## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

My wife, young son and I are happy to be in Hamilton County. We have been very cordially welcomed into the community and appreciate this very much. I would like to ask that you stop the County Agent's office next time you are in Hamilton and have a few minutes to spare where we can get acquainted.

I am a native of neighboring Comal County where I lived on a ranch farm until going to Texas A&M in 1957. After graduating from A&M in 1961 with a degree in Agronomy I trained in Lynn County for seven months with the Extension Service until my wife, Shirley, and I went to Germany on a two-year tour with the Army from 1962-64. Upon returning to Texas in 1964 I rejoined the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Hamilton County, working with one of the best and widely known County Agents in the State, J. M. Cooper. I worked with Cooper for two and a half years before being appointed County Agent in Hamilton County.

I am looking forward to working with everyone in Hamilton County please help me by helping me get acquainted.

It's time to begin preparing for winter temporary pastures. Winter temporary pastures are about the only dependable source of green grazing in the late fall, winter and early spring.

A soil test is the best way to determine how much fertilizer your soil needs. Then, proper seed bed preparation is essential to getting a good stand.

What do you want to plant? Some possibilities are: oats, rye, barley, wheat, ryegrass and legumes such as clover or vetch. Planting more than one variety of small grain is a good practice when maximum grazing is needed. Adapted early types such as Elbon and Gator rye, Goliad barley and Armo-X oats may provide grazing for six weeks earlier than cold-resistant winter types, but these early grazers may not last through the winter.

It's particularly important that small grains become well established before being grazed. Texas A&M research shows grazing oats and small grains too early and keeping them grazed too closely can reduce forage production as much as 70-80 percent. None of the small grains will produce well if grazed closely.

Before selecting a variety to plant, check its susceptibility to rust and stem rust in this area.

They nipped P. W. Hamilton and S. J. Cheek by a single stroke to win first. Runnersup in the championship flight was Howard Burtshell and Edd Brooks of Stephenville, who fired an even par 72.

Two rare "firsts" were recorded during the tournament, with a hole-in-one and a two under par eagle being scored. Steve Parks made the hole in one on number 8, and Edd Brooks of Stephenville knocked in his second shot on number five for the eagle.

## Garl C. Wright, 90, Intombed in Fort Worth Mausoleum

Garl C. Wright passed away Thursday, Sept. 1 at 11:30 a.m. at Hico City Hospital following a short illness. He was almost 91 years of age.

Mr. Wright was born in Caldwell County on September 24, 1875, and later moved with his parents, the late William King and Maggie McLemore Wright, to Carlton, where he was married to Wennie Pettis Scott on April 23, 1899. To this union was born 10 children, seven of whom survive.

He lived on a farm near Carlton until December 15, 1944, at which time he and Mrs. Wright moved to Hico, where they resided at the time of his death. He was a member of First Baptist Church, and had previously served as a deacon and Sunday School Superintendent for many years in Carlton Baptist Church.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock in Hico First Baptist Church, with Dr. A. J. Quinn of Brownwood officiating. Intombment was Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock in Greenwood Cemetery Mausoleum, Fort Worth.

Mr. Wright is survived by his wife; four sons, Herman K. Wright of San Diego, Calif., W. Vernon Wright and G. C. Wright Jr. of Dallas and Ray G. ## Battle of Bengals Feature In Grid Season Opener Friday Night at Glen Rose

Hico lifts the lid on the 1966 grid campaign this Friday night, meeting former opponent Glen Rose in an 8 p.m. contest to be played at Glen Rose. The game will be the first meeting of the two teams since 1963, a game which Glen Rose won 14-6.

Both teams will have four weeks of practice, and a couple of scrimmage sessions under their belts when the whistle blows, and the two elevens are reportedly about even in manpower and ability. Glen Rose plays in the tough

Class A district with Clifton, Valley Mills, Meridian, Whitney and Itasca, and Hico is a Class B school seeking better fortunes this year in a new district. The Glen Rose Tigers are rated third in their district, the same as Hico, and have been tabbed the darkhorse in some quarters.

In the last scrimmage session Friday night with Meridian, the Tiger offense warmed up somewhat over the previous week, but still lacked the consistency to become a winner. The Tigers broke

even with Meridian and Itasca in the pre-season scrimmages, and gained much valuable experience in the contests.

Hico coaching staff, still experimenting in the Friday scrimmage, threw a single wing type attack at the visitors, and the Tigers ate up great chunks of yardage most of the night. Their score came on a perfectly executed pass from Dwain Gray to Gary White. In a turn-about move, Meridian tacked on their only score via the pass route.

Defensively, the Tigers looked sharp, and limited Meridian to very little yardage during the contest.

But this week, the play is for real, and the coaching staff is expecting a good, tight game between the two Tiger elevens. A large crowd is expected to go to Glen Rose from Hico.

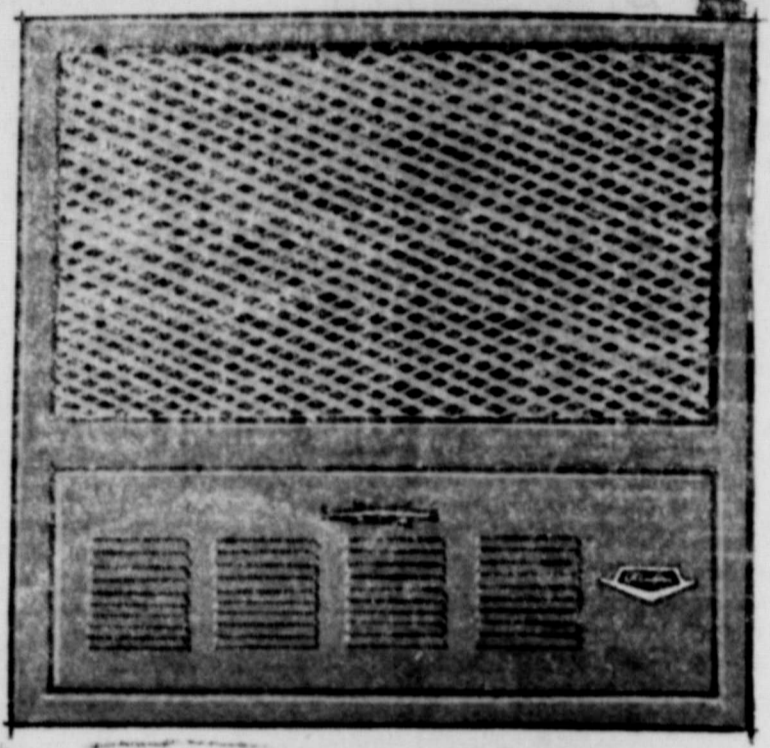

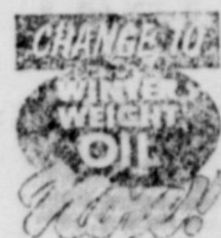

with fresh suds until no more polish comes off, then rinse with clean sponge wrung out of clear water and allow to dry thoroughly before applying a new coat of white polish. It is wise to stuff shoes before washing, either with tissue or clean rags, to catch drips which may occur even though you squeeze out the sponge before use.

Loungewear slippers or boots made of terrycloth or other cotton fabrics, with crepe rubber or plastic soles, are safely hand-washable. Just squeeze them through warm soap or detergent suds and rinse. Squeeze out excess moisture after the last rinse, pull them to shape, and stuff them with tissue paper to dry.

To make car windows, headlights, tail lights, and mirror sparkle, wash them with hot soap or detergent suds containing a few drops of ammonia. Spread this latter over the glass to soak away stains, then rinse suds and soil off together.

The label on a food package is the window through which a consumer "sees" inside the package. You may find a full list of ingredients, or there may be no list of ingredients if the manufacturers use a standard recipe. Manufacturers may include only a partial ingredient list if they use a standard recipe, along with the addition of some other ingredients. It's a good idea to check the ingredient of even familiar products frequently to determine the nutritive value and comparative costs of the food.

Like all other parts of the wardrobe, footwear benefits from good care. If shoes, play shoes, leisure slippers, and sneakers are kept in good cleanliness condition, they will last longer, hold their shape better, be more comfortable—and are less likely to develop a clinging odor of perspiration.

Never dry leather in bright sunshine, or near any source of heat. Don't let a thick layer of polish build up on white leather shoes. Instead, occasionally use a sponge dipped in thick soap or detergent suds to wash white leather. Repeat



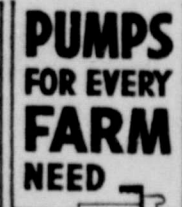

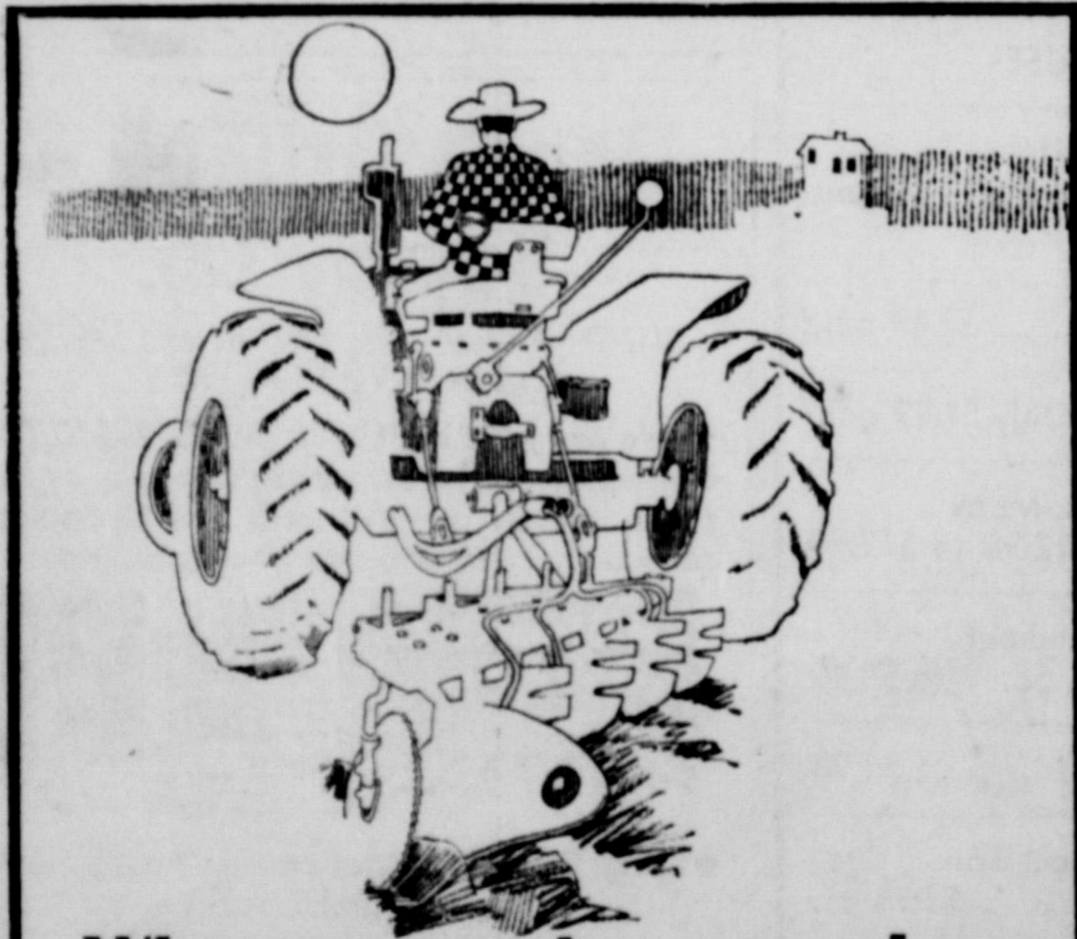

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### As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—With his consent to pass it on to you, the following was written by Congressman Bob Poage to his constituents:

"Washington is full of financial doctors with all kinds of tonics, herbs, and even dried bats and shrunken heads, all guaranteed to cure our problems of high interest rates and declining buying power of our money (inflation). All of these 'doctors' can tell us what is the matter, but I am afraid that many of the suggested cures will but make matters worse.

"I don't have any patent medicine to sell, but I think that I do realize that we have to produce more than we spend. To do this at least most of us have to work. A man who is not working is not producing whether he is on strike or whether he is in the hospital. A man who is living on government help is not adding to our national income whether he is a retired Congressman or a Youth Corps trainee. We can do a great deal to help individuals, and I am glad that we have been able to do as much as we have, but I wonder if we should not give consideration to getting more people to work in constructive jobs. That is the way both Germany and Japan came back after the war. They have both greatly increased their living standards (actually faster than we have) but they have worked at it.

"I sometimes feel that we are making a great mistake to deny our young people the simple opportunity to hold a job. In our proper desire to eliminate the old sweat shop—the long hours of child labor and the like we may have gone so far that too many of our boys and girls are denied any opportunity to work until they have grown up. It is then too late for most of us to acquire work habits.

"I rather like the old doggerel which was going the rounds when I was a boy: 'I ain't no teamster, I ain't no teamster's son, but I can skin those mules till the teamster comes,' and the more dignified song, 'Work for the night is coming, when man works no more.' While I am philosophizing, which I shouldn't do, it seems to me to be very clear that a whole lot of our recent demonstrations and

riots have been supported by a group of people who 'toil not, neither do they spin.' It was always disturbing to me that the very people who are most likely to be found out in front of these mobs seeking to tear down our own government and trying to encourage the Communists anywhere in the world are so often the very people who have received the most at the hands of Uncle Sam. I know of no obligation we have to support these people who would destroy our government.

"I recall a little verse I used thirty years ago as still expressing my views of the obligation of the government to help. It went like this: 'Jobs for those who want work, Help for those who can't work, Hell for those who won't work.'
