Social Security Meeting Set For Aged Citizens at Hamilton

A public meeting of all persons 65 years of age or over will be held in Hamilton next week, according to Henry Madeley, Assistant Manager of the Temple Social Security office.

The meeting will be held at the Youth Center in Horton Park on Thursday, Oct. 21 beginning at 9:30 a.m.

Persons 65 years of age or over who are not now getting monthly

social security, railroad retirement, civil service, or old age assistance payments should attend this meeting, Madeley said. An explanation of the new health insurance Medicare will be given, and applications for these benefits will be taken.

These aged persons should bring along their social security card, if they have one, and some proof of their age; whatever they have readily available at home will usually be satisfactory. Age proofs generally accepted are birth certificates, baptismal certificates, old insurance policies, school records, birth certificates of children, an old family Bible record, and many other documents. Also, the amount of your 1964 earnings will be needed.

Mr. Madeley said, "We are not asking those persons who receive social security, railroad retirement, civil service or old age assistance to come to these meetings because we are getting in touch with them by mail."

Everyone is invited to attend one of these meetings and get an explanation and to file their claim for health insurance benefits. This includes people 65 and over that are still working for themselves or as an employee. The application should be filed now, Madeley concluded.

Lonnie Redden, retired Army Master Sergeant, took over duties of Constable of Precinct 3 this week following his appointment last Thursday by Hamilton County Commissioners Court.

Mr. Redden and his family returned to Hico two years ago to make their home after more than 20 years' service in the Army.

The ex-sergeant's record shows a service career which began in 1942 and carried him to almost every duty station in the world.

During World War II, Sergeant Redden served with the famed 36th Division, and became Hico's most decorated soldier for meritorious service in Italy. He received the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and theatre campaign ribbons with several battle stars, plus the coveted Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Following the war, he returned to Hico where he met and married the former Miss Louise Higginbotham, and later re-enlisted to continue his military career. The Reddens have three daughters, Lynn, a senior in Hico High School, and Gayla and Debbie, both elementary school students.

Hornets Sting Tigers 18-12; Hico Hosts Indians Saturday

Hico spotted Lometa two touchdowns and a 12-0 halftime lead last Friday night, and then stormed back in the second half for two markers of their own to momentarily tie the game at 12-12, only to see the visitors move 59 yards midway of the final quarter for the game-winning touchdown. Final score was 18-12, bringing the Tigers' season record to 2-2-1.

Lometa jumped on a lack-lustre Tiger team in the first half, and before the locals awoke, the Hornets had built a 12-0 lead. Lometa's first touchdown came on their first possession, moving 49 yards with the opening kickoff in 11 plays for a 6-0 lead. The Tigers never crossed the midfield stripe on their two possessions in the first period.

The second quarter found the Tigers with possession at their own 23, and after three plays failed to net the first down, the Hornets' Melvin Porter gathered in the punt and raced 70 yards for a touchdown. On the run at least six blue-

clad Tigers missed tackles on the speedy back.

Hico took the third quarter kickoff and moved 67 yards in 12 plays to get on the scoreboard. Big play in the march was a 20-yard scamper by Dwain Gray on a muffed punt attempt. Back in kick formation, needing 10 yards for a first down at their own 47, a bad snap from center forced Gray to run for it, and run he did, picking up a first and ten and new life at the Lometa 33. From there the Tigers used five plays to cover the distance, with Gray getting the last 14 yards, thanks to two good blocks by Howard Srader and Gary White.

Following the kickoff, the Tiger defense rose up and slapped down three Lometa plays, and took the punt on their own 32. Hico used the remainder of the third period and part of the fourth quarter to move the distance, with Barry Polk crashing the last four yards to tie the game 12-12.

But the visitors wouldn't have anything to do with a tie game,

and put together a drive that carried 59 yards for the winning touchdown.

The game saw Hico receive its first major injury of the year, with top defensive leader Aodis Land going out in the first quarter with an injured knee which will sideline him for two or three weeks.

Leading defensive hands in the Lometa game were Barry Polk with 17 tackles, and Edmund Horton and Dwain Fail, each with 15 stops.

Dwain Gray led the ball carriers for the third week, grinding out 109 yards on 23 carries. Barry Polk had 19 yards on 8 attempts. Leslie Royal picked up 6 yards on 4 tries, Garry White pitched in 48 yards on 9 stabs, and Howard Srader contributed 9 yards on four attempts.

Coach Lee reported the squad in good mental condition for the Saturday game with Comanche B, and only injury is that of Aodis Land.

Fans are reminded of the change in game time, from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m.

An unknown poet describes God's delay:

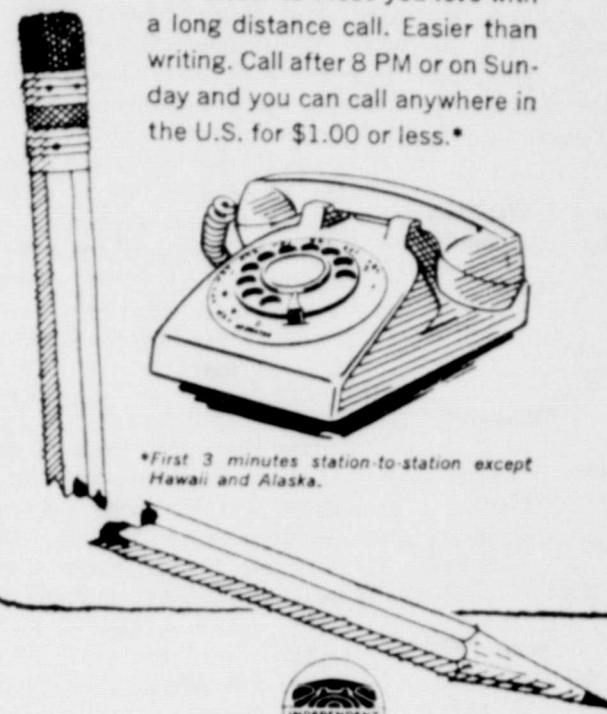
We climbed height by the zig zag path

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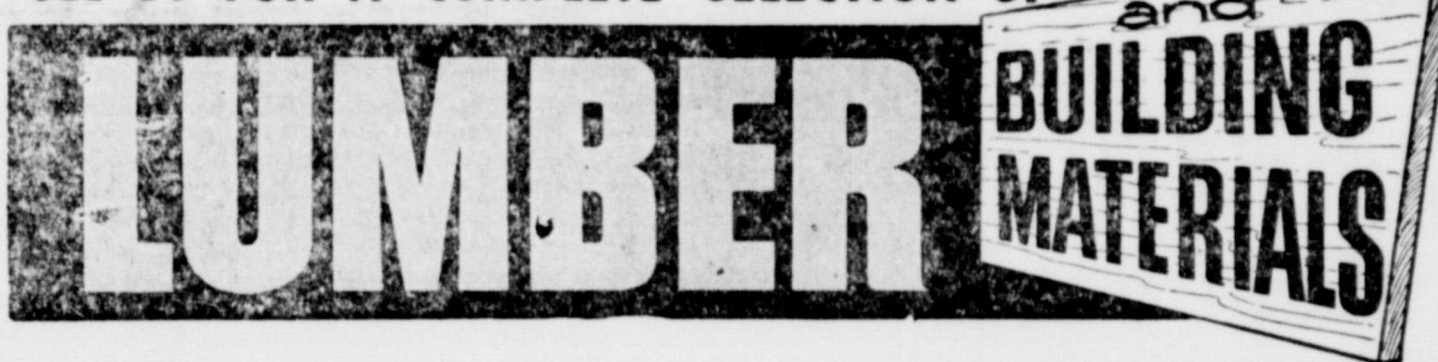

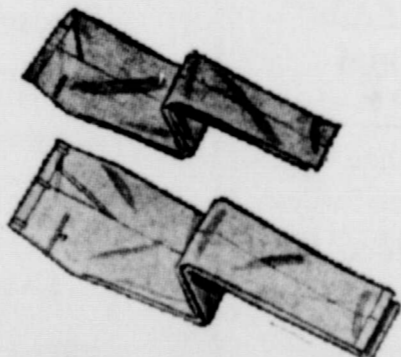

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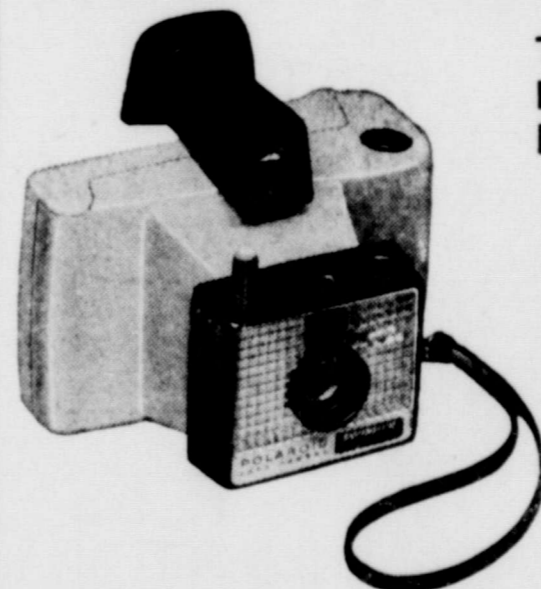

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

It took a long time to get an inch of rain early last week, but it was worth waiting for. The rain fell so slowly that the soil was able to absorb it drop by drop.

The rain was excellent for the small grain that has been planted. This should also satisfy farmers who were waiting on a rain before planting small grains.

I have heard reports that a lot of fertilizer is being put down with small grain crops this fall. If high production is the objective, then fertilizer will be needed. The kind and amount should be based on the fertility level of the soil and its production potential.

The best method for determining the soil fertility level is a soil test. Test results provide an index of the nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in the soil and this in turn is a basis for the plant foods to be added.

When taking a soil sample it is important to get a representative sample, then package it securely and supply as much information as is possible about soil conditions and future cropping practices. I have a good supply of soil testing cartons in my office and I will be glad to discuss the procedure with you.

Since the rain, moisture conditions in the county are good and proper fertilization of small grains can play an important part in turning this moisture into forage and grain. If the grain is to be grazed, fertilization at planting time is especially important.

Small grains which get off to a fast start can better utilize soil moisture and plant nutrients and develop more winter hardiness. Most soils in this county contain sufficient potassium. But small grain plants absorb most of their potassium requirements during early growth, therefore when needed it should be applied at planting time.

The serologist at the Brucellosis laboratory reports that 17,780 head of cattle have been tested in 1,044 Hamilton County herds. A total of 69 positive reactors were found in 35 herds in the county. In addition to this 31 head were found to be suspects. Cattle testing will probably be completed next week.

Ricky Hail, Carlton 4-H Club member, participated in the High Profit Corn Demonstration Program this year. Ricky is the 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hail of Route 1, Carlton, who reside on the Odis Petsick ranch.

The demonstration was divided into two parts. A one-half acre plot was planted at the normal planting rate and was fertilized with 100 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre. The second plot, which was one acre in size, was planted 25 percent thicker and 200 pounds of the same fertilizer was used per acre.

The seed for both plots were given to Ricky by the Louisiana Seed Co. The variety used was Funk's G-711. Cultivation and other practices were exactly the same on both portions of the demonstration in order to demonstrate as accurately as possible the true effects of higher plant population and higher fertility.

Yields were determined on both portions of the demonstration on September 7 by County Agent DeMarquis Gordon, Ricky and his father. All costs and returns were figured on a per acre basis even though one plot was only half an acre in size. All labor, tractor expenses, and cost of seed and fertilizer were calculated to determine the true cost and return of the demonstration. In order to determine the income the price of the corn was figured at \$1.25 per bushel.

The wide spacing, low fertility plot yielded 36.67 bushels per acre while the thick spacing, high fertility plot yielded 61.83 bushels per acre. The total expenses of the wide spacing, low fertility plot

was \$29.63 per acre, giving a net profit of \$16.21 per acre. Total expenses for the second plot was \$39.45, giving Ricky a net profit of \$37.86 per acre. This demonstration was conducted on Odis Petsick's south of Carlton.

Ricky is one of 130 Hamilton County 4-H members who attended National 4-H Club week Sept. 25 to October 2.
