
for maximum fish production. Fertilizer increases the supply for small fish and water insects. Early in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60 degrees is the time to begin the fertilization pro-

Different ponds will vary in their requirements for fertilizer, but in general I would suggest an initial application of 100 pounds of 16-20-0 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 20 to 40 pounds per acre at twoweek intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached.

The plankton bloom is sufficient if a person's cupped hand disappears when the arm is immersed in inches). The bloom usually appears in 1 to 5 weeks after the beginning of fertilization. Other applications should be made only as needed to maintain the bloom.


