## Mrs. Morrison Named 'Nurse of the Year' In State

Mrs. Jimmie L. Morrison, supervisor of nurses at Hico City Hospital, was named Nurse of the Year at the 1965-66 Annual Texas League of Vocational Nurses Convention held June 16 and 17 at McAllen.

Nominees for the state honor were submitted by each component society of the Texas League.

Mrs. Morrison, who was nominated by the Tri-County League of Vocational Nurses, was selected as the most outstanding of the nominees, for her accomplishments in her local component society, in the state league, and in the nursing profession.

She is a charter member of the Tri-County League, and has served as its president, vice-president, president pro-tem, secretary, reporter, parliamentarian, and has served on the program, refreshment, membership, finance, flower and nominating committees.

Mrs. Morrison is also a charter member of the State League. Offices held by Mrs. Morrison in

the state association are: Nominating Committee 1952-53; Archives Committee 1952-55; President-elect 1955-56 and 1964-65;

President pro-tem 1955-56; President 1956-57 and 1965-66; Trustee 1957-60 and 1960-63; Chairman of the Board 1958-59 and 1962-63; Board of Trustees 1966-69; Program Committee 1957; and General Arrangements 1956-57.

Mrs. Morrison has been on the nursing staff of Hico City Hospital since 1947. She is supervisor of nurses O.R. Nurse, and has been the instructor of the School of Vocational Nursing here since 1953.

On August 4, 1964 she was appointed by Governor John Connally to the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners for a six-year term.

Upon nominating Mrs. Morrison for the Nurse of the Year Award, Imogene Howell, president of Tri-County League, stated "Jimmie L. Morrison has spent many hours and driven hundreds of miles endeavoring to improve the status of the licensed vocational nurse in Texas. To no other one person in this state does the LVN owe more gratitude."

## ASC Committee Nominations May Be Filed After July 1

Farmers were reminded this week that petitions nominating a farmer to serve as an ASC community committeeman may be filed at any time during the year after July 1.

Dewey Sellers, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said that he was making the announcement to correct any possible misunderstanding about the time for filing nominating petitions.

"An announcement that nomination petitions are being received is always made in advance of the time for election of community committeemen," the Chairman explained, "and some farmers may get the mistaken impression that the petitions may be filed only during the approximately 35 days between time of the announcement and the time for voting. I hope this statement will clarify the issue."

"Any local resident is eligible to take part in one or more of the farm programs which ASC committeemen help to administer may vote in the elections, and he may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed or national origin," Sellers continued.

"Farmers who are eligible to vote in the committee elections also have the right to nominate as a candidate any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such nominating petitions, each one nominating one farmer and signed by six or more eligible voters, may be filed at the ASCS County office at any time between July 1 and the deadline for such filings—25 days before the deadline for returning election ballots by mail. Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they wish."

In Hamilton County, ASC community committeemen elections are held during the month of September. Each community election chooses three committeemen and two alternates. The regular members elected to the committee also serve as delegates to a county convention where the ASC committee is elected.

**July 1 Final Date for New Grower Wheat Allotments.**

July 1 is the final day for which producers may file an intention for a new grower wheat allotment. A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been

established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, who has available equipment and land and who during the last 15 years has had at least 2 years experience in producing wheat, and who as an operator expects to receive 50 percent or more of the current year's income from the total production on the farm (not including anticipated income from wheat produced on a "new farm" allotment.)

## Former Iredell Man Receives Doctorate at Princeton University

William James McCroskey, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. McCroskey of Glen Rose, formerly of Iredell, was awarded the Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Aerospace and Mechanical Engineering from Princeton University at their 219th annual commencement June 14. Dr. McCroskey did his research in the field of rarefied hypersonic flow. He is a graduate of Iredell High School, Tarleton State College, the University of Texas and the Research Center for Experimental Aerodynamics at Brussels, Belgium.

He was recently awarded membership in Sigma Xi, national science fraternity.

He also recently delivered lectures on his research project at the Universities of California, Washington and Toronto. He presented a paper before the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics at their winter meeting in New York. He has been serving as Research Associate at Princeton University since January.

Dr. McCroskey, his wife and two daughters, moved to Aberdeen, Maryland this week where he began active duty in the United States Army.

By taking drivers education, students can get a percentage off their insurance. The state will not allow credit toward graduation on this course.

## RUM ROYALE CAKE

3 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
One-fourth teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
One 7 1/2 oz. package chocolate frosting mix  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 teaspoon rum flavoring  
Beat eggs until thick and lemon-colored; gradually beat in sugar. Blend one-fourth cup lukewarm water and first teaspoon flavoring. Sift together dry ingredients; add to egg mixture; beat well. Pour into ungreased 8-inch tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees 35 to 40 minutes. Invert; cool. Combine last 3 ingredients; beat till fluffy. Split cake in two layers. Spread one-third of frosting between layers and remaining on sides and top.

## JOHNNY KILGO RETURNS FROM VIETNAM WATERS

Seaman Apprentice Johnny C. Kilgo, USN, son of Mrs. Leon Danysh of Holliday and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. 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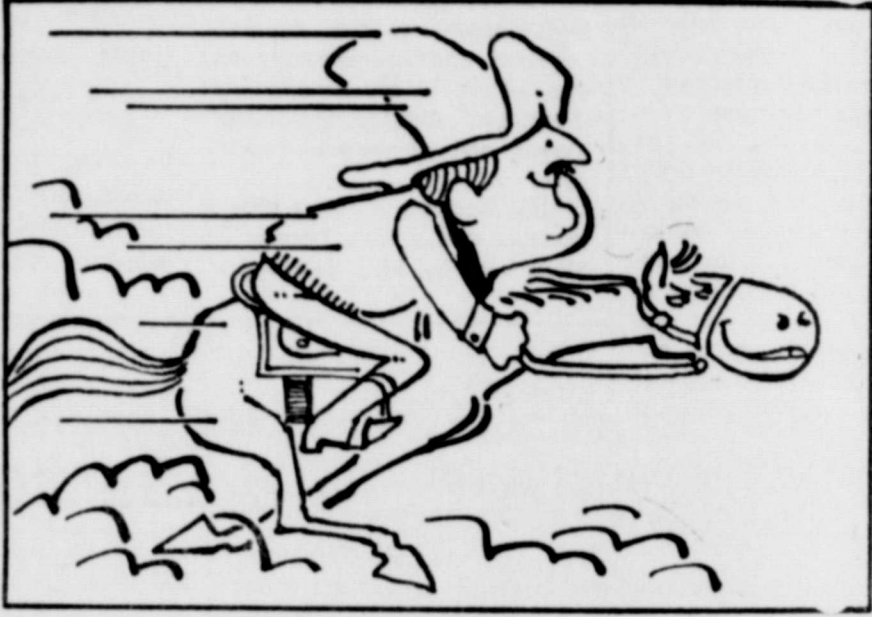

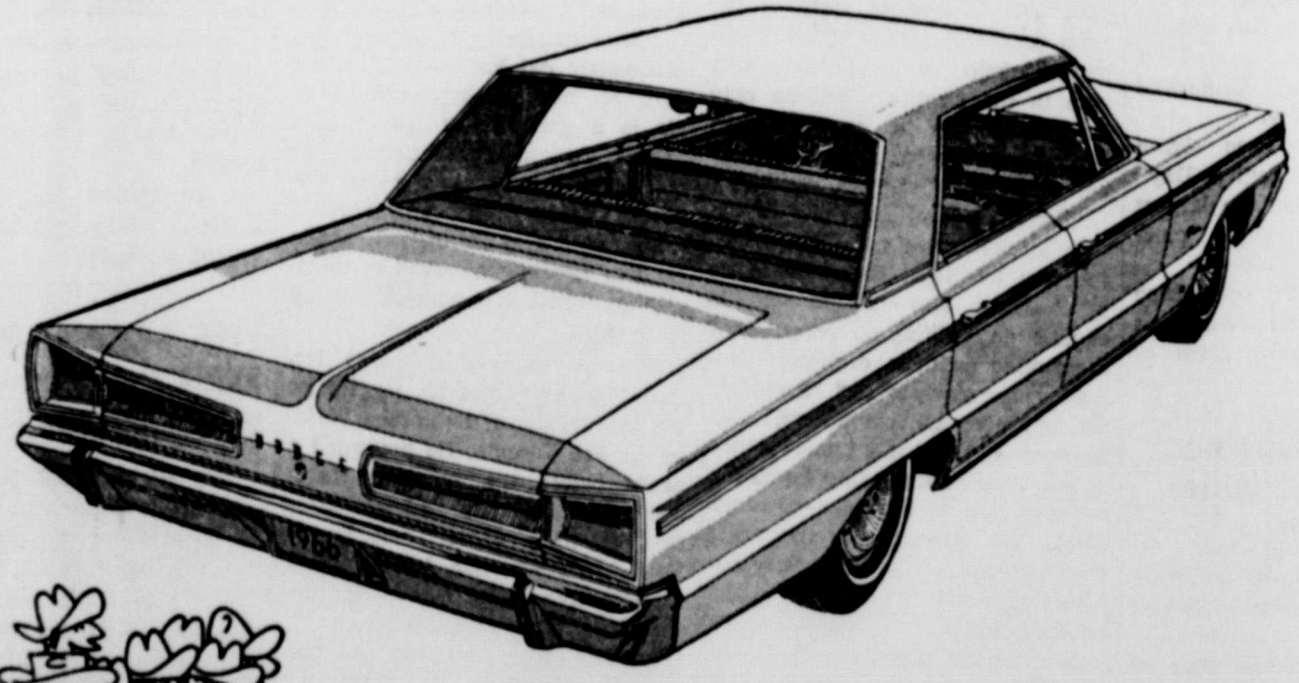

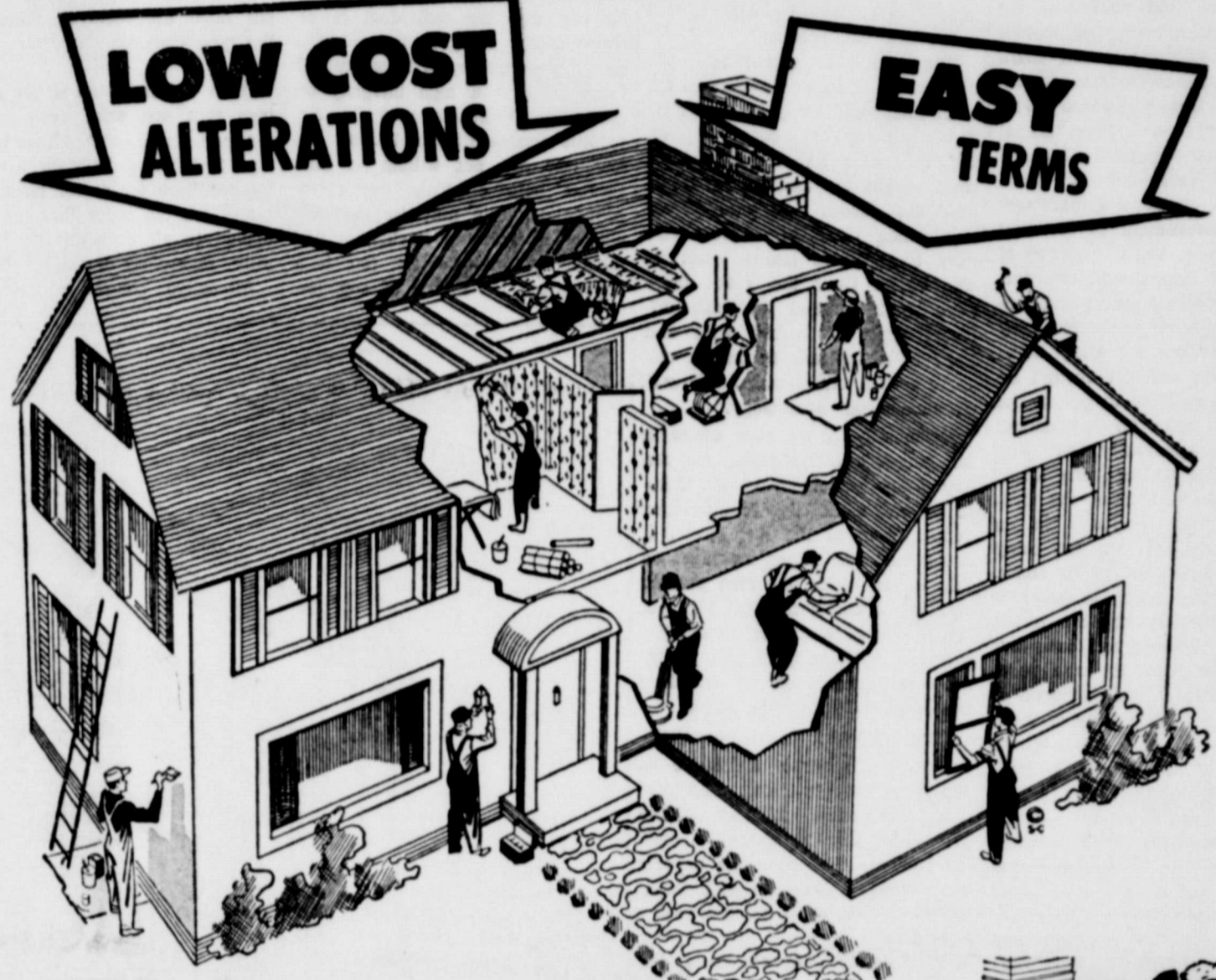

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C. — "Truth in Packaging" was a subject of this release in February of this year. Legislation beamed to the proposition that food products should not be labeled to mislead the purchasing public may be up for consideration in the near future.

The trend nowadays, both in the administration of laws already on the books and those proposed, emphasizes favor and protection for the consumer. Actually, of course, we are all consumers, and there are more of us than there are manufacturers, packagers, and so forth.

Generally the assumption seems to be that the housewife buys a product and gets cheated. There is already a complete Department set up in Government to see that this is not done, but a majority of the Congress may decide that further law is needed to provide machinery for greater protection. They say that there are too many items on the market and not enough information about them to permit the consumer to make an independent choice. Some apparently feel that we are unable to read the labels and tell the good from the bad. In other words, emphasis is on the assumption that we are being sold the sizzle instead of the steak.

Actually, a product is what it does. A freezer, for instance, is not the sum of its nuts and bolts but something designed to save food, time and effort. A steak stripped of its sizzle is a bloody piece of meat from the carcass of a steer. Where the usage of a product is self-evident, such as the wood screw, little more need be said.

Probably we have all experienced disappointment and a feeling of being cheated with a number of things we buy and expect to get its maximum benefit. Power sprays and pressurized toothpaste which runs

out of power before the can is empty is a favorite gripe of a lot of us. It is real convenient while it works but provoking that we can not get our money's worth by using it all.

Be this as it may, someone has got to decide what is adequate "information." Where does it begin and end? How thorough must it be for those of us who are not too perceiving or patient enough to find out about the product?

This proposition might be taken a great deal further in some things other than food. Antiques could really furnish a good example. Depending on one's knowledge, today's trash might be tomorrow's treasure. The person who paid \$5 for any 8-inch piece of barbed wire may really have known what he was doing. Over the years there have been several hundred different types of barbed wire and some of it has now become a collector's item under something called "industrial archeology."

Incidentally, if we want to go in for gadgetry in products, we can buy soap manufactured in Yokohama with a message that remains visible down to the last sizer. It is described as having messages on thin layers which are then pressed together to make the full bar. Not being sure of what the advantages are, one would suppose that youngsters might be able to do their homework while taking a bath.

Drug labeling and beneficial claims is a separate legislative issue from that involving food products. Scientific advances have brought so many drugs on the market recently that even the experts are unable to keep up with them. The Food and Drug Administration has grown by leaps and bounds, and Committees of Congress are

Most families take automatic washing machines for granted, whether they own them or use them at the laundries. There are many points a family needs to consider before owning a washing machine. Some of these considerations are:

- 1. How much will it cost to own the equipment? Include cost plus interest, carrying charges, insurance and installation.
2. What would it cost to take your laundry to a self-help laundry, including cost of transportation plus machine use for the same number of loads you would do at home?
3. Do you have a good supply of water?
4. Is your water heater large enough to supply the extra amount needed for the washer? Can the washer be installed near the water heater? Hot water is a must for satisfactory laundry.
5. Are you permanently located? The next place you live may not have space or water for efficient home laundry.
6. Would the money invested in a washer be worth more used in some other way?
7. The self-help equipment may not have the features needed for the type clothing you own.

Older citizens need home furnishings that are safe, easy to care for, and comfortable. Home furnishings features to look for in selecting furniture for senior citizens actually are the same features which appeal to all members of the family, regardless of their ages.

Attractive colors in furnishings can add much to the lives of older persons. For example, blues and greens are relaxing, while yellows and pinks enliven or "pep up" a room. Patterns and textures are important, too. The absence of pattern is relaxing, but the use of some pattern can add interest and activity to a room.

New, easy-care fabrics used in the home mean less work for any homemaker, regardless of age. Attractive, soil-resistant fabrics are available. Fabrics have been treated to resist both oil and water if they bear the label of "Zepel," "Scotchguard," and "Banguard." Furniture and table and desk tops also are easy-care in design.

Older persons, especially, need comfortable chairs and couches designed so they will be easy to rise from. Furniture that is easy to move is important for all homemakers. However, if furniture is lightweight, make sure that it is well balanced, strong and safe.

Safety features to look for when selecting furnishings for older citizens are low beds, chairs with rubber guards on the bottom of the legs, and non-slip materials under rugs. And the fewer sharp corners and edges on a piece of furniture, the safer it is. More furniture with safety features is now available, as furniture manufacturers become more safety conscious.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

Have you noticed a white waxy powder on vegetables, ornamentals and trees? If you look closely you will see small whiteflies in the powder-like material.

I have had lots of calls during the last two weeks about this con-

dition. This is caused by whiteflies. They have been found on young tender shoots of tomatoes, pepper, blackberries, roses, gardenias and pecans. The whitefly is about one-sixteenth inch in length, has four wings which, along with the dorsal part of the body, are covered with white waxy powder.

The whiteflies feed by sucking plant juices. Heavy feeding gives plants a mottled appearance or causes them to turn yellow and sometimes die.

Malathion or diazinon may be used to control the whiteflies. Two or more applications at weekly intervals may be necessary to eliminate the flies. Be sure to follow directions on the label and allow sufficient time between spray application and the harvest of vegetables or fruit.

Iron chlorosis has been prevalent on ornamentals, fruit trees, and St. Augustine lawns this summer. The leaves of the chlorotic plants range from light green to yellow to almost white. When iron is unavailable for plant use, chlorophyll fails to develop properly and plants have the yellow appearance. Iron chlorosis can be controlled with the use of iron sulfate (copper) or iron chelates. These materials may be applied to the soil or they may be sprayed on the plants. Spray applications of both sulfates and chelates may often be

more effective and give quicker results than soil applications. However, the effect will not normally be as long-lasting and repeat applications may be necessary if chlorosis re-appears.

I have a bulletin named "Iron Chlorosis," No. L-435 which tells how to apply the supplemental iron.

There has not been a confirmed case of screwworms in Hamilton County in over two years. However they are still having isolated outbreaks in South Texas. This is just a reminder that livestock men should still be on the alert for possible screwworms. Producers should continue to send in possible samples for identification.

About one or two samples of larvae are sent in from Hamilton County each month, but for the last two and one-half years the samples have been identified as non-screwworms. Occasionally someone will call in and report a case of screwworms to me after they have already killed the larvae. The eradication officials will not accept my report without a sample of larvae. If you should find a case of worms in a livestock wound, get a sample of about ten larvae and send them to Mission, Texas, or call and I will pick them up.

The recent rains were very beneficial to Hamilton County farms and ranches. The grain sorghum had been growing well, but was beginning to wilt before the rains came. With the moisture we now have the grain sorghums and hay crops should have it made. However moisture does not last long during this time of year so we will probably need more rain in three or four weeks.

We have had excellent grass growing conditions this year and the rain made it even better. But even when the moisture is adequate for good plant growth, it is hard to make range improvements with

a pasture full of mesquites using all the available moisture. When growth conditions are good, control all the brush possible. When woody plants begin to show wilting during the heat of the day then it is too dry. So now is the time to get after the mesquites if you have not already started.

Deferred grazing must be done following brush and weed control to realize most benefit from the control practice. If you plan to kill trees without a followup of other good range management practices you may be better off using your money for something else.

Weed control in areas where weeds are young and growing may be necessary. A heavy crop of annual weeds can offer lots of competition to grasses. If there are 5 annual broomweeds per square yard, then weed spraying would be advisable. The five weeds will about shade all the square yard during the growing season. Mechanical weed control may be best if the pasture is near cotton or other crops susceptible to 2,4-D.

Now that we have good moisture temporary pastures should be used to relieve grazing pressures on native grasslands.

### 31 People Will Die in Traffic Accidents During 4th Holiday

Austin, June 29—Spl.—The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today reported that DPS estimates indicate that 31 persons will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Fourth of July holiday and cited incidents from last year's Independence Day holiday as examples of how these mishaps might occur.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, said the estimate was compiled by the DPS Statistical Service on the basis of past experience and the current trend of traffic deaths. Last year, 28 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents during the holiday period.

"On the first day of last year's

holiday period," Garrison said, "a speeding driver lost control of his car and struck a guard rail. His car flipped high into the air and landed upside down. A passenger was killed."

"In another accident, a car pulled from a country road onto a major highway, directly into the path of an oncoming truck. The truck skidded 134 feet but couldn't stop in time. The driver was killed."

"In still a third fatal accident, one car attempted to pass another on the right hand side. The car in front moved to the right, causing the passer to swerve, lose control and overturn. One person was killed and one injured."

"Our files contain the details of each tragedy," he continued, "and each of them is made even more tragic by the fact that, with proper awareness, they could have possibly been avoided."

Garrison pointed out that the responsibility for avoiding an accident rests with each individual driver.

"Most drivers are basically good drivers," he said. "But too often even the best driver lets his attention wander . . . and lack of attention to one's driving can be a fatal fault. For instance, last year one man was driving a car with five children as passengers. He entered a curve too fast, hit his brakes and lost control of his car. The vehicle overturned, killing one of the children."

To focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel and the need for awareness while driving,

the DPS will conduct "Operation Motorcade" during the holiday period. From 12:01 a.m. Saturday, July 2, through 11:59 p.m. Monday, July 4, traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the Department and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the motoring public.

If each driver will assume an attitude of watchfulness and aware-

ness toward the actions of other drivers," Garrison said, "the total number of accidents can be materially reduced. Paying attention could well make the difference of a split-second between a near-miss and a fatal crash."

As a part of the DPS's operation, calling for maximum enforcement and public support, additional personnel from other uniformed services of the DPS will augment the

regular Highway Patrol force.

In addition, Garrison added, numerous agencies, organizations and individuals will help in the coordinated program to cut down on traffic accidents by taking part in the "Operation Motorcade."

The Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transportation Association will conduct a "Holiday Road Patrol" in which a fleet of 35 to 40 cars

will be used over the state to stranded motorists, thus relieving highway patrolmen for emergency work.

The Texas Safety Association stresses the need for awareness, acceptance of responsibility on the road, and will coordinate local city council holiday safety programs calling for cooperation with enforcement officials to cut on the number of traffic deaths.

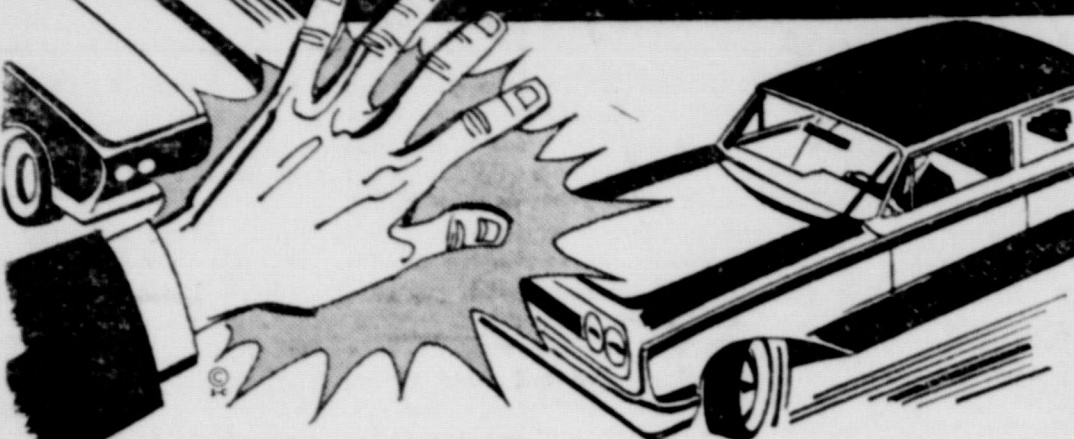
