Tuesday Is 'Vote Day' For 10 Constitutional Amendments

citizens of Texas (and Hico) will vote on Tuesday, November 2, to decide the fate of ten proposed Constitutional Amendments.
The ten proposals are part of 27 amendments proposed by the Legislature. One was voted on (and failed) Sept. 7. The remaining 16 will be up for vote of the people next year.
The ten proposed amendments to be voted on Tuesday are described below in the order in which they will appear on the ballot.

- Number 1.** Provides for a method of payment for acquiring, constructing, equipping buildings and other improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning. It increases state ad valorem tax from 10 cents per \$100 evaluation and removes a restriction that none of the proceeds be used for auxiliary purposes. The interest rate on bonds or notes is increased from 4 percent per year. The Constitution now contains set dates for maturing of bonds for which is substituted a ten-year period.
- Number 2.** Would increase Veterans Land Fund from \$200 million to \$400 million.
- Number 3.** Permits Legislature to appropriate funds for use in the following categories: (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind, (4) needy children and caretakers of such children. It would raise the appropriation limit for such purposes from \$32 million to \$60 million.
- Number 4.** Provides for four-year terms of office for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate at large.

unless a term of office is otherwise specifically prohibited in the State Constitution. These offices are limited to two-year terms at present.

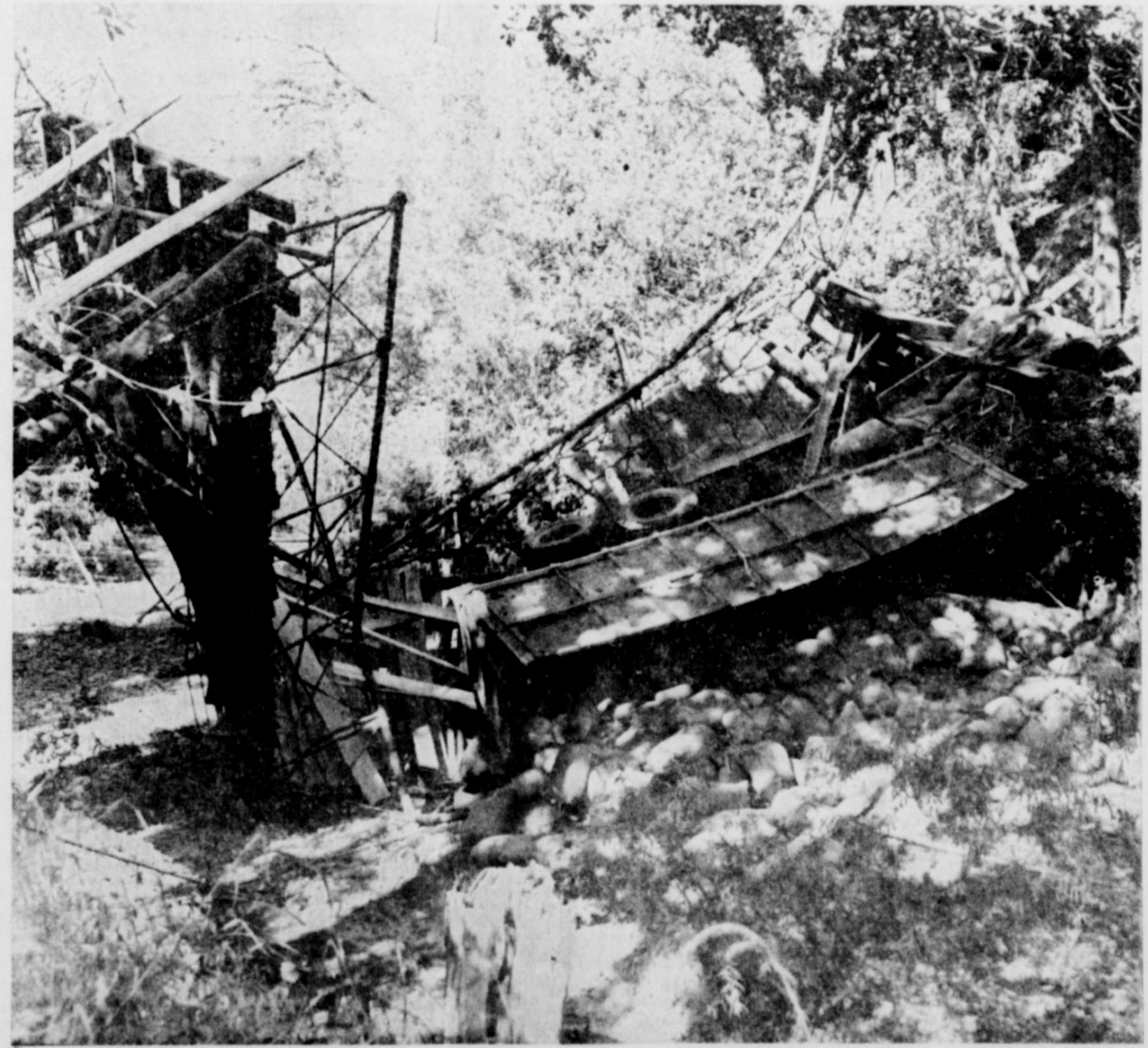
- Number 5.** Would create an agency of the State.

Tigers Lose In Thriller, 13-8

A mistake-filled contest last night, Hico's Tigers went down in defeat for the third time in a year as the Boyd Yellowjackets defeated a homecoming crowd by beating the Tigers 13-8 in a real thriller, from a spectator point.
Over in one game has fans seen many thrilling plays—yet see the statistics remain in such low figures. Mistakes were numerous by both teams, with Hico being assessed a total of 135 yards in penalties. Officials stepped off another yard against the home team.

The flags greatly changed the game totals, as Hico had two downs called back, another run to the one yard line nullified and Boyd, also, lost a scoring opportunity due to an untimely block.
Boyd took the opening kickoff immediately went to work, scoring on the Tiger 8 with a first and goal from that point.

But the Tiger defense went to work, and Boyd made four stabs, failing to punch across. Hico took over at its own 1.
Following a short punt, Boyd was again in business at the Tiger 23, but the Tigers again dug in and limited the Jackets to only three yards in four plays. The reprieve, however, was short lived. On the next series by the Tigers, a loose football put Boyd back in threatening distance at Hico's 23. The Jackets used four plays to score, and after a successful kick, they led 7-0.
On Hico's next possession, early in the second quarter, a holding penalty nullified a 46-yard run by Dwain Gray to the Boyd one. Two plays later it looked like a repeat performance, as Gray sped 35 yards for an apparent touchdown only to see the marker rubbed out by an ill-timed block.
It was "turn-about fair play" on Boyd's next series, as a Boyd back broke loose for 68 yards to Hico's ten, only to see the run marked out by a clipping penalty.
The Tigers forced Boyd to punt.

ANOTHER BRIDGE GONE

A trailer truck, belonging to Poston Feed Company of Stephenville, crashed into Greens Creek near Clairette late last Tuesday night when a wooden

bridge gave way under the weight of the loaded vehicle. The truck, driven by R. A. Rayburn, was carrying sacks of cotton seed meal and was enroute from Gatesville to Stephenville. The tractor and trailer had apparently reached the

mid-way point in the 60-foot bridge when the wooden beams collapsed dropping the truck, load, and driver approximately 25 feet to the river bed. The bridge is located on the old dirt road from Hico to the Clairette road, and was constructed

in 1905. Sacks of cotton seed meal spilled out in the creek and the truck was virtually demolished. Rayburn suffered minor scratches and bruises.
