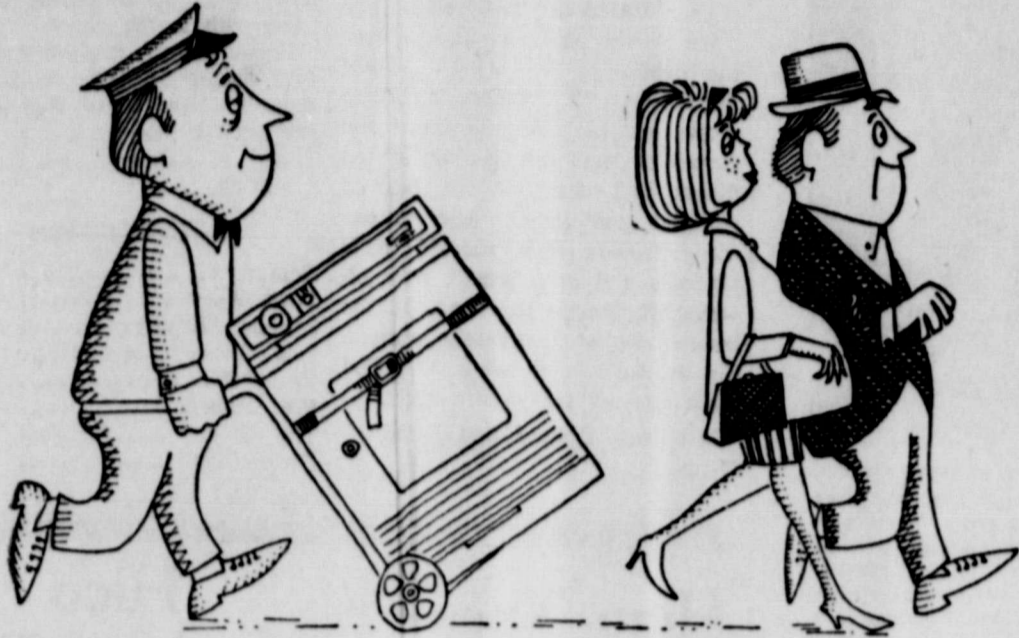

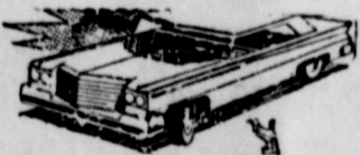


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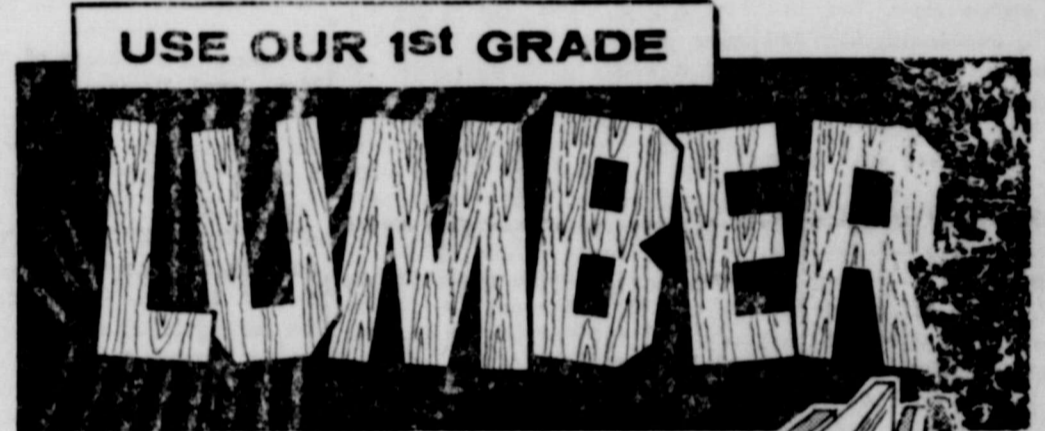

## On the Home Range

Homemakers enjoy keeping a plant in the house to lend a bit of greenery and freshness to the surroundings. Many have found, however, that the plants attract unwelcome insects. It is suggested to use an insecticide spray or dip rather than a dust for ridding plants of unwanted pests. They caution users of pesticides to use them carefully, as many are toxic. The user should read the label and heed any precaution. Plants should be sprayed outside, never around food or eating utensils. Spray and dip pesticides usually give better control of insects and are less likely to leave objectionable residues. When used outside, they are less likely to drift to nearby objects.

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Hints for removing tannin stains. Tannin stains are among the most difficult to remove. They are almost colorless. If allowed to stand or if washed in soap and water or heated as in ironing and pressing, they turn brown and are almost impossible to remove. These stains may be caused by common soft drinks, coffee, tea, bananas, walnuts, pecans, and mesquite. To remove a fresh stain, sponge with clean water or with a mixture of equal parts of water and alcohol. Then pour glycerin on the stain and work it in. Let stand for half an hour, then rinse with water. Do not use alcohol on acetate.

The capacity race seems to have subsided somewhat. Most new models are listed as having a dry load capacity of 12 to 14 pounds. Some makers back up their higher capacity claims by specifying that the 14-pound load must be made up of small articles. The washer load should be determined by the bulk and the type of fabrics. Delicate fabrics should not be washed in large loads of heavy fabrics.

Most popular colors for the season appear to be copper, turquoise and yellow. The decorator colors are available well down into each line, with furniture styling in walnut and woodtones appearing in some of the top-of-the-line models. The step-up features for top of the line models include automatic bleach dispensers and fabric-softener injectors. Automatic programmed controls provide a wide selection of wash temperatures and timed cycles at the push of a button, which is so important to some fabrics.

Some top models have stainless steel inner tubs and filtering systems that clean and reclean the water during the wash and rinse cycles. Consider your family's needs, and shop with these in mind.

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Freezing Fruit Cakes

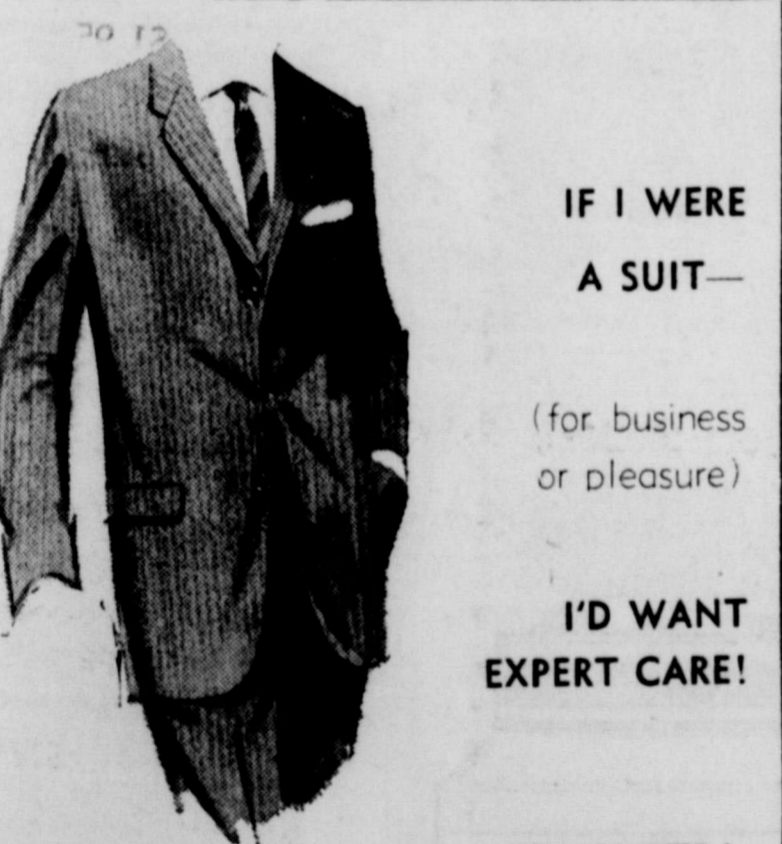
Well-wrapped fruit cakes can be kept in the freezer for one year. When ready to use, remove cake from the freezer and thaw. Do not unwrap while thawing.

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Another year has ended and this means it's time to close last year's farm records and begin the 1966 records. After totaling the balance sheets on all farm and home enterprises, take a good look at what happened during the year.

A close look should point up problems that must be met in planning for 1966. A good set of farm records will reveal problems that are a vital concern to every member of the family. Records often reflect whether a management change cut costs and raised profits or whether a minor farm enterprise should be dropped or expanded.

It is also time to start figuring your income tax and a complete set of records is a must for this job. Regularly kept records can save dollars at tax paying time. For deductible expenses are often overlooked, especially if paid in cash. A few missed items can run up the tax bill by many dollars.

To complete records are helpful when money must be borrowed for production or operating expenses. Knowing what the business is doing makes a strong talking point in making credit arrangements. Farm families also need facts on which to base their decisions, and none are more reliable than those obtained from well kept records.

The banks in Hico and Hamilton believe records are important to farm families as well as other business people. All three banks in the county have purchased a supply of Texas Family Account Books from the Extension Service. They provide their customers with these record books free of charge. If you don't have a good system of record keeping visit your bank and ask for one of these books.

The 1966 edition of "Farmer's Tax Guide," prepared especially for farmers to use in working up their 1965 income tax reports, is available at my office.

This is a very good publication. It is written and illustrated for farmer use and is just about a must for tax filing purposes. One of its most useful sections is the example tax return. On this sample, Schedules B, D and F are used. Also the major form of all, Schedule 1040, is shown with the completed tax return and computed tax. Each step in preparing the return is illustrated and explained.

Every taxpayer who receives two-thirds of his gross income from farming is due to file his return and pay the tax by February 15, unless he files an estimate and pays the amount by Jan. 17.

There will be a farmers income tax meeting at Carlton School Monday night, January 17 at 7 p.m. James Denton, Area Farm Management Specialist for the Extension Service will be there to discuss income tax filing for farm families.

Many of you will be setting out fruit trees, nut trees and other plants during the next few months. Due to our warm weather this fall many of the plants are not completely dormant at this time. Bare root plants should not be set out until they are completely dormant.

This is an excellent time to plant balled or burlapped plants as well as container grown plants. The days are cool and plants are not exposed to the high water loss experienced in summer.

Set plants no deeper than they were grown in the nursery. Many

trees and shrubs are lost annually because they are planted too deeply and the roots die from lack of oxygen. When planting large balled or burlapped plants, don't dig the hole any deeper than the depth of the ball. The ball should rest on firm earth at the bottom of the hole rather than filled soil. A heavy ball tends to settle when placed on filled soil leaving the plant too deep in the ground.

Watering at the time of planting is important. Add a mulch to help conserve moisture. If the weather is dry in the winter, water thoroughly every week to 10 days. This is especially true with evergreens. Never fertilize a newly planted tree or shrub.

Trees and shrubs over four feet tall should be staked so the tops will not blow back and forth in heavy winds.

Go easy on the urge to prune the plants in fall and winter. The best time to do this is in late winter just before new growth commences. By early pruning, new growth is frequently forced from lateral buds during warm spells. A sudden drop in temperatures can cause severe damage or even loss of the plant.

I get lots of calls requesting the varieties of fruit and nut trees recommended for this area. Below are listed some varieties that are well adapted for Hamilton County, but there may be other good varieties that I have not included.

The best apricots are Bryan and Hungarian. Plum varieties recommended here are Bruce, Methley, Sapa and Hiawatha. The recommended apple varieties are Golden Delicious, Red Delicious and Holland. Good pears for this area are Garber, Kieffer and Orient. There are many good peach varieties available. Some of the best ones, listed in order of maturing date are Cardinal, Dixired, Ranger, Red Globe, Halehaven, Burbank Elberta, Loring, Jefferson and Frank.

The best varieties of grapes for this area are Fredonia—a large black grape, Sieble No. 9110, a clear grape, and Favorite, a blue-black grape. The Brazos Blackberry is the best blackberry for this area.

The best pecan varieties for our area are some of the new varieties developed at Brownwood. They are Wichita, Sioux, Mohawk, and Barton. Some of the good standard varieties are Success, Western Schley, Desirable and Maham.

This is my last column in 1965. The office will be closed through December 31. I wish each of you a happy holiday season.

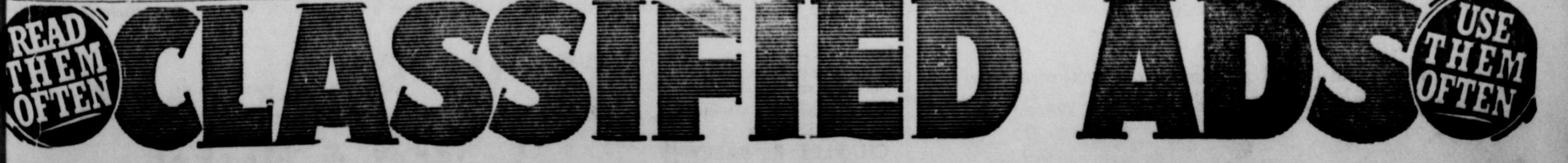

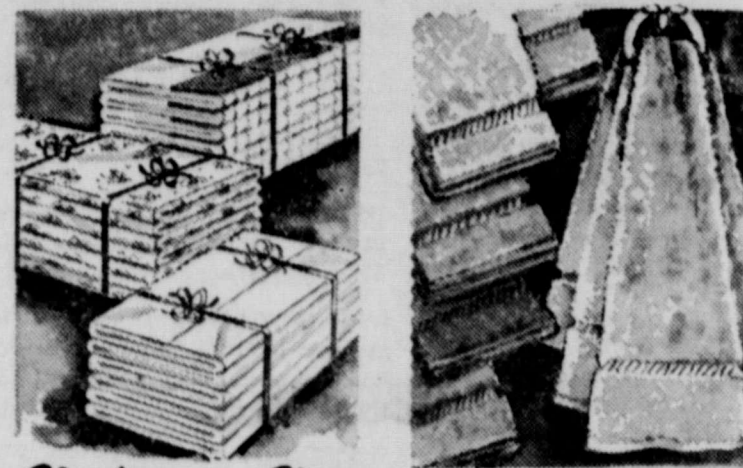

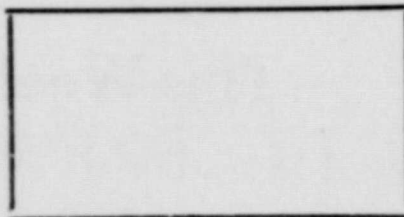
