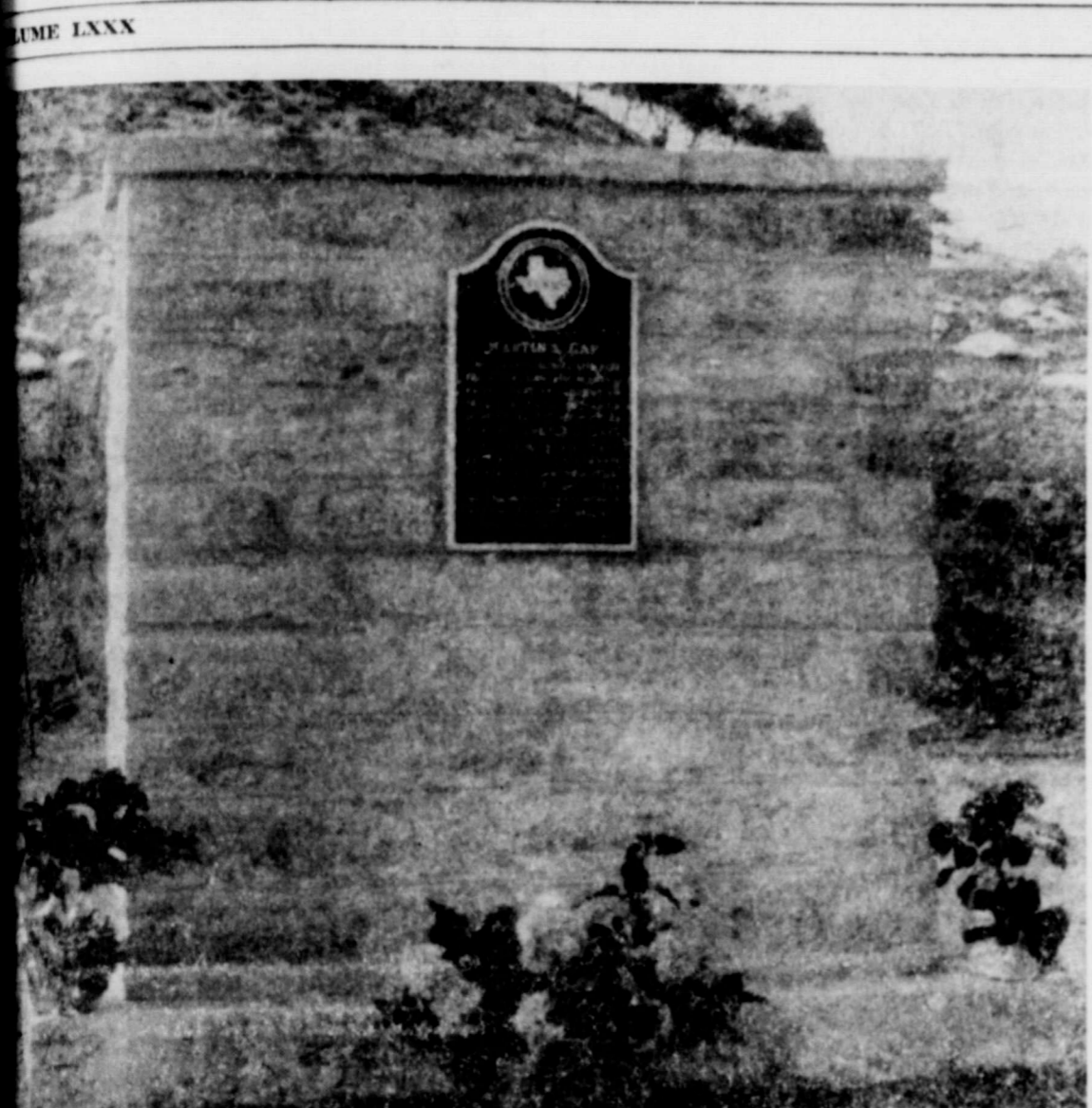

Martins Gap Marker Dedicated Sunday

MRS. EUNICE DANIEL, Hico Review Fairy Correspondent, presided over the dedication services for the Jim Martin pioneer plaque and monument were held Sunday at 2 p.m. at the site of the Martins Gap. She married to Mr. Phelps in 1901 and their home was the Ed Allison residence in Hico. When they lived there until she moved to Hico. Bid Opening Nov. 29 on 4 Phases of C.C. Work

Directors of Bluebonnet Country Club, Inc. met Tuesday night with E. E. Johnson, Engineer, and Geo. Krupala, County FHA supervisor to set final details for calling for bids on various phases of work on the recreational facility to be built here. The loan was obtained by the corporation, a non-profit organization of 63 rural families. The facility will serve the communities of Hico, Cranfills Gap, Iredell, Carlton, and other surrounding areas. Construction of the project will provide 828 man-days of labor for landscape, architect, engineers, machine operators, pipe layers, electricians, plumbers, welders, carpenters, and other laborers and will remove 32 acres of farmland from production. One permanent and one part-time job will be provided in the operation and maintenance of the recreational facility. Funds for the insured loan were provided by the First National Bank of Hico. Under the insured loan program the Farmers Home Administration makes and services the loan and guarantees re-payment of the money borrowed along with interest. "Recreation projects of this type boost rural area development" said an FHA spokesman. "Such endeavors bring new jobs to rural communities and provide much needed recreational facilities for urban and rural families. In addition these facilities help develop the type of rural community that encourages young people to remain in their hometown, attracts industry, and promotes tourism. These projects also utilize land not needed for crop production." The FHA loan will be repaid over a 40-year period. Officers of the association receiving the loan are: B. C. Dayton, president; E. V. Meador, vice-president; Tommie J. Pierce, secretary-treasurer. Directors are M. I. Knudson, Wayne Rutledge, Odis Petsick, Ellis Randals, Horace Ross, Ray Cheek and Harold Walker. This is the fifth loan to be made to a rural group in Texas for the development of a recreational facility. Loans of this type were authorized by the 1962 Food and Agricultural Act.

Tigers Will Host Valley Mills In Season Finale

Hico will host the powerful Valley Mills Eagles Friday night in a 7:30 p.m. contest at Tiger Stadium. The game is the last of the year for the locals, and completes a 10-game schedule. Five seniors will be making their last appearance in Hico school colors. Senior team members are Edmund Horton, Dwain Fails, Leslie Royal, Adolis Land and Lynn Malone. All have been starters this year. Valley Mills will bring to town a team that many observers have declared the best in school's history. They are reportedly big, fast, and experienced, and the young, inexperienced Tigers will have their work cut out to even stay on the field with the Eagles. Rated number two Class B team in Central Texas behind Crawford, the Eagles have compiled a 7-1 season mark, losing to Class A power Clifton earlier in the year. They have swept all other opponents aside with ease in compiling the record. Due to the rains this week, the Tigers have worked inside most of the time, but everyone will be in good condition for the game.

Tigers Fall To Meridian Onslaught

Meridian Yellowjackets, displaying the power that has guided them to a 6-2 season record, smashed the Hico Tigers 54-12 in a mismatch last Friday night on a muddy field in Jacket Stadium. The Jackets set the pattern early, using the first six minutes of the contest to crash 86 yards for their first TD. From then on there was never any doubt as to the final outcome, as it was obvious that the home team simply had more strength than the locals. If any one thing could be cited as a deciding factor in the game, it was the efficiency of the offensive line that consistently cleared the way for Meridian's big backs to gouge out huge chunks of ground over the smaller Tigers. Meridian's line whipped the Tigers handily on the first drive, and continued its aggressive play the rest of the night. The Jackets rolled for 14 points in the first quarter, tacked on 14 more in the second quarter while allowing the Tigers a single counter to take a commanding 28-6 halftime lead. Hico's first marker was perhaps the most exciting play of the game. Following the Jackets' third touchdown, Freshman Dennis Polk fielded the kickoff, handed off to Dwain Gray, and the junior speedster swept 90 yards for the score. Meridian tacked on 13 points in the third quarter, and padded the score to 54-6 before giving up the final Tiger touchdown. Gray passed 25 yards to Leslie Royal for the marker.

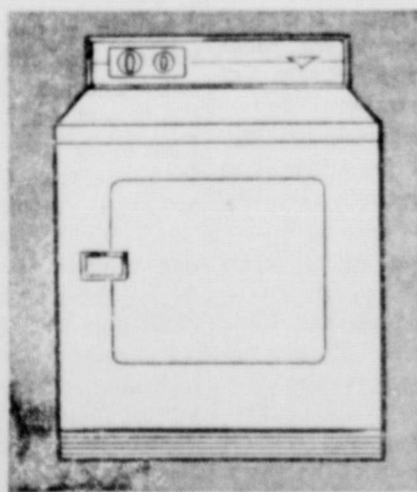

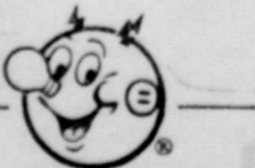



Reports from other parts of the... state indicate that fall Army worms... are beginning to appear. So far, in-... festations have not been reported... in Hamilton County.

But, producers and home owners... should be alert for possible out-... breaks. Young larvae often go un-... noticed until they become rather... large and by then damage can be... considerable. The young worms... skeletonize the leaves of food... plants, leaving the veins and ribs... exposed. This early damage re-... sults in the appearance of whitish... areas or spots where concentrated... feeding by the worms has occurred... These whitish areas are sometimes... the first indication the worms are... present.

Fall Army worms feed chiefly... on native and improved grasses... small grains, alfalfa, and lawn... grasses. Wet, cool weather is par-... ticularly favorable for worm ac-... tivity.

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Congress has finally adjourned after 9 months, 22 days and the appropriation of \$119.4 billion.

There is now opportunity for us to return home and look forward to seeing our many friends and constituents between now and the first of the year. The Congress will convene in its Second Session of the 89th on January 10.

Last May the State Legislature approved a bill revamping Congressional Districts. Under most trying circumstances, the Legislature under the able leadership of Governor John Connally, Lt. Governor Preston Smith, and Speaker of the House Ben Barnes, enacted into law a redistricting plan. Not everyone in the state could be entirely pleased, but the 17th District retained 12 of its original counties, to which 12 more were added. From the standpoint of Central West Texas, no better plan could have been devised, and our state leaders are to be highly commended for such excellent treatment.

The 24 counties which will make up the 17th Congressional District, if approved by the Court, will approximate the combined areas of Maryland, Connecticut and Massachusetts, with a population just under 400,000.
