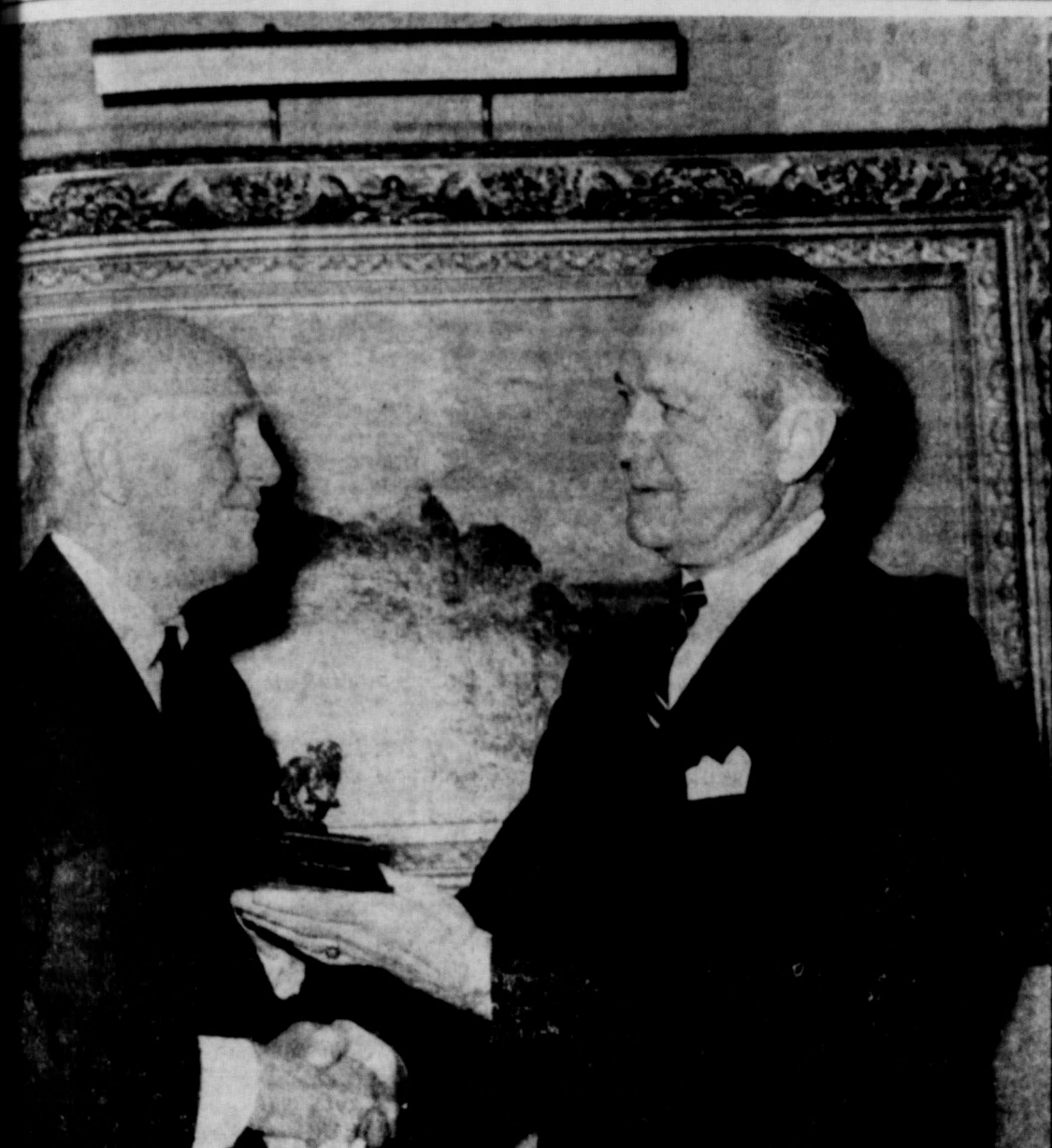

Hico runs into its largest foe of the season Saturday night at 7:30, when Reisel comes to Hico for the local homecoming game.

Scouting reports show that the visitors are big, and apparently skilled, as they were rated No. 10 Class B school in Central Texas last week. Their rating was expected to advance this week as they knocked off the number 5 rated team last week.

Hico coaches are optimistic about the game, and said that all Tiger team members would be ready to go. Dennis Polk received a bruised knee but was expected to be ready.

This will be the first meeting between Hico and Reisel, and a real good contest is expected. Fans are asked not to forget the 7:30 p.m. date Saturday night.

Hico School Homecoming, scheduled for Saturday night, October 15, is expected to draw a large number of ex-students from the local area as well as from out of town. All former students will be given an opportunity to sign the Exe's register, and will be given a ribbon signifying they are ex-students. They will register at the entrance to the football field.

The 1956 graduating class will be honored. First activity of the day will be a "Remember When" party at the homemaking cottage for members of the 1956 class, beginning at 6 p.m. Hico faculty

members will be present to welcome the group.

Following the party, the group will sit in a special reserved section at the stadium for the football game between Hico and Reisel. Game time will be 7:30. The senior members of the 1956 football team will be special guests of the 1966 Tiger team and be seated on the sidelines.

During the halftime ceremonies, the Mrs. Farrell Murray of Austin will be presented as Coming Home Queen. Mrs. Murray, a 1956 graduate, is the former Jean Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. C. Clark of Hico. Mrs. Murray was all-school favorite her senior year.

Tigers Dampen Lometa Homecoming 27-12

A real strong defensive showing, plus the hard running of Barry Polk and the quick-hitting plays executed so well by Howard Strader led to Hico's second win in four outings last Friday night as the Tigers acted as spoilers in dumping the Lometa Hornets 27-12. It was homecoming for Lometa, but the exes were treated rather badly by the visiting Tigers.

The opportunist Tigers used the strong defense and an ability to capitalize on several breaks to post the win. The defense contained the Hornets in situations that really counted, and gave up the two touchdowns when the game was already settled.

The game turned out to be a proving ground for the Tigers, as stellar quarterback Dwain Gray was hobbled with a knee injury, and called his own number only a couple of times. It proved that the Tigers have other "hosses" to depend on, with Barry Polk, Gary White and Howard Strader turning in fine performances.

The Tigers put together a 68-yard march in the first quarter to go

ahead 7-0. Polk got the first TD with a one-yard smash, and Joe Tooley kicked his first of three successful conversions. The TD was set up when Gray handed off to Strader on a quick-opener, and the little man broke through for 40 yards to the four. Two running plays netted three yards to the one, and Polk rammed over on his third try.

The second quarter was one of mistakes on the part of both teams, with Hico losing the ball once on a fumble and once on a pass interception. On the other side, the Tigers swiped two of Lometa's passes to break even in the error department. White and Polk were credited with the Tiger interceptions.

The play that really took the sting out of the Hornets was the second half kickoff. White gathered the ball in at the 21 and set sail 79 yards for the icing on the cake. White bulled out to about the 40, picked up a couple of blockers, and out-raced the Hornets to the goal. Tooley made sevens out of sixes and the Tigers had enough points on the board to win the

game.

The Tigers put the game away midway of that period as Polk came up with another interception and raced 55 yards to paydirt. Tooley was again true with his kick and Hico was out front 21-0.

Lometa took an attempted outside kick 49 yards for their first score of the night. They used only three plays to cover the distance, with hotshot Allen Shelton city-slicking the Tigers for the last 11 yards. They went for two on the conversion, but the Tiger defence shut them out, leaving the score 21-6.

The Tigers really wrapped up the game on their next drive, starting late in the third quarter. Hico used a steady running game to use up all but four minutes of the final period to score their fourth TD of the night. Tooley got his first 6-pointer of the year with a one-yard blast, upping the score to 27-6 with 4:14 left in the game.

Lometa's last TD came after a fumble recovery at the Tiger 11 with 55 seconds remaining in the game. The Hornets passed 8 yards for the marker, leaving 23 seconds on the clock.



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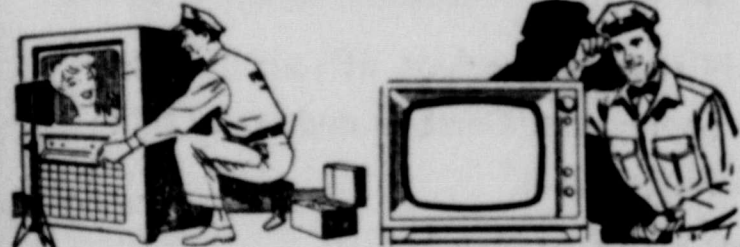

On the Home Range

Before you or someone in your family wears a new garment, check it over. "Strengthen any weak spots and correct any manufacturing errors that might cause trouble later." Often there are faults that catch your attention at once, while other flaws may not be so obvious.

A few well-placed stitches and repairs when the garment is new will help you get the best possible service from your purchase.

Points to check include stitching seams which may be too narrow, seams that are often loosely put in with a stitch that ravel, binding edges, belt loops, pocket corners, plaquets, underarm gussets, pleats, buttonholes and fastenings. The time to reinforce garments is before wearing them.

Narrow or loosely stitched seams pull out easily when wearing or washing. Strengthen first by machine-stitching a seam about one-sixteenth inch deeper than the original seam. A second row of stitching near the cut edge or zig-zag stitching along the edge helps prevent fraying or raveling.

It's a good idea to reinforce underarm seams of raglan or kimono sleeves. This can be done by pressing the seam flat when basting and stitching narrow tape on top, stitching on the seam line. Pull all loose threads to the inside of the

garment and tie securely. To reinforce pocket corners, stitch a narrow tape to the underside of the pockets in line with the corners.

Rework weak or frayed buttonholes. Sew on loose buttons, snaps, hooks and eyes. Check belt construction and reinforce eyelets in a belt with a buttonhole stitch.

Many new woolsens and wool blends are described as "washable" by fabric houses and stores, but not all can be washed by the same method. Read labels carefully because some specify "hand-washable only," while others say "completely washable" or "machine washable." One basic rule in laundering wools or wool blends is to use lukewarm soap or detergent suds and rinse water. Another is to avoid rubbing and agitation.

Flexible plastic freezer food containers are useful for storing all kinds of moist or dry foods in the refrigerator or kitchen cabinets. They're also practical because the lids fit tightly, they stack neatly to save space, and can be used over and over. To get such containers ready for re-use after removing the food, wash in warm soap or detergent suds—never use boiling water. Rinse and dry well, paying special attention to the cover groove to assure a tight seal.

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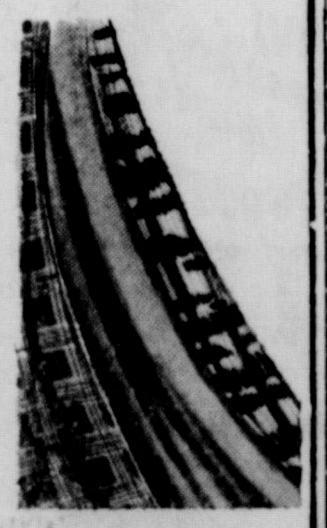

COUNTY AGENT

The Screwworm Eradication Program is in jeopardy and we need the cooperation of every livestock owner to make sure that Texas is not re-infested. This is without a doubt one of the finest programs ever, and now is no time to let up in our vigilance.

I have had word from the Screwworm Eradication officials that there has been a very noticeable increase in the number of confirmed screwworm cases in Texas. For the week of September 18 there were 48 confirmed cases reported from Texas in 22 different counties. This is more confirmed cases for a one-week period than has been reported since the last week in November 1963.

All livestock producers are urged to be especially watchful of possible screwworm cases and collect specimen worm samples and mail to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory in Mission, Texas.

Vials for submitting specimens to the Mission Laboratory can be obtained at the County Agent's Office on the second floor of the courthouse.

Weather conditions over much of the state have been a contributing factor in the recent screwworm buildup.

A large healthy tree is a valuable asset to any property. Premium prices are frequently paid for choice lots because of the presence of large trees on the property.

Hamilton Co. is certainly blessed with its share of beautiful trees, but some of the most valuable ones are going by the wayside.

Some of the losses are unavoidable, others however are due to carelessness or lack of knowledge about proper precautions required to protect trees when the soil around them must be disturbed. Addition or removal of soil around an established tree upsets the delicate balance between the soil and tree roots and can seriously injure or kill the trees.

Heavy traffic by trucks, cars, equipment and workers compact the soil in the root zone, constricting movement of water and air to the roots, thus weakening the tree. Any wound on a tree is an open invitation for insects or fungus to move in.

Construction requiring grade change to install curbs, gutters, drains, sewers, utilities, paving are often necessary and call for fills

around existing trees. Injury can be caused by such fills but vary with the soil type, age species and condition of the tree. When filling soil around an established, valuable tree is necessary you should consider ways to prevent injury.

If insects or diseases are a problem on your trees diagnostic help is available by sending samples to Texas A&M if the question can't be answered locally.
