He is assigned to Strategic Air Command which operates the free world's mightiest missile and jet bomber force ready to counter the enemy threat.

The lieutenant, a graduate of Hico High School, received his commission in 1963 upon completion of the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps program at Texas State University where he earned his B.A. degree. He also has an A.S. degree from Tarleton State College.

Former Hico Resident, Fred Leeth, Dies in Dallas Explosion

Fred Watson Leeth of Dallas, a former Hico resident, died Friday morning in an explosion at his refrigeration plant in Dallas.

Graveside services were held at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon at Hico Cemetery. Rev. Hubert Taylor officiated. Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Sunday in Dallas at the Dudley Hughes Funeral Chapel.

Mr. Leeth was born at Fairy and grew up in that area. He had lived in Dallas for the past 25 years. He owned the refrigeration plant, and lived near the premises. He was killed instantly by the explosion.

Surviving are his wife, the former Eileen Segrest; two daughters, Mrs. Keith Lukin of Dallas and Mrs. Robert E. Post of Virginia Beach, Va.; three brothers, N. A. Leeth, Will Leeth, and V. R. Leeth, all of Hico; five sisters, Mrs. Lela McAnally of Plainview, Mrs. Mamie Appleby of Meridian, Mrs. Oscar Sorley of Cranfills Gap, Mrs. Udie Reesing of Walnut Springs, and Mrs. Donnie Brown of Hico; also six grandchildren.

Abilene Attorney Files For Congress, 17th District of Texas

Eldon Mahon, Abilene attorney, was a visitor at the News Review late last Wednesday, and authorized his name placed in the political column as a candidate for Congress, 17th District of Texas.

Mr. Mahon will oppose incumbent Omar Burleson of Anson.

He is a native of Colorado City, has served in the Texas Legislature, served as both district judge and district attorney, and most recently has been associated with a law firm in Abilene. His formal announcement will appear at a later date.

Snow Blankets Area For Third Time This Year

Hico residents awoke Tuesday morning to find the area blanketed in snow for the third time this year, and activity was virtually at a standstill most of the day. Most residents chose to stay inside, and only those needing the bare necessities braved the cold, wet snow and ice. The snowfall, estimated generally throughout this area at four inches, followed two warm,

spring-like days on Saturday and Sunday, which left the ground warm enough to keep a heavier build-up from staying on the streets and highways.

Light snow began falling about 10 p.m. Monday night, and by early Tuesday, the ground was covered. A steady snowfall continued throughout the day, ceasing about 10 p.m. Tuesday. Highway approaches into Hico

were extremely hazardous, with little traffic moving during the day. Most streets in the town proper remained fairly clear most of the day.

Schools Closed
School officials ventured out early Tuesday morning and decided that conditions were too dangerous to run bus routes. School was also closed Wednesday, giving students two unscheduled holidays. Conditions were expected to improve so that school could open Thursday.

Other schools in the area were closed also. A bi-district basketball scheduled for Tuesday night by Carlton and Bangs was postponed until Wednesday. A special ruling was received from the Interscholastic League for the postponement, as all bi-district champions had to be certified by the Tuesday date. Regional tournament play is slated Friday and Saturday at Stephenville.

No Accidents Reported
Lack of traffic, and extra precaution by those who did venture out, left the area accident free during the latest spell.

A gradual warm-up Wednesday was expected to clear all streets and highways in the area.

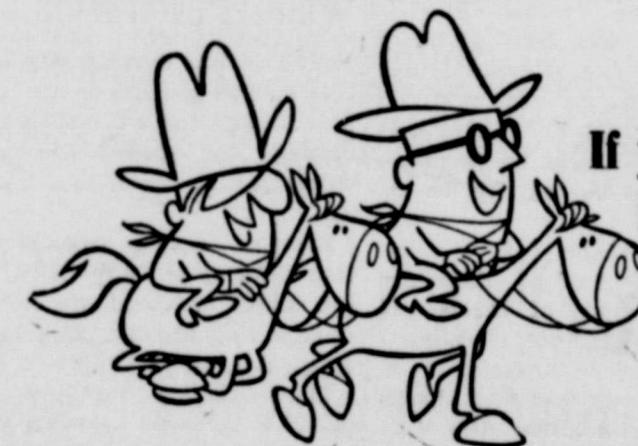

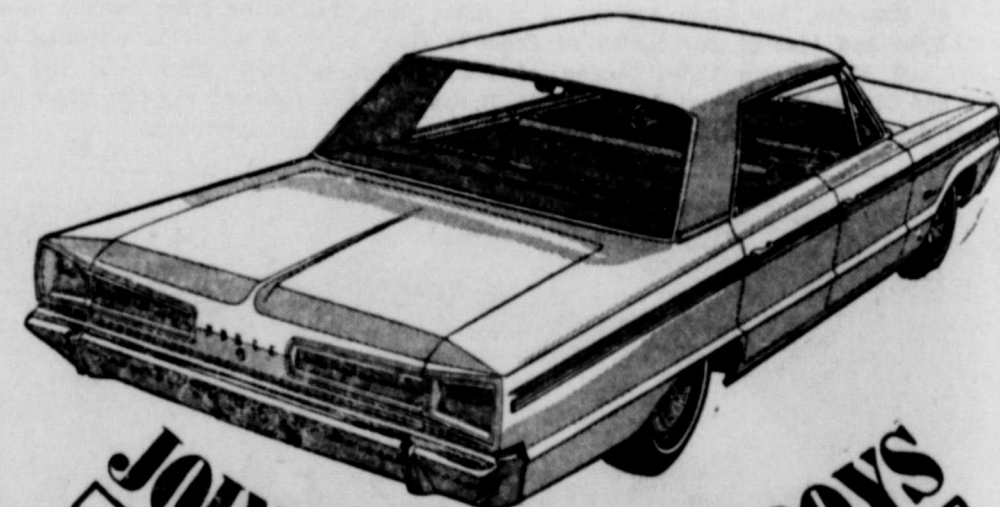

On the Home Range

Rainy weather can cause pesticide problems. With cold, rainy weather affecting much of Texas, winter is a time of the year when members of your family will bring some of the weather into the house with their dripping rain coats, umbrellas and muddy shoes.

Now would be a good time to make sure that all pesticide products you have around the house are locked up "high and dry." Many of the fertilizers that you use on the lawn and garden come in granular form in paper bags. If you keep them out on the floor of the garage, and water drips off the children's wet boots and under the sack, two things can happen. You will have caked-up fertilizer that you can't use next spring and you'll have a messy floor if you continue to leave the boots near the fertilizer. The same thing can happen with the powdered or granular pesticides.

Excess water also can do damage to pesticide products that you buy in a can or metal container. Rust will form on the bottom of the can and will soon eat out a hole, spilling the contents out onto the floor.

When the weather conditions cause an unexpected amount of water to spill across a storage area, spoilage, rust and breakage can occur. Each time you throw away part of a pesticide, you also throw away part of the money you invested in it. It makes sense, then, to protect yourself, your family and your investment in the pesticide product by providing a storage

place for the chemicals that is indeed "high and dry." Be sure it has a lock on the door to keep out the children and pets. Right now, when the weather is bad, would be the best time to prepare a safe storage area for your pesticides.

Wash-before-wearing is always a good rule for napped fabrics in bright or deep colors. For example, red flannelette sleep wear may rub off on skin or sheets unless excess surface dye is flushed away by a series of sudsing and rinses.

Rubber gloves last longer if kept clean. Start by putting the gloves on, and wash them with sudsy water just as you wash your hands. Then work the gloves off wrong side out. Squeeze them through clean suds, and then hold them

under running water to rinse off both sides. Wipe the gloves and hang them with spring clothes pins. When dry, sprinkle talcum powder inside to keep fingers from sticking together.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS By DeMARQUIS GORDON

The winter grain mites are causing damage to some oat fields in the county. These insects feed only at night and are usually hard to find during the day because they remain around the base of the plant during daylight hours. The damage, however, is not difficult to find. They cause the tips of leaves to turn brown.

If the mites are not too severe the best solution to the problem is to top dress the grain with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre. The nitrogen will not kill the mites, but will give the grain a boost and help to out-grow the damage. An application of nitrogen will also result in increased grain yields.

If the damage is severe and you do not plan to top dress the grain you can control the mites with a quart of parathion per acre. The small grain cannot be grazed for 15 days following the application of parathion. Extreme precaution should be used when applying parathion because of the toxicity. Malathion will also control mites in grain, but it is more expensive. Grain can be grazed seven days after applying malathion. Mite damage is generally more severe in grain growing on land which was planted to small grain in previous years. Crop rotation tends to reduce infestations.

noon program features Charlie Scruggs, Editor of Progressive Farmer magazine, as master of ceremonies.

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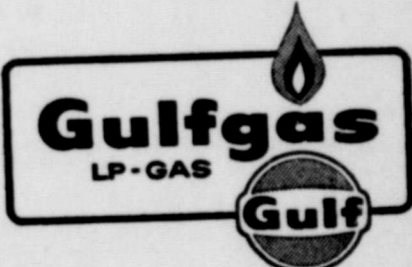

Career Employment Offered By DPS For Qualified Men, 21-35

Career employment in the ranks of the Texas Department of Public Safety uniformed services is currently being offered young men between the ages of 21 and 35, it was announced this week by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS.

"More than 100 of these positions of trust and public service will soon be open for qualified men," Garrison said. "They include opportunities for advanced education, excellent physical conditioning and a permanent career of serving mankind."

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited—Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, and Driver Licensing. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 16-week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the academy, he will receive a salary while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many others.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; \$10 per month longevity for each five years of service; modern liberal retirement privileges based on age and years of service; travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Garrison urged interested men to get their applications in early. June 6 is the deadline for receipt of applications for the June 11 examination for the next training school opening August 9.
