Tigers Close Grid Season Last Week

Valley Mills potent Eagles set the stage for their annual showdown battle with powerful Meridian by tying with the Hico Tigers while routing up a 42-6 victory in the local's final game of the year. The Eagles and Meridian will settle the district race this Friday night at Meridian.

The Eagles scored in every quarter to roll up their 42 points, and allowed the Tigers their lone marker on the final play of the game.

Leading 36-0 near the end of the game, the Eagles scored their final 6-pointer with only five seconds left on the clock to make the score 42-6.

On the following kickoff, Dwain Gray gathered in the ball and rolled 85 yards for the Tigers' only score, the play running out the clock.

Thus the Tigers brought to a close a season that could have been much better except for a few mistakes that meant the difference in an 8-0 record and the final 4-5-1 mark. Only the Meridian and Valley Mills games were clear-cut victories for an opponent, with the other losses and the tie so close that a coin-flip could have been the difference.

The Tigers dropped the season opener 13-6 to Godley in a game where the score could have easily been reversed. They came back the next week with a 33-0 win over Stephenville B; downed Blanket the following week 25-7; met Gorman in their homecoming game and were tied by the Panthers 12-12; saw Lometa take an 18-13 win at the halfway point in the season.

The locals scored a 40-0 win over Comanche B; lost 13-8 to Boyd; took a 1-0 forfeit from Evant; and lost to Meridian 54-12 and Valley Mills 42-6 to close out the year.

Tigers Change Districts
1966 will find the Tigers competing in another district for the first time in 15 years, moving west. In a re-alignment announced by UIL in October, Hico moves to District 17-B and will meet Bangs, Blanket, Gorman and May.

Buck Tales

A reversal from last year's opener, Hico hunters turn tables on the deer Saturday, almost everyone going afield this area bagging bucks.

Despite warm, humid weather, the bright moon, the opener have to be marked up as one of the most successful in recent years.

Most of the deer checked into local locker plant were just average size however, with only one outstanding deer killed to date. Schoolboy Jim quickly laid claim to championship honors of the first two days, bagging down a huge 132-pound pointer late Sunday afternoon.

The big buck was far heavier than other reported. It was Jim's deer kill. Jim was hunting

Space-Science Lecture Well Received at Local School

A space-science lecture was presented Tuesday morning at Hico School, and was reportedly well received by students.

The spacemobile is a specially designed vehicle carrying equipment and material utilized in space-science lecture demonstrations. More than 30 units are operating throughout the United States and in foreign countries.

The lecture-demonstrations are presented without charge to the requesting school. They are conducted by professional science educators who are authoritatively informed on the space sciences and the activities of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

In addition to a discussion of the history of rocketry, propulsion, the special problems relative to space research and exploration, the following questions were answered:

1. What is a satellite? 2. How does it get into orbit? 3. What keeps it in orbit? 4. What good is it and what does it do? 5. What are the present activities of the NASA, the results of these programs, and the plans of the future?

The lecturer demonstrated basic scientific principles by using visual aids and experiments. He showed authentic scale models of meteorological satellites. The Tiros satellite used to photograph cloud formations which aid in locating hurricanes and typhoons and increase man's capability to forecast weather; Observatory satellites which will carry a number of telescopes above the earth's atmosphere to observe more accurately the mysteries of the Universe; Communications satellites, used to transmit intercontinental radio, telephone, and telegraph messages; and International satellite.

The Alouette, built by Canada for inoshere research and launched by the U.S.; Unmanned Lunor Probe—a series of Surveyor lunar probes—is designed to assist in obtaining information about the lunar surface prior to manned flight to the moon; and manned space flight. The Apollo project will land American explorers on the surface of the moon and return them safely to earth.

Carton High School and two of their teachers visited with Hico for the demonstration. The physics students remained for a longer question and answer period.

Cotton Referendum Set November 23 at County ASCS Office

A cotton referendum will be held at the County ASCS Office Tuesday, November 23, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Producers who hold the referendum are Earl Kavanaugh, Elmer Stanford and Monroe Streger.

Approximately 500 cotton producers are eligible to vote in the referendum.

This year, cotton producers will be voting on two different issues:

1. Is for Upland Cotton Marketing Quotas. Are you in favor of marketing quotas for upland cotton for the 1966 crop?

2. For Transfer of Upland Cotton Allotment Out of the County. Are you in favor of transferring upland cotton allotments by sale or lease to farms in another county in this state during 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Peanut Referendum
A referendum on peanuts will also be held Tuesday at the ASCS office during the same appointed hours.

There are 12 eligible peanut producers in Hamilton County. Peanut voters will have only one issue to vote on: Marketing Quotas: Are you in favor of marketing quotas for peanuts for the 1966, 1967 and 1968 crops.

Hamilton to Be Headquarters For New Pecan Organization

Hamilton, Nov. 17.—Pecan growers of Texas are banding together in their fight for higher prices and more stable markets for pecans. The growers have formed the Texas Pecan Improvement Association in an attempt to face the problems with an organized front.

The Improvement Association will have its headquarters in Hamilton. Open meetings over the state will be held to encourage pecan growers to become members.

The growers organization will perform several services, including pooling, storage, possible shelling and marketing of the pecans.

A bumper crop, 50 percent more than last year, has depressed pecan prices and many native pecan growers are selling pecans at well below normal prices. Large com-

mercial producers are also hit hard by depressed prices in Texas.

J. B. Storey, horticulturist at Texas A&M University and secretary of the Texas Pecan Growers Association, said, "There is considerable hope for higher prices and better markets for good native pecans if the growers won't be in too big a hurry to sell."

The newly formed association will accumulate pecans for members and store them in centrally located warehouses. Growers will be given negotiable warehouse receipts. Many of the growers have expressed interest in shelling the pecans and marketing the kernels.

Johnny Harris of Hamilton is temporary chairman of the association, and Fred R. Brison, College Station, is temporary treasurer.

While many problems are discussed at conventions, probably no items are of more importance than resolutions passed to express the views of Districts, state-wide.

The 1965 convention was held in Corpus Christi Oct. 12-14. O. C. King, chairman, Gene Pruitt, vice-chairman, and Homer Perryman, newly elected supervisor represented this district. The convention passed a resolution favoring an amendment to the Flood Control law covering small watersheds.

The amendment which Congress later passed, provides for impounding 12,500 acre feet instead of 5,000 acre feet of flood water detention storage capacity per structure. This increase in storage capacity greatly increases flexibility in locating detention dams in small watershed flood control projects.

In view of the fact that 82 percent of the rangelands of Texas has a heavy growth of mesquite and other obnoxious plants, thereby reducing materially the number of livestock that ranges can carry, a resolution was passed urging more research on methods of control and eradication of undesirable plants for the improvement of grasslands.
