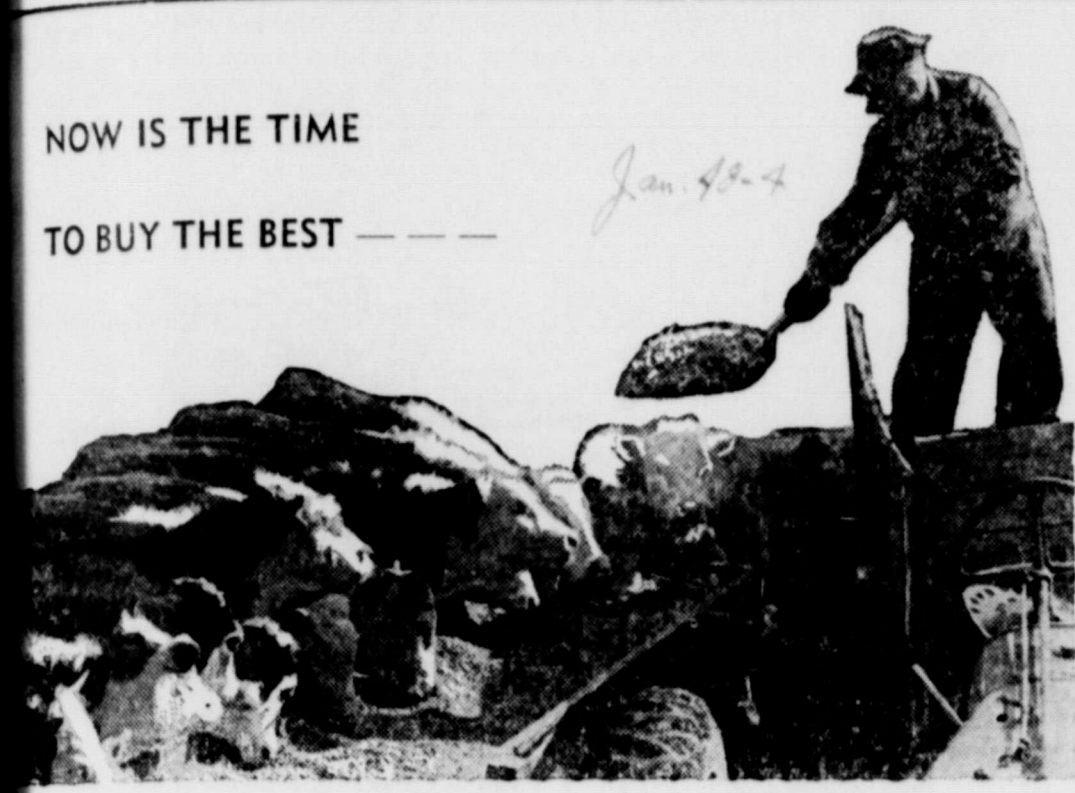

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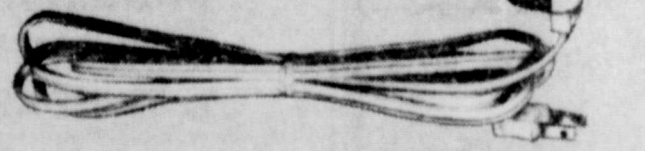

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Whole meals can be prepared in an oven with one oven setting, saving the homemaker time and energy. Combinations such as meat or fish, vegetables, deserts and breads can be prepared in the oven at the same time for unique flavor and saving of fuel. Another way to save time and energy in clean-up work is to bake these foods in bake and serve dishes.

To plan your meal, first select a vegetable, dessert or bread that can be cooked at the same temperature and for the same length of time as the meat being prepared. Or, if the meat takes longer to cook than the other foods, start it first and put the vegetables and bread in later so that all finish cooking at the same time. This allows time for fixing a last minute salad and setting the table.

Since meat requires a more accurate setting of oven temperature than most other foods, plan your vegetables, dessert and bread around the recommended time and temperature for the meat dish.

If necessary, the vegetable and dessert can be cooked at tempera-

tures 25 degrees lower for a longer time, or 25 degrees higher for a shorter time than the recipes or baking charts suggest.

Bread is eaten more regularly than any other food found in the home. Today's homemakers buy over 250 pounds of bread each year from a selection of more than 70 varieties.

Although you may think of bread chiefly as an energy food, it is an important source of essential nutrients. Because bread is used in substantial amounts, it is an economical source of food energy and protein. Bread proteins are better utilized by the body when eaten with other protein foods, especially animal proteins such as eggs, milk and meat.

Enriched breads provide significant amounts of iron and some B vitamins: thiamine, niacin, and riboflavin. These nutrients are lost with the bran and germ in the milling of white flour. When breads are enriched, they are comparable in food value to whole wheat bread.

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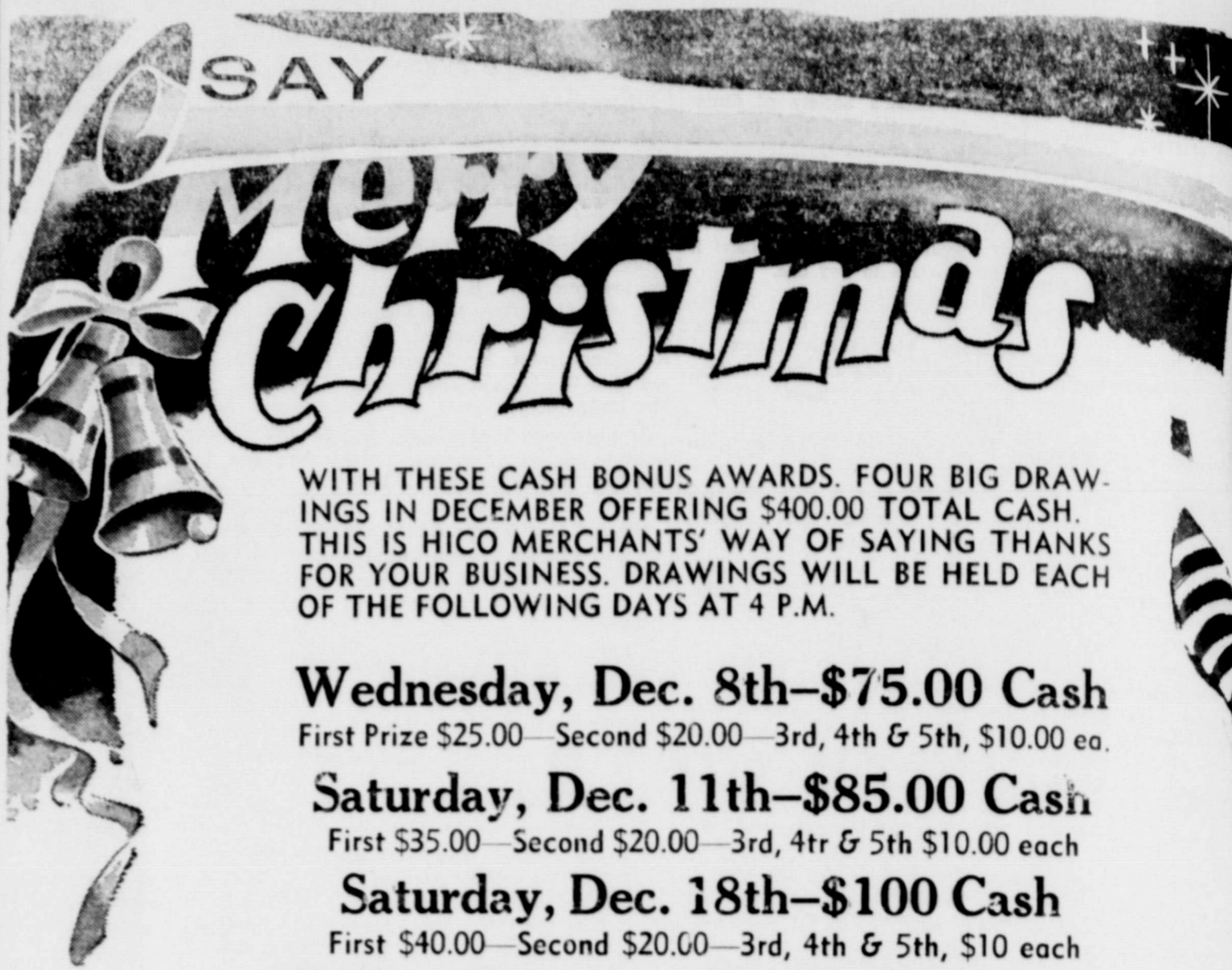

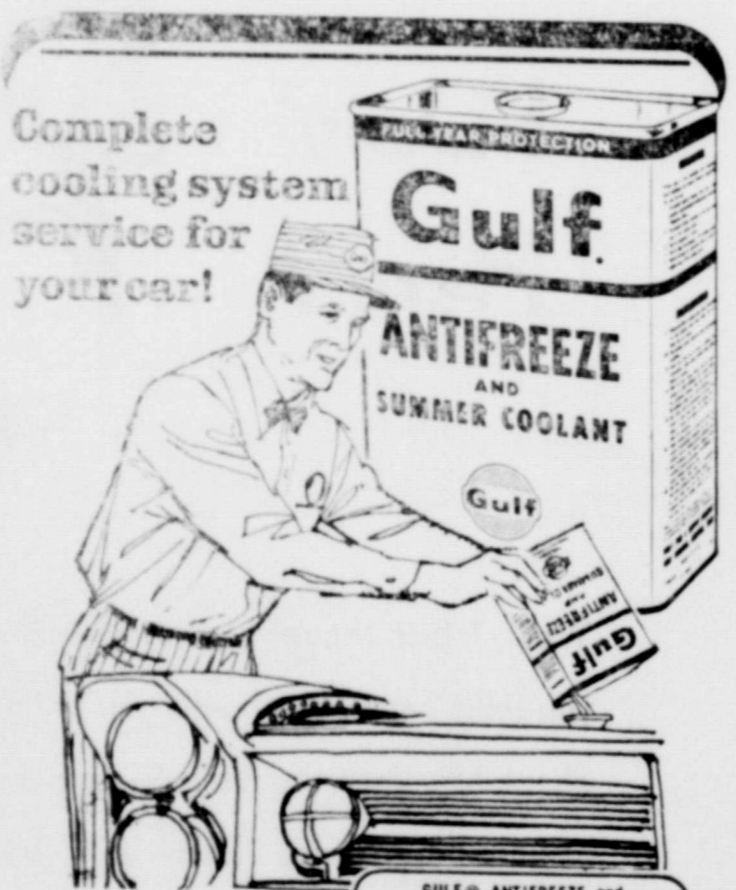

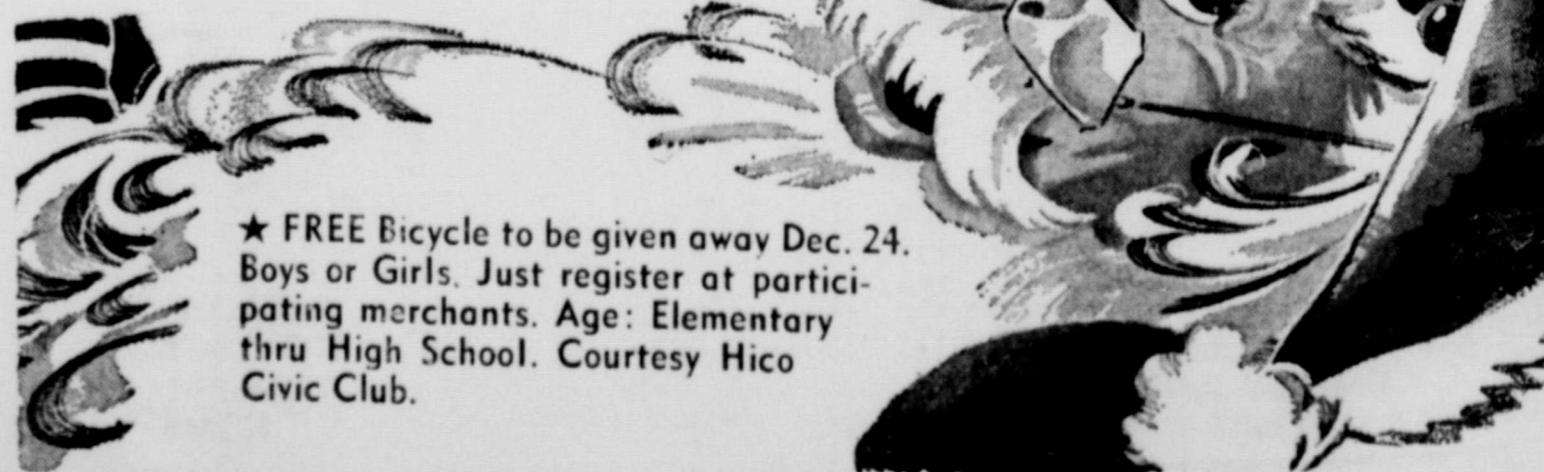

The growing of crops in a rotation or sequence where the soil improving crops at least offset the soil depleting crops in their effects on the soil is indispensable in maintaining a permanent and profitable agriculture. The effects of cultivation have had an adverse effect on the ability of the soil to produce. This is due to the decline in organic matter, fertility, soil structure, and the ability of the soil to take up and store moisture.

limited amounts of residue have been returned annually. The root system of plants have been shallow. The traffic has been heavy and erosion has been accelerated. Thus the soil has the ability to take up only 0.7 of an inch or less of moisture per hour.

If productivity of the soil is restored and maintained, it must be through the use of a conservation cropping system. Crops can be grouped according to their ability to improve the soil and control erosion. Soils deteriorate under some crops more rapidly than under others. Cotton and similar row crops that need frequent cultivation and leave little residue after harvest are most likely to permit serious soil deterioration. Such crops should not appear, in a conservation cropping system more frequently than one-fourth to one-third of the time.

Next in order are the other row crops, such as corn and grain sorghum. These crops require few tillage operations and leave adequate residues managed properly can be amounts of plant residue after harvest. These crops fertilized and the used as soil improving crops. Such crops, properly managed, can appear in the system three-fourths to two-thirds of the time.

Postmaster Offers Timely Tips On Christmas Mailing

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history," Postmaster R. B. Jackson said this week.

Nationally, about 99 percent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

"Zip Code use and the cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for our success," Jackson continued. "With the same or better cooperation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush."

Mr. Jackson had advice which will help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

- 1. Update last year's address list and include Zip Codes.
2. Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to

have on hand enough shipping materials; boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc.

C. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned to the sender if return address is on the envelope.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise. He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards, and packages as clearly as possible and that they make every attempt to mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit all their gifts and greetings.

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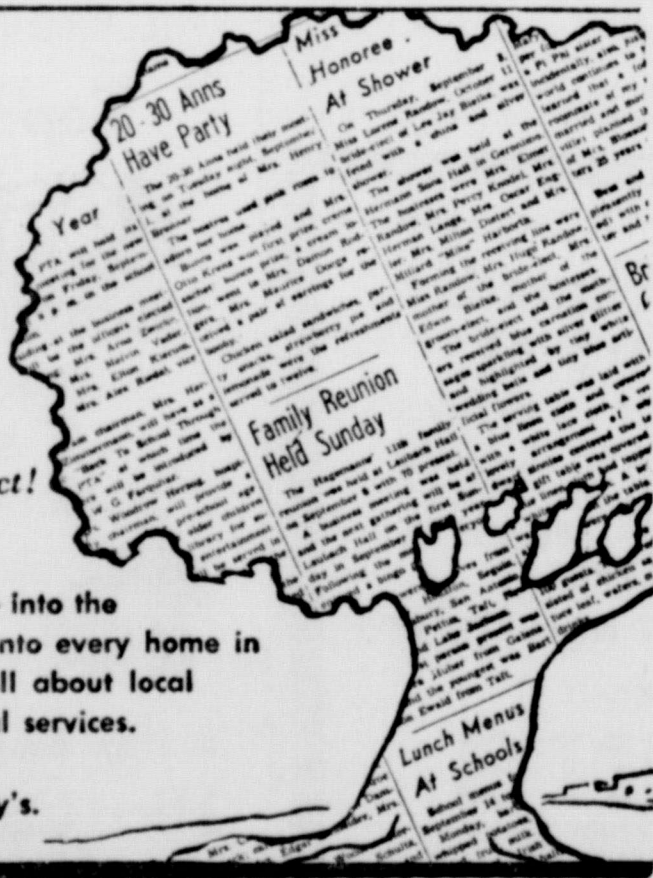
