Poll Tax Payments At 1049 Wednesday

Poll tax payments were still running at a pitifully low count Wednesday noon of this week, and according to Pearl Williams, county tax officer, only 1049 residents had paid their voting privilege.

The figure compares with a rough average of 1800 during an election year.

Residents are reminded of the Monday deadline, and also of the two local deputies in Hico for the convenience of those desiring to pay their poll tax. Deputies are Mrs. Mary Scott at the City Hall and Mrs. Christine Sutton, Hico Specialty Shop.

Another race that directly affects Hico people shaped up this week with the filing of Mrs. Lois Leeth as a candidate for Peace

Justice of Precinct 3. There will be possibly other county contests before the February 7 filing deadline.

At the request of the Hamilton Herald-News, District Judge Truman E. Roberts made the following statement concerning poll tax payment last week:

"If you were not 60 years old on or before Jan. 1, 1965, and are over 21 years old, you have not fulfilled your responsibility as a citizen if you do not pay your Poll Tax by Jan. 31, 1966.

"We are a great people for talking and taking pride in all the various privileges we have as American citizens, but we are prone to forget that every privilege carries with it a corresponding responsibility. We have the privilege of electing our public officials, and the responsibility to be eligible to vote—and to vote.

"This year we will elect State, County, District and Precinct officials. If you do not pay your Poll Tax, you cannot participate in the decision of who will be your officials filling these important jobs. Let's all be responsible citizens."

City, School, County Tax Deadline Near

Last day to pay city, school and county taxes is Monday, January 31, unless you want to pay penalty and interest after that date.

Penalty on city and school taxes is 8 percent, plus one-half of one percent per month for each month thereafter that the taxes are not paid. In other words, taxes which are delinquent for one year are subject to a total of 14 percent in penalty and interest.

If at all possible, it would be to the property owner's advantage to pay taxes before the deadline.

JOHNSON COUNTY MAN ENTERS RACE FOR REPRESENTATIVE

I am secretary-treasurer of the Johnson County Water Supply Co-op. and have worked for the past year and half to bring a fresh, clean and dependable water supply to the rural families of my county.

I am also a member of the Texas State Teachers Association, National Education Association, and the Parent Teacher Association. I am a member of the Friendship Baptist Church.

School Census Deadline is February 1st

Tuesday, February 1, is the deadline for enumerating all children of school age.

Results of the census will determine the number of per capita payments each school will receive from the state for 1966-1967.

All children who are now five, but who will be six on or before September 1, 1966, should be listed on the census blank, as well as those who have become six since September 1, 1965. Also children who won't be 18 before Sept. 1, 1966 should be listed. Married teenagers are eligible and should be listed.

Supt. O. C. Cook is census officer for Hico Schools, and he has urged anyone knowing of eligible children who have not been enumerated to please call him at the school.

It took a long time getting here, but when it did, residents felt the full force of the old fellow—Winter.

Sleet, snow, and sub-freezing temperatures all combined to make this past week one of little activity.

The weather picture really took an about-face Tuesday afternoon when the temperature dropped to near the freezing mark, with light snow flurries falling most of the afternoon. Little of the wet snow stayed on the ground, and only a light

School Trustee Elections Set Saturday, April 2nd

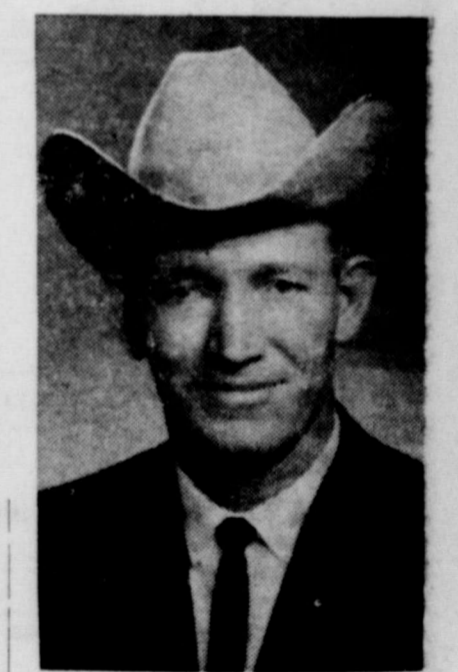
Trustee elections will be held in all school districts on Saturday, April 2, according to information submitted by W. B. McPherson Jr., County School Superintendent.

The time for filing application as candidate for trustee is as follows:

In all elections for the office county school trustee or trustee of any school district, the application of candidates for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than 30 days prior to the day of the election.

Applications of candidates for county trustee or for trustee of a common or an independent school district having fewer than 500 scholars shall be filed with the County Judge. For any of the above elections five or more resident qualified voters may request that certain names be printed on the ballot.

Application of candidates for trustees from independent school districts with more than 500 scho-



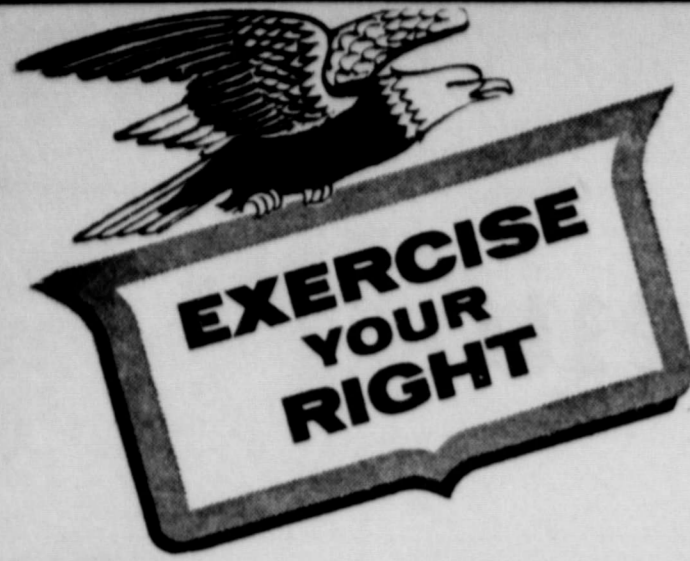

lastics shall be filed with the secretary of the school board of trustees.

Regardless of the method used in filing, each candidate is required to file a loyalty affidavit before his name can be printed on the ballot. Any of these forms may be secured in the office of the County Superintendent.

WASHINGTON —

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—This first issue of the 1966 Newsletter comes shortly after opening of the Congress and in what is predicted to be a hard winter.

What had been billed to be a rela-

tively short session of the Congress faded with the President's State of the Union Message. Last fall the hope was expressed that all of its work should be completed by the end of June. The Viet Nam war notwithstanding, which it seems should have the highest priority, legislation recommended by the President will likely take months if all of it is acted upon.

In brief, here are some of the Legislative goals proposed by the President:

CIVIL RIGHTS: Legislation to take jurisdiction of crimes com-

mitted in connection with Civil Rights out of State Courts into Federal Courts.

Laws to prohibit racial discrimination in the sale or rental of housing.

TAX REVISION: Temporary restoration of automobile excise and certain telephone taxes, dropped in the last session of Congress and effective only a few days ago.

A graduated rate of individual tax withholding from higher bracket individuals.

TRANSPORTATION: Creation of a Department of Transportation as part of streamlining the Executive branch.

LABOR: A renewed call for the repeal of Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act, commonly known as the Right to Work Law.

Liberalization of the Unemployment Insurance Laws which, in effect, would nationalize the insurance system. Expansion of the Minimum Wage Law, including additional coverage and increased rates.

LEGISLATIVE: Recommended a four-year term of office for members of the House of Representatives, and reforms in campaign contributions.

HIGHWAY SAFETY: To provide for structural changes in automobiles produced in the future to make them safer.

CRIME: Legislation to build up law enforcement and revitalize Federal measures "to meet the growing menace of crime in the streets."

CONSUMERS: The enactment of long pending "Truth in Packaging"

and "Truth in Lending," as well as actions to keep harmful drugs and cosmetics away from our retail stores.

VETERANS: The President asked for expansion of special opportunities "to those who risk their lives in the Armed Services," without endorsing a specific GI Bill of Rights.

POLLUTION: Action to end "degrading poisoning" of our rivers and to clean entire large river basins.

FOREIGN POLICY: To continue Foreign Aid and make stepped-up food shipments to needy nations a major part of foreign policy.

To increase trade with Communist nations of Eastern Europe.

WAR AND PEACE: To secure peaceful settlement of disputes, including South Viet Nam, with every possible effort. At the same time, to meet our commitments, militarily and otherwise, wherever they may be.

These and other measures are those which will likely occupy the efforts of the Congress the greater part of the year. Without spelling it out in detail, the President and many members of Congress indicate revision, expansion and financing of welfare measures commonly known as the "War on Poverty." Among these are housing urban development, a Federal Teachers Corps, and other matters relating to filling in the "Great Society."

While the President has laid out a blueprint to keep Congress busy, its members and committees will add to the list of a growing number of proposals and will find time to debate policies related to them all.

Aside from party consideration the guess is that the center of controversy will develop around the liberal contention that we must have better whether we have guns or not, and the conservative view that the financing of a war comes first, even if it means postponing or reducing some of the "goodies" in the Great Society.

Not the least, but in fact what should be the greatest concern of all, except in military considerations, is how to pay the bills, keep our country solvent, and prevent ruinous inflation.

WHAT TO DO IF THE LIGHTS GO OUT IN YOUR HOME

If the lights should go out suddenly in part of your home, the cause may be an overloaded or a "short" circuit. Here is what to do to restore service:

If your home is equipped with a fuse box:

- First: Disconnect lamps and appliances that were in use on the circuit that went out.
- Second: Open the main switch. Make sure your hands are dry and stand on a dry surface while doing this.
- Third: Replace the blown fuse with a new one of the proper size, usually 15 amperes.
- Fourth: Close the main switch to restore service.
- Fifth: Check lamp and appliance cords for signs of short circuits before you reconnect them. Worn places in cords or plugs that permit wires to come together are frequent causes of "shorts."

If your home is equipped with a circuit breaker panel:

- First: Disconnect lamps and appliances that were in use on the circuit that went out.
- Second: Push the open circuit breaker handle to the extreme "off" position.
- Third: Return the handle to "on" position.
- Fourth: Check lamp and appliance cords for short circuits before reconnecting.

If the lights go out in all parts of your home, check to see whether your neighbors have lights. If their windows are dark, there may be a local power equipment failure. Report the interruption to our office.

If you are bothered with frequent blown fuses, your home may lack sufficient circuit capacity to carry your electrical load. Installation of additional circuits will remedy this situation.

Never put a penny behind a blown fuse and never replace a blown fuse with a fuse of a larger size. This eliminates the protection provided by the correct sized fuse, and may result in permanent damage to the circuit wires within the walls of your home. Such damage may lead to fire.

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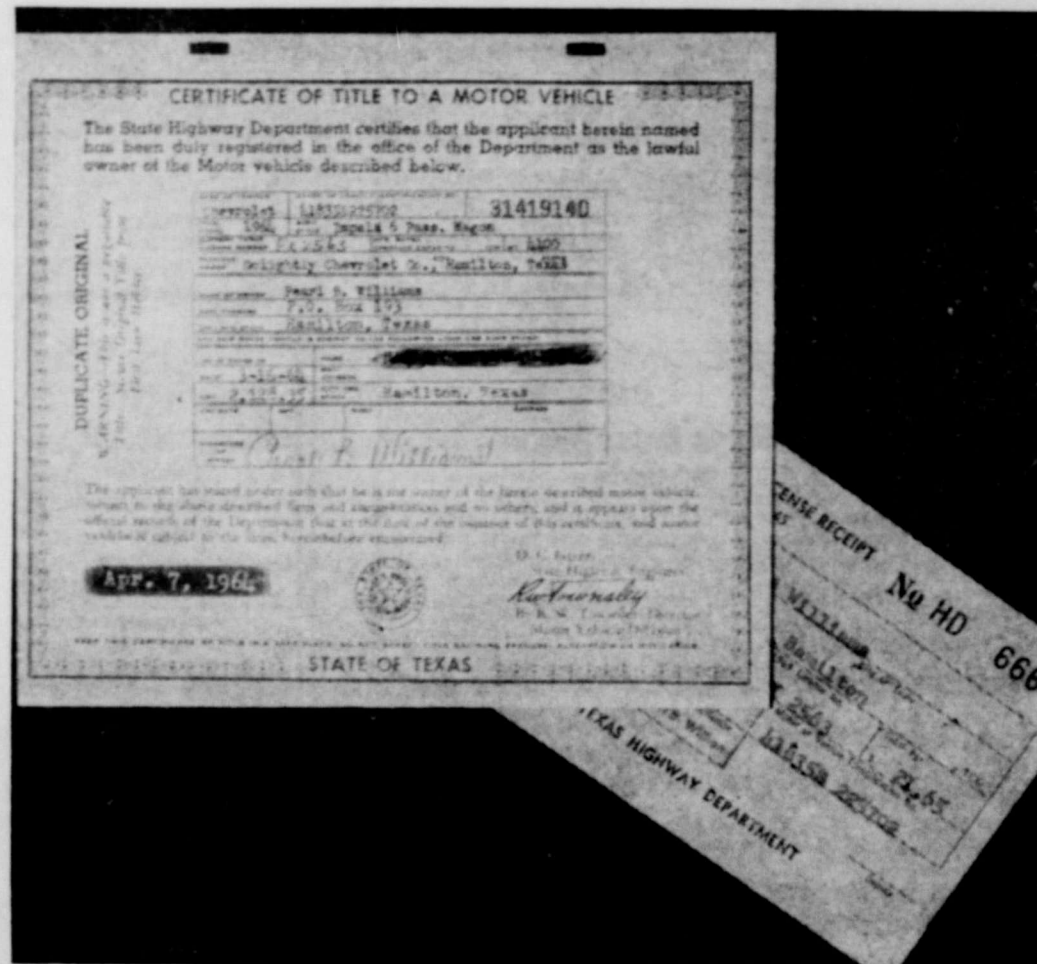

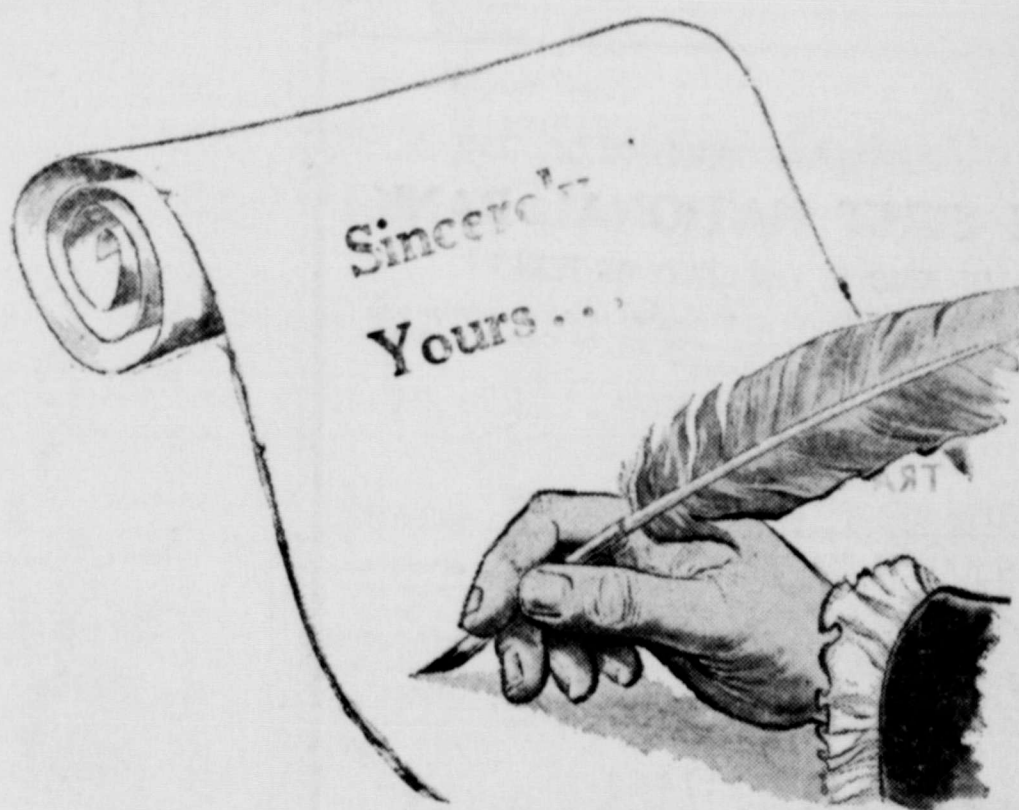
