

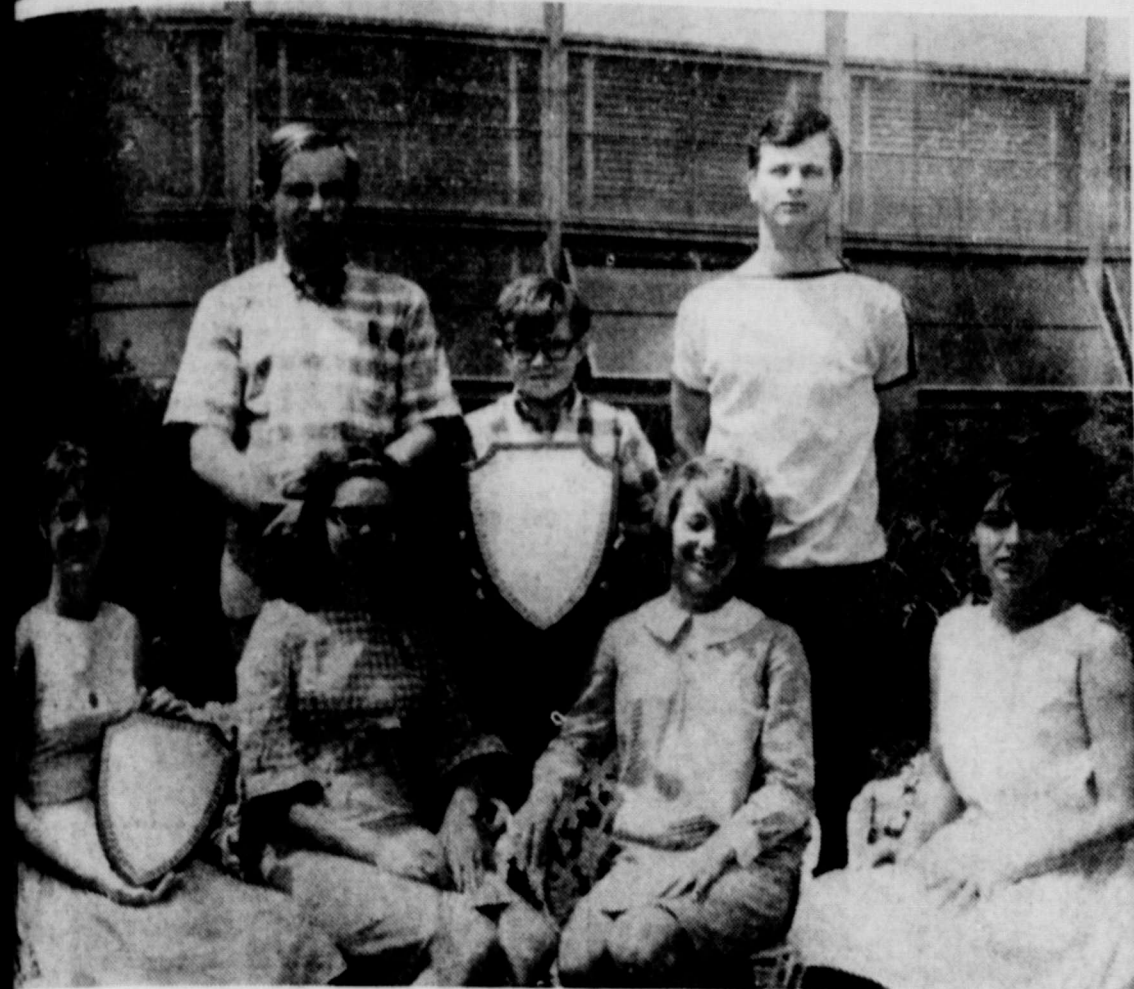

470 Voters Cast Ballots in Primary

Run-Off Set In JP Race

A hot Justice of the Peace race brought out voters 470 strong last Saturday in the initial Democratic Primary, and balloting went just about as expected in most contests.

In the JP race, Grover Renfro and incumbent P. W. Hamilton led the ticket in a race that was close all the way. Renfro tallied 181 votes to lead, with Hamilton only 12 votes behind with 169. Mrs. Lois Leeth, third candidate in the race, was 17 votes behind the second place winner, and only 29 from the top. In the Hico box, Renfro tallied 162, Hamilton 155 and Mrs. Leeth 129.

Renfro and Hamilton will vie in the second primary, to be held Saturday, June 4.

In the write-in balloting for Constable, Precinct 3, Tom Odom was winner by a large margin. Odom, who has served as constable since January, received 276 votes. The other announced candidate W. B. Donley, polled 96 votes, and Lonnie Redden, who previously served as constable received 24 votes.

In the hotly contested Congressional race, incumbent Omar Burleson polled 385 votes to Eldon Mahon's 82, and in Hamilton County the margin was 1836 to 578. Burleson the winner.

J. E. Ward of Glen Rose was also a heavy choice for State Representative in the Hico box. He received 430 votes to Bob Elder's 107. In the county, Ward polled 1775 to 710.

In the County Clerk's race, Mrs. Genevieve Clark won nomination to the office over incumbent Vada Williams by a 1301 to 1050 margin. Mrs. Williams carried the Hico box 272 to 163.

Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, former State Senator from this district, carried both Hico and the county boxes by a wide margin. In Hico, Martin polled 298 votes. Galloway Calhoun received 68, and Franklin Spears tallied 52 votes. In the county, it was Martin 1618, Spears 351 and Calhoun 329.

Only two issues will appear on

the Hico ballot in the June 4th election. The Justice of the Peace and Attorney General will be the only issues voted on by Hico people.

Quite a few people who attended the pecan field day April 26 have been grafting pecan trees during the last week. Almost anyone can make an inlay graft after someone has demonstrated and explained all the steps. This does not mean that every graft will live and grow. It takes some exper-

ience before you can expect 90 percent of your grafts to live, but there is a sense of satisfaction when you see your first pecan graft growing.

Blueford Hancock, extension horticulturist, discussed the pecan varieties recommended for Hamilton County. He recommended the Wichita pecan very highly for this area. In referring to the Wichita's heavy production he said it was the nearest thing to a chinaberry that he had ever seen on a pecan tree. He was not comparing the size of the nut with the chinaberry, but the size of the cluster. The Wichita is a large, thin shell pecan. It is the result of cross between the Halbert and Mahan pecans.

Blueford also recommended the Apache pecan, a cross between

Other varieties he recommended were Choctaw, Sioux, Barton, Comanche and Desirable.

Pesticides can be your best weapon against insects in your garden, lawn and home. To help you use pesticides in a safe way, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just published a new leaflet entitled "U.B. Safe With Pesticides." The leaflet, L-676 is now available at my office.

It has been designed for Texas homemaker, homeowners and home gardeners. It lists step by step the things that you should remember each time you use pesticides in and around the home. The leaflet is basically in four parts with items to consider before you buy pesticides, when you use them, when you put them away between uses and when you dispose of the unwanted left-overs.

Pesticide applications around the home usually are not very extensive and probably you'll find you only have to spray or dust a few times during any spring or summer month. Like many other things practice makes perfect; but, when long periods of time elapse be-

tween pesticide applications, it is a good idea to have some safety reminders posted somewhere near your storage area. The leaflet folds out so that the center page, if taped on the pesticide storage door makes a good reminder list that is easily re-read before you rush out to battle the lawn or garden insects.

The leaflet is a listing of safety tips for pesticide users and is not a listing of recommended materials that will control specific pests. For recommendations on pest control, other leaflets such as the "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects" and "Chemical Weed Control in Lawns" are available in my office.
