RENFROE IS WINNER IN PEACE JUSTICE RACE

An unheard-of 401 voters turned out last Saturday to make known their preference in two races in the second Democratic Primary.

And there wasn't any doubt about their choice, giving each of the winners a large majority.

In the only local race, Grover Renfroe polled 266 votes to incumbent P. W. Hamilton's 133 to lead the Hico box by an exact 2-to-1 count. Renfroe picked up

another 25 votes at Fairy, bringing the final margin of victory to 291-136.

In the Attorney General's race there was little doubt of local people's choice. Crawford Martin, the Hillsboro native, outdistanced his opponent, Franklin Spears 330 to 58.

Hico voters will have one other election to cast ballots this year, in November when the general election comes up.

James Leeth Will Participate in NDEA Institute in Illinois

James C. Leeth, assistant professor of industrial arts at Tarleton State College, has been selected as one of 30 participants for the NDEA Institute for Advance Study in Numerical Control of Machine Tools and Digital Plotters.

The institute will be held at Northern Illinois University at DeKalb, Ill. June 13 through August 5. The latest technical information concerning numerical control systems for updating industrial arts programs will be presented.

Mr. Leeth attended Tarleton State from 1949 to 1951. He received the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Arts from North Texas State University. His master of science degree was also earned from North Texas. He taught in Fort Worth public schools for 8 years before joining the faculty at Tarleton in 1964.

FA Tony Koonsman Returns to States From South China Sea

USS Ticonderoga (FHTNC)—Fireman Apprentice Tony A. Koonsman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Koonsman of Hico, has returned from Vietnam waters to San Diego, Calif., aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ticonderoga, ending seven months of combat operations as a unit of the Seventh Fleet in the South China Sea.

While on station off the coast of Vietnam, attack aircraft from his ship flew over 10,000 combat missions in 115 days.

The 22-year-old 42,000-ton carrier emerged from yard overhaul in San Francisco prior to deploying to the Western Pacific to support American and South Vietnamese ground forces, and launch strike sorties against selected targets in North Vietnam.

Road Dedication Last Friday Is Well Attended

An estimated 150 people attended the road opening and dedication held last Friday afternoon on the Old Stephenville Highway, in observance of completion of the paving project carried out by Erath County Commissioner Roy Fallin.

Paved was that portion of the old highway from the Duffau-Stephenville cut-off for a distance of five miles to the Erath-Hamilton County lines.

The road was built entirely from precinct funds at a cost of about \$2400 per mile. The figure compares with an approximate \$30,000 per mile for farm to market road construction.

Hosts for the dedication were families who reside in that section of the community.

A bicycle race for the youngsters was held following speech-making, and the winner was the official tape cutter, breaking the barrier at the finish line. Lee Ramage was first in, and was presented \$5.00 as was Gayla Redden for being the first girl to cross the finish line.

Harold Walker, who owns a farm in the community served by the road, served as master of ceremonies, making appropriate comments about the new road, and calling on Erath and Hamilton county officials to say a few words.

From Hico, Mayor W. C. Howard, Odus Petsick and Robert Jackson expressed appreciation to Commissioner Fallin and his crew for their efforts in building the new road.

Mr. Fallin introduced his work

Rickey Hail Receives Plaque As Top Corn Experimentor

Ricky Hail, Carlton 4-H Club member, participated in the High Profit Corn Demonstration Program last year, and placed first in a district composed of 20 counties.

The demonstration was divided into two parts. A 1/2-acre plot was planted at the normal planting rate and was fertilized with 100 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre. The second plot, which was one acre in size, was planted 25 percent thicker and 200 pounds of the same fertilizer was used per acre.

Seed for both plots was given to Ricky by the Louisiana Seed Co. The variety used was Funk's G-711. Cultivation and other practices were exactly the same on both portions of the demonstration in order to demonstrate as accurately as possible the true effects of higher plant population and higher fertility.

This demonstration was conducted on the Odus Petsick place south of Carlton.

Yields were determined on both portions of the demonstration Sept. 7 by the agent, Ricky and his father. All costs and returns were figured on a per acre basis even though one plot was only 1/2-acre in size. All labor, tractor expenses, and cost of seed and fertilizer were calculated to determine the true cost and return of the demonstration. In order to determine the income the price of the corn was figured at \$1.25 per bushel.

The wide spacing, low fertility plot yielded 36.67 bushels per acre while the thick spacing, high fertility plot yielded 61.85 bushels per acre. The total expenses of the wide-spacing plot was \$29.63 per acre, giving a net profit of \$16.21 per acre. Total expenses for the second plot was \$39.45, giving Ricky a net profit of \$37.86 per acre.

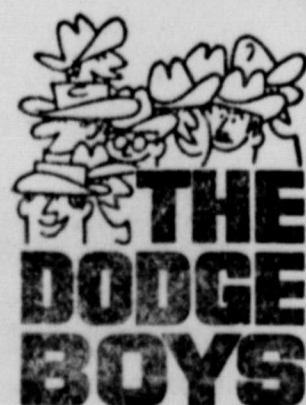

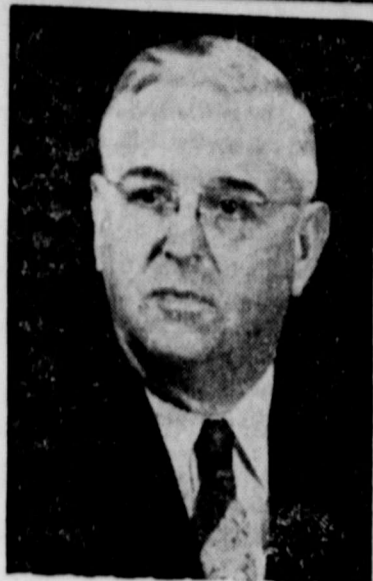

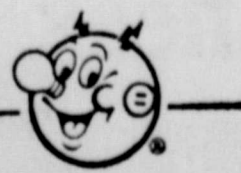
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Clairette Community News

ROADS THROUGH THE YEARS

To the Editor:
I was here when the road out of Hico north toward Stephenville was not in existence. That was in the days before barbed wire came along. After the railroad out of Waco was built through Hico in 1879, people went to buying barbed wire and fencing their land. Within a few years almost all the land in Erath County was fenced and if you went anywhere you had to open gates and go through pastures. Before this time the county was un-fenced and if you wanted to travel between Hico and Stephenville you could pick your own route just as a cow does now as

she goes from one part of her pasture to another.
There were perhaps 25 gates to be opened on the traveled route between the two towns. This was very unsatisfactory to both land-owners and travelers. First because most of the travel was in wagons drawn by either oxen or pony teams (the road was at least five miles longer than it is now). It was 25 miles between the two towns. It took the best part of two days to make it one way.
Eventually buggies were introduced and a good buggy team could make a round trip in a day. But for those awful gates. There was soon a cry for laned roads but no self-respecting landowner would allow a lane across his land. So some of them eventually did agree to allow a lane along side their outer fence lines. Therefore the lanes zig-zagged back and forth over all kind of terrain. Some places were so sandy that they were impassible in dry weather. Other segments crossed bog holes that would have bogged a snipe in wet weather.
People got faster and faster. T-model cars came into the picture. Reckless drivers could drive from Hico to Stephenville within two hours, if it weren't for those sand bogs and those awful mud holes. Something had to be done. What was done? Well a road tax was voted, most of the zig zags were taken out, sand beds and mud puddles were graded up and topped with gravel. This happened in the first quarter of this century.

In the second half of the century the state and U.S. took the roads over, graded, straightened and paved most of the main roads (now called highways). Now fifteen minutes is ample time for an up-to-date automobile to make the trip from Hico to Stephenville.
Now farm to market paved roads are being built all over the country as feeder roads for the main highways and the towns. The latest of this kind of road was hot-

topped. From our community, about six miles north of Hico, the road has been topped to the Erath-Hamilton County line. It is great. We can now drive into Hico within five minutes and what a smile we have on our mugs when we get to town.
What will the road situation be ten years from now? Will we have better roads or chaos as some people predict? We are hoping and trusting that a nuclear bomb doesn't blot out the whole picture as we know you do too.

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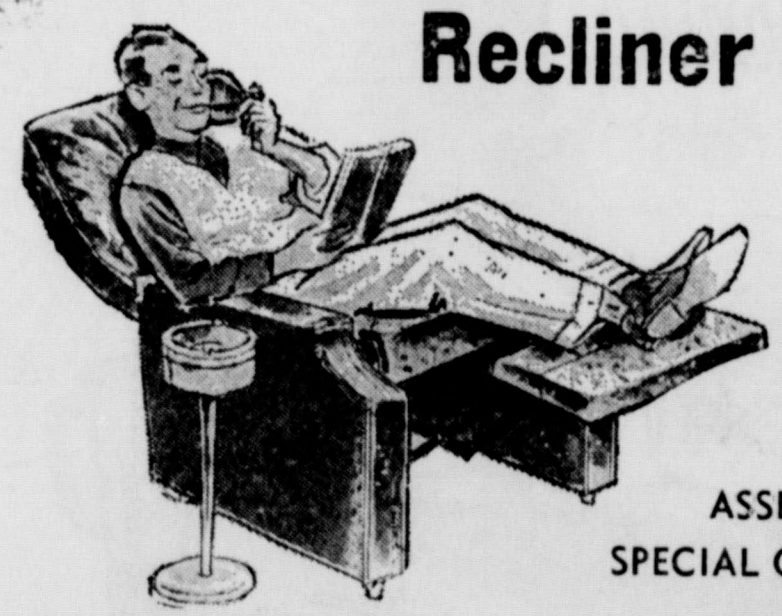

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DEMARQUIS GORDON

It looks like grasshoppers are going to be a problem again this year. You may have already noticed that some areas are rather heavily infested with small grasshoppers.

They are relatively easy to control when they are young, but become increasingly difficult as they near maturity. Now is the time when you can effectively control the hoppers. If you can find and treat the hatching areas before they begin to migrate over larger areas you may prevent later widespread damage.

Several insecticides give good control of young grasshoppers. You should pay careful attention to the label precautions before applying any insecticide to pastures or crops and observe strictly the prescribed harvest, grazing or slaughter intervals.

Carbaryl (Sevin) or malathion are effective and can be used on pasture and range land without limitations for grazing livestock. These are the only insecticides that can be used on pastures where dairy cows will be grazed.

Heptachlor or toxaphene may be used to control grasshoppers on pasture land, but animals should not be grazed for 7 to 10 days following application. Beef animals should not be grazed on pastures treated with heptachlor or toxaphene with 90 days before slaughter.

Dieldrin and aldrin cannot be used on ranges and pastures to be grazed by livestock. However they are very effective in controlling large hoppers on ditch banks, roadsides, wastelands, and non-crop areas.

More information on recommended insecticides and their restrictions are given in the Texas Insect Guides available in the county agent's office. I have insect guides on livestock and poultry, grain and forage crops, cotton, ornamental plants, fruits and nuts, vegetables and household insects.

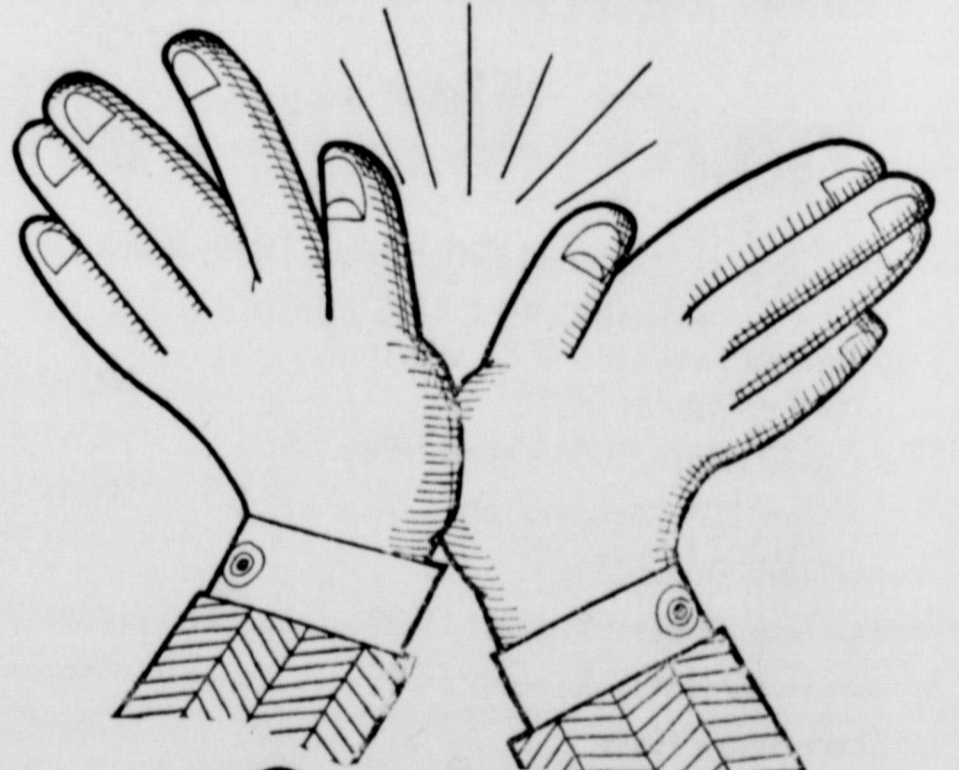

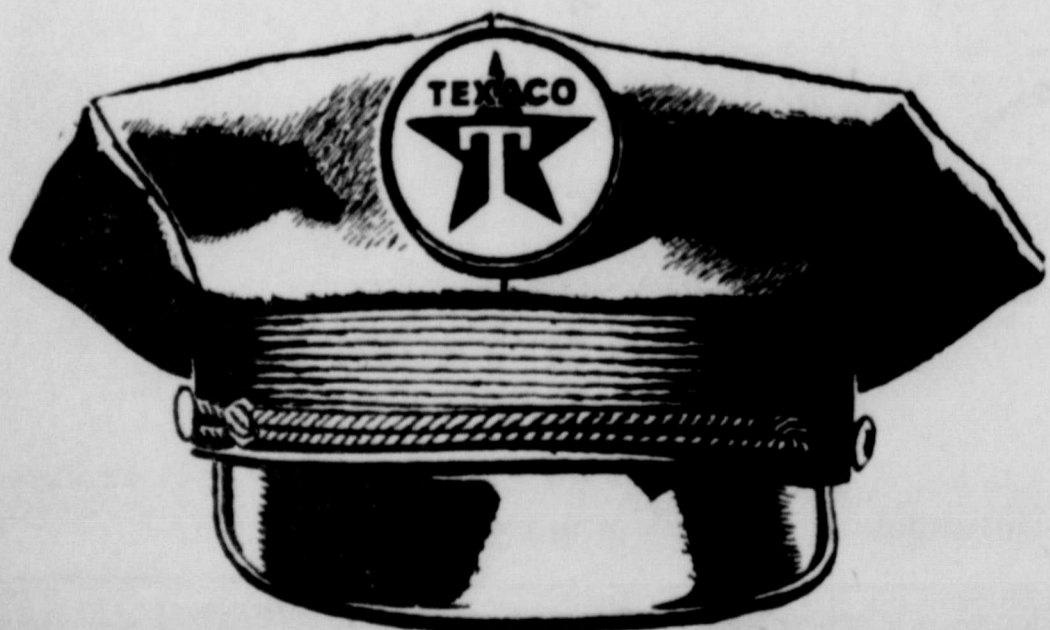

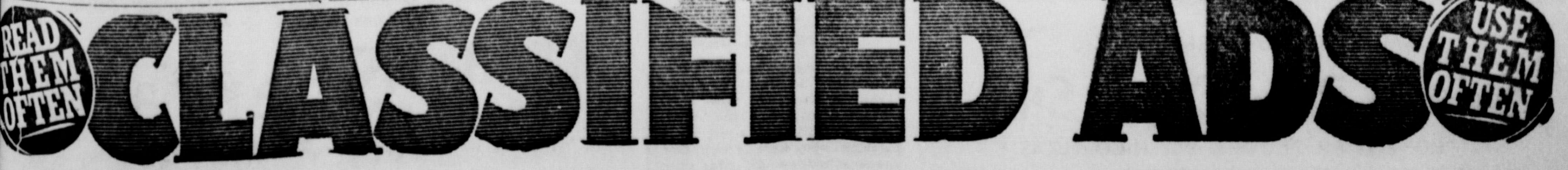

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

By OMAR BURLESON, M.C. 17th District, Texas

Washington, D.C.—The growing problem of water and air pollution is recognized and efforts are being made to deal with it. Just as conditions brought about by water pollution and unclean air did not occur suddenly, it will take a long time to find all the answers and to arrest the processes.

Another problem to receive attention is noise abatement. In discussing living conditions and the general welfare of people, the term "environmental quality" is being used, and anti-noise is a factor in it.

The cost to industry of controlling noise levels will be higher and will likely affect more kinds of industry and business than has been the case of water and air pollution. For instance, aircraft engine and truck manufacturers, having already spent millions to "bottle up" noise, will doubtless have to spend a great deal more. Machinery which operates at a lower noise level will have a selling point. Obviously two purposes are primarily involved—devices to prevent noise in the first place and materials to protect from noise in the second place.

Legislation has already been introduced to start a study on the effects of noise and how to eliminate it. Some day there will probably be a Federal "Office of Noise Control" and will likely provide Federal grants for research in con-

trol and prevention.

It is reasonable to believe that building codes would require greater sound insulation in interior and exterior walls. Heating and cooling machinery and component parts would have to be designed to create and transmit a minimum of noise. Cooling equipment could probably no longer be located on tops of buildings where it would transmit noise to surrounding buildings.

Construction equipment used in growing cities would have to operate below an approved noise level. This would likely include air hammers, generators, compressors, pumps, cranes and pile-drivers. In manufacturing, employers might find themselves required to reduce noise in the machine shops and give free ear examinations and medical treatment to their employees.

Although noise is noise anywhere it is noisy, there still must be ears to receive it (otherwise it isn't noisy at all). Noise of the kind to be dealt with must, of course, be man-made, and if it is to be a profitable operation such as manufacturing, there must be a lot of ears around to receive the noise. The point here is that the problem of noise could be considerably alleviated by encouraging industry to move into rural areas. In fact, but not for this reason, there are plans to help businesses locate or relocate in small towns. This is the latest added objectives to the War on Poverty.

The Administration has indicated that since earlier efforts at warring on poverty have been mostly directed towards the cities, attention should be given to small towns and rural areas, but that such areas must be made attractive by offering services competitive with the cities.

The general plan seems to be that industry will decide on just what is needed in areas in which it would like to locate. This would include available labor, water and sewer facilities, hospital and health facilities, adequate schools, roads, and a source of power.

Under the Rural Community Development Service of the Agriculture Department hopes to coordinate already existing Federal programs to extend them into the rural areas. Under this program the Department will attempt to train workers, advise industry, and develop these needed resources to attract industrial plants to areas depending primarily on agriculture to afford a community a year-round payroll.

The theory behind all this sounds perfectly good. There is no question that our small towns and rural areas are in need of additional source of economic reliability. It is one way to stop the one-way street of people leaving the smaller communities and going into the cities to further compound problems already severe. Some enterprising communities, having long recognized the need, have done something about this situation without the Government's help. There is no substitute for local initiative.

Future Looks Bright For Dairymen, Says Specialist

College Station, June 7.—Dairymen are going into June Dairy Month in a strong position relative to future prices, says A. M. Meekma, Extension Dairy Specialist at Texas A&M University.

The continuing decline in the number of dairy cows, it was 5.6 percent from Jan. 1, 1965 to Jan. 1, 1966 and a slow down in the increase of milk production per cow make the future price situation good, he says.

Meekma adds that the decline in numbers is expected to continue during this year but at a rate nearer the average for the past 10 years. The slow-down in production rate per cow, he says, is characteristic of a long-time rise in production of any product.

Last year, total U.S. milk production declined 1.5 billion pounds below the record of 126.6 billion pounds the previous year. In Texas, Meekma says, milk production increased by 27 million pounds over a year ago and the state's dairyman, especially those producing for the Grade A market, will share fully in the favorable price.

The virtual elimination of any surplus of manufactured milk products has added further strength to the dairy market, notes the specialist. This was probably a factor in the decision to raise the support price of manufacturing milk to \$3.50 per hundred.

There is every reason to believe the favorable price situation will not be short in duration, says Meekma. For not only are dairy cow numbers down, but the number of heifers one to two years of age and dairy calves are also at correspondingly low figures.

This fact makes it impossible to bring about a rapid increase in dairy cow numbers and in milk production, explains Meekma. This situation has been developing over a considerable period of time, and
