The annual old fiddlers contest will be one of the main highlights of the fair, beginning at 8 p.m.

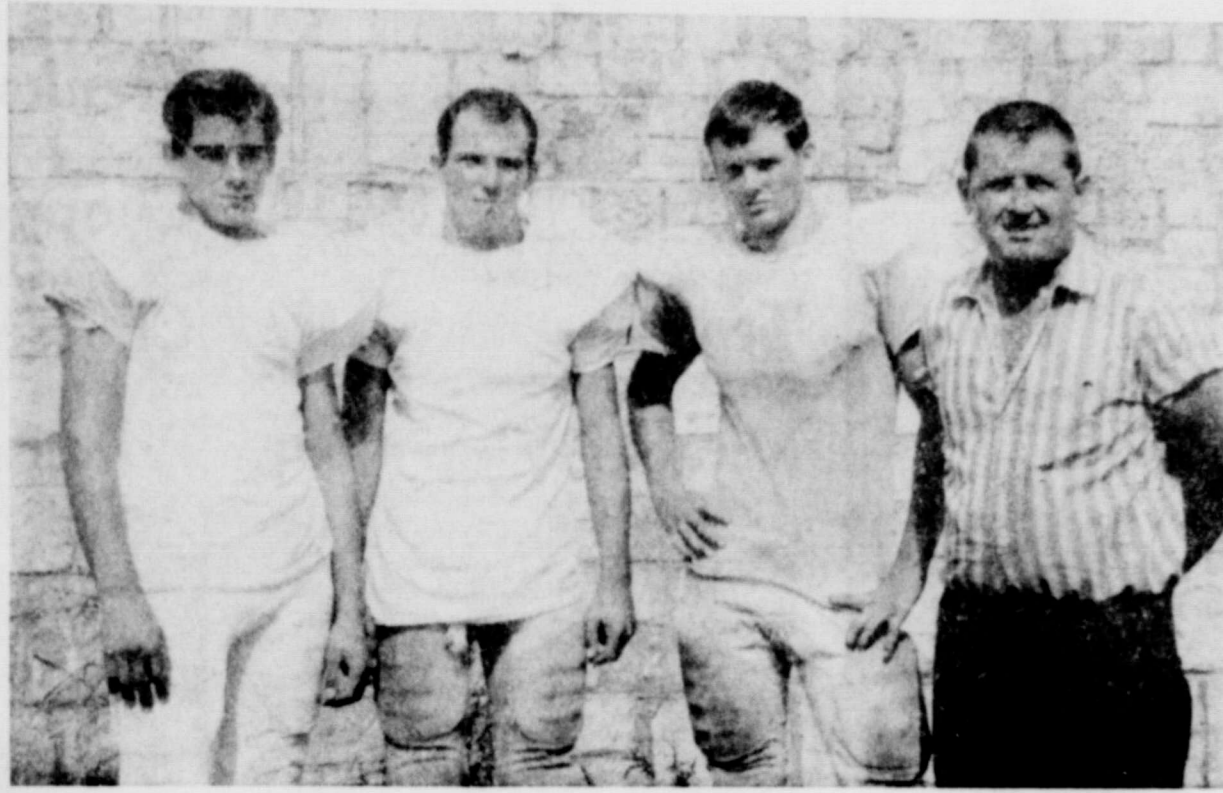
and livestock shows are scheduled to top all records for number of entries. Live-Stock superintendent Scott Bradley is expected to set a record-breaking attendance this year.

## Tigers to Godley Friday In Season Grid Opener

Hico football fans will get a glimpse of what's to come during the 1965 season this Friday night at 8 o'clock at Godley, when new head coach Robert Lee takes the wraps off a small but aggressive squad for the first time this year.

Having only seven lettermen on the 24-man squad, Coach Lee faces a big rebuilding job, and up to now, has been pleasantly surprised in the attitude, desire and effort put forth by the inexperienced team.

The Tigers will be put to the acid test Friday night, for they will be playing a big, experienced team that waltzed through district play last season without a loss. The

only blemish on their record during regular season was the 14-14 tie that Hico put there in the opener. The Wildcats were barely nosed out in bi-district play.

In a tune-up last Thursday against Hamilton B team, the Tigers pushed across four touchdowns, while holding the opposition to none. Leslie Royal, who has been shifted to quarterback for his senior season, scored three of the markers, and Dwain Gray, junior halfback, got the other tally. Joe Tooley, sophomore end, kicked one extra point.

## Compulsory School Age And Attendance Facts Reviewed By Co. Supt.

County School Superintendent W. B. McPherson Jr. this week issued a statement reminding parents of the compulsory school attendance law.

The Texas Legislature in its recent session raised the age of compulsory attendance for school purposes from 16 to 17.

Article 2892 states: "Every child in this state who is 7 years and not more than 17 years of age, other than a high school graduate, shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of its residence, or in some other district to which it may be transferred as provided by law, a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term of the district in which said child attends school."

At a meeting attended by each superintendent of schools in Hamilton County, the County Superintendent and the County Attorney it was agreed that a cooperative effort would be achieved to bring about the compliance with provision of this law. Those present also pledged mutual support in all areas concerning the conduct of the youth of the schools and county.

Hico voters favored enlarging the State Senate from 31 to 39 members in the special election held Tuesday of this week.

Eighty residents cast their ballots in the constitutional amendment election, disappointing to some people, but better than the state average, percentagewise.

Sixty-three votes were cast for the amendment, while 17 voted against the proposal.

However, on a state-wide basis, the amendment was defeated by a large margin of victory over the rural areas.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Attorney Gen. Waggoner Carr came up with some interesting arguments in answer to the Federal suit which attacks the Texas Poll tax.

Suit filed by the U. S. Justice Department seeks to get the poll tax ruled invalid as a requirement for voting. Contention is that the poll tax discriminates against Negroes.

That isn't so Carr argued Friday in a pre-trial hearing before U.S. District Judge Adrain Spears. Carr claimed that a survey this spring by the Southern Regional Council showed that 57.7 percent of the Negroes in Texas eligible to vote paid poll taxes and registered to vote, but only 53.2 percent of the Caucasians registered in that fashion.

Carr also contended that the \$1.50 State poll tax, levied in 1837 as a "head tax" was tied to the right to vote in 1902 not to keep Negroes from voting, but to assure collection of the head tax. He added that revenue from the present \$1.75 poll tax goes to Available School Fund of the state, amounting to more than \$2,000,000 last year.

The Federal suit citation—which centers on an all-white Austin precinct—was filed under the new federal voting rights act. Carr noted that the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights in 1961 found no discriminatory disenfranchisement.

Poll tax procedure is the only form of voter registration in Texas. So, a Federal court invalidation of the poll tax would mean a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of enacting a new vot-

er registration law.

Carr also asked the court to order U.S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach to clarify whether his suit is aimed at striking down requirements that only property owners may vote in bond elections.

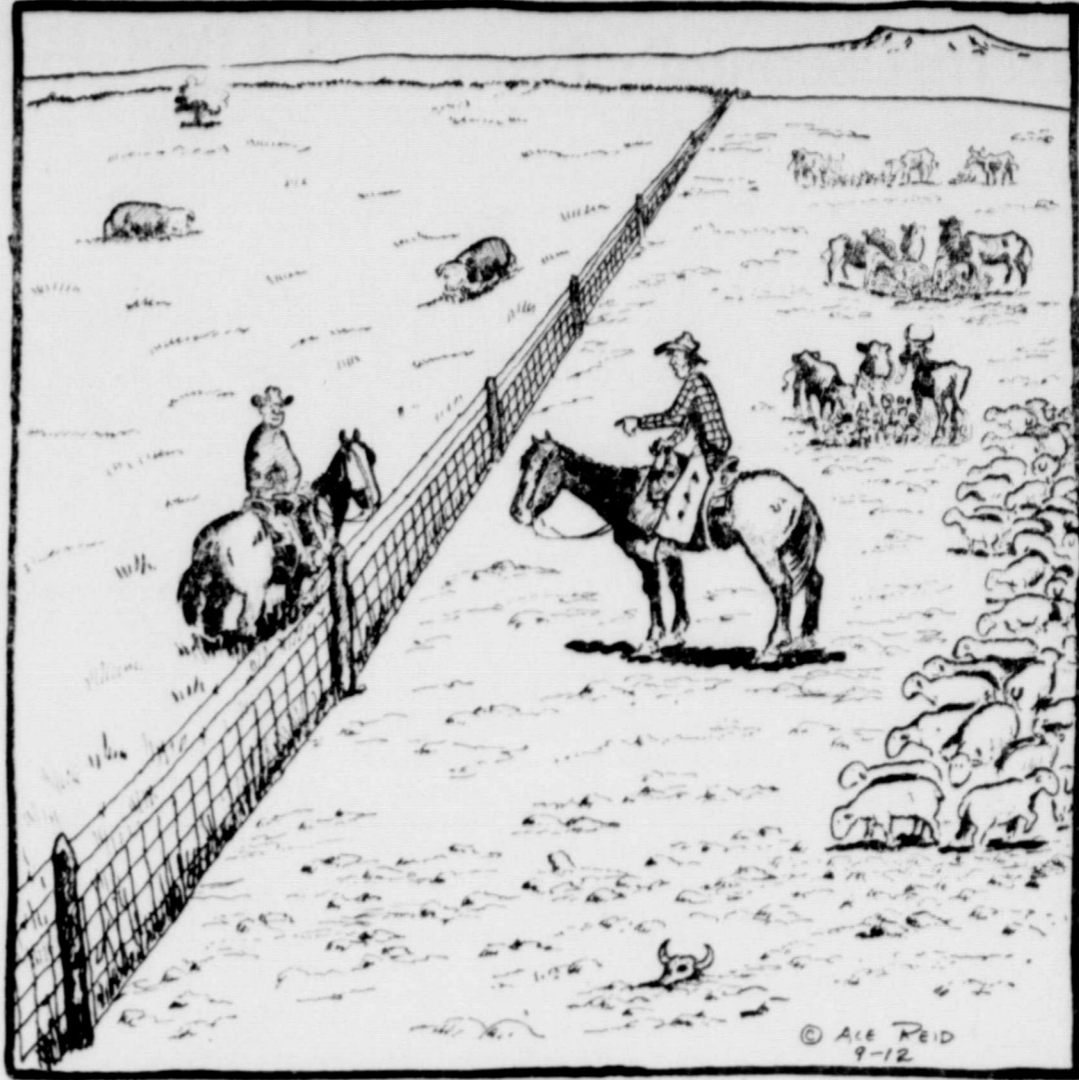

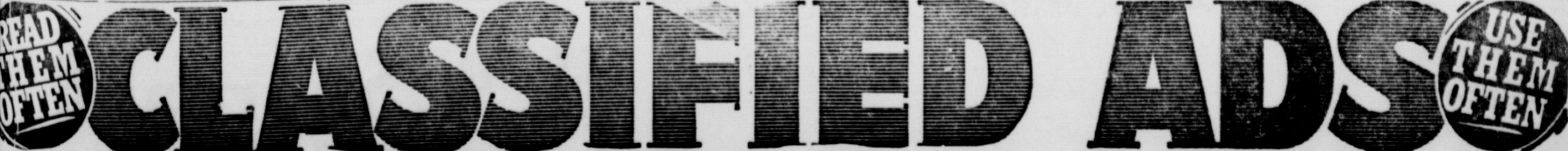

## As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Visitors in a Congressman's office, callers on the telephone, and even letter writers often apologize for interrupting his busy schedule. Let those who think this is the case take comfort from Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield's comment. "There is no reason at all these bills should be passed this year."

The comfort may be brief, but these are wise words.

There is no good reason for the rush in Congress. The Nation would be better off if its lawmakers could somehow, pause and reflect on the totality of their efforts instead of turning out such a mass of legislation.

The Congress has thus far constructed the greatest colossus of government in its history. Such notable bills as Aid to Appalachia, Medicare, Housing, Mass Transit, Made-Work Legislation and all the Aid to Education encompass about anything which can be thought of, including subsidies to the arts and humanities.

Hardly any area of the citizen's life is left out of the Federal purview, and if it is not already included, then prospects are it will be.

Of the many domestic programs which pump billions into our domestic economy, there can be no other result than inflation, which in turn means an increase in the cost of living, which in turn saps all other benefits of a prosperous economy. There can be no perpetual prosperity through perpetual budget deficits.

It seems all too common to ignore the fact that the Nation's resources are limited and must be allocated. No magic in the new economics can change this basic fact.

The Congress and the Administration must eventually find out they are burdening the people with an oppressive new saturation, and should see that trying to do everything at once is a course filled with incalculable risk. It is one thing to meet a threat against our national security at whatever cost, but on idle joke that a prudent Congress can be the best kind.

A hurry-up-and-do-everything congress is doing a dis-service to its immediate constituency and to our Nation's future.
