Hico Homemaking Teacher Honored by Organization

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, homemaking teacher at Hico High School the past four years, has been selected as one of 6,000 "Outstanding Young Women of America," an annual biographical compilation sponsored by leaders of women's organizations.

The biographical compilation honors young women between the ages of 21 and 35 who have distinguished themselves in civic and professional activities.

Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, who serves as honorary chairman of the Board of Advisory Editors for the publication, has said the book is especially meaningful to her because the achievements and abilities of women is a subject close to her heart.

Selections for Outstanding Young Women of America are made by the Board of Advisory Editors.

United States Senator Margaret Chase Smith, in her introductory message for the 1965 edition, said "This book calls attention to the great capabilities of our young women and their ability to get things done."

Miss Eva Adams, Director of the United States Mint, says the women included in the 1966 edition "are marked for recognition because they shunned mediocrity."

The publication was conceived by the leaders of the nation's women's clubs. They felt that young women who give their time for community projects should be recognized. The recognition of these outstanding women can serve to inspire others to give their time to additional civic responsibilities.

Local women's clubs throughout the country submit nominations for the book each year.

Guidelines for selection include unselfish service to others, charitable activities, community service, professional excellence, business advancement, and civic and professional recognition.

New Year's Accident Death Watch Issued by Safety Association

Austin, Dec. 27.—The Texas Safety Association today issued a "New Year's Accidental Death Alert" and challenged Texas drivers to help "score a point for safety" in the weekend traffic countdown.

"The needless loss of life, disabling injuries and suffering caused by traffic accidents can be avoided," S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President said. "But, it will take the cooperation of every driver to do so."

He urged every driver to accept personal responsibility for his actions in traffic. "Put all your driving skills to work, obey traffic laws, drive soberly and be courteous as well as cautious," he said. "Help make the weekend traffic countdown a countdown of lives saved. Score a point for safety."

Past experience indicates that some 36 persons will be killed in traffic accidents in Texas this weekend. Other lives may be lost in accidents in the home or public places.

The TSA "New Year's Accidental Death Alert" begins at 6 p.m. Friday, Dec. 30, and ends at 11:59 p.m. Monday, Jan. 2. It coincides with the period set by the Texas Department of Public Safety for "Operation Death Watch."

The Association joins the DPS, the Texas Highway Department and other groups in coordinated safety programs aimed at reducing accidental deaths during the holiday period.

Employment in County Fell Percent in One Year Period

Employment in Hamilton County fell 5 percent between March 1964 and March 1965 according to one indication of the county's economic condition, "Business Patterns," recently by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the

"Business Patterns" now annually, uses payroll information gathered for the first of each calendar year by the Social Security Administration in most kinds of businesses and industry, but not in agriculture and the self-

employment in the county's businesses covered by the March 1965 totaled 949,000 for the same month in 1964. First quarter payroll for the two years were \$640,000 respectively. The largest group of employees in Hamilton County,

reported a March 1965 total of 317 employees and 3-month payroll of \$178,000. Service firms, the county's second largest group of employers, had a total of 177 employees and \$80,000 in quarterly pay-

roll. Hamilton County ranked 166th among the 254 counties in the state in March 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report.

Comparable figures for Texas as a whole show the state's employment rose some 5 percent during the census period.

A. Garland Adair, Former Hico Editor, Buried at Austin

A Garland Adair, 77, curator emeritus of the Texas Memorial Museum and the man who raised the money for the construction of the museum, died in a Temple hospital Dec. 14. He had been ill for some time.

An Austin resident for 34 years, Adair was most noted for his work with the Texas Memorial Museum, but it was a crowning achievement to an already illustrious career.

As a newspaper publisher and editor for many years, Adair took his place actively in the fraternal, civic, educational, political, and church life of the communities where he lived.

He was a delegate from Hico to the National Democratic Convention in San Francisco in 1920, and in 1924 while editing the Mexia Evening News, he was chosen as a delegate to the convention in New York.

His work as an historian began in earnest in 1932 when he was chosen department historian of the American Legion of Texas and moved to Austin.

In 1935 Adair was appointed chairman of the American Legion Texas Centennial Committee, successful sponsors of the museum.

Adair saw the need for a museum in which to store the treasures of Texas history. He literally raised the museum building near Memorial Stadium—one of Austin's biggest tourist attractions.

To help finance the museum, Adair conceived the idea of the Texas Centennial silver half-dollar, which was coined and sold for \$1 at the Centennial Exposition. The project raised \$151,000. He also prepared legislation by which Austin was made an Exposition City, becoming eligible to receive \$300,000 in federal aid.

As executive director of the Texas Heritage Foundation, Adair worked to bring public recognition to persons of achievement who had an important part in Texas history. He was curator of history at the Texas Memorial Museum since its founding and actively served until 1959.

Born in Queen City, Cass County, March 28, 1889, Adair was the son of a Methodist minister, the Rev. J. B. Adair. He attended Wesley College and the University of Texas where he was president of the Students Association, Council and Assembly. He entered the Army in 1917 and was commissioned a second lieutenant.

Adair held honorary life memberships in the Sons of the Republic of Texas and the Texas Historical Association. In addition he was a fellow in the Texas Academy of Science and a member of the Texas Press Association.

He was author of several books, including "Austin and Commodore Perry," "John Garner Cartoons," and "Under Texas Skies."

The 47th Texas Legislature honored him by designating him to serve as commissioner for the 1945 and 1946 observances of the Texas Centennial of Statehood.

Mr. Adair was editor of the Hico News Review in the early 1920's. Funeral services were held Dec. 15 in Austin, with burial in the State Cemetery.

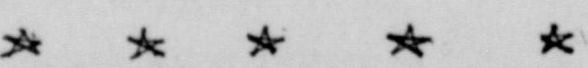

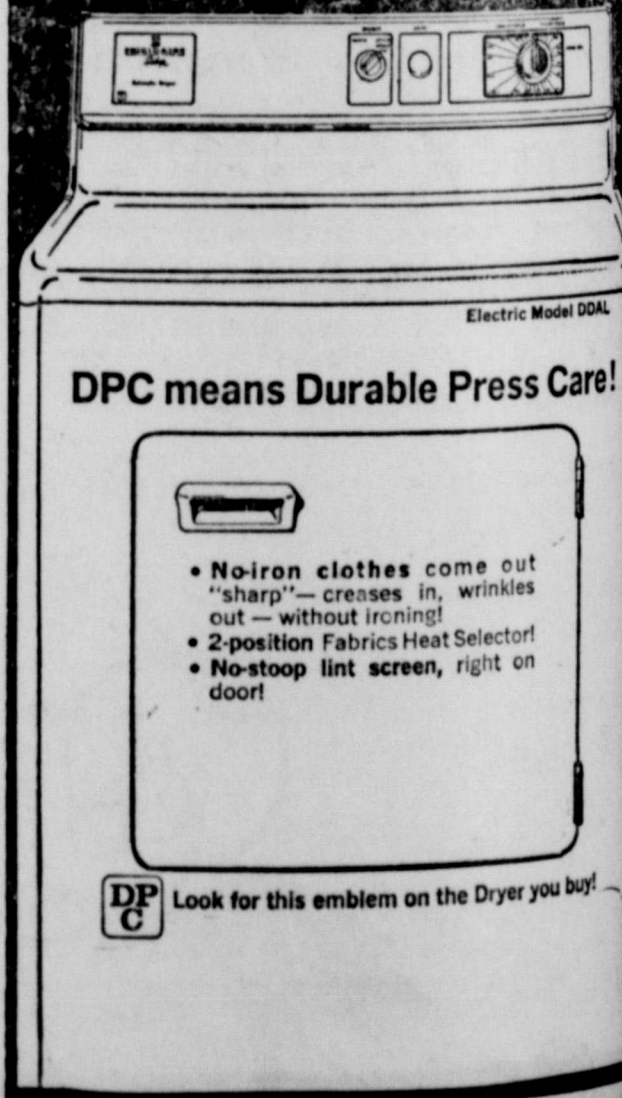

On the Home Range

Has your house outgrown its wires? The fact that your house is relatively new does not necessarily mean that its wiring system is up-to-date. For example, the builder of the house may not have known the extent of your own special electrical needs. Or, the house may have been built to meet a price which did not allow for anything but just "good enough" wiring. Or perhaps after moving in you immediately began adding a lot of extra appliances you hadn't thought about before.

You do not have to be an expert to tell whether or not your house is suffering from "weakness of the wiring." There are many little symptoms that show up every day you live in an inadequately wired home. Here are some of them:

1. Lights flicker and dim when appliances are turned on.
2. Appliances such as irons, roo mheaters, or toasters operate slowly or not as well as they could.
3. Fuses blow or circuit breakers trip too frequently.
4. The TV picture shrinks in size or "winces" when other appliances go into action.
5. The radio fades or sounds scratchy when an appliance is turned on.
6. Too few outlets and switches

where you need them.
7. Multiple "octopus" connections are used for several appliances and lamps at once.
8. Long cords are strung around rooms in order to connect lamps and appliances.

If you recognize these symptoms in your home you are not realizing the fullest benefits of the electricity you pay for. An electrician or power supplier representative can help plan for correction of the symptoms of improper wiring.

Pears are nutritious and low in calories. One pear half contains about 30 calories. Pears can be served in dozens of different ways. They are good plain or topped with whipped cream. Fresh pear pie wedges or stewed pears served with sponge cake are good luncheon desserts. Fresh baked pears are good with oatmeal cookies and upside down pear cake is good all by itself. Salad ideas using pears are almost numberless, but cheese wedges, fresh fruit, and cottage cheese are especially good combined with pears.

Pears also make a good garnish for lamb or pork roasts. Fill the center of the pears with jelly, small fruits, or your favorite salad dressing. Fresh or stewed, cold or hot, plain or garnished, pears make a welcome addition to any meal.

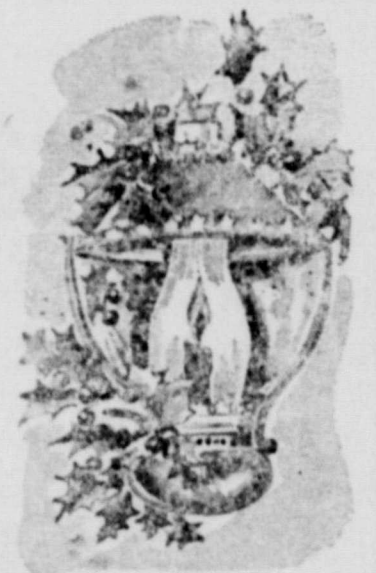

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

The Hamilton County Livestock Show which has been set for February 3, should be one of the best ever. 4-Hers and FFA members are eager and they have some fine animals on feed for the show. 4-H Club members from Pottsville, West Point, Hamilton, Carlton, and the newly organized Hico 4-H Club, and county FFA Chapters will be competing for honors and prizes. The show will be limited this year to FFA and 4-H members attending school or belonging to a club or chapter in Hamilton County. All entries, with the exception of broilers, must be owned and be on feed by January 1, 1967 to be eligible.

Several new classes should add interest and increase the size of the show. There is a class this year for Junior beef bulls (16 months and under). Another class added is for Junior boar pigs (farrowed after August 1, 1966.) Most of the changes will be in the sheep division. Classes have been added for South-downs, and also for the medium wool breeds (Suffolk, Hampshires, Corredale, etc.) Classes for these breeds have been added to the breeding and fat lamb divisions. There are a few more changes, but classes and rules will generally be the same with the exception of changes listed above. Deadline for entries in the show is Friday, January 27.

I have had several reports, and have examined some small grain that has been damaged by the recent hard freeze. Much of the grain received some scorching from the cold, with some severe damage reported. The drought is still the big problem of course, with no relief in sight in the near future. The drought has prevented increases in insects attacking small grains. The winter grain mite is

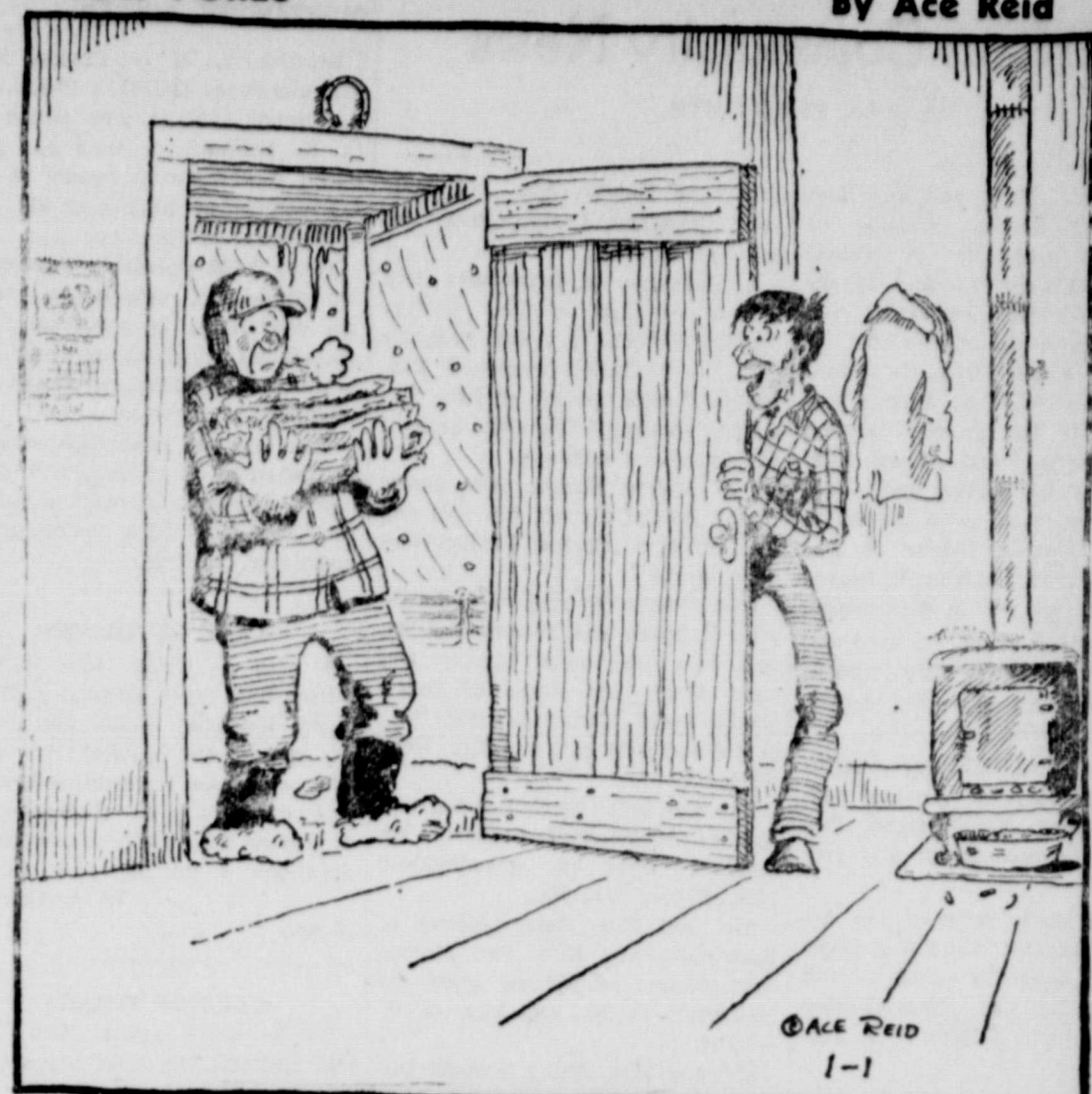
usually around at this time of year, and some greenbugs are not uncommon. So far neither of these pests have caused problems.

I examined Alvin and Willie Perry's irrigated oats last week and we did find a heavy infestation of leafhoppers. These are normal in small grain and seldom cause much damage.

I have had numerous requests recently for control methods for armadillos that are damaging property such as flower beds and lawns. I am sure that the drought we are experiencing is causing these animals to come to the well kept lawns and flower beds in search of food. I would certainly not recommend that armadillos be killed needlessly as their feeding habits are mainly beneficial. They feed primarily on such animals as ants, grasshoppers, crickets, beetles, cut worms, caterpillars, spiders and

earthworms.

In some cases control is necessary. Listed below are several recommendations so that one or more may be chosen as the situation warrants.

1. When practical locate armadillos feeding in the late afternoon and through the night with the aid of a flashlight, and shoot them with a .22 caliber rifle. This of course would be used in a non-residential area.

2. Armadillos usually have a den a short distance from the area in which they are doing the damage. The den is normally a rather large hole in the bank of a creek bed, beneath brush piles or beneath low growing vines or bushes. If the den is located, the armadillos can be killed while in the den during the middle of the day. Saturate

a wad of cotton with carbon disulfide (high-life) and place the saturated cotton well inside the den. Immediately cover the entrance to the den with dirt. The fumes will kill the armadillo within. Carbon disulfide may be obtained at most drug stores. This method, by the way, comes with a high recommendation of a Hamilton resident. He says this can also be used to

thin out the rattlesnake population. 3. Most of you have heard Bob Walsh, Farm Service Advisor for WBAP radio tell of an armadillo trap. These work well and plans for these traps are available in my office. Some other highly effective methods are available for use but I would recommend these only on individual case basis because of the hazards involved.
