Just one glance over our Olin community, as it is the same in other typical communities, one can see where the "good ole days" are definitely not with us anymore.

Maybe this is as it should be. Personally I do not long for the days goes by as I firmly believe in progress and I think we live in an era which offers a great challenge. I'm all for the many conveniences we enjoy and for all

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the recent scientific advances our country has made. It makes us all very proud to live in America and to have the freedom our country offers. And speaking of freedom—the freedom to work—I've made a recent, brief survey of most all the families who live here on farms and ranches, yet the man or woman (sometimes both) see the need to supplement the farm income with an "outside" job and really look forward to pay day! Wonderful thought! Just to name a few families and its interesting to note the different types of jobs our farmers can do, and do well:

The Vernon Knapps own their stock farm, also the store at Olin. Vernon raises thousands of turkeys each year and at present, Mrs Knapp is employed at Patty's in Hamilton.

The J. P. Merritts own and operate a farm, raising lots of cattle and sheep. He works in South Texas and comes home about once a month or between jobs. He is a heavy equipment operator for a road construction company.

Mr. and Mrs. Garland Parker work together in their dairy, as

do the D. O. Chew family. Anyone who has ever been around dairies know it takes lots of time, effort and hard work to maintain an A-1 dairy.

Mr. and Mrs. Murrell Ables are landowners and he is a carpenter with plenty of jobs waiting on him. Mrs. Ables takes great pride each year in their family garden. She also sews, quilts and cans as time permits, not to mention the barn chores she tackles.

Mr. and Mrs. Dale Garner and Jerry moved back here from Grand Prairie about 3 years ago to their new home. Dale works at the Hico Commission Co. and looks after cattle for his father and brother. Mrs. Garner recently entered vocational nurses training at Hico.

The Bill Baley family has lived here about two years. They moved here from Abilene and bought acreage adjoining the M. M. Ables. Mr. Baley is a concrete contractor and works in various places such as Midland, San Angelo and Temple. He comes home most every weekend. Mrs. Baley is kept busy with the usual farm chores, tends the livestock with the help of their son and daughter, Benny and Barbara. To say nothing of the large garden she raises, cans and freezes vegetables and fruit. By the way, they feed a lot of kinfolk company!

Mr. and Mrs. Harmon Trammell work around the clock on their farm plus working at the livestock sales in Hico, Hamilton and sometimes Stephenville. I dare any woman in the state to compete with Mrs. Trammell and all the work she carries out and always takes time to help others.

Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Guest are living in Dallas where he is employed by the Ford Motor Co. but they come home on weekends, holidays and vacation time.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Rodgers leased out their farm this year but still live on it. Their health will not permit them to farm but they raise chickens, cows and a good garden. Mr. Rodgers takes care of the cattle for their son, Bobby, who is in the service overseas.

Mrs. Ettie Basham is still on her farm and loves it. She leases her land out so that she is free to travel and visit her sons, Edward of Dallas and Billy Joe of California. She also does lots of handwork, painting, and is active

in her church.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Haile live on their farm with three of their six boys. Mr. Haile's health does not allow him to do much farming but he is around to advise his sons with the farm work. Mrs. Haile built a real reputation for herself with her cooking skills when she supervised the lunch room at Fairy for a number of years. The Haile's goal is to get their boys each a good education and so far they are doing just that.

Mr. and Mrs. O. I. Garner live on their place but are retired. He suffered a stroke several years ago but can drive his car to church. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Akard and children came here from the Fort Worth-Dallas area about 4 years ago and bought the Sash Jones place. They raise livestock, chickens, turkeys, also do their share of hay baling.

Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Gray and family live on their stock farm raising their own feed, some cotton and livestock. Mr. Gray did work for the REA until he had

an accident breaking both hips several months ago. He has had to be under the doctors care but is improving. Mrs. Gray and children have done a good job keeping the farm going.

The Virgil Holloways are newcomers here, having moved here from Hamilton about a year ago. He is a welder with Gorbatt Bros. in Fort Worth but works away from home in all parts of Texas and Oklahoma.

Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Haile and Ray maintain their property, although Mr. and Mrs. Haile are not strong they enjoy farm life. Ray tends the livestock, raises grain and worked on the Hamilton-Gatesville highway when it was under construction.

Mrs. T. C. Edmondson is living in Autsin with a daughter since Mr. Edmondson's death recently. Mr. Ed Black is leasing her farm.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Holloway live on their farm, also lease nearby acreage. He is a welder, making trailers, cattle guards and other types of welding.

Mr. Claud Arnold farms the Henderson place, always raising good crops along with cattle and sheep.

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. James own land but live on the Ridenhower Ranch where he is foreman. He employs Mexican laborers to assist with the cattle and sheep. They have recently done extensive fencing on the ranch. Mrs. James is interested in paintings, and has decorated her home throughout with many types of handiwork.

Mr. and Mrs. George Abel are also newcomers, coming here from Hico and leasing the Noble place where they have livestock. Presently she is employed in Hico.

Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus King are landowners, raising their own feed and livestock. They work together on the farm and are both interested in social and civic affairs. She is also active in Home Demonstration Club work.

Mrs. A. C. O'Dell lives on her farm, although she rents her land out. She raises a fine garden, cans and freezes vegetables just like

she had a large family. She company and loves to cook them.

Mrs. J. B. Pool maintains home and visits occasionally Odessa with her daughters. Mrs. Johns tends to the Pool's sheep and farm chores. Mrs. Miley Garrett farms her land.

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
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

Mrs. Jimmy Moody and children of Westbrook spent last week with Mrs. Lillie Bishop. Jimmie came for her and the children and spent the weekend.



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
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

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Brucellosis testing of Hamilton County cattle is nearing completion. Mr. Chester Owens, serologist at the mobile laboratory in Hamilton reported that 831 herds of cattle were tested in the county through Sept. 17. This was a total of 14,380 head. Brucellosis infected cattle were found in 32 Hamilton County herds. Only 65 cattle were found to be positive reactors. An additional 26 head were suspects and will be re-tested. The number of reactors in the county is very low.

Testing is complete in most areas of the county. One exception is the Hico area where testing began one week later than other areas in the county. Harold Walker, vocational agriculture teacher at Hico, is assisting the lineup work in that area.

There were a few herds missed in those areas where testing is complete. I would like to hear from anyone who has not had their cattle tested or made arrangements to have them tested.

Farmers have often questioned whether it would be best to put fertilizer down in the fall or wait until spring to fertilize crops planted next spring. A test at the Blackland Experiment Station at Temple proved that the month in which fertilizer was applied did not affect the yield. Farmers have been hesitant about fertilizing in the fall for fear of the fertilizer leaching out over the winter, or bacterial action destroying fertilizer before spring.

In the tests, fertilizer was applied in each of the months of October, November, December and January. Grain sorghum was planted on each of the fields this spring. Recent harvest of the crop revealed no significant difference in yield from any of the fields. The month in which fertilizer was applied did not affect the yield.

Many farmers fall plow their land. This makes it even simpler to apply fertilizer. Sometimes heavy spring rains make it difficult to fertilize, too.

The fertilizer at the Temple station was applied in the furrows between beds. The land was then re-bedded over the furrows to cover the fertilizer.

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

211 Families Benefit From FHA Loans in 2-County Area

Over 39,766 families of farmers, ranchers and rural residents in Texas benefited from Farmers Home Administration loan services during 1965, according to L. J. Cappelman, State Director for the agency.

Loans made or insured by the Farmers Home Administration during the fiscal year ended June 30 totaled a record \$88,289,230.

In Hamilton and Coryell counties, served by the Hamilton FHA office, 211 families benefited from FHA loan services during the year. These were farm, ranch, and rural residents according to George Krupala, County Supervisor.

Loans made or insured by FHA in the two counties during the fiscal year totaled \$645,410.

Krupala said that \$209,230 was loaned to 16 families under the Real Estate Program. Nine obtain-

ed farm ownership loans to either purchase land, refinance short term loans, or develop present units. Six obtained rural housing loans; five to construct new houses; and one to purchase existing housing for a Senior Citizen. One individual soil and water loan for land development was made.

A total of 53 families obtained production type loans totaling \$349,230. Forty-four were operating loans for expenses, fertilizer, feed, leases, purchase of equipment, livestock or refinancing. Nine were emergency loans for operating expenses, fertilizer and feed.

Four families obtained Economic Opportunity loans to help them either set up or improve a small business enterprise.

The communities of Jonesboro and Flat obtained Soil & Water Association loans to develop water systems. A total of 136 families are benefiting from these loans.


