ending at 11:59 p.m. Monday, September 6. It coincides with the Texas Department of Public Safety's alert "Operation Motorcade."

The Association works with the DPS and other state agencies and groups in coordinating holiday safety programs.

In addition to promoting traffic safety, TSA is urging all citizens to use caution in recreational activities, such as boating, swimming and skiing, and dasking homeowners to be on the alert for accidents around the house.

"Whether you are driving on the highway, spending the weekend at the lake or just relaxing around home, being extra careful can make your holiday a time to remember instead of a time of tragedy," Carr concluded.

"And, it could put Texas first in accident prevention!"

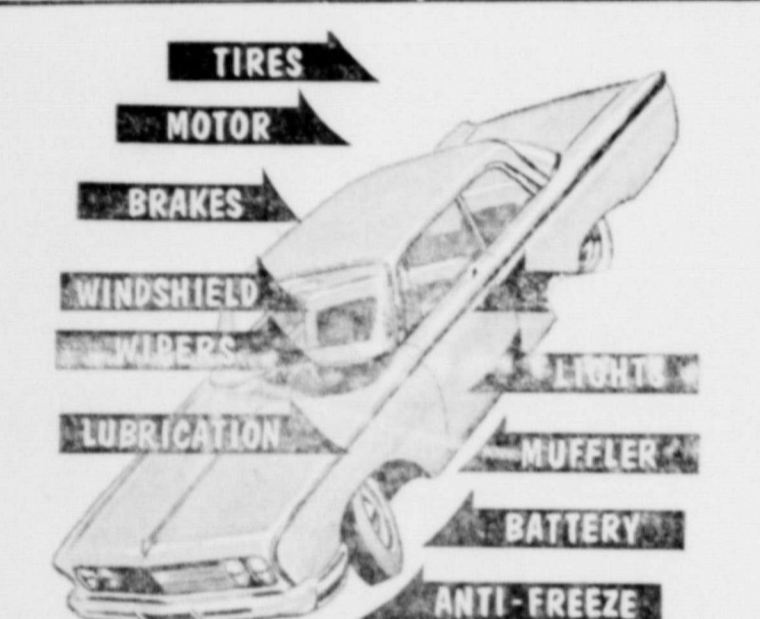


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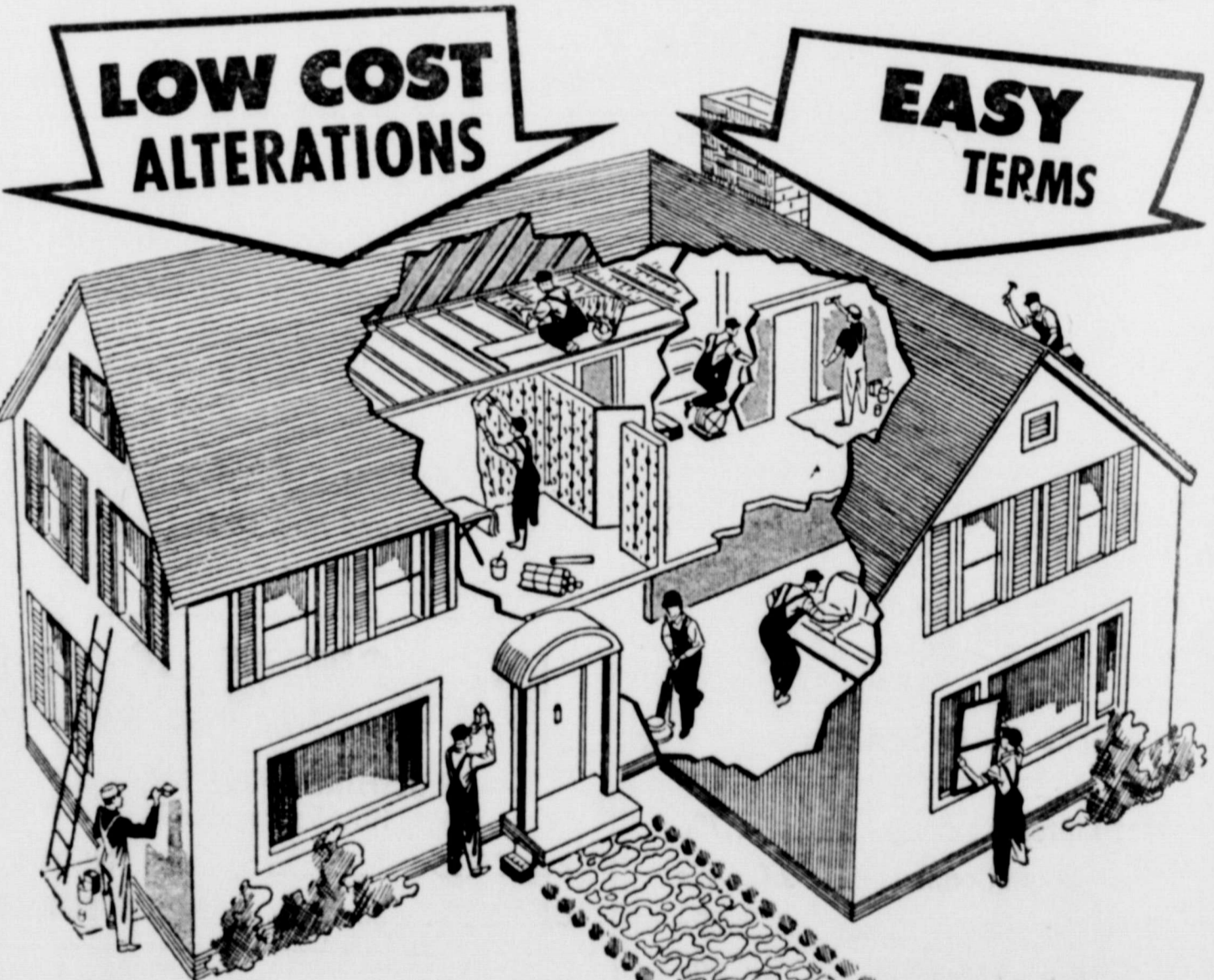

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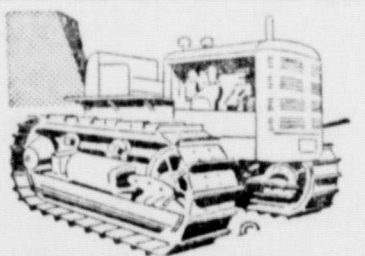
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Olin Community News

has been killed on range land this summer. Let's not forget that proper management following brush control is more important than the particular method used.

The objective of brush control is to get the longest control for the least cost, with the largest increase of forage and livestock production. It's always important to maintain a good grass cover too.

Since brush control is only one important phase of the overall ranch management program, it should be compared with proper stocking and deferred rotation grazing to be most beneficial.

Deferred grazing following any brush control operation is a must. If a livestock man plans to kill trees without a followup of other good range management practices he would be better off spending the money for supplemental feed.

It's a good plan to use brush control practices on an entire pasture rather than parts of a pasture. The reasoning behind this is that livestock will concentrate their grazing in the areas where brush has been controlled, since this grass will be more nutritious and palatable. Soon the controlled areas will become badly overgrazed. If the entire pasture cannot be treated, it should be deferred following control measures.

Returns from brush control amount to much more than just increased grass production. Added benefits are:

- 1. Ease of working and caring for livestock.

- 2. Increased offspring numbers.
- 3. Less parasite damage.
- 4. Livestock is more tame.
- 5. Increased food and cover for deer and quail.
- 6. Less breeding males are required.

If a good seed source is available on the area to be controlled, defer for one growing season to determine the kind of grasses present and to determine whether additional native grass seed should be planted.

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WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—When certain political, educational and religious leaders say to people that the conditions in which they live will cause riots, they are encouraged to do exactly that. When these people in the forefront of public life tell people they can disobey any law they do not like, and are coached to believe that law-breaking is right and moral, then civilized society breaks down and jungle law takes over as it did in Los Angeles.

America can no longer be the "land of the free" until law and order is respected and the crime rate closed.

This nation was made great by a dedication to the majesty of law, a regard for the sanctity of the

individual, a respect for the rights of property and a fear of God. These principles brought orderliness and self discipline into our society and a spirit of honesty, rugged individualism and self-improvement to our people. They engendered hard work, frugality and patriotism. In short, they created a land in which responsibility was co-equal with rights.

Moves are under way to meet conditions alleged to be the cause of the break-down of law and order but it will take more than the appointment of a commission and handout of money. It will take more than the cleanup of slums, although, true enough, they are the breeding ground of crime. There

have always been slums and poverty, but nothing comparable to the crime rate rampant in our country. Records show that the well-to-do and the middle well-to-do are contributing to these conditions also. The overturning of an automobile on a public street, with a man and his family inside, was not done by slum rioters, but a group of black-jacketed \$1600-motorcycle riders.

At this time I am introducing a Constitutional Amendment as follows:

"Section 1. The right of society in general and of each individual person in particular, to be protected from crimes against person and property, shall be paramount to other rights.

"Section 2. This article shall not be construed to limit the action and authority of any duly constituted law enforcement authority, including any person carrying out a citizen arrest.

"Section 3. The Congress and the Legislatures of the several States shall have the power to enforce this Article by appropriate legislation.

This proposal will not stop crime, but it will bolster the power of law enforcement officials and the courts to deal with criminals.

It is time to move on a broad, determined front, to clean up this country, restore law and order and make it a safe place to live. It is high time to cease forever subordinating the rights of the law abiding citizen to the unlawful element.

This amendment is intended to strike at the insidious contempt for law, order, property right, and even life, that is eating away at the very foundations of our national power. Unless the right to be free from criminal acts is made paramount, other rights have little meaning.

The vast majority of Americans are law-abiding, God-fearing people. This majority has an absolute right to have its Nation restored to order to be free and safe, to walk about without danger of violence committed upon them to be safe, in the home, to have one's property safe from theft, rioting and wanton destruction.

Erath Electric Coop Mails Refund Checks to Subscribers

Clinton E. Cox, General Manager, has announced that Patronage Refund Checks have been mailed to members who were receiving service from Erath County Electric Cooperative during the year of 1953. These checks represent the monies the member consumers paid in their electric bills during 1953 which, as in excess of actual cost of producing electric service. Checks were issued last year in the amount of \$7,462. Checks this year amounted to \$43,103, making a total accumulated total for the two years of \$50,565.

The Cooperative is chartered under the State Laws as a corporation and operates on a non-profit basis. At the end of each year the

revenue received in excess of the expenses is credited to the individual member capital credit accounts. The Cooperative has been using its margins to pay principal obligations on its long term loan and to set up necessary reserves in order to keep its financial structure adequate to protect itself and to assure the members that they will receive adequate electric service at a fair and reasonable cost.

The Electric Cooperative has made principal payments to the Rural Electrification Administration as they became due in the amount of \$1,713,321. They also made in advance payments \$443,650. Interest has been paid on the money bor-

owed in amount of \$1,037,267. All principal and interest payments have been made on time and have been paid promptly.

Recently the board of directors decided that a reasonable amount had been paid as advance payments on its loan and that reasonable reserves had been set up. It was decided that the Patronage Refunds for the year 1953 would be refunded to its members for that year.

The board hopes that the financial condition of the Cooperative will remain firm so that refunds may be made each year in the future. The Erath County Electric Cooperative is owned and operated by its members. Each year a board of directors is elected from the membership, responsible for the operations of the Cooperative through its manager.

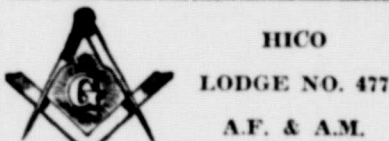

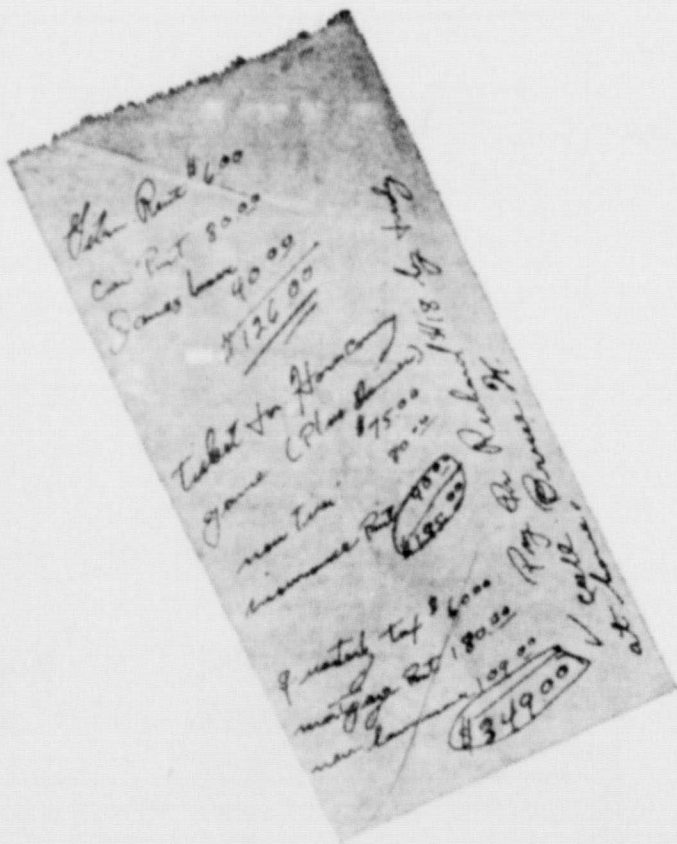
