Aunt Clara, Noted Artist Honored on 91st Birthday

There are plenty of ugly things in the world, but I won't paint them. I paint only of two things: beauty and truth."

That statement, Clara McDonald Williamson of Dallas, who was honored on her 91st birthday Sunday with an invitational reception at the Amon Carter Museum of Western Art, also sets the tone of the museum's retrospective exhibition and simultaneous publication of her work.

The exhibition was opened to the public Tuesday, and will continue through January 23.

Clara S. Vogel, Dallas art dealer, believes that Mrs. Williamson is not only "the best painter, internationally, living and working in Texas today," but also that what she terms her "memory scenes" are the most accurate being done in the state.

"I have that rare type of mind which has photographic memory. I can paint in an area no other painter has touched," he believes.

Though she has been called "the Mona Lisa of Texas," Vogel refers to the title, pointing out that Mrs. Williamson has her own style ("Most people call me Clara, anyway," Mrs. Williamson adds).

She, who with his wife Marjorie has written text for the book "Aunt Clara: The Paintings of Clara McDonald Williamson," published by the University of Texas under sponsorship of the Amon Carter Museum, cites the fact that Aunt Clara's paintings withstand tests for accuracy.

"Memory pictures" are most accurate, Vogel says. "I remember my girlhood in frontier Iredell, and Longhorn cattle were still considered wild, and Indians were still considered dangerous as they went through on their way to the west."

"I can identify everyone in the pictures—an aunt, sister, mother, cousin. She can name who is in every house. Her paintings are accurate even to the number of wheels in a wagon wheel," Vogel says.

"Aunt Clara is quite matter-of-fact in her photographic memory. Years ago she visited a son in New York and twice walked past the Chrysler Building. She can remember it. Her painting

of the scene was later reproduced full page in a national magazine. Later she flew to Baton Rouge for a visit. On departing, she managed to switch seats to view a bridge over the Mississippi "so I could photograph it with my mind."

Aunt Clara did not begin painting until after she became a widow in her late 60s. She and her husband had a small mercantile store in Oak Cliff, and the work kept her busy throughout her married life.

In 1943, when she was 68, she became a coed at Southern Methodist University, studying art. A short time later she met Vogel.

He was attracted immediately to her paintings when he saw her at work in a class at the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts. He recognized the purity of her primitive style. He also was intrigued by the way she—as he explained it—"paints from the top as if drawing a window shade." (When asked why, Aunt Clara had a simple explanation: "To keep my hands from getting in the paint.")

Occasionally, painting a scene of 80 years ago, she does have trouble remembering some details. "But if I put it up on the easel, and look at it for a while it will usually come to me," she adds.

Most of her pictures are painted on the dining room table. She sits in a straight-backed chair, her small stature raised to a comfortable level by a Bible of the proper thickness ("I need to be uplifted," Aunt Clara explains).

Her favorite time for painting is in the quiet of the evening. She often does not retire until midnight.

The "memory pictures" of Bosque County, showing details of picnics, camp meetings, square dances, outings, the interiors of homes, and the way Texans then worked, lived and played, are of special interest to students of the Texas frontier. Fellow painters are intrigued with the way she captures the soft, clear light of the Southwest in her work.

Although Aunt Clara paints of the past, she does not live in the past. ("They talk about the good old days, but I don't remember them as being so good," she has said. "Frontier life was hard, hard living.")

Tigers Close Football Season With 34-0 Romp Over Blanket

Hico's Tigers played cat and mouse with the Blanket Tigers last Friday night in the season football finale, using every man on the team in an easy 34-0 rout of the Blanket team. The win made the experts look good, with the local Tigers finishing district play in the third place slot previously picked for them. Bangs, No. 1 B team in West Texas, won the championship, with Gorman finishing second. Hico was followed in the final standings by May and Blanket.

The game found the locals unable to cash in on two scoring opportunities in the first quarter, relinquishing the ball at the Blanket 11 and 15 yard lines before scoring a safety after a bad Blanket center snap. The safety gave Hico a 2-0 lead at the end of the first quarter.

An 8-play, 90-yard march midway of the second period produced the first Tiger TD, with DWain Gray scoring his first of four TD's of the night on a 35-yard sweep. The run was made possible by a tremendous block by Barry Polk just past the line of scrimmage.

Gray also slid under a Blanket pass at the 10-yard line and rambled 90 yards for an apparent TD, but pass interference was called back at the 12, nullifying the long run. The score was 9-0 at halftime.

Howard Srader got the Tigers moving early in the third period, capping a 3-play march by break-

ing up the middle for 39 yards and the TD, hiking the score to 15-0.

Midway of the third quarter, Gray broke 57 yards on a punt return to place the score at 22-0 going into the final quarter.

A recovered fumble at the Blanket 48 late in the third period set up the Tigers' fourth TD of the evening. Gray capped the six-play drive by going 13 yards for the score on the first play in the fourth quarter.

Following the kickoff the Tigers held Blanket to three running plays to force the kick. On the first play Gray took a handoff from Joe Tooley and raced 79 yards for final TD, making the score 34-0.

Blanket threatened late in the game, but a hard-charging Tiger defense pushed them back from the 9 to the 30 yard line as the final gun sounded.

Season Wrap Up

The win gave the Tigers an overall 5-5 mark for the season, with a break-even 2-2 district slate.

A look at the season shows Hico losing to Glen Rose, Godley, Santa Anna, Gorman and Bangs, while winning from Stephenville, B. Lometa, Riesel, May and Blanket.

Glen Rose clobbered the Tigers 55-0 in the season-opener, and went on to an 8-2 record, winning the tough Class A district that Clifton usually dominates.

Godley, the second Tiger loss, finished with a 9-1 season record, losing only to perennial power Masonic Home of Fort Worth.

Santa Anna closed the season with a 9-1 record, losing only to Bangs, and copped the district championship by defeating state-power Goldthwaite.

Gorman finished the season with an 8-2 record and second place in the final district standings, and Bangs extended their win streak to 17 games by finishing the season with a perfect 10-0 mark.

In summation, the Tigers lost five games, but they look back and say they truly lost to the best.

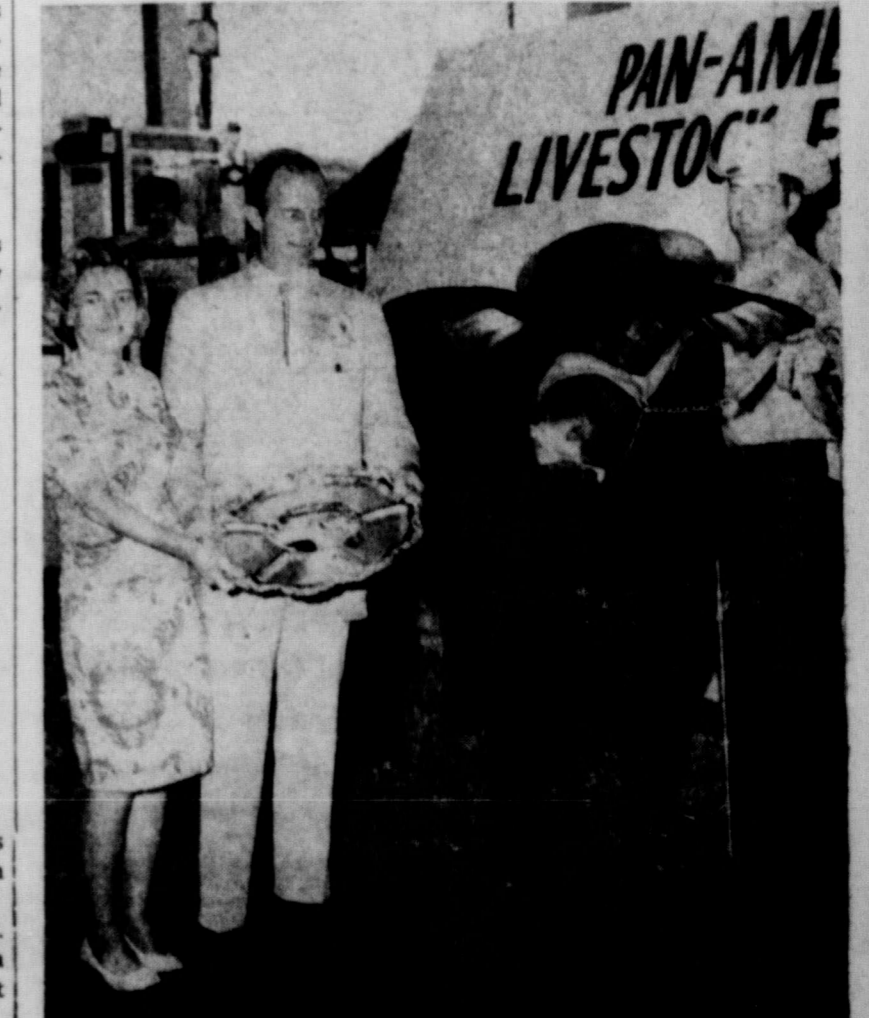
Buck Tales

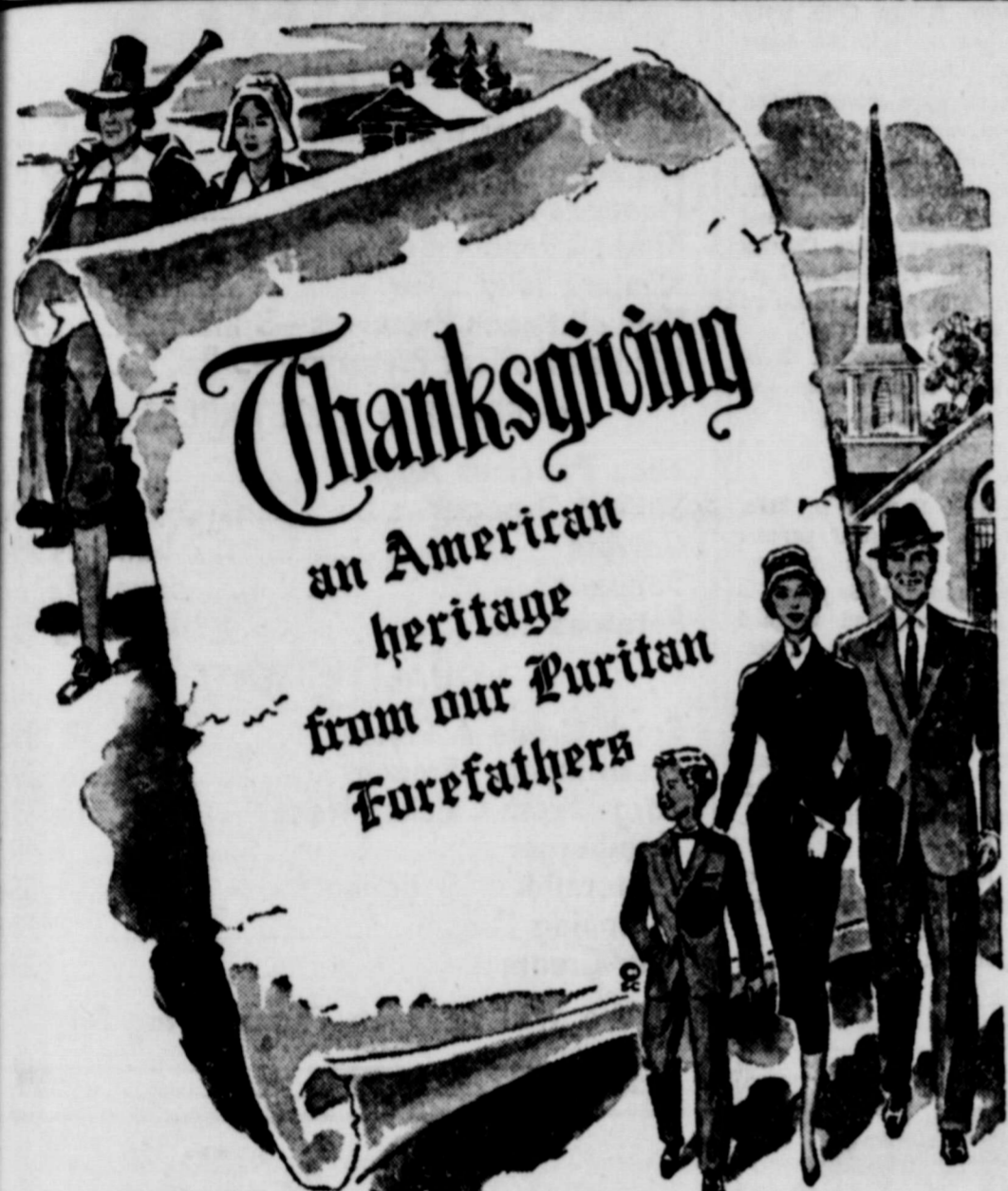

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

I attended a meeting on the Cotton Research and Promotion Act last Friday at the Heart of Texas Fairgrounds in Waco. I certainly wished that every cotton farmer in the county could have heard the explanation of this Act.

Some astonishing facts were brought out in the meeting. Dr. James Kirby, Extension Marketing and Policy Economist, said that \$70 million was spent last year for promotion of man-made fibers as compared to \$5 million spent to promote cotton. Also research expenditures by the man-made fiber industry last year was \$135 million compared with total cotton research funds of just over \$26 million.

He pointed out the Act provides for a \$1 a bale check-off for cotton growers—the money refundable by written request. The money would be used for research and promotion of cotton products. Cotton growers will vote in the referendum Dec. 5-9 to accept or reject the proposal.

Kirby gave the group several favoring and opposing points of view on the referendum. He said those who oppose the Research and Promotion Act say that legislation which forces cotton handlers to deduct one dollar per bale is a potentially dangerous policy and restricts a farmer's freedom of choice. He said those who support the Act say that the farmer can get a full refund of the dollar a bale if he does not wish to support the program. They say this gives the farmer a choice.

Kirby said those who oppose the Act say it gives too much authority to the Secretary of Agriculture. He said those who support the Act say the Secretary's authority would be much less than he has under some 30 other marketing programs that now involve research and promotion.

Since 1960 a research and promotion campaign has been carried on by the National Cotton Council. It has been financed by a one dollar a bale voluntary contribution by growers. Contributions last year amounted to \$2.5 million. If all growers had contributed one dollar a bale the total would have been about \$15 million for upland cotton. The Cotton Council has had problems of collecting funds, an irregular income, and disproportionate contributions.

Kirby told the group, "The decision you make in the referendum requires an answer to two basic questions.

"First, do you think research and promotion aimed at increasing the sale of your cotton is the proper method to use to get a greater share of the fiber market?"

"Second, if you believe increased emphasis on research and promotion will benefit cotton sales, then is the organization of cotton producers as proposed in the Cotton Research and Promotion Act acceptable to you as a way to raise the money?"

Purpose of the Waco meeting was entirely educational—not to say whether the proposed check-off is good or bad—but to present the facts and let growers make their own decision.

I have literature, available to you, in my office further explaining the Cotton Research and Promotion Act.

On the Home Range

Cranberries are on the market now in good supply and at reasonable prices. This year's cranberry crop is reported to be 20 percent larger than average. High quality berries will be plump, firm and dry. Soft or shriveled berries and those with a dull appearance most likely have passed their prime. Cranberries vary in size, shape and color, depending upon the variety. Sort cranberries at home without washing them. Remove any

over-ripe or poor berries. Cranberries will keep several days in the refrigerator and in vapor-moisture proof containers in the freezer for several months.

Dinner clean-ups will be easier if pans and skillets are filled with soap or detergent suds as soon as possible. While you serve the meal, let these utensils soak to loosen grease and food particles. Later, wash them thoroughly in clean hot

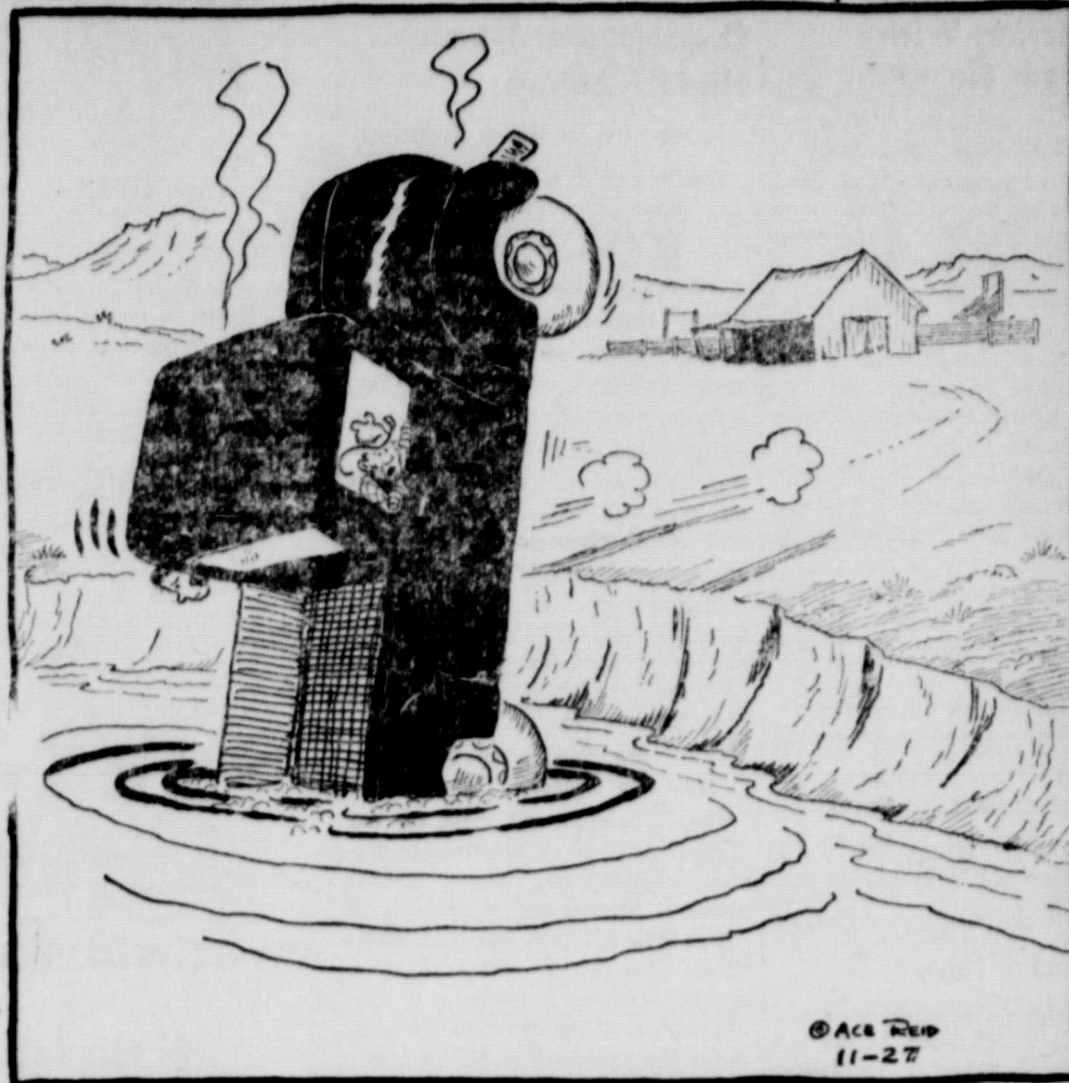
