1966 School Calendar Is Released

School calendar for the 1966-67 was released this week by O. C. Cook following adoption in a board meeting held last night. School will start on August 29, following the following schedule of holidays: Labor Day, September 3; Thanksgiving, Nov. 24 and 25; Christmas, Dec. 23 thru Jan. 2; Teacher's Meeting, March 10; Easter, March 24. School will close on May 19 provided no time is lost for bad weather or an illness epidemic.

Hamilton County Farm Tour will hold Saturday, July 16. The tour will leave from the west side of square at 8:30 a.m., with Hamilton Young Farmers Chapter arranging for transportation. The tour is being jointly sponsored by Hamilton Young Farmers, Conservation Service, Farm-Home Administration, Extension Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, and Hamilton-Coryell SCD. The Hamilton Equipment Company will provide a chicken barbecue lunch, free to all making the

Holladay Dairy Herd Produces Two More Outstanding Cows

Dairy cows in area herds have been credited with recently completed lactations under official production testing rules of Holstein-Friesian Association of America. These registered Holsteins and their actual performance records are:

Tidy Burke Lolita 5084171, a five-year-old produced 14,850 pounds of milk and 519 pounds of butterfat in 305 days. Bosque Aristocrat Mable 5087175, a five-year-old had 15,440 pounds of milk and 518 pounds of butterfat in 305 days.

Both cows are owned by G. E. Holladay of Hico.

These new production figures may be compared to the estimated annual output of 7,880 pounds of milk and 285 pounds of butterfat by the average U.S. dairy cow, notes the national Holstein Association.

Texas A&M University supervised the sampling, weighing and testing operations in cooperation with the Holstein organization's herd and breed improvement programs.

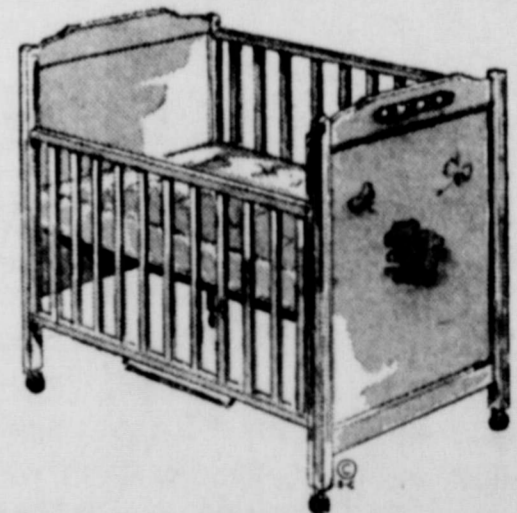

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By DeMARQUIS GORDON

You will want to be sure to remember the annual Hamilton County Farm and Ranch Tour July 16. The grass is greener and the crops look better than they usually do at this time of year. We will see some good range land and good crops on this tour. Livestock are also in good condition this year. The barbecue chicken dinner prepared by Claude Gautier and L. W. Little for the tour guests will be a real treat, so don't miss this opportunity. The tour starts at 8:30 a.m. on the courthouse square in Hamilton.

We hope to have time to emphasize the importance of cattle grub control while on the tour. Beef cattle producers and dairy-

men often fail to notice the hidden damage inflicted by cattle grubs. These losses begin when heel flies attach their eggs to cattle and continue through the period when the grubs appear as lumps in the back. Grub losses can be reduced with timely applications of any one of several recommended systemic insecticides. The insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and carried to the site where the grubs occur.

Since only one application is necessary, proper timing is all important. Early applications of systemic insecticides are considerable safer and more effective than later ones. The best job will be done when applications are made between May 1 and Sept. 1.

The systemic insecticides come in several forms. They may be purchased as sprays. If this is used the animals should be thoroughly wet with the spray solution. It takes about one gallon for mature cattle while smaller animals require 1 to 3 quarts. One of the most used methods of applying the systemic is the ready-mixed pour-on. If Co-Ral is used it takes one-half fluid oz. per 100 pounds of body weight up to a maximum of 4 ounces per animal. This is poured evenly along the animal's back. Ruelene 8R is also sold as a ready-mix pour-on. Apply Ruelene 8R at the rate of 1 fluid oz. per 100 pounds of body weight up to 8 oz. maximum per animal.

A third method of grub control is by feeding the systemics to the animals. These may be fed free-choice in the block or granular form. A granular form may also be mixed in feed for animals in the feed lot.

There are restrictions on the use of the systemics on certain animals. I suggest you get a "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" from my office.

If every cattleman in Hamilton County controlled cattle grubs this year there would be very few next year because the mature form of the grubs, the heel fly, travels only a short distance.

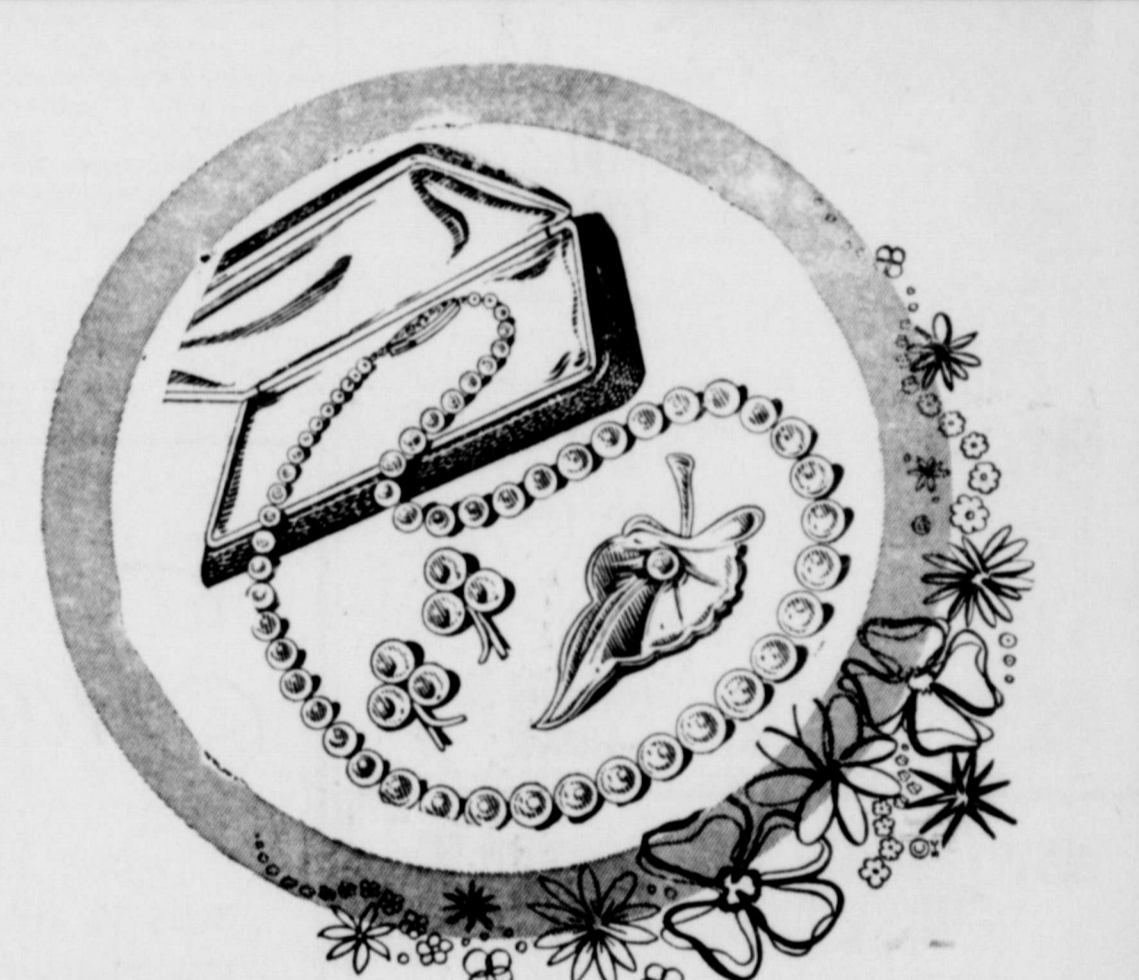

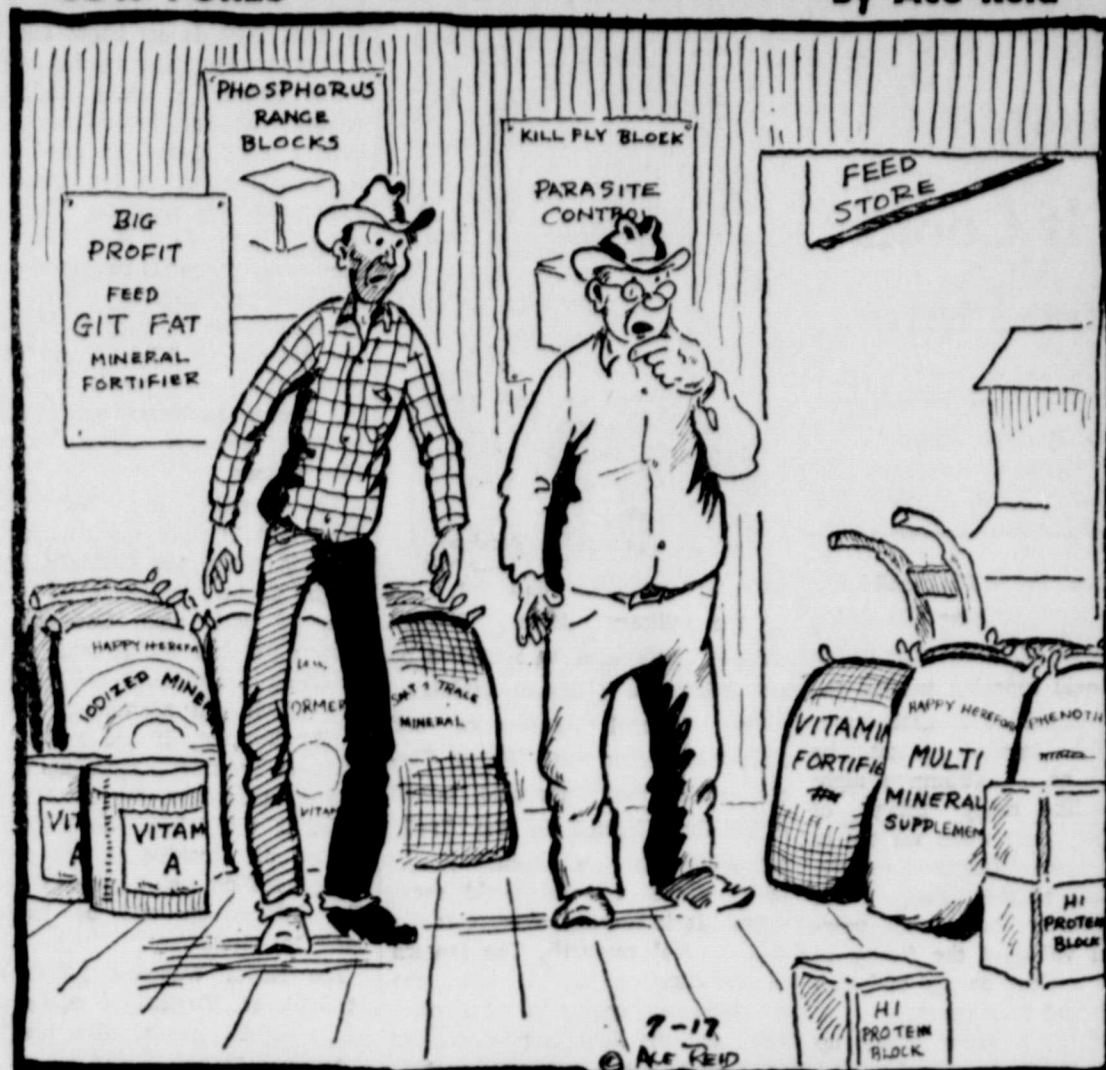

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—What child has not had fun catching lightning bugs but experienced disappointment the next morning to find the brilliance turned to a drab gray.

Meaningful lessons might be drawn such as a midsummer night dream or like many things of beauty which fade when we try to imprison them or look too closely.

The object of this essay is not one of philosophy but on the uniqueness and value of the firefly in this day of nuclear energy and rapid scientific advancements.

Scientists have never come up with an explanation as to how the firefly produces his cold light. It remains a mystery—just as it was to us as children.

To relate the insect's usefulness to science somewhat degrades the romantic legend of Latin American ladies wearing little lamps in their

hair for ornaments and the story of the military doctor, William Gorgas, performing an operation by the light of a bottle of fireflies.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Flight Center at Greenbelt, Maryland, is not especially interested in the firefly as yielding a soft summer magic which makes all the world seem young. It is interested in scientific and medical research. The lantern in the firefly's tail is what the scientists are trying to figure out.

They say the light is produced by combining something called adenosine triphosphate (referred to as ATP) with chemicals in its tail. Evidently, this is quite a trick.

It seems man can turn out ATP, a basic protein of life converted into energy, but he fails to turn it into light as a firefly can. How it

is done, they do not know, and the firefly's secret remains its own.

The reason a firefly collecting company in New Jersey pays children a cent apiece for fireflies is to furnish them to the Greenbelt Laboratory for research. The reason of the research is to determine the action of ATP in red blood cells. As it is understood by the layman, the firefly can be used to measure the amount of ATP in red blood cells, which may result in detecting energy problems and possibly produce answers about diseases like cancer.

The scientists say that where there is ATP there is earth-like life. That is where the Goddard Space Flight Center comes in. Late this year or early next, Goddard will launch its first rocket with a life-detection instrument (called firefly) which will contain extract of firefly lanterns. If the rocket encounters live micro-organisms in the upper atmosphere, the extract will glow. It will trigger an electronic system so sensitive it can detect one-quadrillionth of a gram of ATP. The information will be radioed back to earth.

The Naval Weapons Laboratory at Dahlgren, Virginia, a sophisticated scientists center, also ponders space age problems and is calling for 25,000 fireflies for a study of their light-producing materials. The Center also offers a dollar a hundred for fireflies.

Understandably there is a concern that pesticides will eradicate the lightning bug, as well as the mosquito and other undesirable insects. And, too, it looks as if insects and bugs may not only be sterilized under the method used for the eradication of the screw-worm but will be deafened too. Experiments with certain sun waves at a continuous low hum destroyed 75 percent of moth eggs, and of those which hatched, half died the first day. Adults lived a shorter life. It is sort of comforting to know there are still things the scientists cannot figure out and that they have to run for help to small boys and small bugs.
