

building for Hico. Successful bidders on the new structure are Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Mann of Temple, Texas. Estimated cost of the building. according to the telegram. is \$40,000.00, and completion date is set for June, 1966. The new building will be located at the corner of First and Mesquite Streets, on the site better known as the Aycock lot. directly off Main

Street.

Specifications call for a building with interior of 2,330 square feet. 122 square feet of platform space, and 8,048 sq. feet of parking area.

The builder was awarded a 10-year lease at an annual rental of \$3,200, with four 5-year options.

The contract letting culminates nearly one year's negotiations for either remodeled quarters or a new building. In early November last year, the Post Office Department asked for bids on renovation of existing facilities to be used for a post office building. No bids were received on suitable sites at that time.

Then in March of this year.

the PO Department again 'asked for bids, this time on existing facilities or new construction. Several bids were submitted for the latter.

In early September of this year, Mr. Jackson received notification that a new building had been approved, and that contract would be let in the near future. Wednesday's telegram is the final step before actual construction may begin.

The News Review was unable to contact the successful bidder late Wednesday, and no information was available at press time (Thursday morning) as to when construction will begin.
