

Title VI of the 1964 Act gives broad powers to any Agency of the Federal Government which approves funds in support of state and local programs. Local Administrators who fail to comply with directives called "guidelines" in

COUNTY **AGENT**

Hamilton County cotton farmers are having their problems once again. If it isn't insects or drought but it's too much rain at the wrong time. Recent heavy rains have been welcomed by almost everyone with the exceptions of the cotton farmers and the football en-

With farm labor becoming more difficult to find every year, the farmer is turning more and more to mechanical harvesting. This mechanization does not solve all of the farmers' harvesting problems, in fact it creates new ones. Practically all mechanical harvesting in this area is done with a cotton stripper. To use this machine the cotton stalks must be defoliated and this is one of the problems now, with other problems being wet fields and lower cotton grades due to recent rains.

The way things look now, quite a lot of cotton may stay in the fields until after frost. With the abundant moisture we have in most secions of the county contributing to a renewed growth of the cotton stalks it is going to be difficult to get a good leaf kill, and even if this is possible the green bolls produced by the "top crop" may present a problem.

What to do? There are several choices-hand pulling if labor is available, wait until after frost and machine harvest, or if rains hold for a while use a defoliant or dessicant and hope to get through before it rains again, or regrowth occurs. The answer to these problems will not be the same for ev-

Farmers in this area are using fertilizer as never before. Much is being used on small grains this fall and it is the planning for next years crop as well.

The kinds and amounts of fertilizer used should be based on the fertility level of the soil and its production potential. The best metility is a soil test. Test results provide an index of the nitrogen, phorporus, and potassium in the soil and this in turn is the basis for nutrients to be added.

Unless you have your soil tested you may not be getting maximum returns for your fertilizer dollar. Start planning now for next year by getting your soil analized. I have a good supply of soil testing cartons in my office and I will be glad to discuss the procedure

Not only will farmers be planting it for grain purposes-but in many cases for a winter temporary pasture. Wheat makes excellent winter pasture when grazed while it's still young. Wheat ranks second only to oats in palatability, and it is more drouth resistant and cold hardy than oats. Some of the locally adapted wheat varieties are Caddo. Crockett and Quanah.

When should you apply fertilizer to wheat? There are three main choices: (1) applying all fertilizer before planting. (2) applying half before planting and the other half top dressed in the early spring, or (3) all top dressed in early spring.

If you plan to graze the wheat, least a good part of the nitrogen before planting. But note: excessive fall applications of nitrogen particularly if the plants are not grazed. Also some nitrogen may ticularly in sandy soils.
