

Former Hico Resident Faces Death With Cheerful Outlook

Note: The following story is reproduced from the Palo Alto (Calif.) Times, in the interest of our readers. It is about Rev. Otis Holladay, who was born and raised in the Hico area, and who is the son of George Holladay and Mrs. V. Lotus Gosdin and Mrs. V. Gosdin, all of Hico.

Most people don't realize they're going to die," the Rev. Otis Holladay of Palo Alto, a Southern Baptist minister, said.

Rev. Mr. Holladay, 47, confesses he's going to die of cancer probably in the next few weeks. He has taken the news in stride, not with a so-called new

outlook on life; just with the "emphasis changed a bit," he said.

The Rev. Mr. Holladay preaches several times a week at Palo Alto's First Southern Baptist Church and visits elderly patients at the Palo Alto Convalescent Hospital, "morale building and strengthening," as he puts it.

He has been in the ministry 28 years and was pastor of Belmont's First Baptist Church for four years until his resignation for surgery three months ago.

Didn't Finish Job

"Quite a gash of cancer-ridden large intestine was removed, he said, but his doctor advised him, 'We didn't get it all.'"

"I asked him: Well, what does

that mean?"

"He said, 'It means you probably have just a few months to live.'"

"I don't really mind dying," he says. "I've faced it before. I went through the momentary experience of dying. It's rather a peaceful thing, a pleasant thing."

This was when he was 19 years old, he said, and had inhaled a lungful of gasoline while siphoning fuel for a farm tractor. He also faced death daily in another way, "a pretty hard way," he said, as an Air Force chaplain in Korea.

"I was more aware of death than most preachers; I found I preached more on heaven than others did," he said.

"And I can remember now that when I was 7 years old I thought about death a bit, mostly that life really isn't very long."

He said his mother died when he was young; his brother was killed when his airplane was shot down over Africa during World War II.

The Rev. Mr. Holladay says he bears out the old saying that you can't tell the health of a man by looking at him.

"If you think I'm going to go around looking puny, you've got another think coming," he said in his slight Texas drawl.

What does he regret most when he thinks of dying? What goes through his mind?

"I don't mind dying except for two things. One is the pain: I never enjoyed physical pain."

"The other is my family—that's the tough one."

Living with him in the south Palo Alto apartment is his wife, Glenna, "quite a little lady" he says, and their 15-year-old daughter, Sharon.

"My wife's not one of those seemingly strong-willed persons," he said, "but they're really taking it marvelously."

"I really feel a heavier responsibility to them than ever before. But a preacher friend told me, 'Don't worry about them; they'll make it—but I still do.'" he said.

An older daughter, Mrs. Cecelia

Harp, lives in Napa.

He discussed his new emphasis on life:

"The sad thing about pastoring is that you have to spend so much time on things other than what you really want. You major on the minors and minor on the majors."

"I've always understood the pushers, those with get-up-and-go and ambition. And I've always been a rugged individualist, a trouble-shooter. I didn't really get a chance to talk with the ones the world left behind."

"Now I've been thrust into a different world, the world of the sick. I can sense a little bit of mental anguish of aging people,

those who retire.

"When you visit them, they want you to sit down and talk, not just the 30-second deal like businessmen want."

"We speak about the church's ministry to the older people. Oh, we were concerned, but just not quite so eager."

"When I talk to the Lord," he said, "I know I haven't done as much for Him as I could have—if I had been a better manager of my life. Somehow one's self never gets completely out of the way . . ."

"The doctor told me I might live as long as two more years. But that 'might', you know, is on the outside. I won't know until it happens."

Registration Set Here For Voters Through Mar. 17

Mrs. Pearl Williams, county tax officer, this week named two deputies in Hico for the free voter registration, created last week by a special session of the Texas Legislature.

Hico area residents may register at either the City Hall or the Specialty Shop.

The Legislature set the dates March 3 through March 17 for those people who didn't otherwise qualify to vote by paying poll tax.

Mrs. Williams pointed out that those persons who had previously paid poll tax would not be required to register. Neither do persons who were exempt from paying poll tax by virtue of age, etc., need to register. The law applies only to residents who failed to qualify and who

desire to vote in the various elections throughout the year.

People who register during the specified period will be eligible to vote in all elections set this year, including the school trustee, city, both primaries, and the general election in November.

After this year, voter registration will take place in October until January 31, the same period that applied previously to poll tax payments.

Col. J. F. Isbell, Former Hico Minister, Killed in Fort Worth Accident

Col. Jefferson F. Isbell, former Hico Methodist minister, was killed late Monday afternoon in a two-car accident at Fort Worth. He was 83. His wife, who was driving the car, was seriously injured in the accident.

Funeral services for the retired minister were held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon in Fort Worth.

Col. Isbell was a member of the Central Texas Methodist Conference. He was active in the conference for 37 years.

He retired, officially, from the U. S. Army in 1948.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, J. F. Isbell Jr. of Fort Worth, Robert F. Isbell of Irving and Louis Milton Isbell of Torrance, Calif.

Louis Crump Withdraws From Senate Race; Word Runs Alone

State Senator Louis Crump of San Saba this week pulled out of the race for the Senate seat from the enlarged 12th district, giving "financial reasons" for his unexpected departure from the political scene. His move left J. P. Word of Meridian as the only contestant for the senatorial post.

The race first shaped up after the Texas Legislature created the unusually large district in the re-districting last summer. Crump had served in the Senate since 1957 and Word was elected in 1962.

Senator Crump issued the following statement from his home in San Saba:

"It is with much regret and only after long hours of deliberation that I have arrived at the decision to withdraw from my previously announced intention of running for Senator for the newly created 12th Senatorial District. The 12th District is comprised of 27 counties ex-

tending from the Dallas-Tarrant county line on south to Bexas County, west to Tom Green County, and from the Trinity River on the Northeast past the Guadalupe River on the southwest.

"Although my family and I have many friends throughout this area and have had much encouragement these past weeks, I find that to continue this race would require the expenditure of funds that I do not have. I cannot obligate myself for these funds, and I cannot, considering the welfare of my family, obligate my future for such enormous expenditures as appear necessary to complete this campaign. The alternative would be to accept contributions from sources with whom I do not desire to become associated or to impose upon my friends. I refuse to do either.

"We regret greatly the disappointment my withdrawal may bring to our many friends and supporters.

Game Warden Reports

Now that hunting season is over we can look forward to the fishing season very soon. With some of the spring-like days we have had lately I know some of you have already been fishing.

I would like to remind you that the license law is still in effect, and to be sure, buy a license if you need it. Some of you will be exempt from buying a license if you are over 65 years of age or if you haven't reached your 17th birthday, or if you are fishing in your county of residence with tackle not using a winding device. So remember to go by and get a license before you go fishing and when the game warden asks to see them, neither you or he will be embarrassed.

For you folks that want to stock your ponds with fish, the applications may be obtained from me at anytime. There will be a delivery on black bass this spring, probably in May or June. You will need to turn in your application card by the first of April for these. Catfish will be delivered in the fall, probably in August or September, and you will need to have your application card by August 1. If you fail to get your application in by the dates above it will be next year before you can get fish. And if you don't catch me in the office you may leave your name and address and I will mail you a card.

I was over at the Brazos last Saturday and the river was very low and muddy. I only saw one white bass and the fishermen were not having any luck at all. I think the white bass run will be late this year because we will have to have some water in the river, and for the best luck it will have to be clear. And from the condition of the river now it will take some time for it to get in this condition.

For you fellows that would like to have them I have some brochures on the Texas Water Safety Act that is in effect now. These brochures contain the specifications for your boat and the manner in which it should be operated. This is very helpful to all folks that own

Goat and Mohair Meeting Set Monday Night at Hamilton

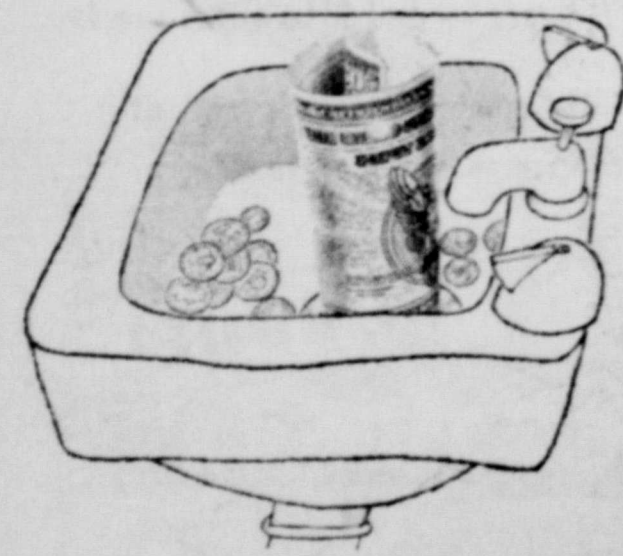

Sort garments as to color, type of fabric, and the way in which they are made.

Don't overload your washing machine.

Don't damage or weaken fabric by excessive twisting or wringing.

Use the type of washing product suitable to the garments being washed, and use the amount recommended on the package.

Avoid adding bleach directly on the garments. Always dilute the bleach water according to the directions on the container.

Place small, lightweight items in mesh bags to keep them from being twisted or damaged during washing.

Close zippers and fasten hooks or supporters so they will not catch on other articles during washing.

Use the correct water temperature for the type of fabric you are washing, and select the correct length of time for the washing cycle.

Allow the clothes to be thoroughly rinsed.

Don't overload the dryer.

Select the correct drying time and temperature for the fabrics you are drying.

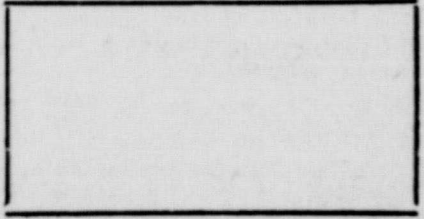
