Cases have also been reported in other nearby counties. This means that it is highly probable that there are screwworm flies in Ham-

Keep a close watch on your livestock for possible screwworm cases. Check purchased livestock carefully, be sure to apply fly repellant to all wounds, and most of all keep sending in suspected larvae samples. It is recognized by all connected with the screwworm eradication program that close surveillance of possible worm cases and reporting is the key to the continued success of the program. No other phase can have as much impact on either success or failure of the screwworm program than continuous, complete observation and reporting of the suspected cases.

It is extremely important that populations be eliminated in Texas this fall so that sterile fly releases can be concentrated across the border in Mexico early next spring. Efforts to push the screwworm fly populations south in Mexico are greatly hampered as long as a large percentage of the sterile fly production must be used to control scattered outbreaks in the U.S. Keep up your vigilance in the fight against this costly livestock pest. 



Deadline Near For Overseas Mailing to Service Personnel

November 10 has been designated deadline for mailing Christmas parcels and greeting cards to Armed Forces Personnel overseas. For air mail parcels and cards, the period is Dec. 1 to Dec. 10.

The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of armed forces and their families and authorized U.S. Civilian employees overseas who receive their mail through an APO.

Gift parcels weighing not more than five pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined and addressed to Armed Forces personnel in Viet Nam will be provided airlift service from San Francisco, even though prepaid at the surface rate.

All articles should be packaged in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong durable corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used when preparing packages for mailing.

A slip showing list of contents, and the name and address of sender and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Matches of all kinds and lighter fluid may not be mailed to overseas military addresses. Also cigarettes, other tobacco items, coffee and various other products are prohibited. More detailed information can be furnished by the local post office on use of customs declaration forms and prohibited articles to any person needing or desiring the infor-

Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pin and ink. All APO numbers have been changed to five digets which are identical to the Zip Code.
