W. R. Hampton said this week that should an actual tornado warning be turned in, the siren would continue to blow for a much longer period than it did Monday.

Residents are asked to remember the tornado signal, and not panic should the same difficulty arise again.

Katy Seeks To Abandon Route West

MKT Railroad Co. has decided to re-activate the abandonment proceedings on 220 miles of line known in this area as "Texas Central Railway" from a point six miles west of Waco to Stamford, via Hico.

The railroad president, John W. Barriger, had taken the applications for abandonment under advisement last April when he was named president of the Katy line. He said the decision to re-activate the proceedings before the Interstate Commerce Commission was made after studying the 1965 financial results of this section of line.

The Katy will continue to operate the western end of this branch beyond Stamford in order to continue serving a large gypsum plant at Hamlin and another at Rotan, the end of the line.

While abandonment proceedings are pending before the ICC, the Katy will make known to the three lines crossing this route that any sections of this trackage may be acquired at reasonable terms. The three lines are Fort Worth and Denver, Texas and Pacific, and the Santa Fe.

She was 33 years old and is survived by her husband and four children, her mother and step-mother, three sisters and two step-sisters. She was a faithful worker in the church where she attended, a good wife and mother, but God has seen fit to call her to a better world where there will be no death or separation. May God bless the bereaved family and all others who were so grieved in her passing. The two step-sisters were Little Loretta and Pauline Newman, who lived here with their father and grandmother when our uncle was blacksmith here.

We were also sorry to learn of the passing of Ollie McDermitt of Hamilton, who died in an Austin hospital Wednesday of last week at 5:30 p.m. following a lengthy illness due to a broken limb received some months ago. He was a patient for sometime at Hamilton Nursing Home, but a niece, Mrs. Gertrude Belcher of Austin, who was looking after him had him moved there several weeks ago. Ollie was a pioneer citizen of Hamilton County, having moved here with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim A. McDermitt from Salem, Va. in 1885, and started in life he could remember wading the creeks behind the wagons as they moved. They located on the river east of Hamilton in 1888 and he attended his first school at Rock House. He was married to Miss Henrietta McClellan of Fairy around 1900 or 1902. She and an infant son passed away several years later. He never remarried and spent his life at Hamilton with the exception of the last few weeks. He was born April 25, 1881 at Salem, Va. He was a lover of gospel singing and attended the county singing as long as he was able. He was president of the County singing classes for some 25 or 30 years. He was a man of many friends, who paid him frequent visits brought flowers, sang for him and tried to bring him cheer in his last days. He kept a small radio near his bed and listened to services and singing. On one last visit, a few days before being carried to Austin, we carried out song books and asked him if he wanted us to sing a few songs to him. He said he did, so dedicated to him. With the help of several dear old ladies at the home, we played and sang two of his favorite songs, "I'll Fly Away," and "This World is Not My Home," and others after which we went back to his room and asked him if he could hear us and he said he could and thanked us. These two songs were sung at his funeral by Mr.

Elbert White, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney White and the writer. Funeral services were held at Hamilton Friday at 10 a.m. with Rev. Mack Hargrove officiating. He read a history of the family which Ollie had written. The beautiful floral offering bore tribute of love and respect for the deceased. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. V. H. (Jimmie) Bird of Stephenville and Mrs. W. T. (Molly) Oats of Cato, Okla.; two nieces and two nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, and three sisters, Mrs. Lena Gordon, Mrs. T. T. Durham and Mrs. Hiram of Hamilton. He had been a member of the Littleville Baptist Church for many years. He played a violin and enjoyed attending old fiddlers contests at the Hico Reunion. He was there last summer but didn't enter. His remains were laid to rest in KKP Cemetery near his parents and other relatives. Sorry we did not get names of the pallbearers. Our deepest sympathy is extended to those bereaved in his passing. He was at the Bob Riley funeral home to pay his last respects to a friend in death when he fell and broke his thigh below the hip. The break healed but due to his advanced years he was unable to be up again. He will long be remembered by his many friends. On the Home Range

By SONDR A KOONSEN
Home Demonstration Agent

The Hamilton County Home Demonstration Council met April 14 at 2 p.m. There were nine members, two guests and the agent present. All four home demonstration clubs were represented.

The council discussed the county picnic and recreation workshop to be held in August. Delegates that went to the District 8 THDA meeting in Temple on March 15-16 gave their reports.

Bonded fabrics require special care in sewing. For ease in sewing, use a thread suitable for the outer fabric, a medium to light tension and pressure, a medium to long stitch and fine to medium machine needles. Since ripped machine stitching may show, hand baste and fit the garment before permanently stitching the seams. If the fabric is extremely bulky, use a matching lining fabric for facings. Understitch collars, facings and pocket edges where an underseam might show. Press darts, using a pressing ham to give shape to the garment. Press them toward the center of

the garment. Bulky darts can be split and trimmed slightly. Press seams open. If they do not lie flat, top stitching can be added close to the seamline. When pressing the garment, either a steam iron or a dry iron with damp press cloth can be used. Use a temperature suitable for the outer fabric. To prevent the hemline from showing on the right side of the garment, attach the hem only to the bonded lining.

A blender manufacturer suggests a sure-fire way to wash the blades and container clean. Partially fill the container with warm water plus a little soap or detergent, put the cover on, and let the motor run at low speed until food particles are loosened. Turn the motor off, then rinse and dry the container. Pull cord from the electric outlet and wipe off the base and cord.

It is extra important to pre-treat synthetic-fabric garments destined for cold water washing. Massage thick soap or detergent suds into soil spots and streaks.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

The one topic that is the center of conversation this week is the rain. It has been a long time since a rain was so welcomed here in the county. The rain is worth a lot to farmers and ranchers, but it was too late to insure a good crop of wheat and oats. It will still help these crops some, however.

Bomer Harris, Soil Conservationist in Hamilton said "We needed 4 inches of rain and a continuous drizzle until it's dry enough to plow."

I attended a breakfast sponsored by the Coryell-Hamilton SCD Monday morning. Ministers and agriculturists met and heard Rev. Mac Hargrove deliver a message on Soil Stewardship. This meeting could not have been held at a more opportune time, just after we had received over four inches of rain.

Many farm ponds were getting low before the rain, but now the situation looks better. This is a good time to mention that properly managed farm pond can provide excellent fishing and serve as a source of recreation and income to farmers and ranchers.

Most ponds should be fertilized for maximum fish production. Fertilizer increases the supply for small fish and water insects. Early in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60 degrees is the time to begin the fertilization program.

Different ponds will vary in their requirements for fertilizer, but in general I would suggest an initial application of 100 pounds of 16-20-0 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 20 to 40 pounds per acre at two-week intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached.

The plankton bloom is sufficient if a person's cupped hand disappears when the arm is immersed in the water to elbow depth (about 18 inches). The bloom usually appears in 1 to 5 weeks after the beginning of fertilization. Other applications should be made only as needed to maintain the bloom.

John Reich, a Carlton 4-H member who caught a calf at the Houston Livestock Show, purchased his calf recently. He selected a registered Angus heifer from Wayne Durham's herd. He has already started working with the heifer. Within three days after he bought the six-month-old heifer, he had taught her to lead. John will show the heifer at the 1967 Houston show.

Time is running out for establishing coastal bermuda grass this season. Higher temperatures and less rainfall in late spring and

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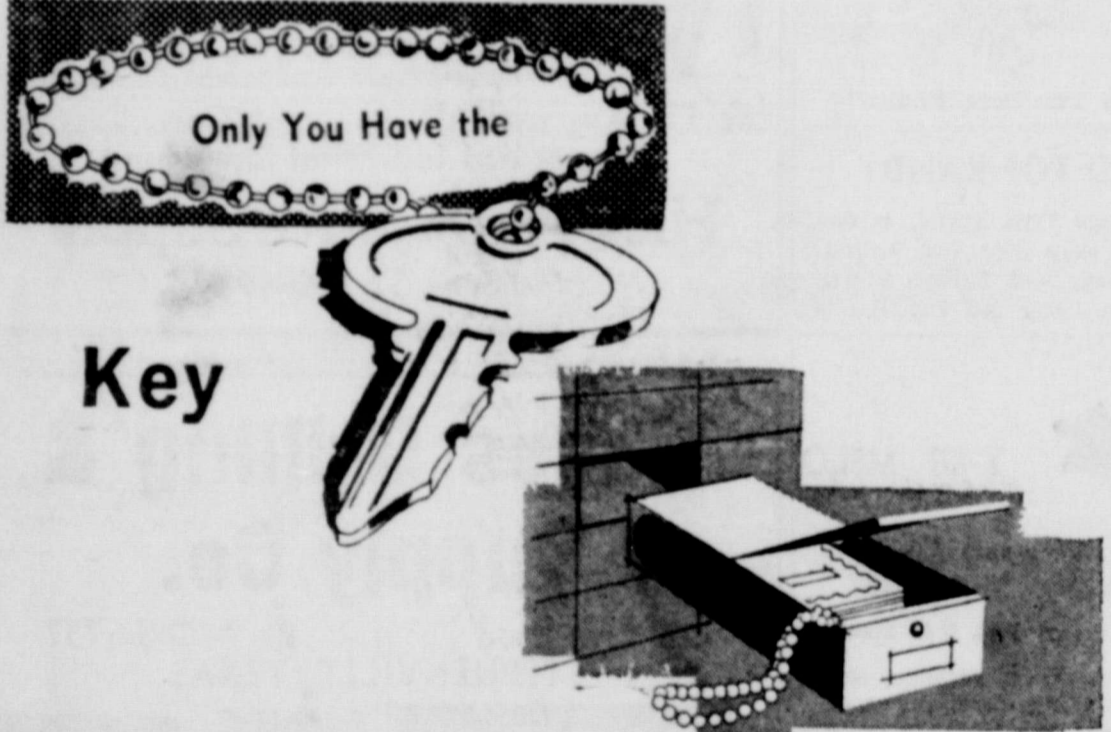
