50-Vote Error Found In Trustee Tally

Following canvassing of election results, two new members of Hico School Board were seated in a call meeting held last Thursday night.

In the vote canvas, a discrepancy in the final tally was discovered, giving Dr. B. C. Dayton 50 more votes than previously reported. He received a total of 212 votes in the April 2 balloting, and Derel Fillingim, the other new member, received 192 votes as was reported.

Also at the Thursday meeting the board was re-organized, with Bobby Needham elected president. Dr. Dayton was named secretary.

Following re-organization, the board spent a lengthy session in re-electing all teachers for the 1966-67 school year.

Track Team To Regional Meet Saturday

Coach Robert Lee will accompany his track team qualifiers to Stephenville Saturday to compete in the UIL Regional meet to be held at Tarleton State College.

Four contestants, plus the mile relay team, qualified to represent the district in nine events in the regional.

Also qualified for the meet are three alternates.

Coach Lee thinks the team members, led by Alan Royal and Dwain Gray, has an excellent chance to qualify for the state meet. Both Gray and Royal have turned in stellar performances in practice meets and at the district meet last week at Valley Mills. Gray has consistently been one of the best high jumpers in this area, and Royal has turned in the fastest time of area schoolboys in the low hurdles.

Farm Welding Short Course Scheduled May 2-5 at School

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held May 2-5 under the sponsorship of Hico High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Supt. O. C. Cook and Harold Walker, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Texas Education Agency and Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A and M, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at A and M.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Edwards and all have met with outstanding success," said Mr. Ralph Moser, area supervisor of vocational agriculture Arrangements for adult education courses are made through Mr. Moser's office.

The course here will begin May 2 at 8 p.m. in the ag building. Other meetings will be May 3, 4, and 5. During the dates the course is in progress, Mr. Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Walker.

Hico Commission Co. Purchased Last Week By Mr. McCampbell

O. B. McCampbell, who has operated Hico Commission Company the past 16 months under a lease arrangement, said this week that he had purchased the property from Odis and Henry Hill. Mr. McCampbell originally held a three-year lease on the facilities.

At the beginning of the lease, Mr. McCampbell changed the sale day from Saturday to Thursday. An expansion, remodeling and repair program was carried out, modernizing the cafe, offices, arena and holding pens.

Mr. McCampbell held his first sale November 12, 1964 with the largest cattle run in years. Cattle sales totaled 675 head, 350 head of sheep and goats, and 90 head of hogs were also sold on the first day.

In releasing the information, Mr. McCampbell said "I am continually trying to maintain the best livestock auction in this area, but I need the help of farmers and ranchers to make this sale even larger and better."

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By De-MARQUIS GORDON

Now is the time to start budding and grafting pecan trees. The interest in pecan improvement has been increasing in recent years here in Hamilton County. More and more people are learning the techniques of grafting and budding. Bill Puckett, C. I. Thomas and several others who have pecan timber have learned to graft pecans and are improving their potential income from this important crop.

Hamilton County is one of the few places in the United States where pecan propagating tools and supplies can be purchased locally.

I would like to see a high school boy or young man learn the technique of pecan grafting and be available to do this type of work for home owners with a few yard trees. He could make a nice income during the propagating season.

We are having a pecan propagation field day at Johnny Harris' pecan grove on April 26. Blueford Hancock, Extension Horticulturist, will be here to help conduct the field day. The inlay graft and patch bud will be demonstrated. The purpose of this is to teach anyone interested the technique of grafting and budding. We will also discuss the pecan nut casebearer control and examine paper bands that have been placed on trees to catch the casebearer pupae. Purpose of catching the pupae is to help us determine the time to spray for casebearer control. One of the stumbling blocks in controlling casebearers has been accurate timing of spraying. Banding offers a scientific method of determining when to spray.

The field day will start at the Hidden Valley Store at 1:30 and visitors will then go to the pecan grove for the demonstrations. Everyone is invited to attend.

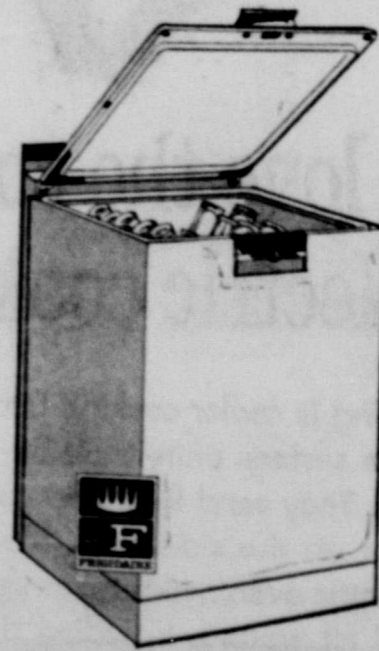
