Mrs. Ramage, a former Hico resident, and other state winners of the "Save the Soil and Save the Water" conservation awards program was honored at an awards banquet and banquet held in Fort Worth May 6. The contest is sponsored by the Fort Worth Press in cooperation with the State Soil Conservation Service, and the Extension Service.

Thus far, goal number two has included sprigging 20 acres with coastal Bermuda, a drainage ditch project, a soil fertility program and soil tests determined specific weeds and brush and weed control on the Coastal and other pasture areas—as well as their pecan orchard.

Abilene, May 16—Spl.—Congressman and Mrs. Omar Burleson left Abilene Monday to return to Washington, D.C. for the remainder of this session of the Congress. Cong. Burleson had scheduled a hedge-hopping tour of the district during the week following the primary, but weather grounded him four days of the past week and he was unable to carry out the scheduled tour.

In commenting on his near 2 to 1 victory, Burleson said "The support given me in the Democratic Primary is humbling, and I keep reminding myself that with the vic-

tory and honor given me also goes a big responsibility of which I am constantly aware." He stated further, "I shall continue my best efforts in the interest of economy and good government, and the welfare of the people of this district and the nation as a whole."

Burleson said "I feel fortunate that many items of major legislation are yet to come in this session of Congress and during the time I have necessarily spent in the district campaigning for reelection, a minimum of major legislation has come up." He added "I am expecting much more to come up, and in fact, the measure calling for extension and coverage and increasing the minimum wage is set to come up in the House this week. I would have felt compelled to return to Washington during the campaign if this, or any other highly important measure, had come up earlier."

The Congressman's district office released a brief statistical report on the campaign, noting that the Congressman spent 11 of the 13 weeks just prior to the primary in the realigned 17th District. This was in addition to 7 weeks during last fall when the Burlesons visited in all of the new counties, and all but two of the old counties of the district.

The veteran Congressman of 20 years said that he had hoped to be able to visit around more to thank many of his friends personally, but felt that he should get back on the job in Washington. He added that he plans to get back to the district when Congress adjourns and hopes to have the opportunity of seeing many of his constituents at this time.
