

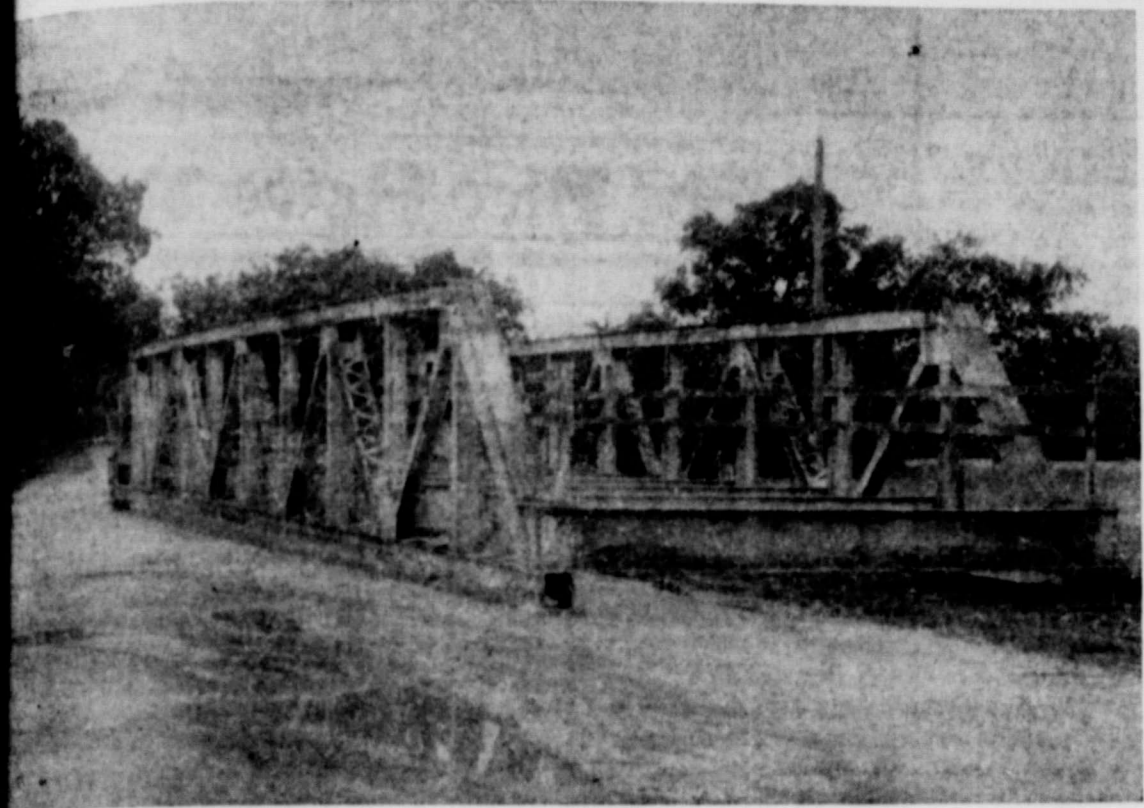

With time fast approaching for the celebration, biggest problem facing Reunion officials is the bridge situation. Officials are concerned about how to get the huge crowd in and out of Hico City Park with only one service road available, visualizing the tremendous traffic problem that could arise.

Not many homecomings over the state draw crowds as large as the one here, with people flocking into the park by the thousands each night.

People living away from Hico traditionally plan their visits back home each year to coincide with the celebration, and one added feature this year is expected to swell the Saturday crowd.

The special "Mattie Segrest Day" on Saturday of the Reunion is expected to draw many people here from wide parts of the country. A reception honoring the longtime educator is planned for July 30 from 2 until 4 p.m. at the newly reactivated Bluebonnet Country Club, and most of those attending the reception will stay over for the Reunion that night.

In the meantime, people are asked to be getting parade entries ready, making booth reservations, etc., because only five weeks remain until start of the homecoming.

Citizen Band Radio Club Organized Here Recently

The Tri-County CB Club was recently organized by Citizen Band Radio operators in Hico and surrounding towns. Present membership in the club is composed of CB licensees and their wives.

The vacant cafe building, owned by Dean Spaulding, has been donated to the club for its use.

Two meetings have been held. The first, May 28, was for the purpose of organizing the club, setting up rules and regulations, and to elect officers.

The following officers were elected: Darrel Simons, president; Calvin Hyles, vice-president; Betty Simons, secretary; Charles Tolliver, treasurer; Joy Tolliver, reporter; and a planning committee composed of Ray Boone, J. C. Braune, and C. D. Stoddard.

A called meeting was held Saturday night, June 11, with 14 members present. During the business session plans were made to have a "tacky party" next meeting night which will be June 25. It was also decided that anyone who is not a radio operator, but is interested, may join the club if they so desire. All prospective members must be voted on by charter members before being accepted into the club.

The club submitted the following information about Citizen Band radios so that the public will have some understanding as to what they are and of their use. Parts of the information is taken from Volume VI of the Federal Communications Commission Rules and Regulations, which each operator must study before applying for licenses.

C.B. Operators are licensed and assigned call signs by the FCC, and operate by rules and regulations set forth by them.

Citizen radio service is a communication service of fixed, land and mobile stations intended for personal or business radio communication, and shall not be used for any purpose contrary to federal, state or local law; or to carry communications for hire; or to carry program material of any kind either directly or indirectly for use in connection with radio broadcasting or for direct transmissions to the public by public address or by any other means. The operating distance of these

radios is 150 miles, and the operator may talk with any other operator in this service within this distance. CB radios are on a complete different frequency than that of police or Ham radio sets.

CONELRAD rules have been set up for all radio stations in the CB service located within the continental United States, for the purpose of providing for the alerting and operation of radio stations in this service during periods of enemy attack or imminent threat thereof.

Objective of these CONELRAD rules is to minimize the navigational aid that an enemy might obtain from the electromagnetic radiations from radio stations in the CB service while simultaneously provides for a continued radio service under controlled conditions when such operation is essential to the public welfare.

Citizen Band radios have played an important part in disasters and emergencies when other means of communication were unavailable.

The Tri-County Club hopes that it can be of some service to Hico and surrounding communities, and ask the public to feel free to call on its members when they can be of help.

The club meets the last Saturday of each month for a business session and social. Anyone interested in CB radios is always welcome to attend the meetings.

Bridge Structure on Site—Completion Not Expected In Time For Annual Reunion

With ample time, and an expenditure of several thousand dollars, the bridge across the Bosque River in Spring City Park will again be in use. Shown above is the two-way structure that was moved to the site last Thursday morning.

Big question on everyone's mind has been "Will the bridge be completed in time for the Reunion?" R. Hampton, city street superintendent, said that it would be impossible to have the bridge moved in time for the July 27 celebration, posing a serious problem for Reunion officials.

Much work is left to be done before the structure is completed, and Hampton expressed little hope that the bridge would be serviceable by Reunion time. Concrete piers and approaches will have to be poured before the structure can be spanned, and a job of this nature is expected to require more time than is available. However, city officials said that every effort would be made to get the bridge in use as soon as possible.

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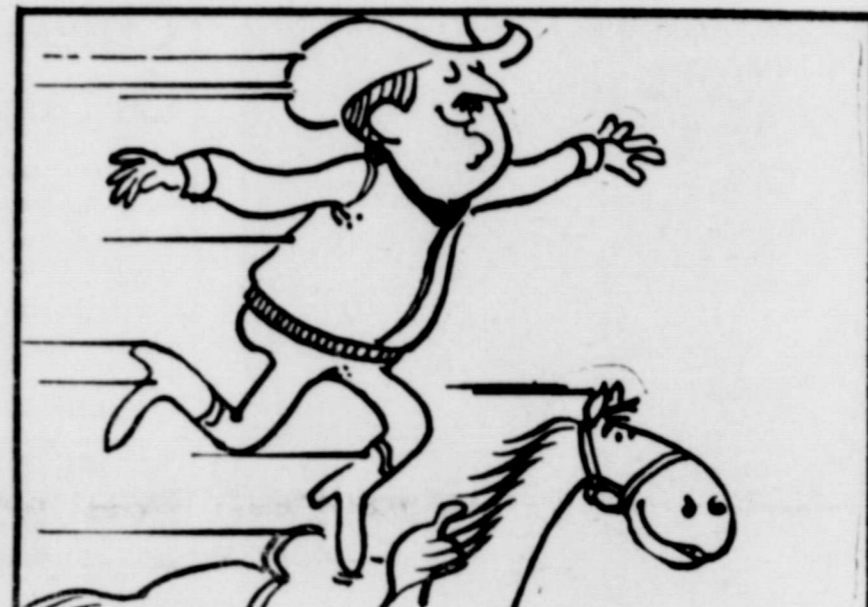

On the Home Range

Wall coverings today give the buyer a wide choice of textures, colors and prices. There's more to shopping for wall coverings, however, than just choosing the right color and style from paper roll goods.

You, as a consumer, should also consider the style and design elements and relate these to other factors within and outside your home. Some of the factors for your consideration include price, care and durability of such materials as vinyl, paper, metal, jute, cotton, silk, saran, olefin and nylon.

Some wall coverings withstand scrubbing longer than painted surfaces. However, the appearance of other materials may be ruined by water. So, before you buy, study the type of materials and care recommendations for each. Then relate these factors to the cost of materials and life expectancy for each. Price-wise, you have a choice of materials which range from less than 50 cents a roll to more than \$50 for a comparable amount of material. Your choice of wall covering may vary greatly from that of your neighbor, but it should please your family.

Many people are under the false impression that with some diets you can eat all you want to and

still lose weight. This is not true. Even if your diet is based on some "special foods" or it limits carbohydrates to 60 grams per day, it is still impossible to eat all you want and lose weight at the same time.

The simple principle of dieting is that when—and only when—less calories are taken in than used by a person's body it is possible to lose weight. A high-fat, low-carbohydrate diet may cause quick loss of weight for a short time. However, most of the loss is water that has been drawn out of the body tissues.

There's little loss of actual fat. Also, a high-fat, low-carbohydrate diet causes an imbalance of nutrients in the body which can be harmful effects.

Other devices to make dieting easier, such as making spaghetti thinner or, the hole in the doughnut larger or cutting slices of bread thinner, are also illusory. There is really no easy way to control weight. It simply takes sustained effort and will-power. The best reducing diet is a low-calorie, nutritionally balanced diet of varied foods. No one food fattens unless too much of it is eaten. So, cut out the extras, such as extra sugar, fat and seasonings, and stick with the balanced diet.

Never attempt to lose weight without first having a medical checkup. Your family doctor can prescribe the correct calorie intake for you to help you lose weight safely.

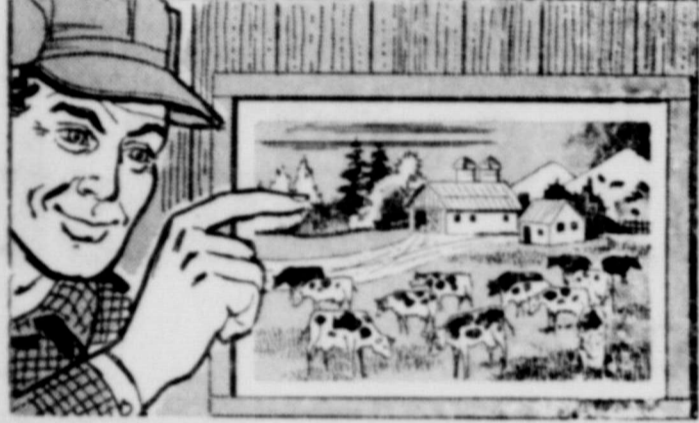

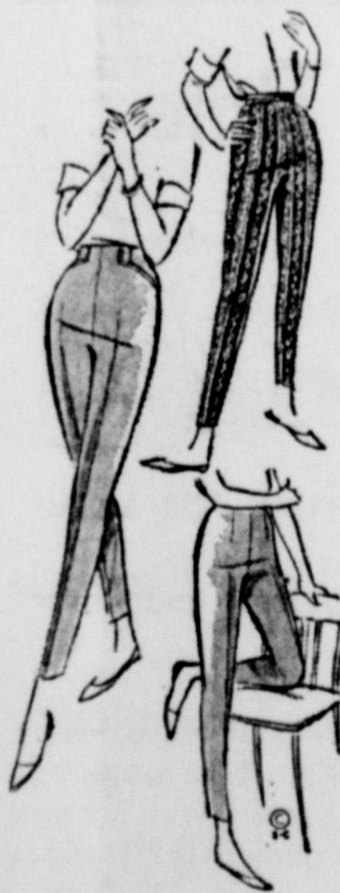


