★ ALL-WOMAN JURY FINDS TRAFFIC VIOLATOR GUILTY

An out of town traffic violator faced an all-woman jury Wednesday morning in Grover Renfro's Justice Court, and the ladies returned a guilty verdict.

Constable Tom Odom summoned a panel of 12 ladies, six of whom made up the jury.

The violator was represented in the court by a lawyer, with County Attorney H. A. Leaverton taking the state's side on the complaint.

In commenting on the case, Constable Odom complimented the women for serving in a non-complaining manner, and for the efficient way in which the case was handled. This was the first all-women jury ever assembled here.

Mrs. Minnie Bell Emmons, 85, passed away Wednesday, March 8, at Parkview following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were conducted Friday morning at 10 o'clock in Harris-Horn Chapel at Parkview, with Rev. Elmer Elroy officiating. Graveside services were held at Hico Cemetery at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Emmons was born Oct. 6, 1881 at Rockwall, and was the daughter of the late A. T. and Emma Raines Holt. A former resident of Hico, she had been making her home in Parkview the past seven years, and was a member of Hico First Baptist Church. She was a music teacher for many years. Her husband, William M. Emmons, preceded her in death in 1948.

Survivors include two sons, Clyde H. Emmons of Arlington and Claude D. Emmons of Hurst; three step-sons, W. B. Emmons of Victoria, J. R. Emmons of Midland and W. M. Emmons of Breckenridge; one sister, Mrs. Ona McDougal of Dallas; and nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Go Fly Your Kite—But Fly It Safely, Says CPS Manager

Time-tested harbingers of Spring are budding mosquitoes, red-breasted robins, and long-tailed kites diving and swooping through sunny skies. One of the traditional joys of childhood that continues generation after generation is flying a kite on a windy March day; and, according to the American Kite Association, it is a sport that also is enjoyed year-round by many enthusiastic adults.

"Whether young or old, smart kite-flyers will observe the basic rules of safety," says O. L. Davis, local manager for Community Public Service Co. "One of the most important rules is never to fly a kite where there is a possibility of its getting entangled in electric wires."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite-flying include using metal string or wire, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve it if it becomes tangled upon electric wires. As a reminder, CPS has distributed kite safety posters for school bulletin boards.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Friday, March 10 in Greenwood Chapel, with burial in Greenwood, Fort Worth.

Mr. Barrow was born in Hico January 1, 1882. He started his business career in the retail lumber business with his father, D. G. Barrow, in Hico. Leaving here he went into the sawmills in Louisiana, and from there he traveled as a lumber salesman over Texas, New Mexico and parts of Oklahoma.

Mr. Barrow was an avid hunter and fisherman; was a member of Hemphill Heights Presbyterian Church; Texas Lumbermen's Association; International Order of Hoo-Hoo; past member of Flat Top Sportsman Club, Walnut Springs; McKinney Lake Club; the old Katy and Echo Lake Clubs of Ft. Worth; Elks Club, Houston.

Survivors include two nephews, George White and Norris Barrow, both of Houston; several great-nieces and nephews; and two sisters-in-law, Florence and Ruth Lilly of Dallas.

FORMER HICO MAN DIES IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Walter I. Malone, son of the late Charlie and Bell Malone, passed away January 10 in Washington, D. C. at the age of 71. He was born and reared in Hico, and was a veteran of World War I. He spent his later years in Washington where he was employed as a security guard at the White House. He was buried in Washington.

Science Exhibit Winners Named Following Judging

Hico High School's chemistry and biology students exhibited science projects last week during Public School Week. Mrs. Lucille Brummett, chemistry teacher, and David Anderson, biology teacher, advised the group.

Dr. A. B. Medlen, Head of the Biological Science Department, and Dr. E. O. Morrison, member of that Department at Tarleton State College, interviewed the Hico students and judged the science projects Thursday afternoon.

Jack Gilliland, senior chemistry student, placed first in the Chemistry division, exhibiting "Effects of Different Substances on Plant Growth." His project featured Florida tomato plants grown under the same conditions but fed with different plant foods—commercial fertilizers, carbonated water, Gibberellic acid, ammonium hydroxide, and tea. Gilliland discovered, after recording data and comparing notes, that tea made the best plant food.

Second place winners in the chemistry class were Joe Tooley and Steve Knudson.

Knudson's project was an experiment with the reaction time of after images. The experiment consisted of the average time it took for different individuals to see the after images of certain colors. Knudson stated that an after image is formed when one's eyes get tired of a color and set up another color in its place in an effort to relieve the eye nerves.

Tooley's project, "Rorschach Test" consisted of mounted ink blots resembling various shapes and forms. Tooley asked different age groups to identify the blots and compared the male and female reactions. "This test is often used by psychiatrists," Tooley said.

Danny Jenkins won third place with "A Study on Hibernation and Hypothermia." Jenkins studied the

Bill Rutledge Receives Promotion Following Basic Combat Training

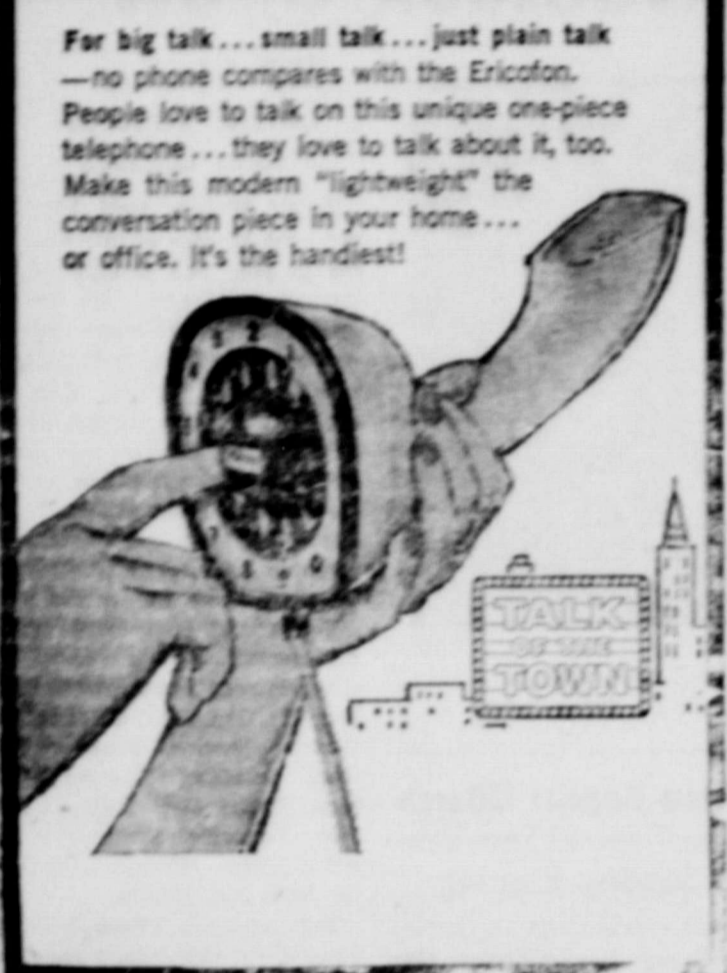

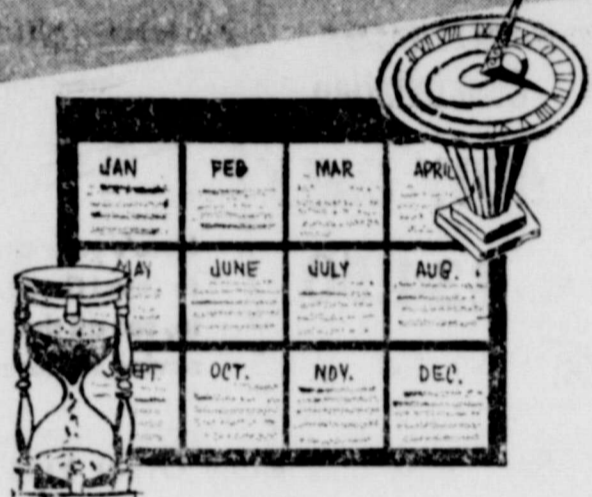

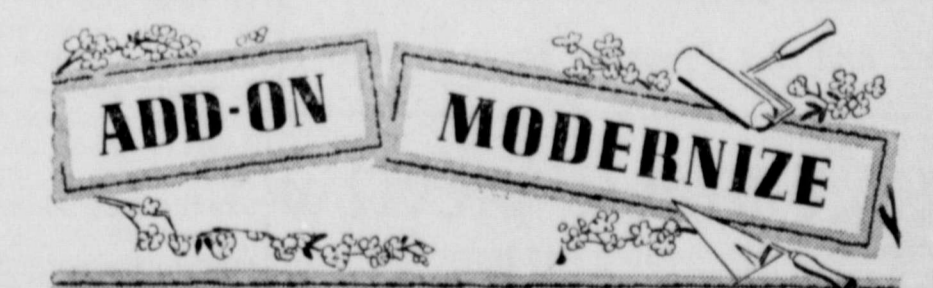

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

With the appearance of the first fruit blossoms in the spring you are already behind on a good spraying program. Whether we have a few back yard trees or a good size orchard we certainly like to grow nice, well formed fruit. There are several insects and diseases with us every year that make producing good fruit a task. The major fruit diseases we are concerned with are brown rot and peach scab. The fruit insects causing the most damage in our area are the plum curculio and the stink bug.

Scab occurs on both plum and peach trees. On peach, there are small dark green or black superficial spots or blotches which occur on the fruit, usually on one side near the stem. Scabbed fruit declines in quality and may decay. Brown rot also occurs on both peach and plums. There is brown decay on the fruit, decayed portions become covered with a dusty mass of spores. Often small brown weevils and other insects feed on the decaying fruit, and are mistaken for the offender, while in reality it was brown rot damage.

The plum curculio is familiar to us all. He is that half-worm we find after biting into a peach or plum. They do extensive damage each year when uncontrolled.

The stink bug feeds on the outside of the fruit. Damaged peaches appear water-soaked and dimpled and frequently strings of gum exude from the feeding punctures.

The important thing to remember is that these diseases and insects must be controlled starting now. There are several good safe insecticides for the control of the plum curculio, the stink bug, and other insects. The diseases and fungi may be controlled easily and inexpensively by including wettable sulphur in your insecticide mixture.
