County Agent Cites Importance Of Dairy Industry to Hico Area

"June Dairy Month" is a fitting time to pause and pay tribute to the Hico area dairymen and their families. I included "families" because the entire family is involved in dairy farming.

I know, because I grew up on a dairy farm and remember all the hard work, long hours, joys and satisfactions that are shared by all members of the family. I am grateful to the dairy industry because it was those milk checks that made it possible for me to attend college.

One only has to look around the Hico area to realize what the dairy industry means to this community. The money received for milk is spent in many ways, but most of it is circulated in the Hico area.

We can all support the dairymen and this community by consuming more milk and milk products. It is also a real good buy

for your money. To get the same food nutrients that are available in a quart of milk from any other food source would cost more than 40c. Milk, therefore, is one of the best food bargains.

The price of milk remains relatively stable, and its food values remain high, making it extremely kind to the homemaker's budget. One way to express the price of milk is in terms of minutes a factory laborer has to work to earn the money to buy a quart of milk. In 1890, he had to work 26 minutes, but in 1960, he had to work only 6.8 minutes to purchase a quart of milk.

Dairymen can do many things to help promote the sale of dairy products. The most important is to produce high quality milk. Other things they can do is to be good users of dairy products, participate in and support activities that improve the image of the total dairy industry, and support the American Dairy Association.

The future looks better for the dairymen now than it has for several years. The number of dairy cows in the nation continues to decline and there is a slow down in the increase of milk production per cow. All this caused a decline in milk production last year of 1.5 billion lbs. below the previous year.

The virtual elimination of any surplus of manufactured milk products has added further strength to the dairy market. This was probably a factor in the decision to raise the support price of manufacturing milk to \$3.50 per hundred.

The favorable price situation will probably not be short in duration. For not only are dairy cow numbers down, but the number of heifers one to two-years of age and dairy calves are also at correspondingly low figures.

This favorable price situation looks good not only for the dairymen, but for the entire Hico area.



TO SCHOOL — Jimmy Luckie, son of Mrs. Essie Mae Luckie and a spring graduate of Hico High School, will leave Friday of this week for Toledo, Ohio, where he will spend two months attending a school to learn the butcher trade.

A formal protest was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission on June 4 by local businesses and organizations in connection with the proposed abandonment of the MKT Railroad between Waco and Stamford.

As a follow-up, a group of Hico and Hamilton businessmen, along with representatives of other towns along the line, met Wednesday in Dallas with MKT Railroad President Mr. Barringer.

Text of the protest, copies of which were sent Congressmen Omar Burlison and W. R. Poage, and Senator Ralph Yarborough, read as follows:

"We have received notice in connection with an application filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Missouri, Kansas, Texas Railroad Company identified as Finance Dockets No. 24126 and 24163.

"Said Railroad has applied to abandon its line of railroad between Bellmead and Stamford, Texas, a distance of 220.28 miles in McLennan, Hill, Bosque, Hamilton, Erath, Comanche, Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford and Jones counties, Texas.

"In our conclusion that the intended abandonment by the applicant would materially inconvenience and impose a hardship on the shippers now served by said railroad.

"The agricultural, lumber concerns both of Hico and at Hamilton, Texas, livestock producing mills and various concerns is so great that the demands upon the railroad justify continued operation of this line of railroad. The MKT is the only railroad in Hamilton County and the Hico agency serves not only Hico but Hamilton (the county seat), Walnut Springs, Morgan, Carlton, Glen Rose, and Fairy, Texas, therefore in the interest of public convenience and necessity as well as the interest of the general public of this area we the City of Hico and Hamilton, Texas, hereby protest the proposed abandonment of the applicant.

"(1) We respectfully request the Interstate Commerce Commission to order an investigation into the proposed transaction, and further that the Commission order a public hearing to be held in the matter to determine whether the public interest would be served in authorizing such a proposed transaction.

"(2) Further, the Commission is respectfully requested to conduct an investigation and hold a public hearing to determine whether public convenience and necessity would be damaged as a result of the proposed transaction and whether the proposed transaction would constitute an undue burden upon interstate and foreign commerce.

"(3) We also respectfully request an opportunity to participate in such a hearing to whatever extent is necessary to protect the best interest of the general public.

"We would greatly appreciate your furnishing us with copies of notices of any and all hearings as well as all orders entered by the Commission in this matter."

The letter was addressed to Mr. Harold D. McCoy, Secretary, Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C.

The protest was signed by Bruce Slaughter, M. I. Knudson, J. B. Woodard and A. H. Lackey of Hico, and J. E. Alexander and P. M. Gerreard of Hamilton.

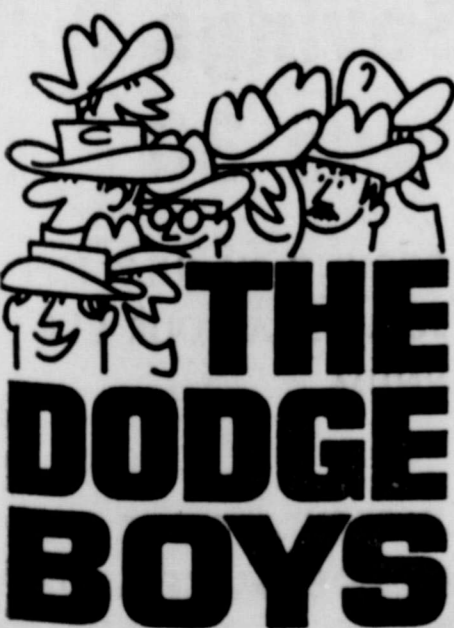
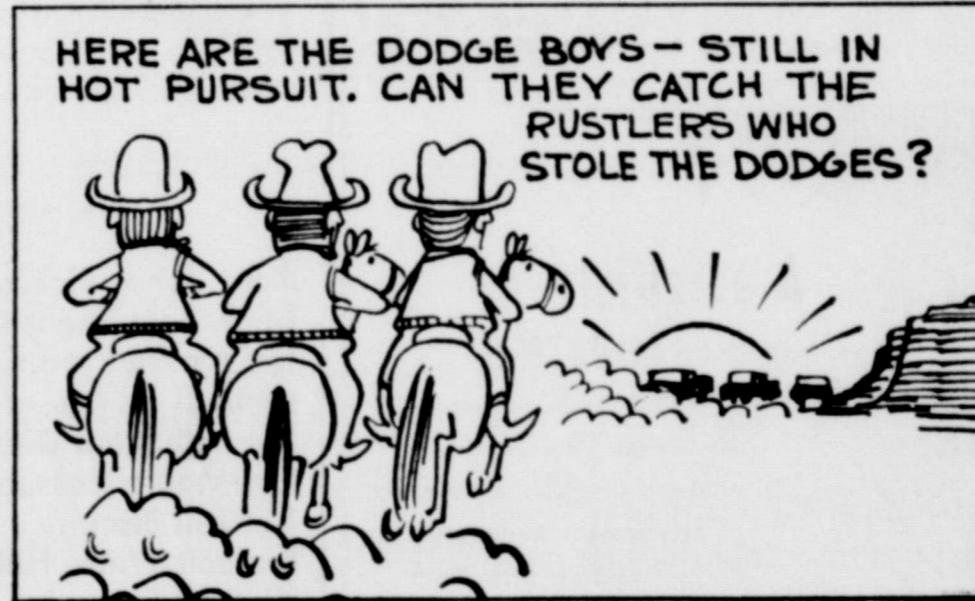
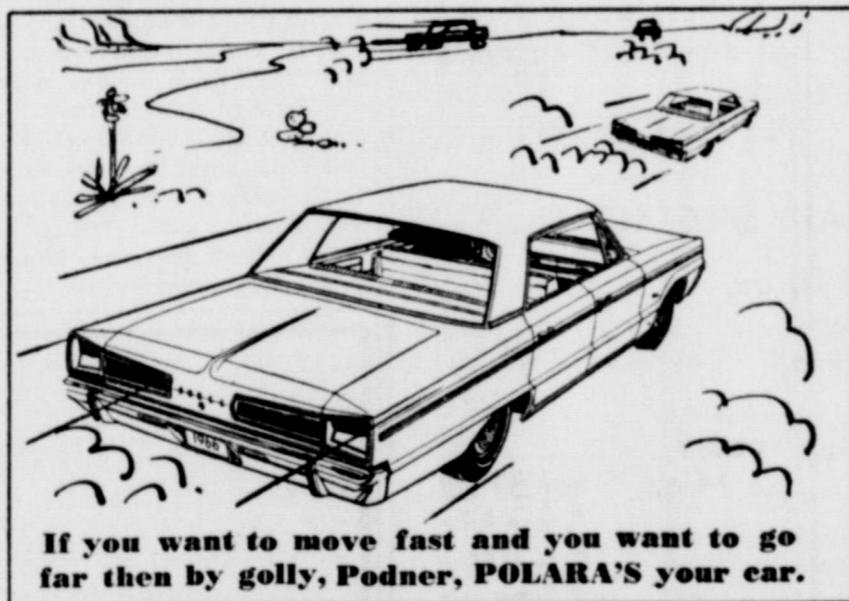
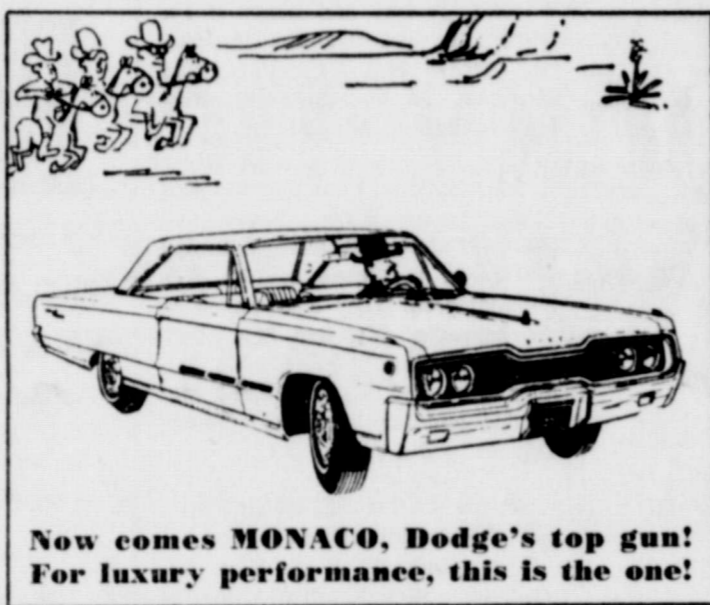
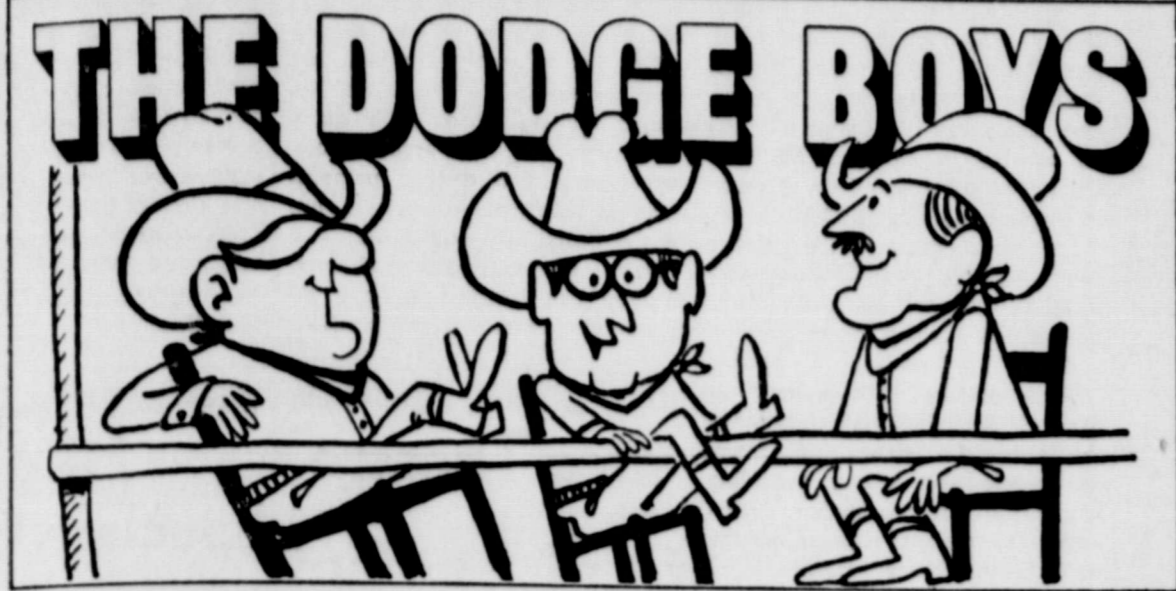
Agricultural Agent. Both agents served on the staff at the leadership congress. The congress provided leadership training which included using group resources, decision making

Fairy Community News

Word was received here Saturday afternoon of the death of Bernal Richardson of Lovington, N.M. who passed away about 3:30 Saturday afternoon following a lengthy illness. 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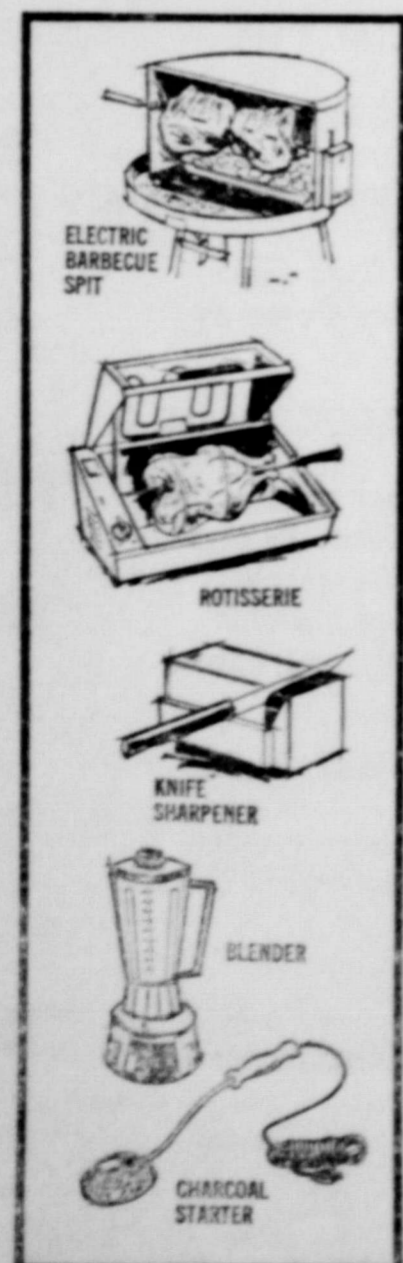

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Future historians will undoubtedly mark September 2, 1945, as a significant turning point in the affairs of the United States, as well as the world. The history of World War II ended on this date with the surrender of the Japanese, but there is also another important significance.

At that exact time the United States stood alone on a pinnacle of power. No other nation anywhere on the earth could challenge us.

Both Allies and the vanquished had to turn to us for assistance. Russia could not have saved herself without the equipment we had given her. Europe could not have rebuilt itself without our wealth. Smaller nations everywhere had no other place to look for help except to America.

Also at this exact time it seemed that we developed a sort of complex of half apologizing for having won the war in the first place. Ever since VJ Day it seems some self-consciousness has bitten deep into us and has affected our foreign policy. At times we have seemed to apologize for our power. This appeared to be the case with Berlin, Korea and the Middle East, which were dealt with by several Administrations.

This is what sets Viet Nam apart from other periods of actual wartime. Other wars, with all their agonies, were made bearable by an enthusiasm for what we felt was right and a confidence in our ability to bring victory. What we knew we had to do was to rise up and fight.

This attitude seems to be lacking in our conduct of the war in Viet Nam.

The evidence of this is now being demonstrated in Geneva where Secretary of State Rusk is trying valiantly to gain support from European leaders for the United States' position in Viet Nam.

Secretary Rusk admits that our prestige is down in Europe because "it has been so long since the United States has had a resounding success or victory."

Europeans have observed the hesitancy and reluctance of the

United States to use its power—in Berlin, in Korea, at the Bay of Pigs—and now what appears to them to be a stalemate in Viet Nam.

The forces of history have not changed. Despite the introduction of nuclear weapons, a nation is not regarded as a great power if it shrinks from the use of its strength when attacked. It is doubtful that under such conditions a nation could expect allies to flock to its side when it is said we only have "limited goals" and those goals are not clearly defined.

England's Winston Churchill did not rally the free world to Britain's side by calling for restraint against the Nazis or giving the half-V sign.

These are the things which make it difficult for our friends abroad to understand. Voices of the "no win" policy for the United States are loud and clear. They were mistaken by a well known Canadian newspaperman and Canadian Parliamentarian who recently visited Washington. Before coming they thought "America public opinion was shifting toward disengagement in Viet Nam and some kind of a re-approach toward Red China."

After being in Washington a few days the Canadians found a different view. "Right or wrong the vast majority of Americans still cling to the opinion that the war in Viet Nam must be fought to the bitter end, that Communism must be contained in Southeast Asia and that it must be stopped there if we do not want it to come over here."

Certainly most people would like to see a peaceful settlement in South Viet Nam, but who can imagine a "peaceful settlement" under prevailing conditions and attitudes.

Indications are that Mr. W. Averell Harriman will soon set off on another round of travels to other nations to explore the possibility of a negotiated settlement.

Mr. Harriman's trip has added significance by statements from Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, calling for "mutual cessation of all types of hostilities in Viet Nam
