Christmas Cantata Slated December 18 At Baptist Church

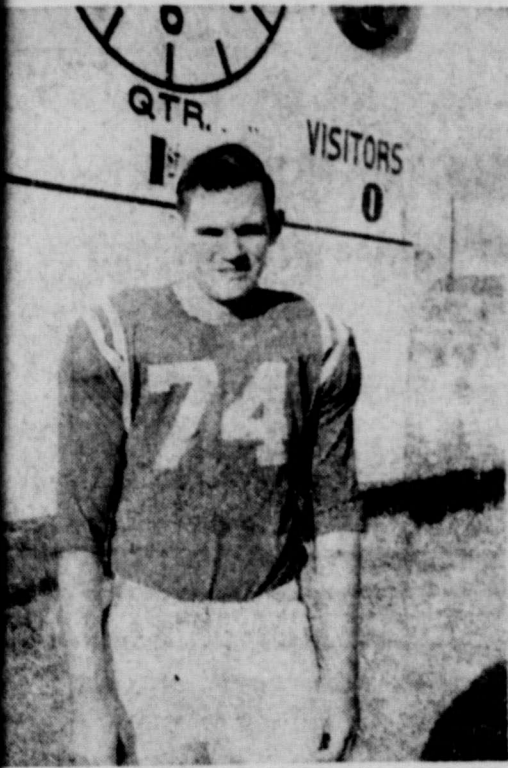
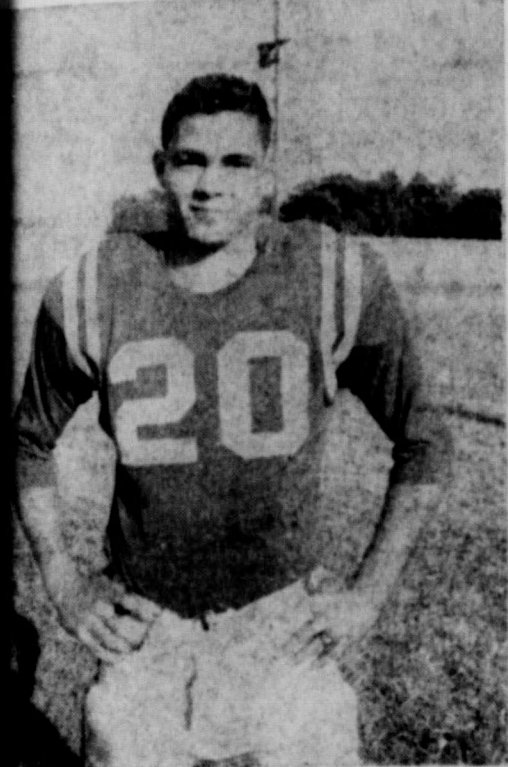

Four Hico players were named to the All-District football team last week. They are Dwain Gray, Barry Polk, Jack Gilliland, and Ronnie Hefner.

The district coaches met last Wednesday night to select the All-District football team for the season just ended. Hico's four players were named to the team.

Gray was named to the offensive team, and Polk and Hefner to the defensive team. Gilliland was named to the backfield as a linebacker's spot.

The district consists of 17-B coaches and school members from 10 districts. The team will be made up of 10 offensive and defensive teams, followed by seven players from each team. Hico and May were named four berths, and Blanket a lone position.

All-district team members will split between the offense and defense, with two repetitions on each team.

Gilliland landed a tackle on the offensive team, and Gray wrapped up a backfield on the team. Ronnie Hefner named to the first defensive unit as an end, and Barry Polk as a linebacker's spot.

Polk and Hefner won all-honors for the second consecutive year, this time in a competitive district. The three were named last year when Hico was named district with Meridian, Valis and Evant, and repeated in the strange loop.

call.

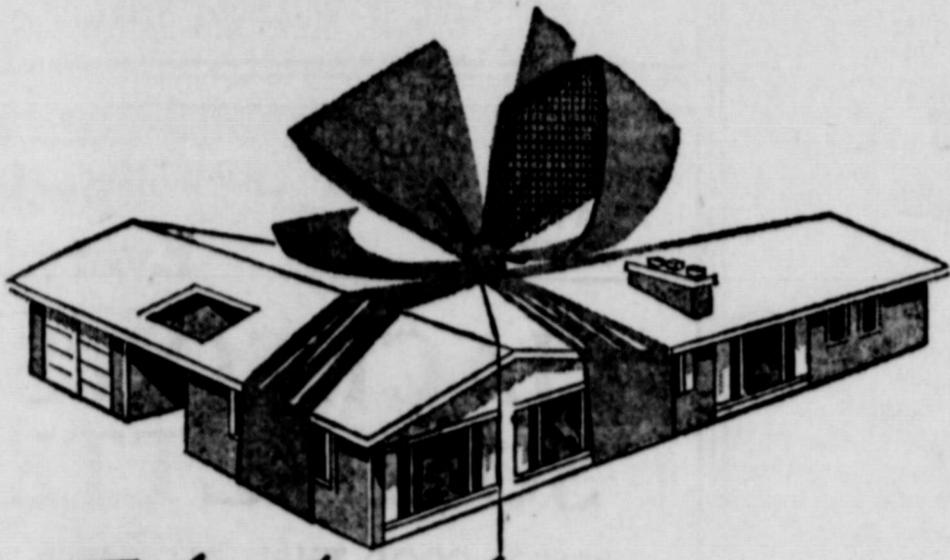
