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CARLTON FFA KEEPS OLIN FARMER CARRIES OUT UP WITH LATEST SEEDING PROCRAM FARMING METHODS In the fast moving field of ag-

Dale Garner, a cooperator with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District, owns and operates a farm about 3 miles southeast of Olin. On December 1, he planted 45 acres of a mixture of Kentucky Fescue 31 and common rye grass. He is shown in the picture with the grass drill he used and leased from the district.

His first essential operation was to prepare a good seedbed. He did this with a disk plow. Clods were broken up and smoothing was completed with a tandem disk. A clean firm seed bed was ready for planting.

He purchased locally adapted seed. The Kentucky Fescue 31 and rye grass were seelcted to provide winter grazing. The grass seed were mixed together and planted at the rate of approximately 10 pounds of pure live seed per acre.

The grass germinated well and came up to a good stand. The grass will soon be ready for grazing and will provide green forage for his livestock until late spring.
