New Governing Rules For Youth Center Set By Committee

The Hico Youth Center Committee met Wednesday of last week to set up new rules and regulations for use of the center. Committee members are Jimmie Ramage, Mrs. Sonny Christian, Mrs. E. V. Meador, Carolyn Wootton and Steve Knudson.

New rules adopted are as follows:
No smoking, drinking, or improper conduct in Center or on premises.

Sponsors will be responsible at activities. There must be at least two couples, man and wife, as sponsors and their duties will be to collect rental fee and see that center is in clean and neat condition following parties.

Rental fee for charge dances will be 25 percent of door collection, to be collected by sponsors night of dance. Money will go into a fund for Youth Center improvements.

Membership will be restricted to Hico High students, young ex-Hico High students, and students from trade territory communities including Carleton, Ireddell, Duffau, Fairy and Clairette.

Parties may only be attended by members holding membership cards and their guests who may accompany them. If member is guilty of misconduct their cards will be taken and they cannot get them back until they appear before the Student Council; a member is also held responsible for their guests' conduct and their membership will be revoked also if their guests misbehave.

Fee to be charged must be approved by person in charge of Youth Center rental. James Cryer is now appointed in charge of all rentals.

Any action needed to be taken on Youth Center affairs shall be handled by the Hico Student Council.

Inspirational Program Given At P-TA Meet by Mrs. Tatum

Hico Parent-Teacher Association met Monday evening. Mr. James Cryer, president, called the meeting to order, and Mrs. O. C. Cook led the group in singing "Silent Night," accompanied by Mrs. Avo Rutledge at the piano. Mr. Robert Jackson voiced the opening invocation.

The room program was presented by Mrs. Berniece Jackson's first grade class. Kerry Lynn Noble introduced the play, "Santa's Magic Touch." First graders dressed in Christmas costumes, presented the skit and sang Christmas songs.

Room count was won by the first grade in elementary school and the ninth grade in high school.

Mrs. J. C. Braune, program chairman, introduced the speaker for the evening, Mrs. Robert E. Tatum, wife of the pastor of Hico First Baptist Church.

"Who Are the Disadvantaged and Why?" was Mrs. Tatum's topic. She stated that she felt that home life was the center of each child's life. She reminded parents that their children are what they make

them. Children are born to parents helpless infants and leave their home environment as grown men and women. Mrs. Tatum cautioned parents that every influence a child has makes him an adult—whether it be good or bad. "Children are copy-cats," reminded the speaker. "They mimic their parents' way of living, language, habits, posture, and ambitions." She encouraged parents to let children be children, not push them into being grownup too soon, and to not rush children. Mrs. Tatum stated that parents need courage to hold the world's pressures from their children.

In closing, Mrs. Tatum challenged parents and teachers to listen to children; let them do the talking; and place honesty as one of life's most important goals. She encouraged parents to make plans for their family including love, good will, and earnest concern as their major goals. As Christmas approaches, she suggested that not try to buy their children's love with material things—rather give of themselves to their children.

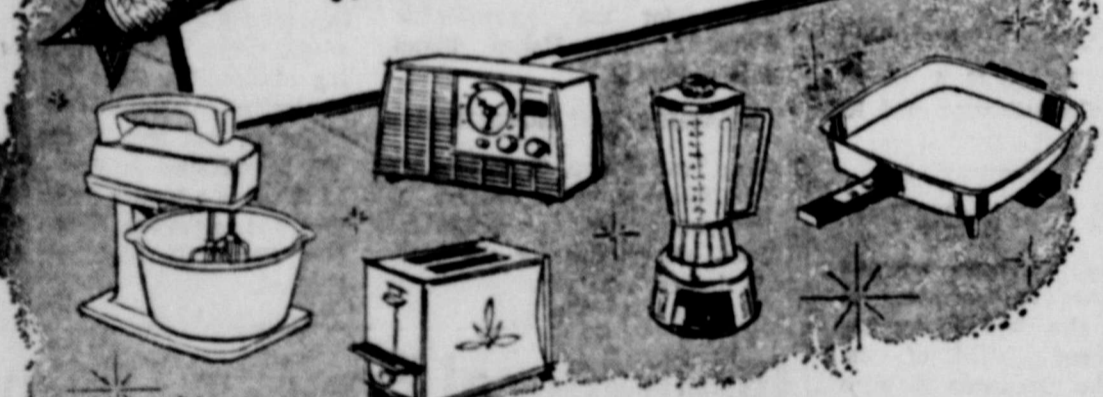

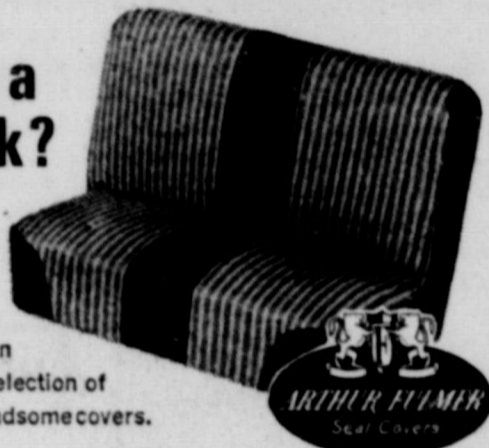
